Construction

"Congress has received reports over the last decade indicating a need for the re-building of our nation's cities and the construction of some 200 new cities of up to 100,000 population each by the end of this century."

"President Johnson's administration made a start in this direction but the effort has now all but been discontinued."

"This nation's construction industry is capable of bringing to reality the development of cities and communities in which housing, employment, education, recreation, culture, energy production and consumption, sanitation, transportation and other vital services are part of a carefully designed plan."

"We cannot afford to let skilled construction workers sit idle and worry about their next job when there is so much work to be done."

Waste Disposal

"Orange County is now the site of a recycling plant which can convert a ton of raw garbage into about 480 pounds of fuel oil, 160 pounds of char, 140 pounds of magnetic metals, and 120 pounds of gass. Columbus, Ohio, supplies power to its municipal buildings by converting the city's solid wastes into methane gas."

"Government incentives could speed development and expansion of these processes for use all over the country-opening employment in a new industry for persons presently unemployed, including engineers, technicians, and chemists."

"Congress needs to examine these and other new solid waste disposal methods, with special attention to aiding local government for development of necessary facilities."

Energy

"There is no good reason why France, Russia, Japan, and Israel should be ahead of the United States in the development of solar energy."

"We had plenty of warning of the energy crisis but the Nixon Administration continued its policy of cutting, vetoing, and impounding the job-producing funds that could have prevented the problem until it was too late."

"Now, more than 2,000 Americans are being thrown out of work every week because of the energy crisis."

"We need to pass legislation like that introduced by Senater Alan Cranston and others to create new jobs and protect old jobs with a massive commitment to development of solar, geothermal, tidal, wind and other sources of energy."

Transportation

"Safe, efficient, inexpensive, non-polluting means of moving people between their homes and their jobs, shopping centers and recreational areas represents one of the greatest unmet challenges of life in the United States."

"The federal government should provide the same level of aid to local government for the construction of transit projects that it presently provides for highway construction."

"Such a program would involve massive new employment possibilities for America's concrete and gravel industry, aerospace industry, auto industry, steel industry, and many others."

"Private industry and government can work together for the creation of jobs resulting in a significant improvement in the quality of life for the citizens of American cities."

Air Pollution

"The Congress should set a high priority on the funding of research and development of new auto engines to replace the gasoline-burning, internal combustion engine."

"New car sales are dropping and that will mean more job losses not just in the auto industry but also in steel and other related fields."

"We can create new jobs with a national commitment to redesign the automobile. In turn we would bring greater employment and job security to auto-related fields and solve a major part of our smag problem."

Aerospace

"The same aerospace technology that allowed us to go to the moon must be capable of producing a new type of aircraft designed specifically to fight forest and mountain fires. Bills to accomplish this have been offered in the past but Congress has not yet given the matter the urgent treatment needed to complete the program."

"Some aerospace firms have already begun to become involved in ground transportation systems. I wholly support and advocate a greater application of the technology and facilities of our aerospace industry to help deal with some of our nation's problems."
