
WHAT IS A MEMORY YOU HAVE ABOUT CANAL STREET TAVERN?

At the age of 17, she became Britain's first mainstream Asian pop star as the voice of chart toppers Monsoon. Soon after she embarked on a solo career that has been instrumental in getting audiences through out the world to accept the sounds and structure of another culture as pop music. Contact with Peter Gabriel's record label, Real World and WOMAD in 1991 allowed her, with her releases *Weaving My Ancestors Voices*' and *The Zen Kiss*, to illustrate the idea of moving seamlessly between various traditions through the mind and voice of one person.

I had the opportunity to see this wonderful artist perform live, and soon after even got to talk with her. Her voice is enough to make one fall in love, and I was completely entranced as we talked about her work on the Real World record label, why it took so long for her to play out live and of course her beautiful singing voice. So here it is, my interview with...

Sheila

MR – When did you first realize that you could use your voice as a musical instrument?

SC – When I was 12 and my voice broke. Women's voices do break; they get slightly lower, and there's that point where they move from that children's voice which is very unemotional, you know, if a child is upset its voice remains the same, that kind of high pitch thing. Where my voice connected up with all my emotions, that's when I really had a tone, an instrument that I really wanted to develop.

MR-How did you go about developing your voice?

SC – Well, I was in theater arts school and we were doing music and singing lessons, which were completely unsuitable for me. So I went off and started singing everything that I was interested in which was mostly pop and soul type vocals. I spent a lot of time working on my voice in that way, motivated for my own love for voice rather than a specific course or anything.

MR - When you sing live, are you ever a fraid that your voice will go out? And what do you do to prepare your voice for a performance?

SC – I spend a lot of time rehearsing, and what I do when I rehearse is I sing continuously. There's a thing about going on stage alone in that the performance is completely dependent on me. If my voice goes out, I just can't say to the guitarist "do a solo" while I go off and grab a cough sweet or something. So when I rehearse, I sing for at least an hour continuously so that I


know that my voice can take it. If it can take it during a rehearsal situation, then I know that it can definitely take it on a day of a performance.

I also use Alexander technique. Are you familiar with that?

MR-No I'm not.

SC – It's a technique developed in Australia about 100 years ago. It has to do with the internal suspension system, which we have in our bodies and which we misuse. If you start getting your body back toward the way in which it should be used; if you can activate that internal suspension system then you become a much better resonator. Then your voice seems to revel in the amount of time you sing whether than becoming degenerated by the amount of work you're giving it. Children do it naturally and they seem to

lose it about the time they go to school. My technique is up to scratch and that's what saves me. I don't think you can do anything just before a performance, if you haven't prepared beforehand. The whole thing about Alexander technique is the months you spend rehearsing that sees you through on the night [of the performance].





MR – How do you go about writing a song, and what is the correlation between your voice and your lyrics when you do write a song?

SC – I write with Steve Coe, who also produces for me. Because we've been writing together for 10 years, we're a very integrated

unit. We're almost like two sides of a brain when we're writing. It's very difficult to say who writes what. We both have our strengths. Steve is particularly good at arranging and lyrics. I'm particularly good at vocal ornaments and wordless melodies and things that express emotion. But we swap and we swap fields very successfully. One of us will have an idea based on a technique we heard or an emotion we want to explore, and pretty much I write on my voice. Steve used to write on the piano, but now writes on his voice as well. Working with me has improved both his writing and his work as a producer. It's very difficult to describe, actually. Sometimes he'll sing a phrase and I'll say

"Is this what you mean?" and he'll say "No, but that's better." Who wrote the phrase? It just goes on and on like that

MR - Where do you draw inspiration from when you write?

SC – Sometimes there's a particular technique that I want to explore or there's a particular connection that I want to explore. On the song *Women I'm Calling You* for instance, I wanted to go back for the first time in a long time, to that soul vocal I learned as a teenager. I wanted to draw into it the Islamic ornaments, which I also know, the Arabic ornaments. Because in fact they're basically the same, they're simply sung with different vowel sounds and different psychologies. But the juxtaposition of notes on the trills and ornaments are in fact exactly the same.

The motivation for the *Speaking in Tongues* pieces is my love for vocal percussion. I think it's completely an emotive sound. And

the way I do it really turns it into an art form that is no longer about drumming. A drummer cannot play Speaking in Tongues III or IV, because I'm throwing in syllables of my own and because I'm breaking the time cycle. There's usually a vocal challenge.

There's also an emotive reason why. I don't really know, and I think it's good that I don't really know because I'm not tempted to go back to any particular place or a formulaic-type of inspiration.

MR – Tell me more about your *Speaking in Tongues* pieces.

SC - I use the seven basic syllables which are

onomanopeic syllables for the drum. So when you strike the drum in a certain way there is a corresponding syllable. Since it is an oral tradition in India, people have over the years learned to say patterns of these syllables in order to communicate with drummers, and for the drummer to be able to teach. Now as I was saving before, what I am doing with the Speaking in Tongues pieces is taking them way beyond that.

I really want the pieces to characterize chaos. And to characterize that kind of space that an artist

continually goes into when an artist faces a blank page what they're really facing is a mirror into their own soul, a mirror to all the things that are unborn in them, things that take a risk to express. That's where the best art comes from. It's that knife-edge, chaos kind of point. And to express all the chatter that goes on in your head when you face the blank page. That's what really



MR – Was there any particular theme in mind when you wrote and recorded your album *The Zen Kiss*?

SC - The Zen Kiss really grew out of live performance, because I hadn't done any live performance for the 11 years that I'd been a recording artist until 1992. I wrote and recorded the material for Weaving My Ancestors Voices with playing live in mind. As I developed toward longer and longer performances, because I started in the festival setting and then moved out into full-length concerts, I started to develop the kind of material that I thought the audience needed at certain points for the pacing in the performance. That was one theme, if you like, the fact that all of it had to be reproducible in a concert situation.

I think that in a way, since I've written Zen Kiss over two years, what comes out is almost a record of your own psychic state, a record of where you are and what's important to you. It's the same for any artist.

I didn't set out with a great theme in mind that I felt needed to be expressed. I often find that I can't do that in any case. I can't say "I'm going to write a song about crossing this vocal technique with that vocal technique," if there's no actual basis in my voice, which makes it a valid experiment. I really have to do what my voice is capable of whether than do things purely out of intellect. So I think the album is more instinctual rather than having any particular theme.

MR – You were a recording artist for more than 11 years before you did a live performance. What made you decide you were ready to play live?

SC – I have never been a fan of live performance, so that's why I never performed live. I just didn't know what made people so excited about live performance. Over the years, talking to musicians, who really enjoyed going to concerts, I started to detect this twinkle in their eye and I really wanted to know what this overwhelming curiosity for what made people feel like was. Because they were talking about the best concert they ever seen from Kate Bush to Howling Wolf; it could have been anything. So I thought "Right, it's not a certain performer or a certain style of music." It's something far more intangible and universal. And I decided in the end it must be a quality of concentration, it must be a quality of involvement that the artist brings to their music and they are able to sustain even though there are lots of people watching them.

When you see an artist on stage, you are very unaware of what they're seeing. What they're seeing is a mass of faces and it can be very intimidating. I decided that I really wanted to experience that. That's why I decided to go for solo voice presentation as the only way I would play live. I really wanted to maximize that potential for that kind of rapport between the audience and

myself.

MR – I really like your song *Mother and Child*, how did that song develop?

SC – I wrote the text, the spoken part of it, in 1987. I don't know why I wrote it. Like the title of The Zen Kiss, it just came out of nowhere. I had this picture in my head and I felt that I should keep writing about it until the piece was finished. So it all came out in one go. I read it to Steve and it was a few years later that he thought that it would make a good track. It's sort of a completion of a psychological journey for me. I think I was wrestling with the issue of being seen as a woman is to be seen as this virgin Mother Mary or Mary Magdalene. Women are either one or the other, they're not both. They're not both at the same time, not both in the same life. And they're not supposed to be both in the same moment, and that is what Woman and Child is about. That it is a ridiculous split. It is even more ridiculous split when you truly understand the biological fact about childbirth, breastfeeding and so on. That it is a sensual experience too. So that's what really the whole piece is about.

There is a space between living and dying—a space that can be a narrow razor's edge—a small ledge where my big toe sat, straining to maintain my weight as my other foot dangled uselessly in the void. My forearms burned, like someone had poured hot water into my veins. The fingers of my left hand crimped on a small ledge as small as my fingernails. The fingers in my right hand were shoved into a narrow dihedral. I strained, using my last ounces of energy to inch upward, pushing imperceptibly with my leg and pulling with my fingers. My partner, some forty feet below me, yelled something, but I couldn't make out the words. My world had become the few inches of rock under my foot, under my fingers, and in front of my face. If I fell, I knew I faced at least a twenty foot fall; I had placed my last piece of protection ten feet below. Safety was just a few inches away, where the crack opened up enough for me to get most of my hand into. I measured my life in those few inches that day.

My partner Chris and I were climbing Insanity Ceiling, a traditional 5.11b testpiece on the north side of Tower Rock in Red River Gorge, Kentucky. The first section of the climb followed an easy dihedral and

can lull you into a false sense of security. A huge roof capped the dihedral. A small, tiny crack exited the roof, where the rock face and the roof met. The climbing got hard at the roof and kept getting harder as you passed the roof and followed the tiny crack to the finish.

Insanity Ceiling was going to be my last climb. Tomorrow I had to go back to college. I had stayed all summer at the Red River Gorge, living the life of a climbing bum. I liked to think I had improved my climbing skill; I had climbed almost every day for the last month. Now I would test that theory on Insanity Ceiling.

Rock climbing has become very popular in recent years. Indoor climbing gyms in every city seem to be produce the much despised gym rat, a self-made

expert who is as much a threat to himself as to those around him. These weekend warriors are content to keep climbing a past time, a hobby. But for some of us, rock climbing is a life, a way of thinking and feeling. Rock climbing defines our personality—not to mention our clothes, I had never seen so much fleece until I became an avid rock climber. During the school year, I climbed the plastic gym holds like everybody else. But during this one summer, I would live out my dream. I had read too many articles about the golden era of climbing—the sixties and seventies when a hard-core group of climbers camped out at Camp 4, Yosemite and climbed (that's it, nothing else). I couldn't resist the climbing bum call.

So with a few hundred saved-up dollars, a decent tent that still leaked during rain storms, and all my climbing shit, I headed down to the Red. I decided to camp out behind Miguel's Pizza. Miguel, a climber and Red River Gorge Local, will let you camp in the field behind his pizza joint for two bucks a night. Even though camping in the national forest where Red River Gorge resides is free, I decided to camp at Miguel's because that's where everyone else who climbed camped. No bathrooms, uneven ground, and only one public water faucet made the camping more of an adventure than I anticipated. Still, I enjoyed every minute off it. Half way through the year, my meager funds forced my to move my camp down to Forest Service road 9, but I would still go up to Miguel's every morning, every evening.

I would wake up around 8:00am, sometimes later if I felt lazy, hungover, or unmotivated, sometimes earlier if I had a few climbs I wanted to do that day. In retrospect: often later, seldom earlier.

Here's a typical day. A buddy of mine from Dayton, Clyde, came up to see me. He's a bum, also, just not a climbing bum. I tried to convince him of the virtues of climbing bum lifestyle, but he seemed unconvinced. An air conditioned bedroom had something to do with his decision, he said. Still, he was a solid climber and a good partner.

We started our day around 10:00am, which seemed a little late for me. I had got up around 8 because some doofus was making a racket a few tents over. This ain't Yosemite, ya know, but this guy had a huge rack full of hexs and stoppers and proceeded to clang them together for about fifteen minutes. So I got up thinking I could flirt with some of the climbing chicks, but they were absent this morning. Needless to say, I was ready to climb when Clyde showed up.

We began by bouldering at Angel Windows. Angel Windows is a cool little rock formation; the two small arches form right next to each other and look like windows. Angel Windows has some easy problems on

them, nothing harder than a V2, which is good because I was feeling a little crusty that morning. You could sink your whole hand into some of pockets at Angel Windows, they were so good. We worked on a little problem call AW direct. It was easy V2 and I sent it in about three tries. Soft living had made Clyde a little soft and he had a harder time at it. The problem has a sit down start with the left hand an a small edge, side-pulling, and your right hand in a mono. You pulled your ass off the ground and then slapped your feet on some good edges under the overhanging start. From there, just crossover to some super-small edges, bring your feet up higher onto the slightly overhanging face, and balance for a sec. Your knees and close to your

chest and the move is very balancy. Move your left hand up to a bomber hold, haul up, and your there. The top is just a couple of feet of easy climbing away. TASTY!

After an hour or so of bouldering, we went up to Whistling Arch and sat on the top to eat lunch. The view of the Gorge was spectacular. You could see the rock bands sticking out from the tops of the hills in every direction. The sun shone down on us pretty hot, but, mecifully, the black flies were light.

After lunch, we went on over to Military Wall, a righteous sport climbing area where I knew there were some moderates to warm up on. Also, I wanted to climb Tissue Tiger, a rad 5.12 climb I'd been working on. Clyde had fun on some of the moderates, and he even redpointed Fuzzy Undercling, a hyperclassic 5.11b. Later, we headed back to Miguel's. Luckily the ladies had returned. REJOICE!

Another criteria I had was that I had to still own the record...even if I don't listen to it much. Yeah, some of the releases are cheesy, but at least I didn't mention my Debbie Gibson or Paula Abdul stuff... So, here is the list. Formed 1995 in Los Angeles, The Streetwalkin' Cheetahs have built a considerable reputation based on their shows where it's common to see hardcore fans dance in abandon. Often these fans become part of the show as guitarist Frank Meyer hands over his instrument to a random audience member, making participation mandatory.

I picked up their new disc, which was recorded during a live in-studio performance on Noyz Pollution, a radio program on the leading Los Angeles college radio station, KXLU. I got it because of the Stooges band name and was just floored by these guys. Frank was cool enough to do an email interview with me for your enjoyment.

MR - I know you're in with Wayne Kramer; how did that come about?

FM - We met in 1995. He moved to LA and had just recorded "The Hard Stuff." I read in an interview that he wanted to produce other bands, so I called up Epitaph and left a message for him to call about some session work. He called and said he would do it if he liked the music, so I sent him some demos. He dug the tunes, so we recorded together, and that became the Cheetahs first EP, "Heart Full Of Napalm". We stayed friends throughout the years, playing

some gigs together and eventually, he started producing us. Now he produces all of our records and we tour together. Lately we have been his backing band as well, and have gotten him to play some really cool MC5 stuff and some Gang War stuff too.

MR - What's your favorite MC5 tune?

FM - My favorite MC5 song is probably "Sister Ann,", "Black to Comm," or "Human Being Lawnmower."





MR - You guys are in that Mc5 documentary. How did this come about?


FM - We met the documentary people at Future Now Productions through Wayne and his manager and they filmed us in Austin at SXSW earlier this year.

MR - How are you guys treated by the LA scene?

FM - For a long time, we were completely ignored by the LA scene. We played locally for four years at every place in town, and couldn't draw flies. Within the last year or so, we have finally built a really strong following. LA is kinda funny that way: They never want to support local bands until the rest of the world gets hip to them and the buzz starts, then they just jump on the bandwagon. We never had a following in LA until Live on KXLU came out and we got a bunch of press and started touring, then everyone wanted to come see us. Whatever! I don't care how people get turned on to us, as long as they do eventually.

MZ - I have that *Live on KXLU* record, any plans for another studio album? Tour plans?


FM - We are recording the new album, titled Waitin' For The Death Of My Generation, in November and December. It should be out in March on Triple X. We are also recording a full record with Cherie Currie from the Runaways in January, also on Triple X. It's gonna be a hard edged glam-punk album like her old band or Suzi Quatro. We're very excited about that. Also, we have a new split album with The Bellrays out on Cold Front this month, a four-way split single with Electric Frankenstein/B Movie Rats, Candy Snatchers out for Halloween, and a shitload of songs on tribute albums and compilations. We also just recorded "Sonic Reducer" with Jimmy Zero from the Dead Boys for a Dead Boys tribute album.



MR - How was that thing you played in New York for Joey Ramone?

FM - The gig in NY for CMJ was killer. We actually had a pie fight with the audience! Some people from POPsmear Magazine actually brought creme pies and threw them at us while

we did "Lookin' At You," so we retaliated and it got really messy. The weirdest moment was having Jesse Camp from MTV come up to me and say he was a fan and had been digging our record. I don't watch MTV, but I heard that Sam Yaffa from Hanoi Rocks played in his band, so I was kinda stoked.



MR - You seem to have an incredible selection of covers, any new additions?

FM - We recorded these ones for recent tribute albums: "Sonic Reducer" with Jimmy Zero by the Dead Boys. "Live Wire" by Motley Crue. "Los Angeles" by X. "Café Ave." with Jeff Dahl by Hanoi Rocks. MR - What do you think about the state of rock in America in the late '90s?

FM - For a long time, I though rock was dead in America, but now I am very excited about a lot of the new bands out there. Here in LA, we have the Bellrays and the B Movie Rats. In Vancouver, you have the Black halos. In Texas, there's a great band called Roller and one called the 45s. Also, there's the Gaza Strippers, Electric Frankenstein, Toilet Boys, the Donnas,

Nashville Pussy, Mover, the Cuts, the Catheters and so on. Right now, there's a real strong movement of high energy, rock 'n' roll band. I feel honored to be a part of it.

MR - Any final thoughts?

FM - Watch out for the Cheetahs on the road, support live music and drink lots of beer!!!!!!

I am a witness to almost four decades of American history. I was born in 1955, the same year as rock-n-roll. I saw myself firsthand the Civil Rights movement as well as the sexual revolution of the sixties and seventies. I took all the drugs, wore all the clothes, and listened to all the rock bands that came along. I was a hippie when I was thirteen in 1969. I was an original punk rocker in 1972. I helped to create the climate that exists locally today for creativity. Through all of it, I have been an out gay man. I was queer in 1965 when I was only ten years old. I had sex with any man, girl, boy, or woman I could get my hands on and I'm not sorry about anything. I have been and I continue to be free. I have lived life my way and if you don't like it, fuck you.

I would like to talk to you about the new millenium and what I can predict in the upcoming years. Dayton will die. Dayton was only a strong growing city in the presence of the industrial boom of the post war years of the fifties thanks to Wright Patterson, GM, NCR, and a few lesser concerns. Those kinds of resources will never be seen again. To expect a community to thrive and grow by frying hamburgers and selling them to people is shortsighted or criminal.

The arts have no place in the Midwest and will generate no revenue no matter how much money is thrown at them. There is actually a prohibition against imagination in the bible and unless we eliminate God people will continue to flee to the suburbs to escape—him. My theory is that Christ is only Satan in drag at best and that he is blocking the light at the end of the tunnel. I think that we should let Jesus get down off of the cross and party.

The atmosphere here is stifling. The evacuation out of Dayton is not a result of whites fleeing blacks. People were abandoning the white trash, rednecks, and hillbillies that stares at them threateningly and witlessly like Pentecostal cattle. We are all being judged and judging on a daily basis to out own detriment.

Dayton is one of the most segregated cities in the world. All stratum of this city are pitted against one another. Blacks are banished to the west. The meager of income are resolved to the inner east. The real monies are found in the north and the south, which are predominantly white. Now, I introduce the Hispanics who could not have chosen a better time to influx. They will eat this city up. In my estimation, they are the only hope for this city. We need new blood. We need jobs downtown and places to live right down and I don't mean loft spaces that run five to six hundred a month. We need small cheap one-bedroom apartments for singles. Mom and Dad and the two point seven kids are never going to live downtown. Once, I has the idea of putting white picket fences all along Main Street ten feet high. I thought that maybe that would bring people back downtown. Actually, people do live downtown, but niggers and faggots are not acceptable. Of course poor people do not exist here. This is a shame and guilt based community thanks to God and his minions, which I prefer to call lion chow. If you have any moxie, you will flee too.

Do not flee away from here, but flee to a future where people are allowed to have in themselves as they are. Relieve yourselves of limitations of the small minded live stock like creatures that inhabit this wide spot in the dirt road of animal husbandry that we call a community. A community is about cooperation and there is none here. Most people do not approve of each other. Intolerance is tolerated.



In the future, money will be the only thing that matters. No one will touch or be touched unless it is done professionally. Intimacy will be regarded with repulsion, even more than it is already. Every person for itself as we are finally dehumanized each into its own vehicle with its own cell phone. I see it rolling in like a tsunami, a living hell of isolation and restraint fashionably shrink-wrapped for your convenience.

Buying this city up house by house is the only way to change it for the better. East Dayton is dirt cheap and up for grabs. \$20,000 with no down payment for the first time buyer. That's a mortgage of \$200 a month, cheaper than rent. Buy out the hillbillies, white trash, and rednecks. Make the city our own.

We can legalize all the vices and tax them and eliminate poverty in Dayton. Tobacco and alcohol already support out schools along with the lottery. Prostitution is a great way to fund the arts. The arts will never fund the arts. Drugs can fund the new ballpark after the novelty has worn off. We can have rock

We could have flavors like stale beer or baloney gravy. We could have an event like the one in Pamplona, Spain only instead of running from bulls in the street people could run from disgruntled welfare mothers. Other events could include bobbing for dentures and tough baby contests. Also, I think that a guided bus tour of murder sites all over the city would bring the people back downtown. We could show all the visitors where a customer wrestled to death at the old McCrory's on Main Street or where an employee was beaten to death with a jar of jelly at Shears.

Dayton is a fun place. You can get hammered at Sloopys, lit at Pappy's Place, or blown at the Stowaway. We have so much that is really going on right here in out own back yard that we really don't need to invent anything. It's all in how you look at things. And even though I believe that this city is hopeless, I can still see the positive. When the city is empty, it will make a great place to train the new SWAT team. Now, if we could only legalize reality.

Tommy Durden

Memories of the man who wrote one of the greatest songs in Rock 'n' Roll History



Recently the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame had an Elvis Presley exhibit and the world celebrated his birthday. All of this is well and good, but another event happened recently in which went unnoticed by the mass media and Elvis fans everywhere. This upsets me, and I almost take it personally. What went largely unnoticed was the passing away of Tommy Durden, the man who is in the Songwriting Hall of Fame for writing Elvis' first hit, *Heartbreak Hotel*.

I met Tommy a couple of times when he visited my grandmother-in-law and her sisters during their annual summer get-togethers. Tommy was a big man who reminded me a lot of William S. Burroughs in his stature. He was a pleasant person who had an engaging personality. Tommy used to be married to one of the sisters, and even though their marriage didn't work out they all remained great friends.

My wife and I would just sit around listening to the adventures they had as they traveled across the country playing in their bands. (Tommy played with the Westernaires, which was the back up band for Tex Ritter.) I learned about the all night cross-country drinking binges that they had with Tex Ritter. I also got to hear the lowdown on other famous folks, all of which will remain nameless. The tales would last late into the night.

However, the most fascinating tale concerned Tommy and his song *Heartbreak Hotel*. This song was the first hit record for Elvis and the only song to ever top the Pop, Rock, County and R&B charts all at the same time. It has since become the most recorded popular song in history and has been recorded by more than 1,000 artists.

Tommy got the idea for the song from a suicide note that was printed in a newspaper. On the note was the words, "I walk a lonely street." Tommy put a hotel at the end of that lonely street and the song came to life. May Axton was with Tommy when he wrote the song. May was a friend of Tommy's, and she was also friends with many other people including, Colonel Tom Parker. Tommy wanted to get the song to Col. Parker in hopes that he could get it to a better known singer to perform.

May told Tommy that she would give the song to Col. Parker, but that he had to give her part of the songwriting credit. Tommy just wanted to get the song out so he agreed. May gave the song to Col. Parker and he gave the song to Elvis. Elvis was impressed with the song and recorded it, and he too was given part of the songwriting credit.

Tommy said when he first heard Elvis' rendition of *Heartbreak Hotel*, he thought it was the most god-awful thing that he had ever heard. However, when the royalty checks started rolling in, he said he rethought his stance and decided that it was the sweetest and most beautiful song that he had ever heard in his life.

In some the stories about the writing of Heartbreak Hotel, May Axton likes to tell how her and Tommy sat down and wrote the song together. I was really pissed off recently when I picked up a book on Elvis and the author wrote that "May Axton and some guy" wrote

Heartbreak Hotel. I asked Tommy how he felt about this, and he said that as long as the royalty checks kept rolling in, he didn't care who got the credit, he knew the truth.

I was saddened when Tommy missed the annual summer gathering due to an illness from which he never recovered. He took a turn for the worse and passed away near his home in Michigan this past fall. While I feel happy that I got the opportunity to meet this wonderful and interesting man, I also feel saddened that the music industry and Elvis fans didn't even acknowledge his passing.

I'm glad to have known Tommy and feel lucky to posses a taped copy of his original recording of *Heartbreak Hotel*.

The First Full Length Record By:

Mite's Musical Progression

I have always been a music freak. My taste in music has never always been... ahem, refined as it is now. But I know that no matter how cheesy the journey was, the important thing is that I survived and am at a better place today because of it.

My very first record was the classic tune *I Love Trash* by **Grouch** of Sesame Street fame. It was a 45 (known nowadays as a 7-inch) and I was around six-years-old. I would play it constantly on my Fisher Price-esc turntable. I had many other such 'kiddie' 45's, but that was my very first.

A couple of years later, my music taste started to develop a bit more. This was due to having an older brother and aunts, and getting to listen to their music. Mind you this was the mid-'70s, which meant only one thing, disco. I tried to like disco. During that period I managed to scrape up enough money to purchase my first album, *The Bee Gee's Greatest Hits*. I soon learned that I hated disco. It was also about this time in my life where I lip-synched *Heaven on the Seventh Floor* at my elementary school talent show. Go ahead and laugh, I deserve it.

After my moment in the spotlight, my musical taste started getting more adventurous. The **Bee Gee's** gave way to **Meat Loaf**, and from **Meat Loaf** I moved onto the first band that I would become a lifetime fan of, **Styx**. We all have had a band like this. I would spend hours copying the bands' logo on anything and everything in sight. I knew all the words to their album, *Pieces of Eight* by heart, and would even stand in front of a mirror giving my own little personal concert as I sang into my Mr. Microphone.

Then suddenly my musical taste started getting dangerous. I have my brother to thank for this. This was the late '70s, when feathered hair was the fashion and Satan in music was feared. I remember when my brother bought AC/DC's Highway to Hell on 8-track. My parents flipped. But surprisingly enough they let him keep it. From there it was Black Sabbath, Molly Hatchet, Nazareth, Led Zepplin and Ozzy Osbourne.

This was a weird time in my life musically. Along with the heavy metal stuff, I was also listening to such bands as **Cheap Trick**, **The Knack** and **Nick Lowe**. I was also just starting to discover the **Beatles**. (My mother was a huge **Elvis** fan, so I have always grown up listening to his music, but was never really that much into it.) The death of Solid Gold came about a few years later, due mostly to something that changed my life forever, MTV. I remember the first time I saw MTV. It was in Michigan in 1983. 

BIG LENS FESTIVAL DAYTON OHIO



Date: December 4, 1999. Time: 8:00. The agents: Psycho Gail, Mite, and myself—Ronin Dave (also, acting as translator, Gary Johnson of *Adam* fame). The mission: The 10th Annual Big Lens Festival presented by the Wright State University. We sauntered in, as it were, nondescript, amongst the beatniks, liberals, leftist university students, parents, faculty, and a very small contingent of the general public to view the five short films for six bucks.

The five short films were written, produced, and directed by Wright State University students as their senior year film projects. The loose theme of the festival was "Forbidden Love" I say loose because, even though each film dealt with concepts of emotional attachment, lust, or desire for acceptance that is often mistaken for love, only a few of the films actually dealt with *love* which happened to be *forbidden*. They averaged about fifteen minutes each, and, to day the least, we were all pleasantly surprised at the quality of the five films

The first film was *Meat*, written and directed by Jim Turner, photographed by Ian Axilrod, and starring Nick DePinto, Caren Gunderson, Shira Zimbeck, and Joe Borghese. Of all the films, *Meat* was the most closely aligned with the theme of the Forbidden Love.

Nick DePinto plays Michael, a vegetarian butcher who is both attracted and repelled by the meat he chops daily. I couldn't figure out if his attraction and repulsion was sexual, but if I had to guess, I would say sex was on his mind. The movie is a dark little piece, almost quasihorror genre. While Caren Gunderson's character Edith comes into the butcher shopto buy large tongues and other strangely phallic pieces of meat, she gives the butcher the once over. She seems to be looking at him as a piece of (dare I say) meat. Eventually, she lures him into her house and offers him a good piece of meat (dinner). He, of course, refuses, but she changes his mind, being very persuasive as she plunges a fork into his hand. Was she the devil? Some dark temptress, or a reflection of the butchers dark pysche? humble opinion, this was the most original screenplay of the night, and good opening to the festival.

The second movie *Hangers* was a little disappointing after the originality of the first film. *Hangers*, written and directed by Matt Lopez and photographed by Mark Ferril, stars Brook Whitemore and Aaron Stiles and two high school boys, Neal and Digger respectively.

Neal is plagued by aliens. You know, those scaly green things which like to take you to their lab and probe you. Well, they like to do these things to Neal as well. Sci Fi movie you might think. No, just cheesy metaphor device for the stupid viewers. You see, Neal is gay and he is "alienated" from his sexuality. Aliens experimenting on him, alienated from his sexuality, get it? Well, I haven't seen this much cheese since I opened a can of Cheez-wiz! But don't worry fearless readers, Neal gets saved by Digger, who is also gay and helps Neal show his true feelings. The aliens go away and never plague Neal again. Gee, I'm warm and fuzzy all over.

Here's the third film, Going Down, written and directed by Carrie Inmon (she was the only chick who made a film at the festival – GIRL POWER!), photographed by James Weckbacher, and starring April Miller, Michael Mueller, and Noel Sheaffer. Much props to Georgianna Gomez for the original music score, the best of the night.

Jessica, played by April Miller, likes to smoke weed, drink alone at partys, meet guys (most of whom are anonymous) and give them blow jobs. I guess she's codependant or something. Maybe she's just lonely and picks up jerks who like to receive pleasure without giving any back (physical or emotional). This is another movie about alienation, from self and others, and Jessica can't seem to find anyone who can make her happy. I have to ask myself, why doesn't she just stop getting high and drunk all the time and try to do something more self-affirming, like taking a long walk through the woods. Maybe the theme of the

film festival should have been "Help I'm Alienated and Can't Get Happy".


Film number four—That Certain Feeling—is the best acted of the five. After the film, the director and writer, Lee Furry, said that he allowed the actors to improvise most of the lines, and then he spent a lot of time in the editing room making the conversations and scenes seem natural. The effort paid off.

Scott, played by Paul Bowen, is searching for a meaningful relationship. Will he find it in Lori (Julia Goodwin)? She's not happy with her current relationship and decides to cheat with Scott. Throw in Mark (Pat Steel), who is Neanderthal-type guy who is searching for instant gratification but is revealed in the end to want a good relationship, and you've got a good stew of a movie.

Film five, Baby Tomatoes, is a strange little film. It's about a pizza delivery person who is trying to get to know an alcoholic 8-track (remember those?) repair guy who wrote a book once on, you guessed it, 8-track repair. The film was written by Mike Popewiny and photographed by Todd Gilpin. The producer was Jason Wilson.



CHEAP TRICK CHEAP TRICK

Cheap Trick's debut release was recorded at New York's Record Plant Studio and was released in January of 1977. The album featured brutally raw rock that was stripped down to expose aggressive, amphetamine charged passion and infectious melodies. "Hot Love", "He's A Whore", and "ELO Kiddies" were top notch rock anthems that were sexy and dangerous. Several tracks on the album have sexual overtones, but the songs were actually intricately put together and were based on intense themes like murder and suicide. "Ballad of TV Violence" was written in the voice of Richard Speck. He murdered 8 nurses in Chicago. "Oh

Candy" is written about the suicide of Cheap Trick photographer Marshall Mintz to whom the band nicknamed M&M and the band is simply questioning his motives. The lyrics to "Oh Candy" makes the listener believe that the song is actually about a young lady. Cheap Trick's debut is one of the most under-rated debut records to this date. The band had a deadly combination of profound themes that were too sophisticated for the average listener to grasp onto, two wild and wacky members, two unbelievably handsome and suave members, a demented sense of humor, and a stunningly intoxicating rhythm that hasn't been matched by any other band since.



THE JIM CARROLL BAND CATHOLIC BOY

Catholic Boy was released in 1980 on Atco Records. Jim Carroll is a famous poet from New York City who is the author of "The Basketball Diaries" and "Living at the Movies" and the movie "The Basketball Diaries" starring Leonardio De Crapio is about Jim's life growing up as a catholic boy in New York City. The movie featured several tracks off of Jim's debut record, Catholic Boy. The songs are slick and threaded together with a strong back beat, swirling guitars and seem like they are practically flying through the air, and jaded vocals breathe life into each of the songs. The lyrics describe the streets of NYC with broken dreams,

junkies, whores, and mainly about some of the characters Jim has met in his life. "People Who Died" is about the manic lifestyles of junkies, glue sniffers, pill poppers, Vietnam soldiers, and various others and the vicious ways that several of Jim's friends have died. "City Drops Into the Night" creates a landscape with pulsing guitars and desolate vocals and is about the dirty little secrets hidden deep in the night. "It's Too Late" is threatening to the mainstream culture lyrically. "It's too late to fall in love with Sharon Tate, but it's too soon to ask me for the words I want carved on my tomb," squarely kicks the hippie culture in the ass and screams wake up before it's too late to the rest of us. Catholic Boy is a self portrait, a mere glimpse into the soul of NYC where Jim witnessed life in a stark and decadent fashion.



THRIFT STORE FIND





BDSM stands for bondage & discipline/dominance & submission/sadism & masochism or sadomasochism. This is just one of the things I learned when I recently talked with Mistress Freya, a professional dominatrix in Dayton. We were also joined by respected local leather "toy" maker Lord Serpent, who is also the founder of the Dayton BDSM Support Group. The photographs of Mistress Freya have been altered to protect her identity and the innocent.

MR - Mistress, how did you get involved in BDSM?

MF - I've been involved in the scene for about five years now. I've been a professional dominatrix for about two years. I actually got interested in BDSM through a roommate of mine in Cincinnati who was into the scene. I got started basically through a dare. I was dared to put an ad in a local underground paper and I did.

Also when I was growing up, females start receiving mixed messages on how they should act when they reach the age of about 13. There would be guys who would go out with girls for what I call "one date wonders". And in school other kids are cruel, making others feel stupid and ugly. That brings down the girls self esteem and they end up in an abusive relationship, which is where I came from.

Doing what I'm doing helped me to break out of the stigma that I received in high school. I no longer feel stupid or ugly. I'm happy with myself.

MR - What is it about being a dominatrix that appeals to you?

MF - I would be lying if I said I didn't like the power trip. Also for me it's very therapeutic. You can't imagine the feeling of having someone kneeling down and kissing your toes at the snap of your fingers. And they enjoy doing it and pleasing me.

A lot of it is the mind fuck part of it. I was with a client who was blindfolded. I acted upset over something minor and told him that I was going to hit him with the riding crop. He was begging me," n,o mistress." And I hit him.... with a feather duster. See, he was getting all worked up, thinking I was going to hit him with a riding crop. MR - What is the difference between a BDSM lifestyle and a couple tying each other up in bed?

MF - What you described, the people are called players. They are, in fact, practicing Even when people use a blindfold in play, about sensory deprivation, which is BDSM.

> You also have your lifestylers, who are people who include one or more BDSM activity in their day to day life, not just occasionally. There is one couple I know where the wife plays the dominant roll and as soon as her husband walks in the door his clothes come off. He's not allowed to wear clothes around the house. It what works for them.

> Then there are the professionals who are paid by someone. Many lifestylers are professionals. However there are some people who are just in it for the money and don't care about the safety factor. Lifestylers who are professionals also care more than people just in it for the money. They aren't out to injure. The first and foremost tenet of BDSM is safe, sane and consensual, which involves the physical as well as the psychological.

MR - What do you say to people who say just a form of prostitution?

MF - There are sexual overtones in BDSM, but there is no sexual contact. Everything that a true lifestyler and professional does in a BDSM is legal by law. There is no oral, anal or vaginal contact. I'm sure there are some that do nothing more that cheap hookers with

delusions of grandeur. The only genital contact is confined to CBT (cock and ball torture) in which I basically tie up the penis with little pink bow and tease it, with feathers, clothespins, etc.

MR - How much is one of your sessions and why do you think that people come to you for this?

MF - My rate starts out at \$200 for a two-hour session and goes up to \$450. I think guys come to me because they like to put a face to their fantasy. It's something that they fantasize about and for some reason or another, they don't have a spouse that will help them fulfill their fantasies. I even had one client whose wife knew what he was doing. I invited her along to see what I was doing. She refused, but I still asked her. I also care for the clients and know when not to leave marks on their body, be it because of a job they have or they don't want their spouse finding out. Most of my clients are middle-aged professional males who are doctors, lawyers, and even a coroner, believe it or not. They are always expected to be in charge, to be the one taking the bull by the horns. They want someone else to make decisions for a change, someone else to be in charge, and that's why they come to me. They also come to me because I actually take the time to customtailor each session to each individual client.

MR – What about personal relationships? Are you able to maintain one while being a dominatrix?

MF – I do have a boyfriend. We've been together for five months now. At first I think that he was a little bit jealous, but after he saw what I did and heard some of the messages I was left by prospective clients he got more comfortable with it.

MR – Is there ever a time where he's in the mood for some BDSM, but you feel too tired to "take your work home with you?" MF – Yes, sometimes, but it's more of being worn out from my regular job. And for me a flogging is almost like a massage in that it helps me relax.

MR - So who has the power in the BDSM act?

MF - Oh, the submissive one has the true power. Before a session, we go over what's going to happen and boundaries are set by the submissive on how far they are willing to go. In all sessions, safe words are involved. They can be any word, but typical safe-words are yellow, which means slow down or stop temporarily, we need to clear something up, I need to catch my breath and red, which means stop immediately.

There are times when the submissive is out of breath and can't get the

words out, but a good dom pays attention and can recognize this and will check and ask if the submissive is alright. Safety is a primary concern.

MR - What's the ratio of women to me who are your clients?

MF - 99.9% of my clients are male with about 90% of them being married men who are looking for a little bit of excitement without cheating on their wives.

LS - I would like to add that the ratio of men to women in the BDSM scene is about 50/50. Also, there seems to be a higher percentage of males who play the dominate roll while the females are more submissive.

MR - I haven't talked to you yet, Lord Serpent. Tell me how you got involved with BDSM.





I had seen the movie 9 1/2 Weeks and have read the Kama Sutra and basically felt that I've been there, done that. I needed something more. It's like a jigsaw piece where you can't quite make out the picture and then you put the piece in and it all makes sense, well that was how it was with me. The piece just fell into place.

At this point Lord Serpent showed me a few of his handcrafted leather toys, including his pride and joy, the Great Red Serpent. His craftwork was quite stunning. I asked him to give me a demonstration by flogging my arm (really, it was my arm). The blows weren't stinging, but did make a loud noise.

MR – Really, that doesn't hurt at all. It sounds like it would. Is sound a big part in BDSM?

LS – The senses do play a large part in BDSM. It's part of the psychological that goes along with it. For example, I had this one woman, who is just a blond bombshell, who was in for a session. She was in a rope dress and I had the soundtrack to Conan playing. Atmosphere is a big part of the whole experience as well. She was totally into the session.

MF – I was helping him with the session and she was so far into it that she didn't know I was in the room. She just thought she was resting her head on two soft pillows, which were actually my breasts. When the session was over and she lifted her head, she had that kind of crackhead stare, she was so much into it. She was in subspace. She was basically experiencing what some people call runners high, which is an endorphin rush.

MR-Is there any humor to BDSM?

MF – Oh but of course. It's all really about having fun and enjoying yourself. A friend of mine likes to paddle her submissives while singing the theme song of *Green Acres*.

LS – Here's another story with the blond bombshell. I had her wrapped in Saran wrap, which makes the skin tighter and more sensitive. I told her that she wasn't allowed to laugh, and if she did she would be punished. I then put on the soundtrack to *Men in Tights*. And here she was trying not to laugh, but she couldn't help it. It was fun.

MRZ-How did you go about forming the Dayton BDSM group?

LS - It all started on March 28, 1998. I knew that Dayton needed a support group for the BDSM community. Others have tried to start one, but it just never took off. I had a few meetings and no one showed up. Then at one meeting when I felt like nobody was going to show up a couple of people walked in. I asked them if they were here for the meeting and they said yes. I then said the BDSM support group meeting. And they said yes. So that's where it started taking off. And now we have 40 card-carrying members with another 30-40 who show up at meetings and are almost like members.

MR - So what do you do in the support group?

LS - We have social gatherings once a week where people get together and just socialize. Every couple of months we have play parties where people get together to socialize, show off toys and become more informed. At these parties there is a social area and a play area. There are no drugs or drinking at these events, and there is no nudity or penetration. Well, the only nudity that there would be are breasts, but not too often. The gatherings are mostly comprised of couples.

MR – If someone is interested in learning more about BDSM, where should they go?

LS – They just need to contact a local support group, which can usually be found via the Internet. Usually someone will volunteer to be a mentor for that individual or couple. The mentors usually end up being another couple.

MF – In fact I had a fellow who wanted to learn more and I mentored him. He would help me out in my sessions. And it is showing the individual how to be safe and do things in a safe manner. I didn't charge him. It was true mentoring. I would suggest that anyone who is interested in becoming a dominate, should be a submissive first in order to gain better understanding of BDSM.

LS - I have to ad that the BDSM group is not a single's bar. We have many social events, which are non-play events. We do have a review process for anyone who wants to join the group.

MR - Do you have any last words?

LS - A hardware store is a dom's best friend.







I really liked *Third Season* by **AFI** video where a group of kids end up attacking an ice cream truck. It's just another example of the right way to make a video that helps to compliment the song.


If nothing else this punk video collection is worth getting just to see Laura of **Superchumk** drinking a glass of milk in thier video for their song *Fishing*.
