Dear Boy -

I have no ink in my room -
I will try to write a few lines to you every
day as I know you are so lonely -
The children are well - Emma commenced
at seven o'clock this morning "wanting to go
see papa" - and kept it up until eight -
I think she wanted to see Charlie and
Eddie Anlett - I have just seen the three
fast asleep. The boarders tell me they are
the best children they ever saw - The weather
is very pleasant - Mother is about the same
very weak - I don't see how she is to be
got home - she wants to go home so much.
Mother gets along very well with her nurse
and I have little to do - I wish very
much I could see you - I feel kind
of anxious about you -

Oct. 26th

Mother fretted so to get home - and the weather being mild and lovely - Mr. Thomson went to Morristown last night - he had engaged a special Car to go up from Hoboken to Morristown for Mother - it stopped at the corner next to Mrs. Sindrup's house and a man carried Mother from her room down stairs and out through the streets and put her in a Steamer chair in the car - we had the entire Car to ourselves and it cost 25.00 - at Hoboken the engine backed us down until we came opposite the gate to the ferry where Patrick was waiting he drove up close to the car and they lifted her into the carriage - the little Brynham was also waiting into which David and the children were put - the small express wagon was also in attendance and took all the baggage. when we got to the house

a large man took mother in his arms
and carried her up to her room -
So here we all are - and don't you
think it was stylishly accomplished.
Not having to exert herself - mother
knew the trip very well and is now in
bed safe and comfortable - she requires
the closest care - but if she don't take
cold she may live a good while yet -
her worst symptoms are better - she
don't sit up much or walk - but she
don't suffer much now -

We are all up on the 4th floor and
are very comfortable - Father in my old
room - Emma and Sonisa in the blue
room and Mary, Susan and I in
John's old room - Father is well - so
are Sam, Julia & Jeanie - the baby is
better - but looks very frail.

I got your letter this afternoon and
the enclosed letters for which I thank

you - I am kept so active from soon
after six in the morning that I don't
have time to write as much as I
want to - but when things settle I'll
do better - The children are very well
and happy, all send you their love.
Avery is quite fat - he loves Jesus as he
calls his Son's a - We all wish we could
see you. Mother sends her love - After
darning and working all day - Julia
rushed up to my room to hang up
a picture of you - Excuse this awful
scribbling - but I dare not take time
to write decently. I'm going to run out
and put this in the letter box - hoping
it may go in tomorrow's mail -
I'm glad the house is rented and
agree with your reasoning - there is
little damage can be done - and we
are not paying anything out for it -
What money you send next month I

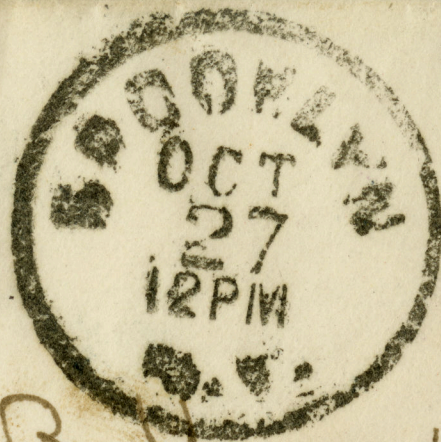
will make do. I am glad you have
