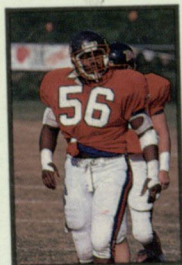

PRESS CREDENTIALS: Will be issued on a per game basis only. Requests should be made as far in advance as possible. "Visiting" media may make their requests through their respective "home" SIDs. When time permits, credentials will be mailed.

PHOTO CREDENTIALS: Will be issued on a per game basis only and must be worn in plain sight at all times. NCAA rules limit shooting to outside the restraining line enclosing the field and the team areas and these rules, as modified due to the inadequate space behind benches at Santa Ana Stadium, will be strictly enforced.

PARKING: Free, ample and close to western grandstand with press box. No credential or pass required.

PRESS BOX: Is limited to working members of the press, radio, television and others whose duties require use of the press area. No one will be admitted without proper credentials (spouses included). Light sandwiches and soft drinks will be provided. Play-by-play reports by quarters, halftime and final statistics, scoring summary and post-game quotes will be distributed throughout the press box, which is located on the west side of Santa Ana Stadium.

FAX/TELECOPIER: One Xerox 7010 will be available on a page-by-page, first-come, first-served basis.

BROADCAST SPACE: One booth is allocated to each team's designated commercial radio station. Each holds four persons comfortably across the working counter with standing space available to the rear. Additional needs for radio and all television requests will be handled on an individual basis (read: rooftop).

TELEPHONES: One pay telephone and one usually busy Fullerton SID business line (714) 953-6837 are available in the press box. Additional phones must be ordered through Pacific Bell by calling (818) 811-3204.

INTERVIEW ROOMS: Do not exist. Interviews must be conducted outside the locker room areas which are located behind the south end zone on the field level.

SCOUTS: Professional scouts will be sold tickets in the grandstands (top row south of press box) and provided handout materials upon request at the press box entrance. Scouts from opposing schools will be issued press box passes if space permits in accordance with NCAA rules, but only if requested at least four days in advance.

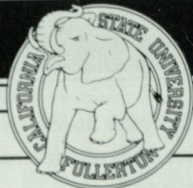

The University

California State University, Fullerton is a broadly based liberal arts institution that also offers many professional studies such as business administration, education, engineering and nursing.

Classes were offered for the first time in 1959 and the first commencement — for five students — took place in 1960.

The University's 24,000 students come primarily from southern California with many from other states and other nations. Most students commute each day to and from classes, although nearly 400 now live on campus in recently completed residence halls.

Drawn from throughout the world, the 775-member faculty is noted for its commitment to effective teaching and scholarly activity. Research is actively pursued, typically with students involved.

The University is fully accredited and enjoys national recognition for both its array of traditional academic programs and a growing list of independently accredited professional programs, including art, athletics training, business, chemistry, communications, computer science, dance, education, engineering, music, nursing, public administration, speech and hearing and theater. All told, there are 85 degree programs — 41 of them at the graduate level — plus a wide variety of credential and certificate programs.

Reinforcing classroom instruction is an internship and cooperative education program that allows students to gain on-the-job experience while continuing their regular studies.

Another amenity is the extended education program. It provides classes, workshops, conferences and study tours without the formalities of regular admission to the University.

Still another strong point is the University's cultural events program. It includes a series that brings nationally known professional artists to the campus for residencies as well as public performances.

An extensive recreation program aimed chiefly at students but also open to community members is another highlight, as is the network of community support groups, including the Titan Athletic Foundation.

Further examples of community outreach are the new Ruby Gerontology Center, which serves as an educational and research facility for the study of aging and a meeting place for the Continuing Learning Experience support group.

Through a series of joint ventures started in 1979 with the establishment of the Fullerton Arboretum and continuing now with the construction of the Marriott Hotel, the University and the City of Fullerton are working to complete an on-campus sports complex by mid-1991. Already in use are two lighted softball fields. When the main part of the sports complex is finished, it will include a stadium for football, soccer and other activities plus a pavilion for baseball.

To reinforce the University's commitment to high academic standards and community services, Cal State has embarked on a comprehensive fund-raising campaign. Its purpose is to raise the necessary non-state funding to make a very good university a great university.

Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb, President

Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb became the third president of Cal State Fullerton on Oct. 1, 1981.

Dr. Cobb had served as dean of Douglass College at Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey, since 1976. There she also held the rank of professor of biological sciences. Prior to her Douglass appointment she was dean of Connecticut College and professor of zoology for seven years. Previously, she was professor of biology at Sarah Lawrence College in New York.

Known for her work in cell physiology, her promotion of the advancement of women in scientific fields and her activities on behalf of minorities, she is the first black woman to head a major public university on the West Coast.

Cobb earned her bachelor's degree from Talladega College in Alabama and her M.S. and Ph.D. in cell physiology from New York University. She also holds 17 honorary doctorates. She is the mother of a son, Jonathan, a graduate of the Cornell University Medical School now serving on a post-residency fellowship at the New York University Medical Center.

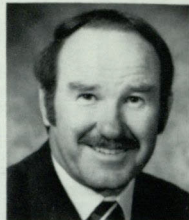

The Big West Conference enters its second year of existence since changing its name from the Pacific Coast Athletic Association prior to the 1988 football season. The name is seen as a simpler, more accurate description of the league's 12 member institutions -- Cal State Fullerton, Fresno State, Long Beach State, New Mexico State, San Diego State (women only), San Jose State, UC Irvine (no football), UC Santa Barbara (Div. III football), Hawaii (women only), UNLV, Pacific and Utah State.

When the league was formed in 1969, it consisted of seven charter members, all of which were located in the state of California. In its 20 years of existence, however, the conference has expanded to include universities from states which are not on nor near the Pacific Ocean (Utah, Nevada and New Mexico).

While the 1988 season would have to be labeled a rebuilding year, the prospects for 1989 are bright. A dozen first-team all-conference selections return from the underclassmen dominated squad of a year ago and many are likely to follow in the footsteps of previous Big West stars into the National Football League.

Quarterbacks, wide receivers and cornerbacks generally have been the major "export" of the Big West, although Utah State linemen such as Merlin Olsen and Rulon Jones have had major impacts. Last year the NFL welcomed the NCAA's leading rusher in UNLV's Ickey Woods, who became a national celebrity doing a sideline dance.

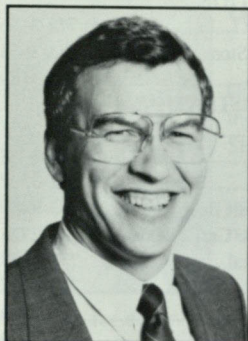
Five of the eight California Bowls decided by a touchdown or less with the Big West holding a 3-2 lead in the nailbiters and an overall 6-2 advantage.

Athletics Department



Ed Carroll, Director of Athletics

The rapid climb of Ed Carroll through the ranks of the Cal State Fullerton athletics department culminated in his appointment as Director of Athletics on July 1, 1985.

University President Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb made the announcement on May 28, 1985, after a nationwide search and Carroll, now 39, immediately ushered in an era of "positive thinking" for Titan athletics.

"One of my priorities has been to enhance the image of our athletics program by stressing positives," says Carroll. "We must use the power of positive thinking to overcome our limitations and build our program to greater heights."

One of Carroll's first moves was to upgrade the football schedule. The Titans have played LSU, Florida and West Virginia in recent seasons and have dates with Georgia and Auburn in the near future. With the new stadium complex now firmly on the horizon, Carroll has signed Mississippi State, Colorado State, UTEP and Army to a home-and-home series.

Carroll scored his first hiring coup when he was able to replace Augie Garrido with equally successful Larry Cochell as the baseball coach for 1988. Cochell took the Titans to the College World Series in his first season and was selected national Coach of the Year by "Collegiate Baseball Magazine."

Building plans are being finalized and construction has begun indirectly for an on-campus Sports Complex to provide a playing facility for football, soccer and baseball as well as an all-weather track. An on-campus Marriott Hotel will be in operation before the end of the calendar year and the revenue it generates will help finance the \$10.2 million athletics project.

Fund-raising levels have reached record numbers during Carroll's tenure. The Titan Athletic Foundation's 1989 spring drive raised more than \$450,000.

Carroll began his Fullerton athletic career as a wrestler. In 1972, he served as team captain and was selected the "Most Outstanding Wrestler" in the California Collegiate Athletic Association championship meet. He later served as an assistant to former head coach Don Matson.

Carroll earned bachelor's degrees in history (1972) and physical education (1974) from Fullerton as well as a secondary teaching credential. He taught physical education classes at Fullerton and earned a master's degree in recreation administration from Long Beach State.

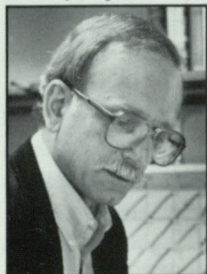
After serving in various capacities in the Fullerton recreation department, Carroll left briefly in mid-1980 to serve as a recreational sports programmer and doctoral intern at Indiana University. He returned to Fullerton in November, 1980, as an assistant athletics director and later served as acting director of the Titan Athletic Foundation. He then served under athletics director Lynn Eilefson, who left in January, 1985.

Ed and his wife Connie live in Fullerton with young children Brandon and Kimberly.

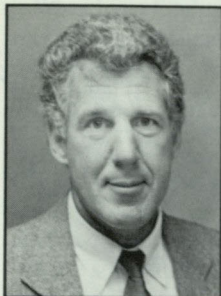

Nickname and Mascot

"What exactly is a Titan?"

"Why do you have an elephant for your mascot?"

Those are two of the first questions that pop into the minds of media and fans when a Cal State Fullerton athletic team makes its inaugural visit. While the relatively young institution carved out of the Orange County citrus groves may be too new for many traditions, here are the recognized legends.

"It was the students' decision in a vote," explains Dr. Ernest Becker, founding Dean of Students, of the nickname 'Titans.' "More than a hundred names were suggested, and the Student Council took on the job of narrowing the list down to a few for the purposes of an election. The vote was close, with Titans narrowly prevailing over Aardvarks and Rebels."

It was a unique student body at the outset, all upper division students until 1963. There were 453 of them, mostly female, in 1959, the first year of classes at what was then known as Orange County State College. They voted to organize as a student body and to assess themselves a fee of \$10 per semester.

"Even when it was decided that 'Titans' would be the nickname, there was confusion as to what it represented," said Becker. "I was thinking of a large mythological figure from Greek history, not unlike Tommy Trojan, but with perhaps straighter, more modern lines. In the same vein, the original dormitories were named Othrys Hall. There were others, however, who related the name to the Titan missile then in prominence."

Nothing official was done about a mascot because no one knew quite what to do. Until, of course, the "First Intercollegiate Elephant Race in Human History."

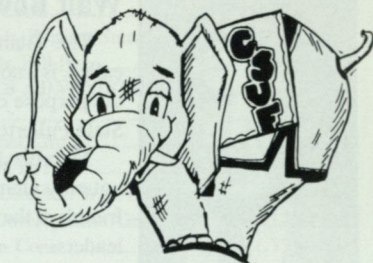
What began as a practical joke turned into probably the biggest "happening" on the campus to this day.

The "gag" attracted elephants from universities around the nation and even Oxford from England. A crowd estimated at more than 10,000 people turned out on "Dumbo Downs" as the hastily graded field became known that spring afternoon in 1962.

To publicize the event, a circus-like elephant called Tuffy the Titan was used and it began appearing on sweaters and notebook covers around the campus. With no other mascot, the elephant was unofficially adopted. Several revisions in the caricature have been made in recent years to create a more tenacious Tuffy, or Titus as he also was called in an attempt to make him Greek.

The mascot outlived the race. In 1963, one elephant charged the crowd causing minor injuries and an early sign of a now-common liability insurance crisis nipped a tradition in the bud.

The origin of the school colors also bears discussion. The students voted for royal blue and

white when they chose Titans, but the athletic equipment manager at the time thought orange was an appropriate color on uniforms for a school known as Orange County State College. The unofficial color was "adopted" and finally was formally acknowledged by the Athletics Council in 1987.

When Lynn Eilefson was appointed athletic director in 1982, he furthered the cause of orange because of its uniqueness and brightness compared to the wide variety of blues. Thus, the "Orange Crush" booster group was born and the color remains prominent in most team uniforms.

And, finally, there is the matter of the school's name. As mentioned earlier, the name originally was Orange County State College. It's also been Orange State College and later California State College at Fullerton or California State College, Fullerton. The change to university status necessitated a further change to California State University, Fullerton, but the school's address could not be changed from 800 N. State College Boulevard. And that's only the start of the confusion.

To out-of-staters, the picture clouds quickly because most don't realize there are two distinct systems of higher education in the state — the University of California and the State University system. So, the school has been called everything from Cal-Fullerton to UC Fullerton to California State Fullerton State to simply Fullerton State. The preferred moniker is Cal State Fullerton, with no hyphens, which is what most of the more than 80,000 graduates recognize. But since there are only two other major institutions known as Titans (University of Detroit and Oral Roberts University), just call Fullerton teams the "Titans!"

History of Titan Athletics

Obstacles and adversity. Grass roots support and coaches with "sandwich board" signs. Stunning upsets and courageous performances. All have been a part of Cal State Fullerton athletics as "Titan Pride" has taken limited resources to athletic successes disproportionate to such a young institution.

How many universities can claim national championships in seven different sports, a star major league third baseman, men and women basketball players in the Olympics, two rookies in the Super Bowl and the subject matter of a Walt Disney feature film?

The tenor was set by the first Titan intercollegiate team - men's basketball. In only their second season, the Titans of coach Alex Omalev advanced five rounds into the NAIA national playoffs in 1961-62.

Sixteen seasons later, the entire nation watched another "cinderella" Titan five advance to within one victory of the "Final Four" as Bobby Dye's 1977-78 team won the Pacific Coast Athletic Association post-season tournament and then beat nationally ranked New Mexico and USF to gain the finals of the Western Regional.

The basketball tradition, which included a women's national title in 1970 and coach Billie Moore and star Nancy Dunkle on the women's 1976 Olympic team, was continued in 1984 as Leon Wood helped the men to a gold medal before he became a first-round NBA draft choice. Coach George McQuam's teams were usually factors in the PCAA race and had national Top 20 rankings and a victory over the nation's No. 1-ranked and undefeated team to their credit. Fullerton also has competed twice in the post-season NIT Tournament while the women have recently been in both the WNIT and the NCAA fields.

Gymnastics has brought Fullerton more fame. Coach Dick Wolfe won three college division titles (1971, 1972 and 1974) and has had recent teams in the Top Ten at the Division

under the direction of new coach Larry Cochell and finished third in the CWS.

Women have sparked on the Fullerton diamonds, too. Coach Judi Garman founded the softball program in 1980 and the Titans have been a powerhouse, making seven trips to the College World Series in 10 years. The Titans brought home their first NCAA Championship in 1986 and have been ranked No. 1 in the nation often during the past three seasons.

There have been national titles in men's cross country and women's fencing and individual standouts like golfer Martha Wilkerson and runner Mark Covert. But football is the name of the game in intercollegiate sports and the Titans have won their share on the gridiron as well.

Dick Coury was the inaugural coach in 1970 and he built an instant winner at the Division II level. The Titans were 27-16-1 over the first four years under Coury and successor Pete Yoder before the growing pains of moving up to Div. I were endured. But the program came of age under the guidance of Gene Murphy and now football is another topflight program of which Fullerton students, alumni, faculty, staff and the community can be proud.

I level while winning 10 PCAA titles in a row. His 1987 squad was ranked No. 1 in the nation led by former Chinese Olympian Li Xiao Ping. Lynn Rogers began the women's program in 1976 and the Titans have finished sixth or better in the nation every year but two and won the national title in 1979. One-armed Carol Johnston was an All-American and star of the Disney film, "Lefty," while more recently Tami Elliott won 10 All-American awards before suffering a fractured vertebra in her senior season.

Baseball exploded on the national scene with the arrival of coach Augie Garrido. He broke the USC monopoly in the western regionals in 1975 and won the national title in 1979 behind the play of Tim Wallach, now of the Montreal Expos. He won the College World Series again in 1984 with players such as pitcher Greg Mathews of the St. Louis Cardinals. The Titans won their first six-team regional in 1988 at Mississippi State

Santa Ana Stadium

Cal State Fullerton football returns for a sixth consecutive season to Santa Ana Stadium -- commonly known in its glorious history as Santa Ana Bowl.

Officially named "Eddie West Field -- Santa Ana Stadium," the 12,000-seat facility served as the Titans' home during portions of the 1971 through 1975 seasons while Fullerton was alternating home dates with Anaheim Stadium. In 1984 the Titans returned on a "temporary permanent" basis and won all four home dates.

Located at 602 N. Flower St. between Sixth and Civic Center Drive in central Santa Ana, the Orange County seat, the "Bowl" is only nine miles south of the Cal State Fullerton campus and it boasts a tradition as one of the finest stadium sites in Orange County. It was dedicated on Apr. 27, 1932 and has played host to a wide variety of athletic and entertainment events while undergoing numerous facelifts and remodelings. It is the home field for Rancho Santiago JC and all Santa Ana high schools.

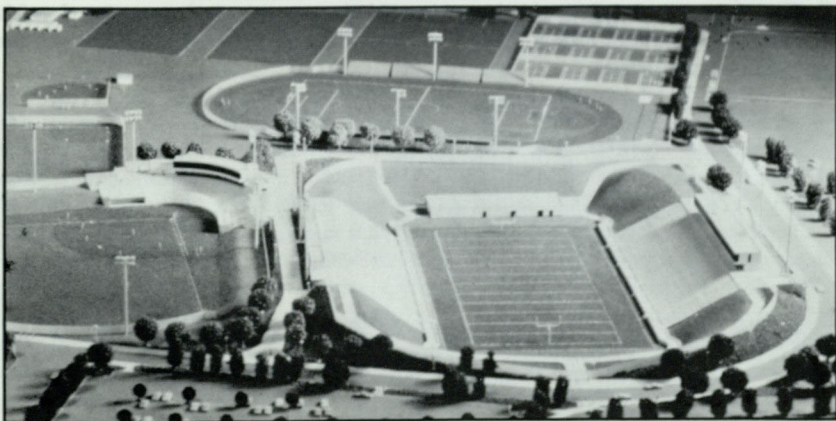
The current structure was built in 1963. It was re-dedicated in 1981 in memory of Eddie West, long-time sports editor of the Santa Ana Register.

The two-tiered, enclosed press box can handle two radio play-by-play crews in separate booths, numerous film crews on the roof and approximately 30 writers and statisticians on the lower level. The expected press box phone number is (714) 953-6837.

ON-CAMPUS SPORTS COMPLEX

The long-awaited dream of a permanent on-campus facility for Cal State Fullerton is approaching reality. In July, 1988, the Board of Trustees of the State University system approved the schematic plans for a \$10.2 million complex that will include a 10,000-seat football stadium designed for expansion to 30,000 seats. Also in the project, due for completion in Fall, 1991, are a 1,500-seat baseball pavilion, an all-weather running track surrounding a soccer practice field and renovated tennis courts.

Currently under construction on campus is a Marriott Hotel and convention center. Its projected revenue will reimburse the City of Fullerton for the University's portion of the construction cost of the sports complex, which will receive joint use from Titan athletics, city recreation programs and other community tenants.

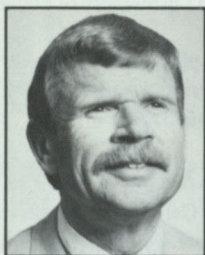
The Student Athlete Assistance Program (SAAP) was established in the spring of 1987 to benefit the health and well-being of student athletes in the intercollegiate athletics program at Cal State Fullerton. Designed from the outset to be a preventive rather than a punitive program, the SAAP has three major components.

First and foremost is EDUCATION. The obvious key to prevention, with upbeat, up-to-date, honest and informative presentations, it is of utmost importance. Conscientious attempts are constantly made to keep improving the efforts and progress has been charted.

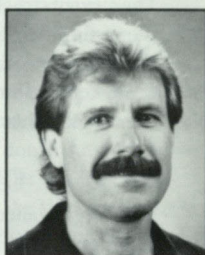
The second component is TESTING. Although somewhat controversial, a fair and

sensitive random selection urine-testing program has been designed and implemented. ALL athletes are subject to random selection and/or referral for cause. Periodic testing is done throughout the year with the analysis being performed by American Clinical Laboratory in San Diego.

The final component is TREATMENT. Any athlete testing positive or self-disclosing use of any banned substance is required to participate in an appropriate treatment

process. This usually includes counseling and additional educational modules. The program is committed to assisting athletes with problems or potential problems and ensuring that the teams placed on the field or floor are healthy and competitive.

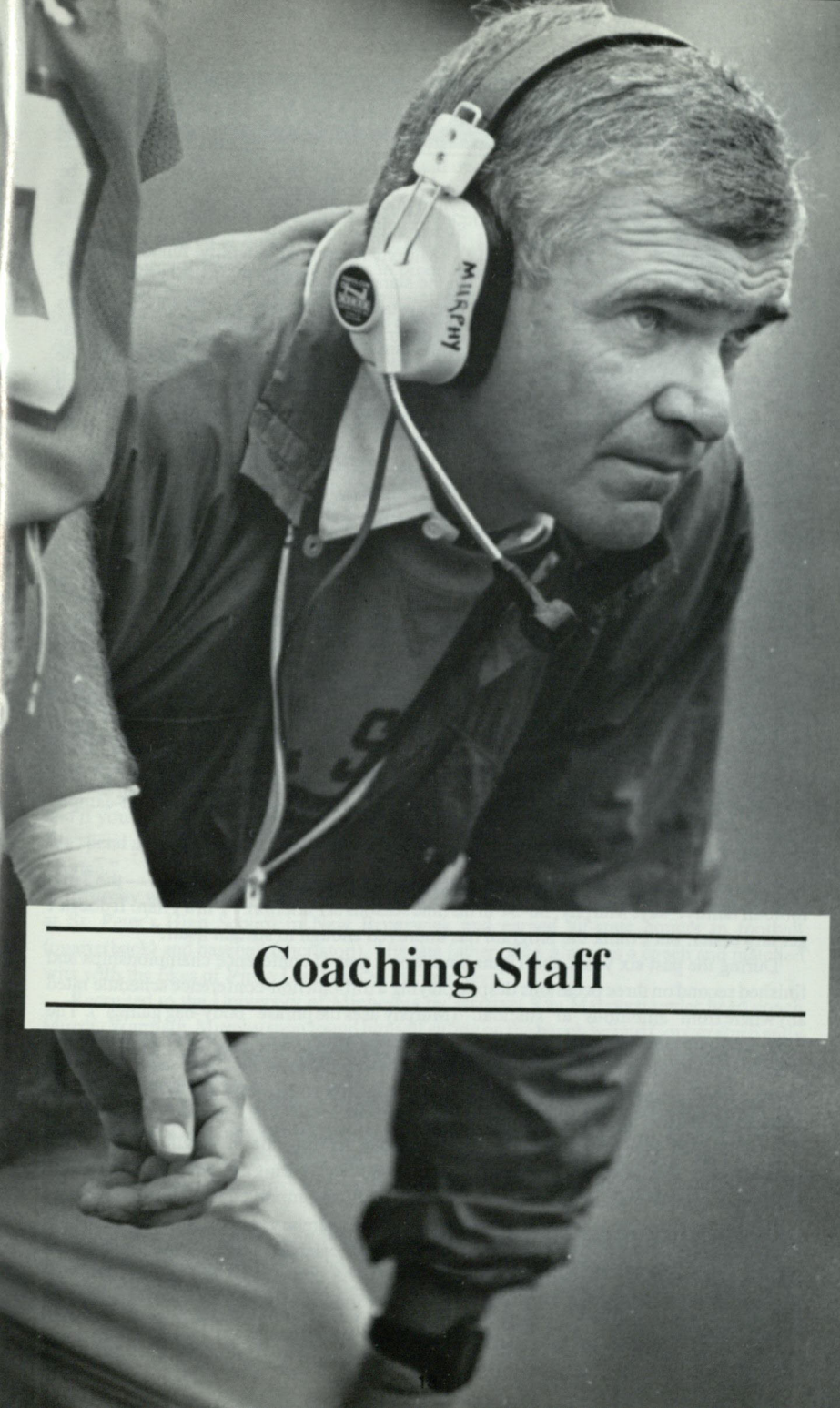
While the need to continually monitor and improve the SAAP is recognized, success has been achieved in just two years. The percentage of positives has continued to decline and in the recent spring semester there were no positives in seven testings involving more than one-third of the 350 student athletes.

The response by the athletes has been overwhelmingly positive and supportive. It is felt that this is due, in large measure, to the sensitive and confidential manner in which the program is administered.

"We learned a lot during the first year of drug education," said Dr. T. Roger Nudd, who coordinates the educational portion of the program. "Most athletes knew the legal hazards and the pharmacology of the most common drugs, but they were often misinformed about the effect of an athlete's drug use on his/her family and friends, on teammates and ultimately on society. As a result, the 1989-90 program will focus on those areas."

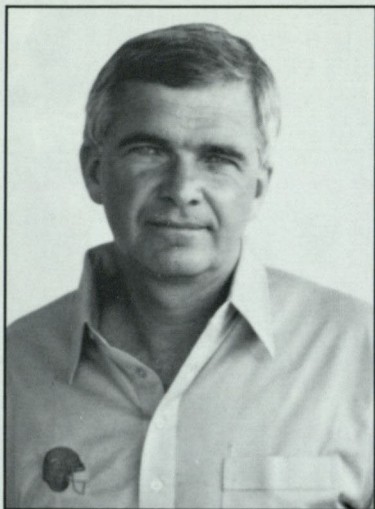
The program is administered with the complete cooperation and involvement of the Department of Intercollegiate Athletics. The SAAP coordinator is Paul K. Miller, who also is Director of Disabled Student Services. Dr. Nudd serves as the university Substance Abuse Education Officer and frequently is called upon to speak to off-campus groups on this subject.

Coaching Staff

Head Coach Gene Murphy



The 1980s and Coach Gene Murphy will be synonymous when historians look back on Cal State Fullerton football.

Murphy has brought identity, fun and success in the standings to Titan football while inadvertently establishing himself as one of the traditions of a program about to embark on only its 20th season. This will be its 10th under the direction of the New Jersey native who spent two decades in North Dakota before migrating to southern California.

Murphy's homespun sense of humor, his ability to turn negatives into positives and his genuine concern for assistant coaches and players have been the constant threads holding together a football program that has outperformed its resources. He has received coaching offers from more established institutions, but he has remained a Titan.

While Dick Coury (1970-71) brought Cal State Fullerton football into the world and Pete Yoder (1972-74) nursed it through adolescence until Jim Colletto (1975-79) guided it into Division I status, it has been the 49-year-old Murphy (50 on Aug. 6) who has nurtured it to maturity. He and his staff remodeled an old home for an office complex (Football House), constructed their own weight training facility (Titan Pete's Bulk House in honor of Fullerton contractor Ray Peterson), arranged a fall training camp through the cooperation of Frank Frobisher at Pacific Christian College and even erected their own temporary on-campus "stadium."

It has been an "us" against the world existence.

"I've said it many times, but it's true. The only people we have to gratify is us — the Titan football family," says Murphy, 50-54 in his nine seasons at Fullerton. "I'm a Titan. It doesn't get any easier, but I think the program has improved enough to sustain itself."

During the past six years, the Titans have won a pair of conference championships and finished second on three occasions despite playing a difficult non-conference schedule rated anywhere from "ambitious" to "suicidal." (Murphy uses the phrase "body-bag games"). The Titans have become ex-officio members of the Southeastern Conference with recent games at LSU and Florida and trips to Auburn and Mississippi State on the 1990 slate. Last year the vagabond Titans wandered into the path of the best West Virginia and Wyoming teams in the long football histories of those institutions.

Murphy has kept the Titans competitive despite fighting for the southern California football talent against most of the nation's top programs and sharing a municipal stadium with local high schools and junior colleges. The University has improved his lot by providing a full allotment of assistant coaching positions, a football secretary and a scholarship count approaching the NCAA Div. I-A maximum. A schedule unbalanced heavily toward road games has been the result of the stadium situation, which will come to an end in 1991 with the completion of an on-campus facility spearheaded by former Mayor Dick Ackerman and the City of Fullerton as well as the Marriott Hotel chain.

"The stadium is the final piece in the puzzle," says Murphy, who has walked the sidelines at four different "home" sites during his tenure. "We are very pleased with our arrangement at the Santa Ana Bowl, but playing on campus in our own facility will be the ultimate."

A 225-room on-campus Marriott Hotel will open before the end of the 1989 season and begin paying off the construction cost to the city of a \$10.4 million football/soccer and baseball complex that will be utilized by the community as well.

Murphy arrived at Fullerton in January, 1980, but it took until the 1983 season for his freshmen-oriented recruiting program to produce a winning record.

"We had to go back to square one — erecting the stadium, fund-raising, recruiting, building facilities, everything — to build a broad base," said Murphy, Pacific Coast Athletic Association coach of the Year in 1983 and United Press International's West Coast Coach of the Year in 1984. "And from Day One we had to build the self-image of the Titan program. What we have developed is 'Titan Family.' You win with people. We put up with a lot of adversity, but we do it together and I think it has made us stronger. It's something you have to experience to properly appreciate."

Murphy is second in the Big West Conference in seniority to Fresno State's Jim Sweeney. He left a nationally prominent Div. II program at North Dakota to "throw the football." His early Titan teams featured wide-open aerial assaults and more than a bagful of trick and gadget plays, collectively known as the "squirrel derby" offense. But he has adjusted almost annually to the available personnel.

The 1983 PCAA championship team and California Bowl entrant was built around a stubborn, ball-hawking defense while the 1984 squad put it all together on its way to a UPI No. 20 national ranking: a strong running game to balance an efficient yet deep-striking passing game and an aggressive defense that was second in the country in creating turnovers. In 1985 and 1988, defense carried the load until young offensive units put things together. In 1986 and 1987, the offenses played ball control to help a thin defensive units stay healthy.

The one constant has been the importance Murphy has placed on special teams play.

"We feel the game is divided into three phases — offense, defense and special teams — and if you can win two of the three, you have a pretty good chance to win the football game. We spend a lot of time and front-line personnel on special teams and don't just give them lip service."

Murphy was born on Aug. 6, 1939 in Jersey City, New Jersey. He was an all-sports star at St. Peter's High School in New Brunswick and earned all-state honors in football (quarterback) and baseball (shortstop). His late father, Bud, also was a coach and matched wits with the likes of Vince Lombardi at the prep level.

Recruited to the University of Minnesota by assistant Ray Malavasi under head coach Murray Warmath, Murphy soon found himself sitting on the bench behind Gopher star Sandy Stephens. He transferred to North Dakota and as a senior was the All-North Central Conference quarterback.

After obtaining his bachelor's degree (double major of physical education and social studies) in 1962, Murphy served one year as graduate assistant and then coached football, baseball and swimming at North St. Paul High School before returning to UND. He remained there 14 more years — the first 12 as an assistant and then the 1978 and 1979 seasons as head coach.

While he was offensive coordinator, the Sioux won six conference championships and participated in three (1966, 1972 and 1975) post-season bowl games. As head coach he won the conference title in 1979 and was named Coach of the Year as the Sioux went 10-2 and were ranked as high as No. 3 in the Div. II national rankings. His 1978 team was 5-5, giving him a two-year mark of 15-7 at UND and a current career mark of 65-61.

Murphy spent five summers (1967-71) as a "guest" coach with the Saskatchewan Rough Riders of the Canadian Football League. During his Fullerton tenure he also has turned down opportunities to return to Canada.

A holder of two master's degrees (physical education in 1963 and secondary administration in 1977), Murphy served as interim athletic director at Fullerton for much of 1981. Murphy has two sons. Tim, 23, is in his senior year at Cal State Fullerton and works for the sports information office, most recently handling the baseball program. Michael, 19, is a Fullerton sophomore.

A Glossary of "Murphisms"

As a native of New Jersey, nurtured in the upper Midwest, employed in Canada and now working and living in southern California, Gene Murphy has developed a language all his own. In the interest of better communication, here is a glossary of often-used words and phrases:

"Hail damage in the attic" - questionable mentality or lack of common sense

"Jordanians" - his kickers, either punters or placekickers or both

"Keeper" - a player who will contribute to a winning program

"Little Sisters of the Poor" - school with a lightly regarded football program... an opponent that will enhance your W/L record

"Munchken" - small, tiny person... usually a defensive back

"Norp" - someone from North Dakota

"Sandy Koufax" - a "no-hitter"... a player afraid of contact

"Smash Mouth" - an offensive style of football common to the upper Midwest that makes Woody Hayes look like LaVell Edwards... up the gut... in your face... trench warfare

"Snuse" - smokeless tobacco

"Son of a Buck" - see "stallion," but more ornery

"Sorp" - someone from South Dakota

"Spudbutt" - physical description of a football player, typically big but slow and indigenous to the upper Midwest... currently being artificially harvested in the Titan weight room

"Squirrel derby" - Murphy's offensive philosophy that carries over into special teams play... men in motion, passes from and to all backs... end arounds, flea flickers, fake punts and gadget plays still to be devised

"Stallion" - a notch above a "keeper"

"That's Us" - all encompassing exclamation when something goes wrong away from the gridiron like a late bus... being bumped from an airliner... locked stadium gates... photo day bleachers stolen... kicked out of Anaheim Stadium the morning of a game, etc...

"Yewper" - someone from Northern Michigan

ON THE ROAD AGAIN

Willie Nelson's hit recording "On the Road Again" in the early 1980s has become the Titan football theme song while awaiting the construction of an on-campus stadium. Coach Gene Murphy has taken his team to most of the airports in the western United States and many in the east as well as his teams have played in 15 states outside of California and set foot in airports in another five (Texas, Georgia, Pennsylvania, Washington, Missouri) getting to some of them.

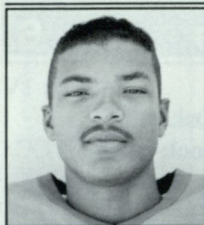
In his nine seasons, Murphy is 22-12 at a combination of four home sites, 26-43 on the road and 0-1 on a neutral site (California Bowl in 1983). The 34 home games represent less than one third of his 104 total games, which included one streak of 10 consecutive road contests (last six of 1980 and first four of 1981).

But it will get better. And it has been worse.

The construction of a Marriott Hotel on University property is the first concrete (pun intended) step towards a long-awaited on-campus stadium that will permit the scheduling of more home games beginning in 1991. Mississippi State, Colorado State, San Diego State and UTEP are some of the future visitors as well as Army in the next century.

The ratio of road-to-home games was much worse in Fullerton's first five years of Division I-A play, when the Titans played only 17 home games including just two each in 1978 and 1979. The home record as 8-9 in that period while the road mark was 9-29.

The Division I-A totals: 51 home games and 108 away from home in 14 seasons.

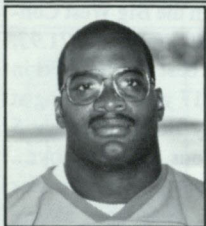
FOOTBALL HOUSE

SIROIS WINS SCHOLAR-ATHLETE AWARD

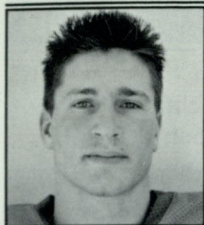

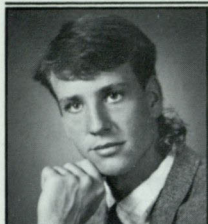

TITAN PETE'S BULK HOUSE

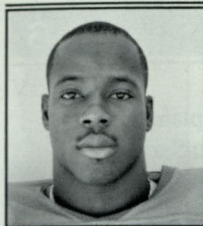
A monument to the success of Gene Murphy's coaching and entrepreneurial skills rests a few yards to the north of the Football House -- "Titan Pete's Bulk House."

Named after former Booster Club president Ray Peterson, the "bulk house" is Fullerton's six-year-old weight-training facility. Built by donated labor and materials and specially designated monetary gifts, the "bulk house" is the symbol of the "growing" Fullerton football program.

Unable to consistently recruit the polished, large linemen necessary to compete on the Division I-A level, Fullerton builds its own -- by recruiting lanky high school seniors with large frames and the desire and dedication to spend countless hours in the "bulk house" to build themselves into Big West Conference championship caliber physical specimens.

Three prime examples of this process are former offensive tackles Daren Gilbert and Hank Goebel and tight end Jim Thornton. Gilbert and Goebel were high school basketball players in the 225-pound range. They ended their Titan careers in the 275-pound range and as NFL draft picks -- Gilbert on the second round to New Orleans in 1985 and Goebel to the Los Angeles Rams on the eighth round in 1986.

Thornton came to Fullerton in 1983 as a 200-pound quarterback. Two years later he was converted to tight end and by 1988 he was a 250-pounder playing in the Hula Bowl and later was a fourth-round draft pick by the Chicago Bears. In Chicago, he has won a starting role and the admiration of coach Mike Ditka, a hard-nosed tight end in his playing days. Thornton's massive upper arms -- or "guns" -- have captured the attention of John Madden every time the popular color commentator does a Bears' game. And they had their birth in Titan Pete's Bulk House.

1988 in Review



For the third time in four seasons, the Cal State Fullerton football team played the bridesmaid role in 1988. The Titans compiled a 5-2 record in what became known as the Big West Conference last season and posted an overall 5-6 record, missing a winning season by the margin of not one but two last-season losses to field goals.

Coach Gene Murphy's team also had the misfortune of running into two "major" football institutions enjoying their best seasons ever. West Virginia went undefeated in the regular season and carried a No. 1 national ranking until the Mountaineers lost to Notre Dame in the Fiesta Bowl. Wyoming was a juggernaut in the Western Athletic Conference, making a folk hero of coach Paul Roach before losing to Oklahoma State and Barry Sanders in the Holiday Bowl.

A veteran and talented defensive unit carried the team until an offense dotted with newcomers could develop consistency. A turnover-marred home loss to Fresno State took the Titans out of the California Bowl picture at mid-season but they finished strong to capture second place with a pair of explosive victories over San Jose State and Utah State.

Three National Football League draft picks could be found on the defensive unit -- two most obviously in the statistical category and another with the measuring stick. Down lineman A.J. Jenkins repeated as a first-team all-conference pick and finished second on the team with 77 tackles including 19 for losses -- nine of those quarterback sacks. Linebacker Jerry Leggett made the most of his lone season as a Titan as the Mississippi State transfer led the team with 109 tackles and made two clutch pass interceptions. Lineman Alex Stewart was hampered by injuries and made only 38 tackles in 8 games but 9 of them were QB sacks. The

physically imposing Stewart dazzled pro scouts at the post-season combines and starred in both the Senior Bowl and Blue-Gray All-Star Games.

The secondary got excellent play from safeties Kevin Henderson and Mike Schaffel and cornerbacks James Howard, Sean Fernandes and Tony Williams, who narrowly missed an NCAA record against San Jose State when he ran back a pair of pass interceptions 92 and 86 yards for touchdowns. Senior linebacker Bill Bryan injured an ankle and missed a couple of games, costing him a shot at Terry Hubbard's school record for career tackles.

Offensively, Dan Speltz played virtually every down at quarterback, giving way only in the second half of the loss at West Virginia and the lopsided win over San Jose State. Mike Pringle overcame an injury and a mid-season eligibility snafu to emerge as the top running threat, leading the team with 496 rushing yards and ranking among the nation's leaders in kickoff returns.

Newcomer Rocky Palamara etched his name into the Titan receiving record book. He caught 53 passes for 875 yards and a team-high 8 TDs despite the absence of a consistent threat on the other side after a knee injury to senior John Gibbs. Former quarterback Tony Dill and former defensive back J.J. Celestine made a difference down the stretch as each grabbed a pair of TD passes.

The offensive line was anchored by senior tackle Matt Fitts, the former pro baseball player, and junior center Marc Hauser. By the end of the year, the Titans had gone through four tight ends and finally just lined up without one.

Special teams had their moments. Punter Jim Sirois established career records before his season ended two games early when he suffered a separated shoulder covering an errant snap. Placekicker Stan Lambert hit 16 of 26 field-goal tries to set a single-season record but most PATs were an adventure. Gibbs displayed a flare as a punt returner, averaging 17 yards on 8 tries, before dislocating his knee on a return at Wyoming.

Tropical storm warnings surrounded the Titans' opener and disaster soon reared its ugly head in the most basic of locations — the center and quarterback exchange. Six times the ball came loose and the host Ragin' Cajuns recovered four of the fumbles to go with a pair of interceptions and they coasted to a 24-9 victory.

Fullerton found itself down by 10 points before it logged its initial first down. USL drove 55 yards for a TD the first time it got the ball and added a field goal after the first of QB Dan Speltz' four fumbles one play after the touchdown. Before the quarter had ended, Fullerton had fumbled again and amassed a total of nine yards of total offense compared to 119 for USL.

A 47-yard TD drive put USL up by 17 before Kevin Henderson's pass interception set up a 42-yard field goal by Stan Lambert for a 17-3 halftime deficit.

The game got interesting when Fullerton drove 40 yards to a 1-yard scoring plunge by Michael Moore. The PAT attempt was blocked, but the Titans forced a USL punt after three plays and were poised to narrow the 17-9 deficit. But Speltz fumbled on the first play from the Titans' 20-yard line and the Cajuns cashed it into a touchdown. There would be no more scoring as the wind and rain forced conservative play calling over the final 20 minutes of the game.

Fullerton had the misfortune of scheduling West Virginia in the early stages of what would be its best season ever, capped by a run at an undefeated season and a Fiesta Bowl showdown with Notre Dame for the national championship.

The Titans came away duly impressed after a 45-10 decision that would prove closer than most of the Mountaineers' games in 1988. The veteran WV offensive line gave quarterback Major Harris plenty of time to operate and he and flanker Calvin Phillips hooked up on five pass plays for 190 yards and one touchdown as the Mountaineers out-gained the Titans, 514 to 175 yards. Fullerton was led by tailback Mike Pringle, who ran for 100 yards and set a Mountaineer Field record for opponents by returning kick-offs for 202 yards in six tries.

Fullerton kept the hosts out of the end zone for one quarter as 54,196 fanatics settled for a 28-yard field goal by Charlie Baumann. Then came the explosion. West Virginia scored on its next two possessions and then had to drive only 21 yards for a third TD after the interception of a deflected pass.

An 80-yard drive and then a 37-yard bomb from Harris to Phillips gave WV a 38-0 lead going into the final quarter. Seven successive runs by Pringle from midfield set up a 29-yard Stan Lambert field goal and the Titans got a late touchdown as Carlos Siragusa engineered a 67-yard, 8-play drive culminated with a 12-yard TD pass to John Gibbs.

Just as they did twice the previous season, the Titans bounced back from a lopsided loss to a nationally ranked opponent to record an important conference victory. They spotted UNLV a touchdown and then overcame numerous mistakes for a 20-10 win, their first in Las Vegas since a non-conference match-up in 1972.

UNLV took the opening kick-off and went on a time-consuming, 13-play scoring drive of 80 yards, all on the ground, for a 7-0 lead. Fullerton went 79 yards the other way but had to settle for a 19-yard Stan Lambert field goal. But the Rebels fumbled on their first play from scrimmage at their own 18-yard line and the Titans capitalized with a 3-yard TD run from Michael Moore. A bad snap forced a futile 2-point conversion pass and left the lead at 9-7.

Fullerton kept the Rebels in the game by missing a couple of short (27 and 29) field goals around a fumble by Moore that set up a go-ahead 30-yard field goal by UNLV.

On their third possession of the second half, the Titans took the lead for good as two runs by William Robinson and five by Mike Pringle, replacing the injured Moore, comprised a 51-yard touchdown drive. Dan Speltz threw to John Gibbs for a 2-point conversion.

Two plays later, Jerry Leggett, who would be in on 15 tackles and win Big West Defensive Player of the Week honors, intercepted a pass and the Titans marched down to the UNLV 6-yard line to set up a Lambert field goal and the game's final score.

The familiar confines of Santa Ana Stadium failed to bring out the best in the Titans, who staggered to a hard-fought 13-10 victory over visiting Pacific.

The Tigers got two big plays from flanker Troy Cole and almost parlayed them into a win. Cole put Pacific ahead in the second quarter when he took a short pass from quarterback Ron Beverly and eluded James Howard on his way to a 77-yard touchdown play.

The Titans responded immediately when Earl Williams, who would be the day's top rusher in the absence of injured tailbacks Michael Moore and Mike Pringle, returned the kick-off 48 yards to set up a 38-yard scoring drive. Dan Speltz threw passes of 14 and 9 yards on the march to a 7-yard scoring toss to Rocky Palamara.

Once again the Titans ran into a scheduling flaw, walking into Laramie to face the best Wyoming team in decades. The Cowboys were coming off a remarkable comeback victory at Air Force on their way to a second consecutive Western Athletic Conference championship and a Holiday Bowl contest against Oklahoma State.

It took awhile for quarterback Randy Welniak to fire up the Cowboys' explosive offense and Wyoming needed all its big-play weapons to subdue a Titan team displaying its best offensive effort to date.

Fullerton took the opening kickoff 56 yards to set up a 41-yard Stan Lambert field goal and the Cowboys had to punt on their first four possessions. But the Titans, who saw Lambert miss a 28-yard attempt at a 3-pointer, could not extend the lead and they fell behind when Welniak engineered a 13-play, 83-yard touchdown drive. After a Fullerton punt, the Cowboys scored in two plays.

Fullerton closed to 14-9 when Dan Speltz and Rocky Palamara hooked up on a 52-yard scoring play on its first possession of the second half. Welniak responded with scrambles of 37 and 18 yards on a 73-yard scoring drive but the Titans came back again, with Speltz hitting John Gibbs for a 15-yard TD pass to cap an 80-yard drive.

Wyoming countered with a 70-yard pass and run play from Welniak to Dabby Dawson for a 28-16 lead and the Titans never could retaliate.

Fullerton's California Bowl and Big West Conference championship hopes disappeared on a sparkling afternoon in Santa Ana as the visiting Fresno State Bulldogs played a near-perfect game for a 23-10 victory in their first Santa Ana visit since 1984.

The game's pivotal play occurred in the third quarter when tailback Kelly Skipper bounced off a couple of would-be tacklers and went 70 yards for a touchdown on the longest run of his career. The play gave the Bulldogs a 17-10 lead and the Fresno defense kept Fullerton bottled up in its end of the field the remainder of the game while Steve Loop added a pair of insurance field goals.

Fullerton had taken a 3-0 lead on its first possession of the game with a 22-yard pass play from Dan Speltz to Rocky Palamara and a subsequent 15-yard personal foul penalty being the catalysts. Fullerton got a break when Loop missed a 22-yard field goal try in the first quarter but he atoned with a successful 31-yarder that led to a 3-3 halftime tie.

Fresno gained the advantage when William Robinson fumbled the ball away at the Titans' 12-yard line. Mark Barsotti passed 10 yards to Craig Jones for the go-ahead touchdown. Fullerton responded impressively as Speltz directed an 8-play, 76-yard TD drive. He hit Palamara with a 30-yard scoring pass on third and 17 and the game was tied again. The Bulldogs were backed up to their own 7-yard line and had a second and 16 when Barsotti passed them out of the hole before handing the ball to Skipper.

Fullerton got its first touchdown early in the third quarter but the 2-point conversion try was foiled and that would prove decisive.

Another Lambert field goal moved the Titans within striking range and they finally capitalized after Mike Schaffel recovered a fumbled punt at the 49ers' 40-yard line. Dan Speltz threw a scoring pass to Rocky Palamara on fourth and six from the 18-yard line and Lambert's PAT gave Fullerton a 22-21 lead with 2:38 to play.

Mark Seay's 40-yard kick-off return enabled Graham to be patient in running the 2-minute offense and he guided the 49ers to the Fullerton 15-yard line from where Dave Van Steenkiste kicked a 32-yard field goal for the last-second victory.

Fullerton found its way back into the win column when it ventured to Las Cruces to meet New Mexico State, which made a strong effort to repeat its only conference victory ever over the Titans two years earlier.

The Titans scored on their third possession and never trailed, yet they couldn't put the game away until a fourth-quarter outburst. It took an Aggies' field-goal drive to awaken Fullerton, which survived a couple of aborted field goal tries.

Michael Moore, whose fumble stopped the first Fullerton march, scored the early touchdown to cap a 66-yard drive. He accounted for all but 28 yards of the march with seven runs. The Titans wasted several opportunities and Stan Lambert missed field goal tries of 45 and 21 yards in the first half.

The first fumble of Tim Byrnes' career came at the NMS 26 and from there the Aggies moved to the Titans' 3-yard line before settling for a 22-yard field goal by Dat Ly. From then on it was all Titans, although they had to survive another Lambert miss from 25 yards out. Using comparative scores, Fullerton didn't figure to be in this game against the host Zips, who had routed the 49ers a week earlier. Coach Gerry Faust's Akron team started quickly, marching to a field goal on its second possession. The Zips took an unusual 5-0 lead moments later when they blocked a punt that was recovered by Jim Sirois in the end zone. He saved five points but saw his collegiate career ended by a shoulder separation.

The teams sparred for the remainder of the first half, but Fullerton, which would use Carlos Siragusa and Stan Lambert as punters, took the lead when it took the second-half kickoff 75 yards for a touchdown and tacked on a successful two-point conversion. The teams exchanged fumbles before the Zips regained the lead with a Mike Johnson-led 80-yard scoring drive late in the third quarter.

Dan Speltz got hot and drove the Titans to a 25-yard Lambert field goal after a 70-yard drive and a 59-yard march led to a 39-yard field goal and a 14-12 lead with 3:31 to play.

After a week off for a bye, the rested Titans responded in record-shattering fashion with a 58-13 Homecoming victory over San Jose State on a sunny afternoon at Santa Ana Bowl.

The tone was set early when the Titans scored on their first play from scrimmage on an 87-yard touchdown pass from Dan Speltz to converted defensive back J. J. Celestine. It was 17-0 by the end of the first quarter as Fullerton outgained the Spartans, 183-55 yards. By halftime it was 31-7 with Speltz throwing for 302 of the team's 407 yards to nail down Big West Offensive Player of the Week honors.

Speltz played only two short series in the second half, converting a fumbled punt into an 18-yard touchdown pass to Tony Dill. It was up to cornerback Tony Williams to conclude the scoring as he approached an NCAA record by returning two pass interceptions in the fourth quarter 92 and 86 yards for touchdowns. Only a missed conversion kick by Kevin Ferguson after the next-to-last touchdown prevented Fullerton from setting a school scoring record. The 58 points is a record for a Division I opponent.

An entertaining contest boiled down to two successful goal-line stands by the Titan defense. Fullerton had taken the early lead with a 66-yard scoring drive after the opening kickoff. The Aggies countered with a 27-yard field goal when they couldn't score from the Titan 7-yard line. The Aggies were on the verge of taking the lead early in the second quarter, but on second and one from the Fullerton 1-yard line, quarterback Brent Snyder was intercepted in the end zone by Jerry Leggett.

Fullerton responded with an 80-yard TD drive capped by a 33-yard pass play to Rocky Palamara for a 14-3 lead. Back came the Aggies, marching 95 yards for a touchdown that made it 14-10 and then advancing 61 yards in 14 plays to a field goal that made it 14-13 at the half.

A 59-yard bomb from Speltz to Palamara produced a one-play Titan scoring drive but the PAT was blocked and Utah State was poised to tie or go ahead with a first and goal at the Fullerton 1-yard line early in the fourth quarter. Three runs gained nothing and Snyder's fourth-down pass was tipped away by James Young.

Fullerton marched back down field and Lambert missed a 42-yard field goal try, so the Aggies had one more chance. But Sean Fernandes intercepted Snyder and the Titans chewed up five minutes of the clock before Lambert kicked another field goal with 21 seconds to play to clinch it.

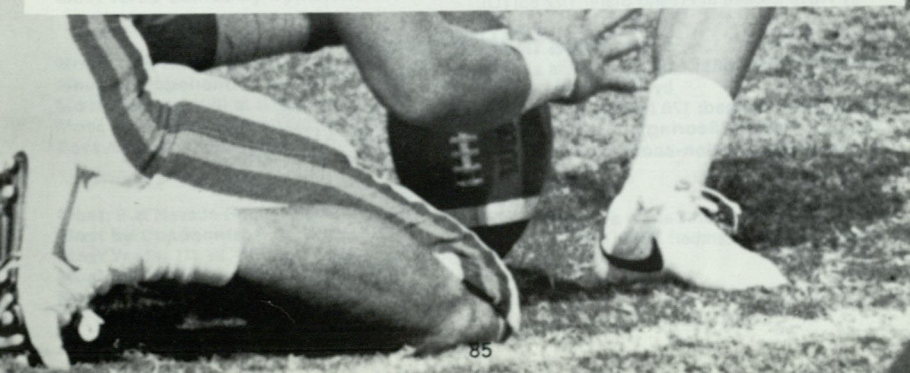

Radio-TV Broadcasts



John Rebenstorf returns for his eighth season as the radio voice of Cal State Fullerton football in 1989 with all games to be carried live on KMNY (1600 AM), with studios in Anaheim and transmitter in Pomona.

"We are pleased to continue our working relationship with KMNY," said Athletics Director Ed Carroll upon signing a five-year (1989-1994) contract that will cover all men's basketball games and selected other events such as baseball and women's basketball.

"Its strong signal gives Titan fans throughout southern California an opportunity to follow our teams."

This will be Fullerton's fifth season on KMNY (formerly KWOW), which features an all-business news format for its regular programming. Rebenstorf began broadcasting Titan sports during the 1981-82 school year and has handled the play-by-play duties for seven years for football, eight years for basketball and four years for

baseball. He has brought to Titan fans the excitement of the California Bowl, National Invitation Tournament men's basketball, NCAA Tournament women's basketball and the College Baseball World Series.

During the summers of 1986 and 1987, Rebenstorf was the voice of the Oklahoma City 89ers of the American Association. He previously did play-by-play for Cal Poly Pomona and UC Riverside as well as filling in for Long Beach State. His radio station work has included stops at KBON and KMEN in San Bernardino, KNTF in Ontario and KFI in Los Angeles.

Titans in the Pro Ranks

The growth and development of the Fullerton football program can be seen quite graphically in the output of players into the professional ranks in the past few seasons. Multiple Titan selections in the annual NFL draft have become the norm with 14 players chosen in the past five years after a total of only three Titans were picked in the previous 14 years.

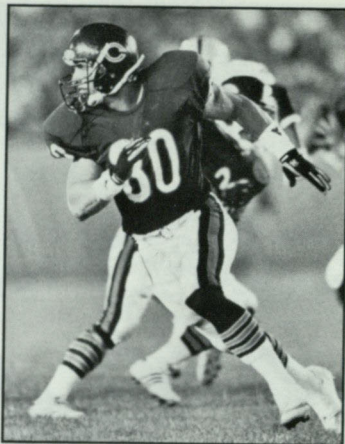
Three physically unique members of the defensive wall were tabbed remarkably close together in the draft of Apr. 24, 1989. Alex Stewart, a transfer from Fresno CC and USC who had limited playing experience but was built like the model for a body-building trophy, went on the eighth round to Minnesota. On the ninth round went A. J. Jenkins, a down lineman with linebacker quickness, to Pittsburgh, and Jerry Leggett, a linebacker the size of a tackle, to New Orleans. Offensive tackle and long snapper Matt Fitts and punter Jim Sirois were among the most prominent Titan products to get free agent invitations.

The 1988 draft ranked among the highest ever for Titans as tight end Jim Thornton was tabbed by the Chicago Bears on the fourth round and wide receiver Todd White went to the Philadelphia Eagles on round No. 7. Only second-round picks Daren Gilbert (New Orleans, 1985) and Mark Collins (NY Giants, 1986) rank higher than Thornton, who came to Fullerton as a quarterback.

The zenith was reached in 1986 when four Titans were chosen in the first eight rounds. Collins went to the Giants on the second round; wide receivers James Pruitt (Miami) and Corn Redick (Philadelphia) on the fourth and seventh rounds, respectively; and offensive tackle Hank Goebel to the Rams on the eighth round.

Actually, the list would have been more impressive had fullback Todd Gerhart and linebacker John Nevens not signed USFL contracts prior to the NFL draft.

Titans have done more than just sign contracts and make rosters. Both Bobby Kemp and Collins hit the jackpot early, playing in the Super Bowl as rookies. Kemp started for the Bengals in a losing cause against San Francisco in 1982 and Collins saw considerable

action in a winning effort against the Broncos in January, 1987. The former PCAA Defensive Player of the Year also gained a berth on the NFL All-Rookie team. Thornton became a starter as a rookie and began cashing in on endorsements in Chicago with extensive exposure in the Sears Big and Tall Man's Spring Catalog.

Free agents from Fullerton have had good luck gaining professional status. Johnny Gray unseated current KABC-TV sportscaster Jim Hill at cornerback for Green Bay and started for many years. Lucious Smith played defensive back in the NFL for several seasons with Buffalo, San Diego and the Rams and Vince Gamache was the regular punter in 1986 for the Seattle Seahawks. The Titans also have made a good showing in the Canadian Football League led by recent graduates Damon Allen (Edmonton and Ottawa QB), Greg Gary (Hamilton LB) and Eric Emery (British Columbia LB); the WFL and USFL; NFL strike squads and Arena Football, where Wade Lockett was one of the top players for the Los Angeles Cobras and Quinton Knight was a regular for the New York Knights.

Bob Bowser, SID in 1970, went on to work for the Washington Redskins and Pat Mooney, a former assistant athletics director, is the Director of Advertising for the Great Western Forum in Inglewood.

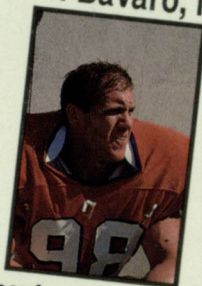
