The Point Mugu Naval Air Weapons Station will soon grant the public controlled access to the Point Mugu salt marsh, which the Navy has been steward of for the last fifty years.

This premier natural resource is the largest coastal estuary in Southern California.

When completed the site will become the westernmost anchor of the Santa Monica Mountains National Recreation Area. It will bring visitors worldwide to enjoy and study this rare environmental habitat, an "edge" region teeming with life.

You can help plan educational activities for a new Environmental Learning Center, a building that will "teach" by emphasizing renewable energy and conservation, including recycled building materials.

The design of the Center needs to be practical and sustainable, accommodating the public, preserving the salt marsh and lagoon, while leaving the Navy base secure.

Four design schemes developed over the year by UCLA graduate students in Sustainable Architectural Design will be presented.
