we received our ballots for the



In April 1960, when our house was finished and my husband and I moved in, we were given a set of rules and reg-

ulations and were told that this was a Community and we each had to follow those rules.

We had a friend working at the District Attorney's Office, and she told me that we were governed by a Board of Directors that we elect and, in case of any problems, they were supposed to help us solve them. Therefore, we followed the rules, and in all these years, we never had any serious problems, and when we had any, we put in a request and the Association took care of them.

It seems to me that now, the newcomers are given a different set of rules and regulations and the new owners do not comply and do as they please and defy them.

A few years ago, I got a lilac bush and asked the Foreman of the Maintenance Department to allow us to plant it in the ground. But he told me that the General Manager does not allow any lemon trees or lilac bushes in the ground and to put it in a big pot and it will be OK, which we did.

About two weeks ago, I noticed that one of the plants that the Village planted was sprayed with white powder (it seemed to me) and I called the office to have Mr. Salas, the foreman, come and take a look. He did, and he said that the plant was diseased and had to be taken out, but Mr. Watkins, our General Manager, won't allow it because of my lilac pot, which was in the way. This amazed me, and I ask myself: What about my rights as a Homeowner? The pot is not cemented to the ground, and they could just push it aside a few inches and the men could do their work. Don't I deserve that much consideration? My monthly fees were raised by \$16.50 per month on April 1, and I don't have the right to ask for anything because the General Manager does not allow it and it can't be done!

ago, he was an "official" candidate, selected by the Board's own Nominating Committee. Now, Arthur Katz is caught in a trap not of his own making.

The trap is one of those "Catch-22s," a dreaded "legal technicality." This "technicality" got Katz's name removed from the ballot just before printing because the Board ruled that he is not "officially qualified." However, he says, he will meet the official qualifications the day before the election. That's when he is assured he will receive court approval to manage his late mother's estate, which includes his residence in the Village where he has lived for most of the past three years.

So, Katz became a writein candidate for a Board seat. Katz, who chairs the Insurance Committee, was chosen by the Nominating Committee and campaigned along with the three other candidates. Two of those, Harold Goldwasser and Marjorie Lorraine, also were nominated by the official Committee.

However, Katz's name was abruptly withdrawn when the Board concluded that, as he is not the official holder of title to his late mother's home, technically he is not qualified for the ballot.

Those who know that "timing is everything" can appreciate Katz's dilemma. The legal decision on his control of the estate is not due, unforeseen events notwithstanding, until June 23. That is the day before the election is officially certified, on June 24. The certification is part of the required Annual Meeting. Those ballots mailed to us

on May 27, can either be marked and mailed back to the Administration, dropped in the Administration box at the Recreation Center, or personally taken to the Administration Building.

The foggy area is the possible disagreement about whether or not Katz is a viable write-in candidate.

Randy Watkins, Village General Manager, says, "There are no by-laws governing the write-in process; anybody's name can be written in on an absentee ballot.

However, to take office, Watkins points out, should a write-in candidate win, "That person would have to be, officially, an owner of a residence in the Village.

Arthur Katz will be officially nominated at the Annual Association meeting at 10 a.m. on June 24. That is when any Association member can nominate any candidate. Those in attendance who have not voted by absentee ballot can write in their candidate.

Though the Annual Meetings rarely attract a large number of voters, and the nominating process usually is no more than an honor to the person nominated, another critical technicality (yes, another one), at least in Arthur Katz's case, will be resolved.

Regardless of the questions raised about Katz's qualifications, assuming he meets the critical legal technicality — that he has court approval of his control of the property in which he resides — his nomination, the seconding, the vote, and the write-ins, all tabulated, then will be counted in the balloting against the other three candidates and the top two will get the open seats.

Whew. Now you know why I warned you at the beginning that this election would be a challenge.

Meet your Board candidates Harold Clair Goldwasser Huffman

Harold Goldwasser believes that his 40 years of business experience, much of it in management, has prepared him to find and eliminate what he calls "unnecessary expenditures, thereby showing a more profitable bottom line.'

He expresses a generalist's view of what he can do

if he is elected to the board, focusing on making a difference in what he sees, "as a lot that needs correcting." His thrust would be

to reduce costs, which would lead to lower monthly assessments.

Among the issues he cites as specific areas of interest is better management of landscaping, especially care and maintenance of trees and general cleanup.

Goldwasser says that by giving greater attention to general upkeep of the com-

Seeking a second consecutive term on the board, Clair Huffman says he has "no big schemes about spending people's money."

"The big problem is to decide what is reasonable and how to get good value and good results with the money we spend," he says.

Maintaining property val-

ues is one of his priorities, but Huffman says annual costs should be balanced fairly between those "residents who are finan-

cially secure and the others - singles and widows on fixed incomes, for example - who are hurt by assessment increases."

While he sees street maintenance and repair as priorities, he also thinks that not having a consistent and effective long-term landscaping program is "a big problem.



Channel Islands National Park is worth the effort

To visit the Channel Islands National Park, all one has to do is to climb aboard one of the Island Packers Co. boats in either Ventura Harbor or the Channel Islands Harbor in Oxnard for a half-day, full-day, or overnight camping trip. My wife and I have experienced day trips — but non-camping — from both harbors.

The thrill of "going to sea" on a boat that provides intimate observation of sea animal and plant life proved to be a good way to develop an appreciation for and a strong interest in our unique national park.

Before committing oneself, the best introduction is to visit Park Headquarters at the jetty end of Spinnaker Road, the main thoroughfare through the Ventura Harbor community. This visit provides an orientation to the park and its history.

The Park consists of five islands, and you can see several from the tower in the headquarters building. Right next door is the Island Packers Co. office and pier. Perhaps one of its boats will

be available to whet your cruise appetite.

During your visit, you'll learn more about the cruise-time schedules, clothing needed, food requirements and the roles of crew members, docents, and Park employees. On your cruise, you may see migrating whales, seals, pelicans, sea lions, birds, foxes, otters and a variety of plants on land and in the sea.

Additionally, you'll also have friends and companions just as pleased as you'll be. There's something about being together at sea that creates a feeling of camaraderie.

Incidentally, a similar cruise service is available from Truth Aquatics at Santa Barbara Landing. And Channel Islands Aviation at Camarillo Airport offers roundtrip flights to Santa Rosa Island. The day boat trips are most comfortable for the first visit and can provide insight into efforts required to try overnight camping.

How fortunate we are to have our own "private" National Park within a few miles!

Patio surface paves the way to outstanding improvement

Jon and Pat Amelsberg care a great deal about the appearance of our Village, as evidenced by their carefully tended yard and improvements they have made to their home in Village 44.

As volunteers tor the Building and Grounds Committee, they walk two Villages, 37 and the very large Village 17. They pick up all kinds of ideas along the way as they exercise and meet other Villagers.


Their gardens have drought-tolerant planting approved for full maintenance care, but Jon and Pat have added various pots and artifacts, making the areas "Red Stake." This means

they must do the upkeep, which they enjoy.

"I can easily return to full maintenance by removing the tchochkes," Pat said.

The Amelsbergs had their entry walkway and back patio resurfaced with a unique overlay treatment called "Thin-Crete." This stamped concrete system duplicates the look of flagstone, brick or other deep relief patterns over existing concrete and eliminates the expense of jackhammering out the old concrete base.

A new fiberglass front door with an oval window was installed. And one would swear it was real wood. Leaving the front door open tor the afternoon breeze is still possible with



The audience laughed for three hours at the hilarious antics of Laurel and Hardy, Buster Keaton, Charlie Chaplin and a very young Al St. John, later to become "Fuzzy" St. John, cowboy sidekick to everyone from Roy Rogers to Gene Autry.

Al St. John was a very respectable comedian, too. He was Fatty Arbuckle's nephew, and the big guy wanted to help him get a start in the biz!

On June 20 we will screen "Spring Parade," a relatively unknown movie with Deanna Durbin, Mischa Auer, Henry Stephenson, Anne Gwynne, Szoke ("Cuddles") Sakall, and, of course, Village 3's own Peggy Moran Koster and directed by Village 3's former inmate, Henry Koster.

In among the many shots of makeup, rehearsal and production of his movies are a number of scenes from "Spring Parade," which Dad photographed in color. The movie was shot in black-and-white, but his home movies were in color. So now we can see the bril-

Architectural Guidelines now being remodeled

Guidelines for alterations or improvements proposed for structures within The Village are now under review and revision. The Architectural Committee has determined that the current Guidelines, issued under that committee's jurisdiction, are at times less than "user friendly."

The basic purpose for having these Guidelines is to improve the ability of the applicant to understand the process and to assist in planning and execution of a project. To that end, the Guidelines are being totally reviewed and rewritten. It is intended to remove as much "legalese" as possible to make them more understandable.

The intention is also to remove redundant material. as well as material that is fully covered by (and thereby superseded by) Camarillo City Building Codes. Many of the "Specifications" that were part of the Guidelines will be dropped, and those that seem still to be pertinent and retained will be reviewed for clarity.

Items added include attic

ladders, which, though internal to a structure, can materially affect structural integrity, and commercially produced storage cabinets for patio use. It is also intended to upgrade the Guidelines to include current construction practices and newly available materials, hopefully for the benefit of all.

The Guidelines have been reduced to 20 pages, and the prior associated Specifications have been combined into 36 Exhibits, some of which are strictly procedural guides:

Finally, the entire application/approval procedure will be more clearly described and streamlined to make the application/approval process as short and "painless" as possible.

The new Architectural Guidelines were presented to the Board of Directors for approval in May, and it is expected that they will be acted on by the Board this month.

In the interim, the current Guidelines and associated Specifications remain in force. If, and when, the revisions are adopted, there will be a public notification. Affinity Bank

Why raise fees in times of excess?

In the May issue of this paper, it may have been noticed that I offered a bit of encouragement to all residents of Leisure Village to get in and participate in the Village's business.

While I held forth on that subject on one page, on the facing page, Joe Benti gave us what many, I'm sure, considered to be great news

concerning our Reserve Account. It is just the type of information that is very important to "us." He told us that the account was

"125 percent funded." That is, we have 25 percent more money in the bank than our reserve study indicates we should have for the repairs/replacements due to be made in this fiscal year. Not to worry!

Why, then, was there a discussion over the need for a Special Assessment of around \$650 per owner to permit repairs of pavement? That would have come to more than \$1,387,000.

A Special Assessment is used when there are unplanned or excessive expenditures needed, or for

emergencies unforeseen. In this case, the anticipated assessment is to pay for items that rightfully should be contained in the Reserve Study, and therefore, currently "in the bank."

Even though the State of California has no specific legal requirement for an association such as ours to fund and account strictly in accordance with a Reserve Study, it is to be used as a guide for the Board of Directors to execute their "fiduciary responsibilities"

you feel comfortable with, but there was no mistaking what it was. Yet again, another thoughtless, bad citizen had proved that one of the biggest problems created by dogs is really "a people problem.'

Like so many of the people problems that some of us think occur only outside our Village gates, this one, too, has been brought right in with us. The problem (which violates Association Regulations and is punishable by a fine) is so bothersome that Pat Amelsberg brought it up during the residents' comment section at the open board meeting in March. Her appeal was familiar and, not surprisingly, timeless.

Why, Pat asked, can't all dog owners be responsible for their pets? Why don't they clean up after their pets who obviously cannot clean up after themselves?

There's the rub. Some deeper studies into the problem reveal that no matter what negligent dog owners are told, most of

them simply don't get it and don't want to get it. They cannot figure out why the big fuss over their pet's

little muss.

In a recent article in USA Today, Traci Watson reported that a 1999 study by the

Center for Watershed Protection found that of the 41 percent of those in the study who do not clean up after their dogs, nearly half refuse to pick up their pet's droppings despite fines and the complaints of their neighbors. Among their arguments for not cleaning up were these two: "Eventually it goes away," and "Small dog, small waste."

Neither argument is true, however.

There is plenty of evidence that dog and cat waste is every bit as dangerous as human waste, containing bacteria that you would not want to track into the house on your shoes or, for that matter, to have your dog contaminated by just for sniffing too close-

No matter how cute, cuddly or lovable the dog, it often harbors E. coli, Salmonella and Giardia all nasty and unwelcome in our bodies and our water


And dog droppings are just like everything else in these times of exponential growth. At one place in Virginia, called Four Mile Run, an estimated 12,000 dogs live in the watershed area. Each day, these Fifis and Fidos leave behind an estimated 5,000 pounds of fecal matter. Do the math. If we have, say, 200 dogs in the Village, that's approximately 84 pounds a day,

588 pounds a week, 2.852 pounds a month. You get the messy picture.

It is not small, and it does not just go away if it is not picked up.

Perhaps the best advice comes from the Web site, VeterinaryPartner.com., which notes, "Picking up is just part of having a dog. If everyone would do it, there would be far fewer objections to dogs living and traveling in human communities. ... Picking up shows pride in your community, in yourself, and in your dog.

To which one might add: "Don't be a Stupe. Pick up the poop!"

Paul Ilovsky was my friend

(Editor's note: This article is the first of what we hope will be others sharing insights into the fascinating history and variety of people who have called Leisure Village their home over the years.)

When I moved to Leisure Village in March of 2000, I already had a good support system. After all, my father had moved in here in 1980 with my stepmother, and even though he had left us in 1988, Peggy was well known in the village by everyone and had been an enthusiastic participant in such varied activities as the Players Guild and the pool room. And my wife and I had been traveling out here for 20 years, attending plays, performances and even dances.

So although we did not know anyone at all in Village 24, where we bought a charming little home, we knew enough people, stores, and restaurants in Camarillo to be comfortable from the git-go. And although my wife and I are naturally shy people, everyone around here seemed so friendly that making new friends did not appear to be a problem.

For the first few weeks, we traveled back to Los Angeles quite frequently to have dinner with our friends there, and many of those friends drove the halfhour to Camarillo to be with us. We did not break the umbilical cord to Tarzana for quite a while. In fact, for the first few weeks, while there was an overabundance of trash brought on by shipping boxes and wrappings, etc., I made the trip every few days back to Tarzana to visit my favorite Dumpster, not having completely understood the ridiculously simple instructions for the biweekly pickups here in the Village.

Slowly our focus moved westward to our new home, and we began to explore the facilities more avidly. I discovered that although the

Village was at least partially peopled by folks with a theatrical bent, there was no regular screening of the old and well-loved movies, of which I have a rather large collection in the closet. Hence, the new Leisure Village Classic Films.

We also discovered the swimming pool. We learned early on that we would neither scald ourselves nor suffer frostbite by immersing ourselves, so during the meteorologically beneficial period, which consists of only around 80 percent of the time here, Sarah and I went to the pool.

There are two advantages to the swimming pool. One is swimming and the exercise it affords. The other is the fascinating and wonderful variety of people who use the facility — conversa-tions ranging from the more obscure facets of Shakespeare to discussions of the Hebrew language to the current state, or lack thereof, of the Clippers. We discovered a disproportionate number of fans of New York teams, for some reason. Must be the weather that affects people strangely.

As I said, we are shy people, not easily drawn to new friends, and we very seldom approach anyone on a social basis out of the blue.

However

My mother, my real mother, was born in Budapest. Peggy was my stepmother. But my real mother was a Hungarian, a

natural-born Magyar, a tradition and heritage of which I am most proud. The artistic tradition and theatrical results of Hungarians all over the world are well known. And my family was a big part of that.

Erno Kiraly, my grandfather, was the Hungarian Maurice Chevalier. Hermine Solti, Grandma, was the Phyllis Diller of Budapest, except somewhat less constrained, even in private life. They were married for only a few years, long enough to give birth to Mom, Katherine Kiraly, later Kitty Koster. Grandpa's wandering eye put an end to domestic bliss, and he divorced Grandma to avail himself of almost anything not wearing pants in Hungary at the time. This led to his constantly looking for more work because of the severe lack of funds caused by his lifestyle.

In the period around 1910 to about 1930 he was a big vaudeville star, stage presence, all over Hungary. He traveled the countryside appearing wherever he was recognized, which was everywhere, and getting himself into one bad romance after another.

the usual greetings, as well as "please," "thank you," and "you're welcome." It's not an easy language to learn because its roots are neither Greek nor Roman, so most English speakers find the lexicon to be obscure at the very least.

But listening to the language is a delight. It flows and sings, smoothly and melodically. It has none of the guttural back-throat sounds of German or difficult tongue/lip combinations of French. It is verbal music—to my ears, at least. And since it is not similar to any other language in the world, except vaguely Finnish and Ugric, Magyar is easily identifiable even to the untrained ear.

But there are not a great many Hungarians in the world. It is a small country, after all. Those who emigrate to warmer climes, Camarillo, are recognizable by their accents and their language when they are in public. And since my heritage is Magyar, I hear the language.

I was Iying by the pool, minding my own business, completely involved in the latest issue of American Heritage Magazine, when I noticed two handsome, distinguished men drifting about in the pool, having a conversation in Magyar. Presently they said goodbye ("Viszlat") to each other and walked out of the pool. The thinner of the two gentlemen walked directly in front of me as he headed for his chaise and towel. Being whimsical, I said, "Jo napot," ("Hello") as he passed my chaise.

He stopped to look at this stranger who had intruded on his private thoughts. He said, "Magyar?" I answered, "Igan"

I answered, "Igan" ("yes"), "but my mother was born in Budapest. I do not speak the language." I asked him what part of Hungary he was from, and he asked me about my parents. We chatted for a few minutes and I realized that he had a story to tell. And

what a story!

Paul Ilovsky was a romantic. He was also incredibly lucky. He was born in a small town in Hungary and grew up there. He met a local girl, Erszibet (Elizabeth), and married her at an early age. They had an idyllic existence. Well, they were happy, anyway, and young, and very much in love.

Not too long after their marriage the scourge of the Nazis struck, and Paul and Erszibet were carted away to separate concentration camps. They spent the war there under the most appalling conditions. No human should ever have to go through what these people went through. And it lasted for years - not just a few days - years. They had been separated at the first and neither knew where the other was, or even if the other was alive. So many had died. (Except for an aunt I have never met, who lived in Canada, my whole family was killed during that horrible period.)

Paul was almost entirely unmindful of the world outside the camp. Existence was a day-to-day proposition. Somehow he lived through it, and one day his camp was liberated and he was free again.

Paul was homeless, but at least alive. Living off his wits he managed to travel back to his home village. And after all those years, he discovered that Elizabeth had done the same thing! They were reunited. Of course they both had

grate to the United States, where he was even more successful. They had a much happier life from then on, and eventually Paul bought a home in Leisure Village and he and Elizabeth lived here for many years.

What a story to hear at the swimming pool! I was astounded! But just on the off-chance, I asked Paul if he or Elizabeth had ever heard of my grandpa, Erno Kiraly. ERNO KIRALY???

"Bob, you won't believe this."

"Of course I will, Paul."

"Bob, your grandfather taught me how to play the violin!"

"YHAT???"

It seems that Grandpa was appearing in Paul's village when, as usual, he fell in love for the umpteenth time and was again broke. Had to get back to Budapest somehow, had a gig at the theatre. Needed train fare. Good old Grandpa. Paul llovsky's father helped by hiring Grandpa for a few days to teach Paul how to

play the violin. Paul learned violin, Grandpa kept his theatre engagement date, everyone was happy. This was in the late 1920s or early 1930s.

Paul and Elizabeth became friends with Sarah and me. We spent a delightful afternoon at their beauti-

ful house where, as Elizabeth does, she treated us to some wonderful, sinful, exquisite pastries as only Hungarians can do. I loved the conversation and the friendship even more than the pastries. It certainly lasted a lot longer than the pastries did.

Paul and I saw each other often at the pool and chatted easily every time. He always swam, every day, kept up his strength and stamina and his indomitable spirits. What spirit that man had! I wish I had half his character and fortitude and especially his wonderful, warm humor. Never a bad word to say about anyone.

I miss him. He left us a few months back. I never go to memorial services because they are usually depressing, and I am not comfortable there. But I did go to Paul's and his was different. So many fine people, so many good words. I felt Paul's presence there very strongly. I sat quietly in the back row.

I still think about Paul llovsky often. And sometimes when I am at the pool and nobody else is there, ripples appear suddenly in the deep end where Paul used to swim. Who knows?

Grandpa would have been proud of his pupil.

to each owner in the Village. It now is clear from the reported condition of the reserves that they have done this quite well.

A reading of the Leisure Village Reserve Study Summary reveals the following information:

The planned expenditure this year for pavement is around \$343,000, if those items shown in the study with "zero useful life remaining" are to be replaced or repaired.

If we are funded at 125 percent of the necessary funds this year, someone found nearly \$419,000

somewhere. If the once-proposed assessment was to have raised \$1,300,000, what else was it for? \$1,387,000 minus \$343,000 leaves \$957,000 unaccounted for. If we now no longer need this assessment, then someone actually found around \$1,044,000. Wow! Not easily misplaced in a desk drawer.

All of this might be attributable to "creative accounting methods," but then we must be sure that there is not a larger surprise coming in the future.
