

Management should stay as is, panel recommends

"We should continue with self-management for the foreseeable future" was the principal recommendation of the Ad Hoc Committee on Outside Management at the eagerly awaited May 16 Town Hall Meeting, which was attended by more than 250 homeowners. The meeting, chaired by Ben Miller, Board Liaison to the Committee, was telecast live on Channel 8.

Ed Hawthorne, Committee Chair, stated that the Committee's mission was to consider possible advantages of outside management for Leisure Village as compared to our current self-management. He reported that the Committee listened to homeowners, interviewed our LV staff, and consulted outside property management companies.

The top management of two of these - PCM of Orange County (which manages our sister HOA at Ocean Hills) and AMS Realty of Ventura — were interviewed in depth here at LV, having previously been furnished our 2002-2003 budg-

Committee recommends change in insurance practices

Opinion by Jerry Hoffman

On Monday, June 3, in an almost full house, the Ad Hoc Insurance Committee reviewed its recommendations to the Board of Directors and interested homeowners.

The committee recommended that future inside resident damage costs be borne by the resident owner or their insurance company as appropriate.

They further recommended that because of runaway increases in these claims and costs, that they are done as soon as possible by amending the Rules and Regulations.

Since 1996 when resident claims were \$16,059, they have increased to \$88,469 in the year 2001. Almost half of this is due to water damage caused by aging of the copper plumbing, rated to have a 20- to 25-year life by the manufacturer. We're there folks, and it can only get worse as it gets older.

Other causes contributing to these costs have been residents driving into their own garage doors and residences where their auto insurance



Then the committee would have had something concrete to base its report on. Copies of the budget were sent to the various management companies, but who knows why? That wasn't even explained.

Why are Homeowners with mortgages receiving notices about

Leisure Village insurance coverage lapsing on June Many homeowners called me to say they were having a difficult time getting their individual homeowner policies renewed because of this notice. They said that although they had called the insurance broker, Tolman & Wiker, they didn't get a satisfactory answer.

My response was that it is very likely that premiums will escalate because of LVA's many claims, and we homeowners will end up paying bigger assessments because of those claims. This leads to another question: Is the insurance carrier even going to renew LVA's policies, and at what cost?

Homeowners assured by Chair Pratt that an Insurance Broker of Record was hired to provide expert advice about insurance matters and that he would also alleviate anticipated insurance problems. So, what happened?

Since our Broker of Record is an expert in the field, why do we have an Ad Committee Hoc Insurance? Shouldn't the Broker be answering our questions and advising us appropriately? And why is Director Sweeney chair of that Ad Hoc Insurance Committee? I'm sure that many of you still remember that she's the director who announced at an open board meeting several months ago that homeowners shouldn't worry about Leisure Village paying settlement claims because our insurance company pays them. I hope she's found out since then that the greater the claims are, the higher the premiums are. And we homeowners pay them in increased assessments

et, as well as a comprehensive list of some 70 questions which the Committee had prepared for this purpose. Four other companies declined our invitation when confronted with these questions.

Hawthorne stated that, "We have dispelled as myths the floating claims of immediate major savings from switching to outside management," saying that this became evident from talking to these companies - which were alleged to have been the source of such claims. He pointed out that although Committee members had started with varied opinions, they all ended up agreeing unanimously on all conclusions and recommendations.

The other Committee members presented further details. Lucy Fiore and Jack Prosen identified the constraints in any attempt to significantly reduce the LV yearly budget of \$7 million - whether under outside- or self-management. One set of constraints are the benefits which we do not wish to forego (like our security). constraints Other imposed by our "culture" of expected privileges and benefits. Hawthorne pointed out that Committee discussions with outside management companies revealed that any prior claims of achievable major savings invariably compromising assumed these benefits.

Max Heller pointed out certain additional concerns over switching to outside management: a yearly fee

"off the top" in the order of \$300,000; likelihood of diminished volunteering services which currently yield major cost savings to the Association; vulnerability to future fees and performance of the company first selected; the difficulty of contracting with another company, or of ever reverting to self-management.

Jerry Doctrow pointed out that discussions with property management companies did point out some possible savings in administration, financial operations, and landscaping —without necessarily switching to outside management. This led to the Committee's second recommendation — to employ a consultant to explore these possibilities.

In the question-andanswer period that followed, several homeowners asked that the investigation be continued to obtain more definitive data on possible savings, or perhaps to solicit specific bids. One suggested that such a study be performed in-house, rather than by an outside consultant. Another suggestion was to study other HOAs for more comparison data. Hawthorne pointed out that the next step is up to our Board — Committee members now "intend to resume their retirement.'

It was generally felt that the Committee did a commendable job.

A six-page summary of Committee findings was distributed to attendees. The full 30-page Committee Report may be read in (but not removed from) the Library.
