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MEDIA INFORMATION

PRESS CREDENTIALS: Will be issued on a per game basis only. Requests should be made as far in advance as possible. When time permits, credentials will be mailed. If not, press will call is located in the main ticket booth behind home plate.

PHOTO CREDENTIALS: Will be issued on a per game basis only and must be worn in plain sight at all times.

PRESS BOX: Is located in the top row of the central section of grandstands located directly behind home plate. It is an "open air" facility — cooled, heated and ventilated by Mother Nature. Seating at the working counter is limited to approximately seven persons.

TELEPHONES: There is only one telephone — (714) 773-3970 — available in the press box and it must be kept free for messages, other scores, etc. Ample phones are available in the sports information office or the athletic department after games. Additional phones should be ordered through the Cal State Fullerton business office and Mr. Joe Dusbabek at (714) 773-2421 and well in advance.

TELECOPIERS: One is available upon request in advance.

RADIO: One telephone will be provided the designated commercial station for the visiting team but a modular extension cord of approximately 50 feet must be provided by the radio station. All line charges must be charged to the radio station. There are no enclosed booths. The broadcast position is behind home plate.

TELEVISION: An elevated platform behind home plate is available for one camera. There are no other camera locations.

ELECTRICAL POWER: Is limited to two outlets in the press box area.

PARKING: Is FREE on Friday nights and all day Saturday and Sunday. For other games, a fee of 50 cents (two quarters) is required upon entry for a daily permit in Lot A, at the northwest corner of the campus accessible from either State College or Yorba Linda Boulevard.

CAL STATE FULLERTON CAMPUS



California State University, Fullerton, is a relatively young institution, having opened only 23 years ago. However, it already has grown to more than 24,000 students and achieved national distinction.

The university's students come primarily from Southern California with many from other states and other nations. Most students commute each day to and from classes; many come to classes only in the evening.

Drawn from throughout the world, the 750-member faculty is noted for its commitment to effective teaching and scholarly activity. Research is actively pursued, typically with students involved.

The university enjoys full accreditation for its overall program. In addition, national recognition has been accorded to programs in art, athletic training, business, chemistry, education, engineering, communications, music, speech and hearing, and theater. All told there are 81 degree programs — 39 of them at the graduate level.

Reinforcing classroom instruction is the largest university level internship and cooperative education program on the West Coast. The program allows students to gain on-the-job experience while continuing their regular studies.

Another amenity is the extended education program. It provides classes, workshops, conferences and study tours on a year-round basis. Extended education offerings are open to the community without the formalities of regular admission to the university.

Still another strong point is the university's cultural events program, including a series that brings nationally known professional artists to the campus for residencies as well as public performances.

A more recent development is formation of a professional caliber symphony orchestra to provide the university community and area residents with high-quality music.

An extensive recreation program aimed chiefly at students but also open to community members is another highlight, as is the 7,000-person network of community support organizations. The Titan Athletic Foundation is one of these support groups.

Further examples of community outreach are the Fullerton Arboretum and Tucker Wildlife Sanctuary. Opened in 1979, the Arboretum is a 25-acre on-campus preserve that was established jointly by the university and the City of Fullerton. Tucker Wildlife Sanctuary is a half-hour from campus in a canyon of the Santa Ana Mountains.

To reinforce the university's commitment to high academic standards and community services, Cal State has embarked on an ambitious campaign called "Partners in Excellence." Its purpose is to raise the necessary non-state funding to make the university the foremost bachelor's master's degree institution in the nation.

ADMINISTRATION

Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb, President



Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb was appointed the third president of Cal State Fullerton on July 8, 1981. Her selection was the culmination of a nationwide search begun in November, 1980 to replace Dr. L. Donald Shields, who had resigned after a ten-year term to accept the presidency of Southern Methodist University.

Dr. Cobb had served as Dean of Douglass College at Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey, since 1976. There she also held the rank of Professor of Biological Sciences. Prior to her Douglass appointment she was Dean of Connecticut College and Professor of Zoology for seven years. Previously, she was Professor of Biology at Sarah Lawrence College in New York.

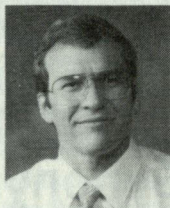
Born in January, 1924, Dr. Cobb is known for her work in cell physiology, her promotion of the advancement of women in scientific fields and her activities on behalf of minorities. She is the first black woman to head a major public university on the west coast.

Cobb earned her bachelor's degree in 1944 from Talladega College in Alabama and her M.S. and Ph.D. in cell physiology from New York University in 1947 and 1950, respectively. She is the mother of a son, Jonathan, who is a student in the Cornell University Medical School.

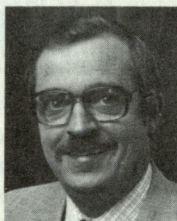

The Titan Athletic Foundation is a non-profit organization that exists solely to aid the athletic program at Cal State Fullerton. It is a group of individuals with a genuine interest in athletics, the University and the community.

The foundation supports athletics by providing funds for scholarships that insure an effective recruiting program which attracts the best student-athletes available. The 1982 drive totaled nearly \$300,000.

The TAF was founded in January, 1973 and the initial 150 members raised approximately \$30,000. Membership today totals more than 800.

Fullerton businessman Pierre Nicolas was the TAF's first president. He was succeeded by Don Karcher, president of Carl Karcher Enterprises; Buck Johns, president of Home Works; Larry Slagle, vice president of Yellow Cab of North Orange County; and current president Jim Woods, president and chairman of the board of Baker Oil Tools.

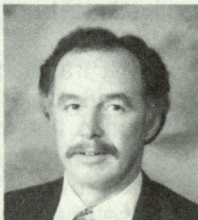

Titan Baseball Synonymous with Success

At a recent sportswriters luncheon in Anaheim Stadium, visiting Hall of Famer Yogi Berra was asked if he had ever heard of Cal State Fullerton.

"Sure," said Yogi quickly. "They have a good baseball program."

In many parts of the country, Cal State Fullerton is synonymous with college baseball. Nine consecutive conference titles, the 1979 national championship and the blossoming of Tim Wallach as a star with the Montreal Expos have put Titan baseball on the map. Such accomplishments were far from the mind of Beryl Kempton when he volunteered to grade the first Cal State Fullerton diamond north of the gymnasium back in 1964. What had been a club team began play with a 13-man roster and a history professor as coach in Warren Beck.

Physical education instructor Bill Fulton raised the program to a more competitive level but it was Augie Garrido's arrival in 1973 that set the stage for greatness.

After a transitional losing season, Garrido quickly turned the program around with junior college players and won the California Collegiate Athletic Association title in 1974 to advance to the Far West Division II regional.

The step up to Division I in 1975 only served to accelerate Fullerton's baseball growth. The Titans won the Pacific Coast Athletic Association crown and upset the reigning dynasty — USC — on its home field in the regionals.

A short-lived trip to the College World Series in Omaha only served to whet the appetite for a return visit.

The string of championships continued with another PCAA title in 1976 and the first of six consecutive Southern California Baseball Assn. crowns in 1977. This alignment currently includes Pepperdine, UC Santa Barbara, Long Beach State, UC Irvine, Loyola-Marymount, University of San Diego and Cal State L.A. and is one of the most powerful conferences in the nation.

The Titans hit the jackpot in 1979, beating UCLA in the regionals and then capturing the NCAA championship with a 2-1 win over Arkansas.

They did it the hard way, losing in the first round of both the regional and national tournament, which are double elimination affairs. UCLA won the opener of the regional, 5-4, but Fullerton came back to beat Portland, 20-3; host Fresno State, 12-3; and the Bruins twice by 9-2 and 6-5 scores.

At Omaha, after Garrido boldly predicted a Titan championship, Fullerton looked bad after a 6-1 first-round loss to Mississippi State. But the Titans came back again to beat Connecticut, 8-3; Arizona, 16-3; Arkansas, 13-10; and SCBA rival Pepperdine, 8-5, before winning the title behind Dave Weatherman's four-hitter. Garrido's prediction held true, even though he thought the final game would be another high-scoring battle between the Razorbacks and Titans.

The difficulty of winning a national championship was apparent during the next two seasons as Fullerton won two more SCBA crowns but had to take to the road to play in the regionals.

In 1980, the host Wildcats of the University of Arizona won their regional and went on to capture the NCAA title. Arizona State used the same formula in 1981, beating the Titans in Tempe and cruising to the crown in Omaha.

Fullerton overcame that same hurdle last year but paid a price for their stunning sweep of the Sun Devils in Tempe. Arizona State never had lost a playoff game in Packard Stadium but this time they lost a pair of one-run games to the visitors, 10-9 and 8-7. Having eliminated the defending national champions, the Titans then went to Omaha and scored another first — becoming the only team that failed to score a run in two quick defeats.

Three Titans have advanced to the major leagues and more are on the way. Pitcher Dan Boone broke in with the Angels and spent most of last season with the San Diego Padres. Catcher Dan Whitmer played briefly with the Angels and Toronto Blue Jays. Wallach, who was the College Player of the Year in 1979, emerged as a bonafide star this year when he batted .268 with 28 home runs and 97 runs batted in.

SEASON PREVIEW

A team reminiscent of Augie Garrido's early Cal State Fullerton squads will try to continue the Titans' dominance of southern California collegiate baseball in 1983.

The heart of a powerful batting order and the No. 1 starting pitcher have gone on to professional play and Garrido has lined up what may be the toughest schedule in the nation. But the 11th-year coach had another recruiting bonanza and is confident the Titans have the tools to win their 10th consecutive title in the Southern California Baseball Association.

"This team will have to be more efficient and handle a lot of offensive and defensive responsibilities," says Garrido. "We won't be able to hit home runs to overcome our mistakes like last year. Our success will be directly proportionate to how well we develop teamwork, team attitude, team dedication and team identity."

There are no stars the magnitude of slugging Mike Rubel, four-year catcher Mark Pirruccello or southpaw Eric Barry, but there are solid performers at every position. Any weaknesses will be exposed quickly by a schedule that includes four of the other seven teams that participated in last year's College World Series in Omaha.

"Our schedule is not conducive to a flashy won-lost record but we're not going to accept a higher number of losses automatically," says Garrido, who is 435-181-4 (.706) at Fullerton. "There's not much room for error so we will be able to evaluate our expectations against the highest level of competition."

"What it takes to get a national championship performance can't be identified in the fall or against a weak pre-conference schedule. We will use the first part of the schedule to settle on a lineup. The players' true character will come out."

Defending national champion Miami and regional champions Stanford and Oklahoma State all visit Titan Field, which will feature 1,000 seats and lighting for night games in 1983. USC, UCLA and the University of Arizona are other strong programs that will precede the seven SCBA rivals on the home schedule.

Second-team all-conference righthander Tim Thompson (9-8, 3.31) heads the list of Titan returnees that include six pitchers led by Todd Simmons (8-1, 2.96), Jeff Robinson (9-4, 4.65) and reliever Scott Wright (5-2, 3.34 with 6 saves).

Outfielder John Fishel (.313) and infielders Frank Mendicina (.306), Bob Bright (.294) and Shane Turner (.292) are the top returning position players from last year's 51-23 team that won the NCAA West II regional championship over Arizona State. Fullerton also gets back outfielder-first baseman Bill Moore (16 homers in 1981), who missed most of last year with a hand injury.

Top newcomers include lefthanders Ed Delzer from Sacramento City College and Jack Reinholtz from Orange Coast College; catchers Ray Roman from Cerritos College and Rich Slominski from Arroyo High School (El Monte) and outfielders John Bryant from Santa Ana College, Tom Thomas from Cerritos College and Fred Tuttle from Ocean View High School.

"We're excited about developing a fan following with our improved fan facilities," says Garrido. "We've never really had a consistent home field advantage. Now we have the opportunity to generate the revenue necessary to continue to develop an already excellent product that will provide exciting entertainment for Orange County. I know one thing — there will be some great athletes out on that field this year."

A breakdown by positions:

PITCHING — Gone to the Oakland A's is lefthander Eric Barry (12-4, 3.14) but back are starters Tim Thompson (9-8, 3.31), swingmen Todd Simmons (8-1, 2.96) and Jeff Robinson (9-4, 4.65) and short reliever Scott Wright (5-2, 3.34 and 6 saves) along with youngsters Bill Hobbs (2-0, 3.27 in 22 innings) and Steve Rousey (3-2, 3.92 in 41). Vying for starting roles will be JC transfers Ed Delzer, 12-1 and 1.89 at Sacramento City last year and Jack Reinholtz, 9-4 and 2.59 at Orange Coast. Other

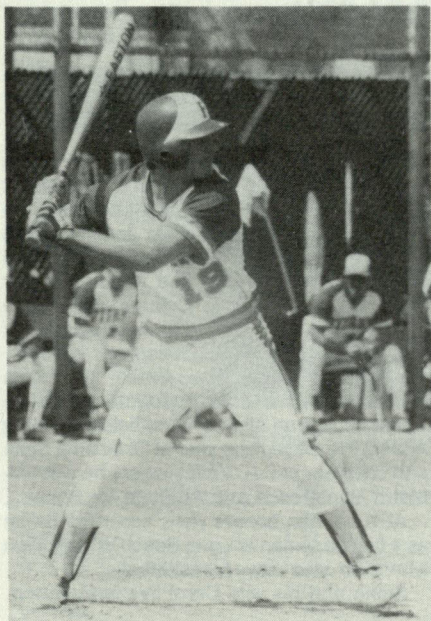
candidates are Glen Braybrooks from L.A. Valley, Greg Mathews from Santa Ana College and football quarterback Damon Allen, brother of the Raiders' Marcus.

CATCHING — After four years of Mark Pirruccello, the Titans have a wide-open battle among lettermen Paul Bradley (strong defensively) and Rick Campo (strong offensively) and newcomers Ray Roman from Cerritos College and Rich Slominski from Arroyo High School in El Monte. Bob Caffrey, who played the outfield last year, has left the football program and will return to catching, the position where he starred at Loara High School in Anaheim. The team's designated hitters likely will come from this group as well.

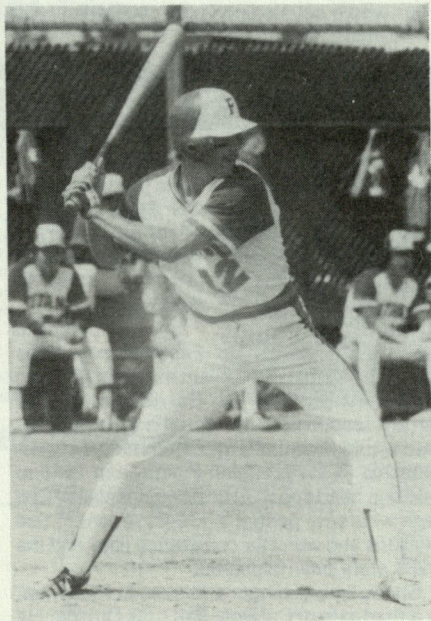
INFIELD — Four returnees but there may be some position changes pending the development of newcomers. Bob Bright (.294) and Shane Turner (.292) split duty at shortstop last year with Frank Mendicina (.306) enjoying an impressive freshman season at third base. Mendicina may move to second to open a spot for USC transfer George Sarkissian. If not, returnee Vic Espinosa, who had a strong fall season, will play second. Power hitting Bill Moore (16 homers in 1981) is the probable first baseman but he could move back to the outfield to give Campo playing time. A very versatile newcomer is Jose Mota, son of the Dodgers' hitting instructor Manny.

OUTFIELD — John Fishel (.313) had a great freshman year in left field and will be joined by junior college transfers Tom Thomas (.347) from Cerritos, John Bryant (.395) from Santa Ana and Richard Estrada (.359) from Butte College or freshman Fred Tuttle (.426) from Ocean View High.

SUMMARY — Only Moore has the power of the departed Rubel, Pirruccello, Bob Bathe and company but there is better running speed throughout the lineup and more contact hitters. Delzer and Reinholtz had good fall seasons and will likely displace some of the veterans in the pitching rotation. Improved infield defense will further help the pitching staff, which must adjust to a new catcher regardless of who emerges as the leader.

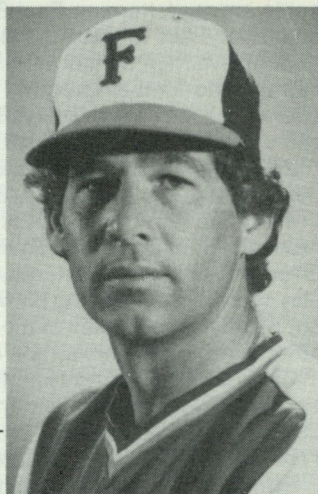

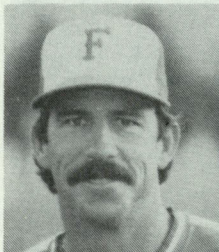
One national championship, three regional crowns, nine **consecutive** conference titles, a pair of national Coach of the Year trophies and a winning percentage of better than .700.

Those are the highlights of Augie Garrido's 10 years of coaching at Cal State Fullerton.

Garrido took over the CSF baseball program in September, 1972. In eight previous seasons of play, the Titans had won only 35 percent of their games. After one losing season, Garrido turned it around.

A Vallejo native, Garrido, 43, received his bachelor's degree from Fresno State in 1961, following an all-star career with the Bulldog squad. He joined the Cleveland Indians organization in 1961 where he remained until 1966 when he accepted a coaching position at Sierra High School in Tollhouse, CA.

ASSISTANT COACHES

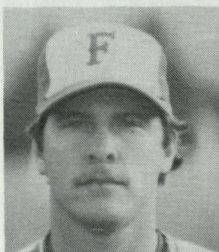


Dave Snow returns this year to the Cal State Fullerton baseball program that he helped build into a national power.

Snow, 32, came to Fullerton in 1973 as an assistant to Augie Garrido and was

largely responsible for recruiting the athletes that would eventually win the national championship in 1979. He left Fullerton in 1978 to become head coach at Los Angeles Valley College where he posted a 156-41 record in five seasons and won four conference titles and the 1982 state championship.

Snow, who is single and lives in Placentia, is a graduate of Cal Poly San Luis Obispo. He is in charge of the Titan pitchers.

Smith, 24, is a graduate of UCLA

All-American honors were accorded Smith as a first baseman at Long Beach Wilson High where he also played basketball.

As a measure of the respect the fledgling baseball conference has received at the national level, in 1982 not just one but two of its teams were invited to participate in the NCAA regional play.

And when Cal State Fullerton knocked off top ranked Arizona State to win the NCAA Western Regional championship last year, it marked the third time in the SCBA's six years that it has had at least one member participate in the prestigious College World Series in Omaha, Neb.
