Bob Dye, Cal State Fullerton head coach heading into his seventh season, is featured on the cover of CSF's 1979-80 media guide. Dye has led the Titans to six consecutive winning seasons (a feat never before accomplished at CSF), one Pacific Coast Athletic Assn. conference championship (in 1975-76) a PCAA Tournament championship (1977-78) and the finals of the NCAA West Regionals (1978). His record at CSF is 99-61. Dye needs 38 wins to become the winningest Titan coach in history.

CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITY, FULLERTON

California State University, Fullerton is a relatively young institution, having opened only two decades ago. However, it already has grown to 21,500 students and achieved national distinction.

The university's students come primarily from Southern California with many from other states and other nations. Most students commute each day to and from classes; many come to classes only in the evening.

Drawn from throughout the world, the 750-member faculty is noted for its commitment to effective teaching and scholarly activity. Research is actively pursued, typically with students involved.

The university enjoys full accreditation for its over-all program. In addition, national recognition has been accorded to programs in art, athletic training, business, chemistry, education, engineering, journalism, music, speech and hearing, and theater. All told there are 79 degree programs — 37 of them at the graduate level.

Reinforcing classroom instruction is the largest university level internship and cooperative education program on the West Coast. The program allows students to gain on-the-job experience while continuing their regular studies.

Another amenity is the extended education program. It provides classes, workshops, conferences and study tours on a year-round basis. Extended education offerings are open to the community without the formalities of regular admission to the university.

Yet another strong point is the university's cultural events program, including a series that brings nationally known professional artists to the campus for residencies as well as public performances.

A new development is formation of a professional caliber symphony orchestra to provide the university community and area residents with high-quality music.

An extensive recreation program aimed chiefly at students but also open to community members is another highlight, as is the 7,000-person network of community support organizations. The Titan Athletic Foundation is one of these support groups.

Further examples of community outreach are the Fullerton Arboretum and Tucker Wildlife Sanctuary. Opened in 1979, the Arboretum is a 25-acre on-campus preserve that was established jointly by the university and the City of Fullerton. Tucker Wildlife Sanctuary is a half-hour from campus in a canyon of the Santa Ana Mountains.

To reinforce the university's commitment to high academic standards and community service, President L. Donald Shields has recently embarked on an ambitious campaign called "Partners in Excellence." Its purpose is to raise the necessary non-state funding to achieve the president's chief goal for the university. That goal is to make Cal State Fullerton the foremost bachelor's/master's degree granting institution in the nation.



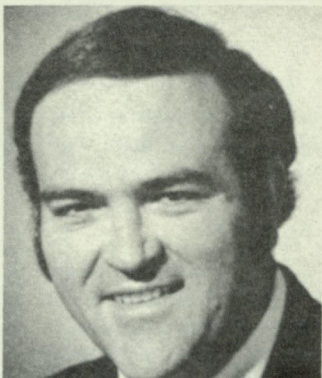
DR. L. DONALD SHIELDS

PRESIDENT

Dr. L. Donald Shields became president of California State University, Fullerton in 1971. At the time he was 34, making him the youngest chief executive of a major state university in the nation.

Since 1974, Dr. Shields has served as a member of the National Science Board, having been appointed by President Ford and confirmed by the U.S. Senate. He also is the only person from the western United

States currently serving on the National Commission for Cooperative Education.



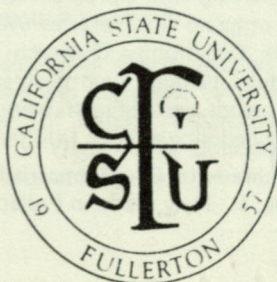
Dr. Shields received his undergraduate education at University of California, Riverside, then went on to earn his Ph.D. in chemistry from UCLA.

Dr. Shields joined the Cal State Fullerton faculty in 1963 as an assistant professor of chemistry. He became an associate professor in 1966 and a full professor in 1967. He was elected chair of the Faculty Council in 1967 and later that year became the campus' first vice president for administration. From October 1970 to May 1971, he was acting president of the University.

Dr. Shields has authored three books and numerous articles in professional journals. He had addressed or participated in professional meetings throughout the United States, and in 1976 represented the National Science Board in Vienna, Austria, at the first biennial international symposium at the International Institute for Applied Systems Analysis.

Among Dr. Shields' community activities are having chaired the Disneyland Community Service Awards Committee, being a trustee of the World Affairs Council of Orange County, and being a director of Orange County Sports Celebrities.

Since 1978, Dr. Shields' foremost goal is to make Cal State Fullerton the most outstanding bachelor's/master's degree granting institution in the nation within five years.



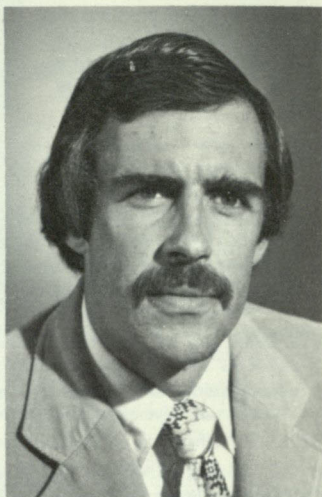
RONALD G. ANDRIS

INTERIM DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Ronald G. Andris, Director of University Recreation at Cal State Fullerton the past five years, is CSF's interim Director of Athletics.

Andris succeeded Neale R. Stoner who resigned to accept a similar position at the University of Illinois.

"I realize this is an interim appointment," Andris said. "My role is to keep the program moving forward; the same direction Neale had it going.



"I also see my role as one of maintaining a positive relationship between the athletic department at the Titan Athletic Foundation, which is obviously vital to the success of the program.

"This position is a tremendous challenge and I'm excited about it. And, quite frankly I was surprised when offered the job."

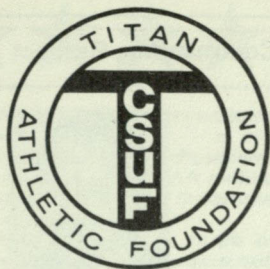
Ronald George Andris, 36, was born Feb. 22, 1943 in Chicago. He graduated from the University of Illinois in 1966 with a bachelor of science degree in physical education.

He earned his Master's in kinesiology from UCLA in 1969, with a minor in administration.

Following his graduation from Illinois, Andris became a graduate instructor at UCLA. In 1967 he became associated with UCLA's Recreation Program, running the Men's Intramural Sports Program. When he left in 1974 the program had 28 sports (up from 23) and overall 5,000 students involved (up from 2,000).

Andris was named CSF's Director of University Recreation in 1974, starting with a program with less than 1,500 students. The program now services over 5,000 students, and through its Community Outreach Program, services children and adults through such programs as gymnastics, summer sports camps and summer swimming. He is also responsible for scheduling athletic facilities usage.

Andris, and his wife Cherri (married 12 years), have one child, Nicole, 5. They reside in Fullerton.

The Titan Athletic Foundation is a non-profit organization with the express purpose of aiding the athletic program at Cal State Fullerton. It is a group of individuals, not necessarily alumni, who have a genuine interest in athletics and the University.

It is community involvement for some, business involvement for others, or simply an interest in a fine sports program that has attained national recognition and respect the past few years.

The foundation supports the athletic program by providing funds for scholarships and grants-in-aid which insure an effective recruiting program that attracts the best student-athletes available.

The Titan Athletic Foundation was founded in January 1973, and is the University's official athletic booster organization. In the TAF's first year approximately \$30,000 was raised and 150 members enlisted. Just six years later the TAF raised almost a quarter-of-a-million dollars and has a membership of about a thousand.

Fullerton businessman Pierre Nicolas was the TAF's first president, and was succeeded by Don Karcher, executive vice-president of Karcher Enterprises. Buck Johns, general manager of Trane Home Comfort Center, became the TAF's third president in the summer of 1978.

PCAA: It's a League Commanding Respect

While the Pacific Coast Athletic Association is not as widely known as it is going to be, the Conference which embraces universities in California and Utah, is commanding increasing amounts of respect.

Cal State Fullerton's drive to the 1979 NCAA Division I baseball championship and the "Cinderella Story" spun by the same school's basketball team in 1978 when the upset-minded Titans won the hearts of fans all over the nation are a couple of recent happenings which have focused attention on the PCAA.

But they are not the only things. Far from it.

Although the PCAA is starting only its second decade of life, the construction of a solid base for the NCAA Division 1-A Conference has always been foremost in the thinking of the architects of the league.

Jesse T. Hill, the highly esteemed director of athletics at USC for 26 years, was instrumental in obtaining automatic qualification for NCAA championships in several sports and in 1976 played a key role in the inauguration of the highly successful post season basketball tournament.

Formation of the Northern and Southern California Baseball Associations intermingling the members of the PCAA and WCAC Conferences was a Hill project hailed as a major money saver by both leagues.

Stability, financial security and national respect were the legacy left by Hill, the PCAA'S first full-time commissioner, who served for six and one half years until retiring in June of 1978.

But since Lewis A. Cryer came aboard as commissioner July 1, 1978, the character of the PCAA has broadened to include a new boldness. Cryer is a mover, an aggressive promoter and an achiever.

Consider the major events of his first year in the commissioner's chair:

1) Obtaining NCAA sanction for the **California Bowl** game beginning in 1980 in Fresno between the champions of the PCAA and the Mid-American Conferences.

2) Negotiation of a contract giving the Conference a regional television audience for its football and basketball "games-of-the-week" and post season basketball tourney.

3) Improvement, particularly financially, of the already flourishing post season PCAA basketball tournament which has automatic qualification into the NCAA tournament for the champion.

Directing the smooth inaugural year for Utah State as a PCAA member was another success.

Without question, it was the most progressive and financially successful year the PCAA has ever had.

Cal State Fullerton's championship in baseball is the 10th NCAA Division I crown earned by PCAA members.

San Jose State has captured seven titles — three in boxing, two in cross country and one each in golf and outdoor track.

UC Irvine owns an NCAA water polo title while former member San Diego State earned a national volleyball crown.

Individuals representing PCAA institutions have annexed a total of 92 NCAA championships with the five won by Utah State in 1978-79 — two in indoor track and three in outdoor track — being the latest.

San Jose State competitors have been declared national champions 43 times while CSU Long Beach representatives own 15 gold medals including nine in swimming.

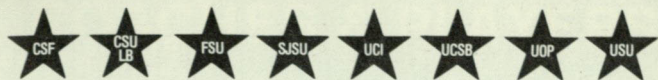
Six of the nine titles earned by CSU Los Angeles came in gymnastics. All eight of San Diego State's championships have been in outdoor track.

All but one of Fresno State's seven title-winning efforts have been in outdoor track.

Individual NCAA championships have been claimed by representatives of every PCAA member institution. UC Irvine owns two in outdoor track, UC Santa Barbara one in swimming and Pacific one in outdoor track.

Prior to moving up to the Division I level, PCAA members ran away with 36 team crowns and 155 individual championships in NCAA Division II and its predecessor, the College Division. In fact, UCI still ranks first in number of team and individual championships with 15 and 61, respectively.

A desire to form a Division I football conference is the spark that led to the formation of the PCAA July 1, 1969.

Five of the seven charter members of the Pacific Coast Athletic Association still are part of the league. They are: CSU Long Beach, Fresno State, San Jose State, University of the Pacific and UC Santa Barbara.

UCSB, however, has altered its goals. The Gauchos terminated their football program at the end of the 1971 season and were themselves terminated by the league in 1974. But UCSB returned to the fold sans football in 1976 after the conference rescinded its football requirements.

The other charter member, CSU Los Angeles, retrenched its program and left the conference after the 73-74 season.

San Diego State, a recognized rising national power, particularly in football, bolted the conference in that sport after the '75 campaign. The Aztecs competed in the other PCAA championship events through the 1977-78 year when the school became part of the WAC alignment.

Cal State Fullerton was granted PCAA membership in the summer of 1974 and began league title play in 1974-75. The Titans entered football play in 1975.

UC Irvine, like UCSB, a non-football school, became a member in July, 1977. That October Utah State became the first non-California member of the circuit.

"The addition of Utah State to the PCAA family is one of the most significant events in the history of the conference," Cryer asserts. "It transformed the PCAA into a regional conference and brought us into the Salt Lake City and Rocky Mountain markets."

There's a combined enrollment of 137,128 students at the eight PCAA member institutions, CSU Long Beach is the largest with 32,000 students and University of the Pacific, the only private university in the conference, the smallest with 6,200 students.

When Commissioner Cryer accepted the position as administrative leader of the PCAA he noted, "Talented people at great universities provide a wealth of opportunities for the conference to grow and prosper."

In its first decade, the PCAA has had some outstanding leadership from men like Dr. Stephen Goodspeed, vice chancellor at UC Santa Barbara, the first president and chairman of the founders' committee.

George Ilg of Fresno State chaired the conference for two years before turning over the gavel to Dr. Edward Betz of Pacific. Dr. Richard Post of San Jose State chaired the conference until July 1, 1976 when San Diego State's Dr. Jim Malik assumed leadership.

Currently, the PCAA is being directed by the enthusiastic, dedicated leadership of Frank Bowman of CSU Long Beach as president.

Both Ilg and Betz have served as NCAA District 8 vice presidents. Pacific President Dr. Stanley McCaffrey serves on the NCAA's Division I Steering Committee in addition to being on the jury that selects the recipient of one of the NCAA's most prestigious honors, the Theodore Roosevelt Award.

Utah State athletic director Ladell Anderson currently serves on the NCAA basketball committee.

While the PCAA has acquired a degree of maturity in its first 10 years, it has not come at the sacrifice of boldness nor in the curbing of enthusiasm and creative approaches to making a good thing better; namely the PCAA, a Division I league with a future that appears even brighter than its illustrious past.

HEAD COACH BOB DYE

Success and Bob Dye. The word and the name are synonymous.

The close association of the two was finally realized in 1978 as Dye led Cal State "WHO" past two nationally ranked teams (New Mexico and Univ. of San Francisco) to the finals of the NCAA West Regional in Albuquerque, N.M. Although the Titans came up three points short of defeating another nationally ranked team — Arkansas — sports-writers and sportcasters throughout the country proclaimed Dye the unofficial coach of the year.



The season was the best ever at Cal State Fullerton, with the Titans finishing 23-9 overall. CSF won two tournament championships (the PCAA Tournament and the Viking Invitational at Portland), placed second in the NCAA West Regional tourney and finished third at the Cougar Classic in Provo, Utah.

However, the remarkable season was the result of a slow, steady building program instituted by Dye when he was hired by CSF in May 1973.

For the nine years prior to Dye's arrival at Cal State Fullerton, the basketball program had been a consistent loser — none of those teams had compiled a winning record.

Dye's first season at CSF resulted in a 16-10 record. Succeeding teams have compiled marks of 13-11 (1974-75), 15-10 (1975-76), 16-10 (1976-77), 23-9 (1977-78) and 16-10 (1978-79). His Titan teams have won 99 of 160 games; winning 63-percent of their games.

In CSF's 19-year history of intercollegiate basketball, Dye's record of six consecutive winning seasons is a first.

Turning programs around is nothing new for Dye.

Prior to taking over the reins at CSF, the 41-year old Downey, Calif. native (born May 16, 1937) was the head coach at Santa Monica City College. He took a team that had not won a league championship in 45 years of competition (losing 60-percent of its games along the way) and compiled a record of 115-53 (69-percent) during his six-year tenure.

Santa Monica City won the California Junior College championship in 1972, and Dye was named JC Coach-of-the-Year for his efforts. The Corsairs won their first conference title the same season. Sidney Wicks, an All NBA forward and former UCLA All-America, is one of the many standouts Dye coached at Santa Monica CC.

Dye graduated from Downey High School in 1956 following a prep basketball career that saw him earn All-CIF honors as a guard. He then attended Fullerton Junior College (under head coach Alex Omalev), where he started for two seasons. Dye was an All-Conference selection for the Hornets in 1957 and '58, and led the team in scoring as a freshman.

The following two seasons found him at Idaho State. After graduating in 1962, he returned to Southern California as the head coach at St. John Bosco High School in Bellflower. His first year at St. John Bosco, Dye suffered his first, and only, losing season as head coach (8-12). In three years at S. John Bosco, Dye compiled an over-all record of 43-24 (winning 64-percent).

Dye became assistant coach at Cerritos Junior College under Jim Killingsworth in 1966, and in 1968 was named head coach at Santa Monica City. Dye became the Titans' third head coach in the school's history when he replaced Moe Radovich (Radovich coached the 1972-73 season, and Alex Omalev from 1960-72).

In 1975-76 Dye led the Titans to their first-ever conference championship, winning the Pacific Coast Athletic Assn. title; in only the second season as a member of the conference and the NCAA's Division I.

He and his wife, Judy, have two children — Kelley, 20, and Stacy, 7. They reside in Yorba Linda.

MARK WARKENTIEN (CSF '76)

Mark Warkentien, 26, enters his second year as an assistant to coach Bob Dye.

Warkentien came to the Titans from UC Riverside in 1978, where he was the head coach of the Highlanders' women's team. His one season at UCR he compiled an overall record of 18-7.

He is a 1976 graduate of Cal State Fullerton, and played basketball at Ramona High School (Riverside, Calif.) and Riverside City College. The Ramona team finished 22-5 and won the Citrus Belt League championship Warkentien's senior season. He was an All-Mission Conference selection in 1972 at Riverside City JC under then head coach Bill Mulligan.

Following his graduation from Riverside City, Warkentien became a graduate assistant to Mulligan, spending two seasons there (1973 and '74). Both teams won the Mission Conference championship, compiling records of 28-6 ('73) and 27-8 ('74).

When Mulligan became head coach at Saddleback Junior College in 1975, Warkentien followed him there as an assistant coach. The '75 team compiled a record of 22-8, and in 1976 won the Mission Conference championship with 25-9 mark.

Warkentien was born April 16, 1953 in Huntington, Indiana.



DONNY DANIELS (CSF '77)

Former Cal State Fullerton basketball standout Donny Daniels is the newest assistant to Titans' head coach Bob Dye.

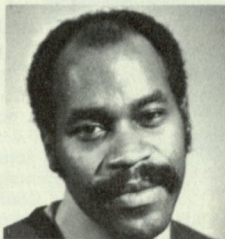
Daniels, 25, was a two-year starter at guard for CSF in 1974-75 and '75-76. The Titans won their only Pacific Coast Athletic Assn. title in the '75-76 season. Daniels averaged 8.5 points his junior year and 7.2 points as a senior, and was selected as the team's Best Defensive Player following his senior season. The Titans were 13-11 and 15-10 in Daniels' two seasons as a player. He graduated from CSF with a degree in criminal justice in 1977.

Donald F. Daniels was born August 3, 1954 in New Orleans, LA. He attended Verbum Dei High School in Los Angeles, and was a starter on two straight CIF championship teams under coaches George McQuarn and Kenny Booker.

Following his graduation in 1972, he attended Scottsdale (Ariz.) Community College, and was named the team's Best Defensive Player as a 6-3 guard/forward.

He transferred to Harbor Junior College for his sophomore season and was an All-Southern California Conference selection and the team's MVP for coach Jim White. Dye recruited Daniels for Cal State Fullerton.

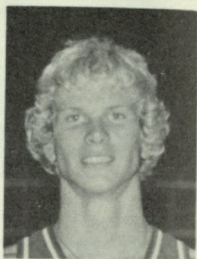
Daniels was a graduate assistant under Dye last season.

1979-80 BASKETBALL PREVIEW

The past six seasons Cal State Fullerton's Titans have averaged almost 17 wins a year, without a bona fide center.

Enter one Stan Ray, a 6-9 redshirt out of Missouri who was the Most Valuable Player in the Big-8 tournament two seasons ago, and the prospects of another successful Titan season seem indeed bright.

Added to a front line that includes returning starter Calvin Roberts (6-7, a first-team All-PCAA selection), lettermen Tom Morgan (6-6), Daryl Roper (6-8), redshirt Lance Ball (6-9), junior college recruit Bruce LaVallee (6-8) and the Titans would appear set.

However, CSF lost three of four guards that started at one time or another last winter. Keith Anderson and Kevin Heenan started for three seasons and each scored over 1,000 points in his career. Mike Linden set a CSF season record for assists and was number two on the career assist ladder behind Anderson. Only George Barrios (6-0), who averaged 2.0 points per game, returns to the backcourt. Junior college recruits Tommy Wight (6-4) and Michael Knight (6-2) are expected to pick up the slack.

"We feel very comfortable with the players on the front line," says Bob Dye, Titan head coach whose teams have won 99 of 160 games the past six years. "Ray gives us a legitimate center for the first time, and Roberts is a quality athlete. We feel Lance Ball can be an exceptional player and Bruce LaValle was an excellent JC forward. Morgan and Roper have already proven they can play at this level.

"Obviously, our major concern was the loss of three quality guards and their replacements. Barrios did a fine job for us last season, and Wight and Knight are talented. We feel all three can do the job for us. Richard Polee, who did not play as much as we would have liked last year will also be a factor, as will Kevin Bowland.

"This team should have good depth overall, good height and speed. Our guards must mature quickly to this level of play."

The Titans finished 16-11 overall last season, and 7-7 in the PCAA. Roberts, who blocked 40 shots, led the team in scoring (15.3 points) and rebounding (9.2 per game) enroute to his selection as an All-PCAA performer. The 6-7 native of Tarboro, N.C. shot 54-percent from the floor and 74-percent from the line. He is the Titans' candidate for post-season honors.

Stan Ray, who will be a senior (as will Roberts), averaged 7.3 rebounds and 8.8 points his last season at Missouri. Tom Morgan, another senior, averaged 5.9 points and 3.8 rebounds for the Titans last year, and Daryl Roper, yet another senior, 2.6 points and 2.7 rebounds. Paul Gilbert (6-7, sophomore) and Franklin Berry (6-4, senior) saw spot duty.

Bruce LaValle was an All-Conference performer last season at Saddleback JC. The 6-8 native of Montclair, Calif., scored 14.4 points and averaged 7.4 rebounds in leading the Gauchos to a second place finish in the state junior college tournament.

Besides scoring only 2.0 points per game, George Barrios (a junior) handed out 62 assists in 24 games. Kevin Bowland, a 6-4 sophomore guard from Brea, Calif., and Richard Polee, a 6-2 sophomore guard from L.A. Morningside High School, each averaged less than a point a game in seeing very limited action.

Junior college transfer Tommy Wight averaged 20.8 points per game and 5.6 assists in leading Riverside (Calif.) JC to the state JC tournament. The 6-4 junior shot 58-percent from the floor and 72-percent from the line.

Also entering the CS Fullerton basketball picture will be newcomer Michael Knight. The 6-2 transfer out of Pepperdine, will attempt to help fill the gap left by the departure of Keith Anderson. Knight averaged 16.2 points per game two seasons ago and shot 76-percent from the line. Knight had 121 assists and 90 steals. He is reputed to have blinding speed.

Another player signed by the Titans this year is 6-5, guard-forward Dennis Smith. The Washington State transfer should also figure heavily into Coach Dye's plans for the upcoming season.
