#### Senior Legislature Report

California taxpayers will have a rare opportunity to do something in their own best interests, when they fill out the 1983 Form 540, the California State Income Tax Form.

Appearing on the form 540 for the first time will be Line 89, which asks taxpayers to indicate if they wish to contribute a dollar (or more) to the California Seniors Fund. The newly created California Seniors Fund will underwrite activities of the California Senior Legislature and will support various direct services to Seniors in such areas as housing, health care, transportation, and nutrition. The Fund, and Line 89, are the results of passage this year of Assembly Bill 50, through the combined efforts of State Assemblyman Art Agnos, State Senator Henry Mello, the California Commission on Aging, and the California Senior Legis-

The California Senior Legislature is a non-partisan, grassroots body of 120 elected Senior Senators (40) and Senior Assemblypersons (80) over the age of 60. In their annual legislative session in the State Capitol, the Senior Legislators debate, draft, and select ten top priority bills for the State Legislature to consider. In 1981, seven of the ten CSL bills were enacted into law: in 1982. six of the ten CSL bills became law. California was the 17th state to establish a Senior Legislature.

#### **RIGHT ON**

At the January 9th meeting of the Leisure Village Board of Directors, Board Member Lou Okun spoke forcefully on matters which the editors of ILV feel should be brought to the attention of all the residents.

We are therefore excerpting the major portion of his remarks as follows:

"We have more than 100 volunteer committee people serving Leisure Village, and I have first-hand knowledge of what it takes to be a dedicated, hard working member of the many committees that are literally the eyes and ears of the Board of Directors.

"I would like to thank the committee chairpersons in this room and ask them to convey to their membership, the gratitude of the Board for their selfless devotion to the job at hand and for their continued efforts toward improving the welfare of all residents.

"Now, I shall address the following to the  $\frac{1}{2}$  of 1 percent — a fair estimate — of our residents, whose actions have prompted these remarks.

"I think we are all very fortunate to have a staff, such as the group of people we are now associated with, covering the various managerial and clerical positions and responding so courteously and efficiently to the requests and, at times, the demands of residents.

"This Board encourages wholeheartedly the right of residents to express their views. We expect you to register your complaint if you honestly think the complaint is justified, but don't call in to the office and threaten our staff with, 'I pay your salary' or 'You work for me!'

"I recently witnessed such an episode and was shocked to know that a resident would do this, and I was proud of the two involved members of our administrative personnel, both of whom maintained a calm and courteous attitude in resolving the problem in question.

"I pay your salary" — indeed! This kind of talk is immature and abusive, whether it is directed at the girls in the office or at our Security personnel, and I say it is unacceptable.

"Certainly you pay their salary — we have more than 2,000 homes in Leisure Village, and each homeowner, you might say, is paying about 1/2000th of the total — salaries, capital expenditures, water, power, etc. — but that does not empower you to harass our employees. You have elected a Board of Directors. The Board has appointed committees. The Board has hired a General Manager. The General Manager is authorized to hire employees and fire employees 'for cause,' and he consults with the Board on a daily basis.

"If you have a legitimate gripe, attend a committee meeting pertinent to the subject and make yourself heard. If you prefer to address a letter to a Department Head or the General Manager, by all means, do so! Just stick to the facts—and no threats.

"This Board has complete confidence in every member of our administrative staff, from the General Manager down through all departments.

"No one is perfect — it would be intolerable to have to deal with the perfect man or woman — and besides, I don't think there is such an animal. Skip Roberts, our General Manager,

My sleep pattern is on the blink again, so rather than fret, I've decided to do something I've been procrastinating about.

## JUST WHAT IS YOUR NEIGHBORS CARE GROUP?

Do you really know what Your Neighbors Care Group is all about? For many villagers it means having a monthly free blood pressure check without leaving the village. For others it is an opportunity to hear professionals speak on health-related subjects. For some it means that payment of \$1.00 yearly dues makes them eligible to subscribe to an excellent group supplemental medical insurance through Weldon Insurance Service.

But Y.N.C.G. is even more than that. As its name implies, it means being a caring neighbor. How? By being available when the need arises to help someone in a minor emergency situation, such as taking someone for a medical appointment, being a companion to a lonely villager or in times of stress, perhaps picking up a wheelchair or other medical equipment at the Rec. center for a villager in need, perhaps fur-

nishing a meal in a particular instance, etc.

Who takes care of all these problems? While the day-to-day operation is carried on year in and year out by a small group of dedicated volunteers, and the blood pressure clinic staffed by qualified people, the group depends upon you neighbors to help in these other problems.

When you pay your dues each July you are asked to check the boxes on an application indicating in what area you may be able to help—transportation, simple meal preparation, etc. There is also a box marked "moral support," which is for those who are physically unable to help, or who have been helping for many years.

But the majority of residents are not checking any of these boxes, not volunteering, especially those in the newer villages. The reason might be

## **HEALTH NOTES**

The number of L.V. residents that attended the Y.N.C.G. Health Fair in November proved that we indeed are interested in our health. However it was also disclosed that many do little to protect or improve it.

Stroke detection tests: 590 residents were screened and found to need no further testing. 142 needed detailed scans.

Those with high carotid artery blockage should definitely see their doctor about this condition. You with lower percents and those not requested to take the scan can now do something to prevent this condition from advancing or start-

This month new information was released by the National Institute of Health. A 10 year study by the institute headlined its article "Reduced Cholesterol Cuts Risk of Heart and Artery Disease." Dr. Basil M. Rifkind

stated, "This is the first study to demonstrate conclusively that the risk of coronary heart disease can be reduced by lowering blood cholesterol as we previously suspected."

In connection with the stroke scans: if you have not received notice from S.D.S. call 1-800-624-3692. You may have received notice from Medicare that it will not pay for your scan. Have no fear, you will not be billed for the scan by S.D.S. They assumed all monetary responsibility if they could not collect.

Diabetics: Another condition hard to comprehend was brought out by our Health Fair Most of the L.V. diabetics who took the blood-sugar test were dangerously out of control. I was asked to find out if a support group could be formed in L.V. for all diabetics. Guest speakers, doctors and nurses would dispense information and support. Carpools would be arranged to attend classes at Los Robles Hospital on "Survival Skills for People with Diabetes." Is there a diabetic volunteer out there who would help get this started? Call Sandy Okum 482-8125.

Alzheimer's Disease: This a frightening disease that is becoming more prevalent. The Ventura Health Dept. has a special task force ready to assist afflicted persons and their families. I have been asked to help start a group in L.V. If you are interested in forming an organization call me at 482-8125.



father was in construction work, but after emigration to California in 1929, he ran a family restaurant in East Los Angeles.







## CURRENT ISSUES FORUM

Rates for 1984-85."

George Orwell's book "1984" was discussed by a panel of three speakers at the Current Issues Forum on Dec. 30. Approximately 200 Villagers heard a contrast in views concerning the question of whether the dire predictions of the author as to the curtailment of individual liberty were actually coming to pass now that we are in 1984.

Sol Robin, V. 42, was the

most pessimistic, giving many examples to prove that the dreaded world of "Big Brother" is here now. He cited the Reagan administration's new secrecy order requiring federal employees to get administration approval to publish anything relating to government activities even after leaving government employment as a serious threat to our civil liberties. He also mentioned the "Double Speak" used by President Reagan in calling the MX missile the "peace keeper." Also, there is the imprisonment of political dissenters throughout the world revealed by Amnesty International.

Dr. Leonard Diamond, psychologist, recently elected school board trustee, was more optimistic. He believes that our love of freedom will prevent the all-powerful state from taking over our lives. Dr. Diamond suggested that the conditions of post-war Britain in 1948 shaped Orwell's pessimistic attitudes about the future.

Philip Cohen, Camarillo attorney, who grew up in En-

gland agreed with Dr. Diamond that the conditions in England inspired the frightening novel "1984." But he called the novel "hype" and cited such conditions as the emergence of the "Third World" and the strong environmental protest movement in Germany and the ACLU in this country to support his optimism.

Prior to the panel discussion, Harold Lee, V. 20, spoke of his meeting Orwell during the Spanish Civil War in the 1930's when Lee was a member of the Abraham Lincoln Brigade and Orwell a member of the British brigade fighting the Franco forces. He said that Orwell left Spain very disillusioned because of the infighting between the democratic forces.



I cannot believe that I even enjoy the sound of the sprinklers as they go on in the morning. It's a comforting sound as I am lying in my bed.



I have found contentment, have you?



## PROFILE: RUBE DAVIS Volunteer's Volunteer

The most important activity in Rube Davis' life currently is the Speakers' Bureau of the L.V. Community Relations Committee. The purpose of the group which he organized, expresses what he feels is a fundamental need of our country: well educated youth. Giving senior citizens an opportunity to speak about their special knowledge, viewpoints, and expertise also provides stimulation for people who have invaluable experience to share with young people.

Acting as liaison for the Speaker's Bureau and the public schools is Tri-Tec Center, which has published a directory listing speakers and their topics. Teachers or administrators may select a topic of interest to their classes, and the speaker is contacted. At present there are about thirty people in L.V. who are active in the program. A division of the Department of Education of the State of California is using the

L.V. program as a model to encourage organization of other groups throughout the State. In view of cutbacks in educational funding, the seniors' contributions are particularly welcome, and the response from young people has been most gratifying. Rube has a thick pile of letters expressing appreciation to the speakers. It is becoming more difficult to fill requests, hence qualified people are welcomed to the group.

Rube Davis has a long history of volunteer work. As a young man in Los Angeles, he was interested in community affairs. He was president of numerous organizations, social, business, and political. His home displays dozens of plaques, citations, thank-yous, mementos, and photos of civic involvements as an assiduous volunteer.

Rube was born in New York in 1906, but grew up in Illinois as eldest of six children. Rube's

steadily-growing older population of the State, the CSL transcends all boundaries of race, color, sex, religious or political belief, or economic status, in that its deliberations and acts benefit all who reach the age

On Line 89, taxpayers will be able to support the California Seniors Fund in one of two ways: if they anticipate a refund, they may instruct the State to withold one dollar (or more) from that refund and pass it over to the fund; if they declare that they owe income tax to the State, they may include one extra dollar (or more) with similar instructions.

In working for, and obtaining, passage of AB 50, members of both the State Legislature and the Senior Legislature felt that taxpayers in California would appreciate the opportunity to dictate directly how at least one dollar of their money is used.

#### **HOW TO NOMINATE 1984 BOARD CANDIDATES** BY PETITION

Nomination of candidates for election to the Leisure Village in nomination to the Board of Directors may be made in two ways:

1. By the Nominating Committee

2. By petition

An owner wishing to place a resident of Leaiure Village in nomination to the Board of Directors may do so by submitting the name in writing to the Nominating Committee by April 20, 1984. Such petitions require five percent (5%) of the owners in residence signing their approval, or 167 signatures.

No special form is required for the petition.
