Do You Know The **Location Of Our Emergency Phones?**

Sadly, there was an injured villager, and his partner, in haste, ran right by a free emergency phone to a pay phone, losing valuable time.

Security and ILV invite all villagers, when you visit the Rec Center in the near future, to take a brief walk, noting the location of the four emergency phones.

Since we have a large pool, you are certain to find a phone nearby and there it is - it's bright yellow and is just to the right of the lifequard's office.

To operate it, simply open the latch, pick up the phone and you'll hear a buzzing sound. within a few seconds a voice will come on. Speak clearly and tell the person at the other end the location of the phone you are using. The location is clearly printed just above the phone cradle.

For the second phone, go south, past the pool, past where the garden plots used to be on your left, turn left as soon as you can, past the radio shack and other small rooms and there is the yellow phone in full view.

For the next phone, we retrace our steps back to the Rec Center, enter the double doors and turn right, going down the east hall to where the sewing room is on your right. Now look to your left and there's the phone on the wall.

For our final phone, retrace your steps back to the Rec Center, continue straight, past the travel office and Rec Center office on your right, through the

door. Once outside, take Register Now the right fork, past the MPR, lapidary and ceramic rooms and there, just this side of the wood shop, bright as can be, is the final emergency phone.

We trust it was a good little walk, and more importantly, lessons learned may someday save a life.

On the job safety practices will result in fewer accidents to our employees; hence they do not suffer the discomfort of injuries, and they do not face a reduction of earned income. 2. The fewer the accidents, the lower the cost to the Association of premiums for Workers' Compensation Insurance.

Death And Taxes (What Else Is New?) Dominate California Senior Legislature Session

Meeting in the chambers and hearing rooms of the State Capitol in Sacramento, the 120 members of the California Senior Legislature, representing older Californians, participate in the 14th annual session of the CSL recently.

The legislative process provided the opportunity to hear testimony, debate issues and vote approval or disapproval of the more than 120 proposals which members had submitted, all bearing on the lives (and deaths) of the millions of California seniors. Of the approved proposals, ten state and four federal were voted to receive special attention throughout the year.

Taxes and death received the greatest attention. Senior legislators seek state lawmakers to author CSL priority proposals, and then work throughout the year to ensure adoption of these bills. Since its inception, the CSL has had an excellent track record of accomplishments with as much as 75% of its priority

proposals enacted into law.

Because the current method of funding the CSL through contributions to a voluntary donation check-off item on the State income tax form has fallen far short of requirements, the number one priority has been to create a new funding mechanism. This proposal, if adopted into law, would eliminate the current \$64 senior tax credit on the tax return for those over 55 years who earn more than \$27,000 individual and \$37,000 joint adjusted gross income. Revenues thus generated would be directed for services for seniors including the CSL, and for educational programs for young people.

In tandem with the tax issue of priority number one, the CSL's second priority deals with death-- death with dignity, to be precise. This proposal has been patterned after the Oregon initiative and would allow mentally competent, terminally ill adults, suffering unrelieved, excruciating pain, to obtain a prescription from a consulting physician to end his or her own life in a humane and dignified manner. The California Senior Legislature turned down a similar proposal in 1993, but the tide of opinion has become more receptive for persons to be in control of decisions at life's end, and the number two priority proposal may become the "hot button" issue in the months ahead. The other top ten proposals include the following:

The repeal and modification of the consequences on equity interest liens on a home of institutionalized

The establishment of scholarships to increase rural and inner city health coverage:

The establishment of a pilot study project for the purpose of assisting seniors with money management, so that the frail, the elderly and confused will not be victims of financial abuse:

To expand the Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) to include grandparent and other relative caregivers as qualifiers for AFDC grant amounts;

To provide that the California Commission on Improving Life Through Service build into their state plan a program to train California Conservation Corps enrollees as Certified Nurse Assistants;

To require the State Department of Health Services to establish registries for certified home health aides, providing background checks and detailed information on previous experience in the field;

To clarify the right of the well spouse to protect his or her share of assets where one spouse is disabled

and in need of public assistance.

Many equally interesting and compassionate proposals, while not making the "top ten," reflect the dedication and hard work of the elected, volunteer members of the California Senior Legislature, who make the trip to Sacramento each Fall for the 5-day legislative session, and work throughout the year to help enact good legislation. In time of severe financial need, the CSL is deserving of public support so that it may continue its advocacy on behalf of California seniors. Las Posas Care Home I, at 462 Calle Higuera (Lic. No. 565800041) and Las Posas Care Home II, at 2143 Stacy Lane, (Lic. No. 565800039) both in the City of Camarillo, each a Residential Care Facility for the Elderly, are the only Jewish personal care homes in Ventura County (with the cooperation of the Jewish Elderhome of Ventura County, a California Nonprofit Corporation).

These quiet residences include observance of Jewish Holidays, Shabbat, Jewish cultural and community events, as well as "Jewish Home Style Kosher" meals.

The dust has not yet settled from our practice session (DPX) of December 7. Weeks of planning and discussions came to fruition in 45 minutes of intensive action on that day. We are analyzing the first batch of reports with mixed feelings. There is disappointment over things that went wrong and there is joy in the knowledge that so many busy, capable people took time to work with us at this very busy time of the year. We heard several good suggestions that resulted from this practice. These were further analyzed at our December 20 ESC meeting and may become integral to our operating procedures.

Our amateur radio operators received several congratulatory comments from ham radio organizations in Ventura County commending the crisp professional manner in which the data was collected and transmitted to Command Center.

We thank the CB radio operators who assisted the Village Coordinators in delivering their house count to the relay stations. They also assisted in dispatching the special teams to reported emergency sites. They faced a day of very poor CB reception performed adand equately.

Our Nutrition team reports that their time was well spent in learning to cope with camp-out conditions. Their short term goals are to organize the store room for efficiency and to prevent spillage, and to investigate feasibility of a temporary conversion of the picnic barbecue to propane during We're emergencies. happy that they solved the mathematics of making camp type coffee from unfamiliar instructions; it went well with the cookies.

Certain new techniques were tested in this session, including use of "icons" or

"tiles" which are 8 inch squares of masonite. Each contained a message to be found by the Coordinators and their Assistants that states that a special team is required to take action. In this session five were deployed. One required an ambulance, another a search and rescue operation, etc. Our eagle-eyed Coordinator Crews didn't miss a single one and each was retrieved with appropriate instructions for the special team involved.

The Emergency Services Committee is quite proud of the effort displayed by the Village Coordinators and their Assistant Coordinators. Several new persons were involved who began their service with a very limited time for instruction. And we are grateful for the help provided by other residents who filled in at the last moment for people who could not participate.

Another positive indica-

tion was in the form of comments from residents. The consensus leads us to believe that Villagers in general were grateful for this indication of interest in their welfare. Strong support was also detected for the "phone-tree" fast warning system and the explanatory letter signed by the President of the LV Board. Results of more formal reports from consultants and Team Leaders will be discussed in a subsequent article.

Our new Chief Coordinator, Bill Klee, and his Deputies Roy Hergenroeder and Arnold Rich are completing the task of staffing villages with Assistant coordinators. Each member will be provided with a clarified job description and detailed instructions for practice sessions and actual emergencies.

In summary, the practice served its purpose well. Much was learned and there was a resurgence of interest and enthusiasm which was heartening. Our new members were able to experience the interactions of the several teams.





At a forum held on the evening of December 5 in Camarillo Springs, there was a disturbing discussion of Malathion's toxic impact upon the health of the young, the unborn and the elderly, presented by highly qualified molecular biologist and medical doctor and university expert on poisons such as Malathion. Unfortunately, permission to hold a L.V. Current Issues Forum to present those speakers inside LV could not be obtained.


