"Strike City"

In the midst of the talks about the infamous middies' "strike," many points of controversy were raised. In this article two of these questions were investigaged. They are:

1) Why we don't have milk available for every meal;

2) Why we can't have liberty after the last class of the day.

On the milk issue, I talked to Mr. Henderson, the Head of the Galley. The point he made was that we have an allowance of twenty-four and a half gallons of milk per quarter per person. This works out to about a third of a gallon per person per day, and since most of us don't eat here on weekends and holidays, it works out closer to a half gallon per day. On the suggestion that we could get this allowance increased, Mr. Henderson pointed out that we have the highest milk consumption per person of any state organization, with an example of the Youth Authority (Firefighters) who have a consumption of eighteen

As far as liberty after the last class of the day, I received the same answer we receive almost every time that we question the rules and regs here at the Keema Kiddie Academy. The answer was threefold from our acting-Commandant, Mr. Yinger:

gallons per quarter per person.

1) The privilege would be abused by the midshipmen, and guys would be wearing civilian clothes here around base, making life more unpleasant on the middies who are still in classes.

2) Our "Resident Mothers" in the White House seem very concerned that our academics would bottom out, due to the fact that we would spend all of our time in town instead of studying.

3) The third reason deals with the fact that we are perpetrated by radical, hippy-types, and that a number of guys would "tear out the gate."

In further justification of his decision, Mr. Yinger mentioned that it is indeed "easy as pie to get out the gate." Specials these days are very easy to get signed as long as there are no classes involved. Mr. Yinger said he is looking into easier ways off base, such as a sign-out book for the upper classmen, and that he is open to any plan that will work, and is consistent with the rules, especially academic; not to mention a way of keeping that system honest.

One suggestion which I did submit to him for consideration was that liberty start at 1400 for all of those who had no further classes for that day. Mr. Yinger at that time said that it sounded like a reasonable compromise which deserved to be looked into, yet upon talking to him later I found that no action had been taken whatsoever (the suggestion apparently hadn't been taken seriously), but he again said that he would indeed look into it.

In conclusion I would like to ask that the Corps of Midshipmen take a little bit of responsibility on themselves, and put pressure on those that bring in the half gallon and gallon containers into the Mess Deck to get our milk, so that we might again be able to enjoy milk at every meal once more (because we won't get anymore). Also, if everyone were to work in the same direction and push for a 1400 liberty, we just might be able to push it through.

As I'm sure all of you midshipmen know, on September 16th we were issued a bulletin which set down a set of rules for dining in the Mess Deck. Admittedly, rules pertaining to smoking, food throwing, and disrespectfulness were well in line, but the remaining rules deserve some consideration and revision.

It has been reasoned that "Due to extended meal hours" second servings wouldn't be available until the end of the meal hour. For example, today I was served a taco; the meat in which wouldn't amount to more than a meatball the size of a golf ball. The solution to both problems is obvious: don't serve seconds but instead portion the servings so the total output of single servings is equal to the total food availability.

Somewhat more of an issue rather than a reconsideration of objectives is the second rule restricting the number of glasses available to each midshipman per meal. The root to the problem, of course, is the large number of students using the Academy's Mess Deck facilities.

This writer feels that it is not the midshipmen's responsibility to meet with the Academy's capacity, but instead it is the responsibility of the Academy to meet its capacity for midshipmen.

Congratulations are in hand for those midshipmen who made our recent meetings with Admiral Rizza possible; but let's not stop here. There can't possibly be a better way to solve our communication gap than avoiding the Green Building filter, and getting to issues with those who, in fact, make policy that governs us all.



Scholarship Deadline Announced

Undergraduate college students who will require financial assistance to continue college in 1977-78 are invited to file for a California State Scholarship (Cal Grant A). Approximately 14,900 new State Scholarships will be awarded in April 1977 for use in 1977-78. Although a majority of the new scholarships will be awarded to high school seniors, it is anticipated that some 3,700 awards will be available for currently enrolled college students who are not already in the State Scholarship Program.

State Scholarships may be used at any four-year or two-year college which is eligible to participate in the Basic Educational Opportunity Grant Program or which is a candidate for accreditation with the Western Association of Schools and Colleges. The new awards will range from \$300 to \$500 at Cal Maritime.

Applications are available in the Financial Aid Office, Room 5, or directly from the Student Aid Commission, 1410 Fifth Sacramento, Ca. 95814. Applications must be mailed to the Student Aid Commission by midnight, December 4, 1976 and a 1977-78 Financial Aid Form must be mailed to the College Scholarship Service by midnight, December 4, 1976. All applications must complete the Scholastic Aptitude Test no later than December 4, 1976 to be considered. Scores from Scholastic Aptitude Test examinations completed in prior years will be accepted.

On October 23, twenty-one teams competed to inaugurate a new era of whaleboat rowing competition on the Vallejo waterfront. Until 1873, the whaleboat races were



held annually among the many steamship companies around the Bay Area. Once again, the perpetual trophy will be passed-on each year to the winning team. This year, oarsman from the Matson Steamship Company finished in first place by about two boat lengths. The powerful team pulled through to victory with both choppy water and a strong head wind against them. The Tennessee Street Merchants beat the CMA Crew Team by a narrow margin to take second place. The Crew Team, suffering from either a drunken coxswain (who else can a rowing team blame?) or cardio vascular arrest, rowed at a pace that would have whipped fresh cream. Who knows, perhaps it was the trauma of the Admiral's presence that frustrated the team, Mare Island Shipyard Design finished in fourth place and sailors of the U.S.S. Seawolf finished in fifth place.

Discount at All Sheratons

Bargain-hunting, economy-minded college students and faculty members are eligible for a 25 percent discount at Sheraton hotels and motor inns around the world.
