Hawapipe Talent

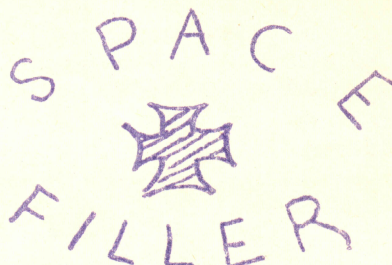
