

Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb, President

Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb was appointed the third president of Cal State Fullerton on July 8, 1981. Her selection was the culmination of a nationwide search begun in November, 1980.

Dr. Cobb had served as dean of Douglass College at Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey, since 1976. There she also held the rank of professor of biological sciences. Prior to her Douglass appointment she was dean of Connecticut College and professor

of zoology for seven years. Previously, she was professor of biology at Sarah Lawrence College in New York.

Born in January, 1924, Dr. Cobb is known for her work in cell physiology. her promotion of the advancement of women in scientific fields and her activities on behalf of minorities. She is the first black woman to head a major public university on the west coast.

Cobb earned her bachelor's degree from Talladega College in Alabama and her M.S. and Ph.D. in cell physiology from New York University. She also holds 14 honorary doctorates. She is the mother of a son, Jonathan, who is a graduate of the Cornell University Medical School.



Ed Carroll, Athletic Director

The rapid climb of Ed Carroll through the ranks of the Cal State Fullerton athletic department culminated in his appointment as Director of Athletics on July 1, 1985.

University President Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb made the announcement on May 28, 1985, after a nationwide search and Carroll, now 36, immediately ushered in an era of "positive thinking" for Titan athletics.

"One of my priorities has been to enhance the image of our athletic program by stressing positives," says Carroll. "We must use the power of positive thinking to overcome our limitations and build our program to greater heights."

In his first year as athletic director, Carroll immediately upgraded the football schedule. LSU, West Virgina, Florida and Tulsa signed to host the Titans while the United States Military Academy (Army) agreed to a home and home series in 2001 and 2003.

Long dormant plans for an on-campus Youth Sports Complex to provide a playing facility for football, soccer and baseball have been revived. The faculty Academic Senate and Fullerton City Council approved plans in October which hinge on the construction of a Marriott Hotel to help finance the project.

Carroll began his Fullerton athletic career as a wrestler. In 1972, he served as team captain and was selected the "Most Outstanding Wrestler" in the California Collegiate Athletic Association championship meet. He later served as an assistant to former head coach Don Matson.

Carroll earned bachelor's degrees in history and physical education from Fullerton as well as a secondary teaching credential. He taught physical education classes at Fullerton and earned a master's degree in recreation administration from CSU Long Beach.

After serving in various capacities in the Fullerton recreation department, Carroll left briefly in mid-1980 to serve as a recreational sports programmer and doctoral intern at Indiana University. He returned to Fullerton in November, 1980, as an assistant athletic director and also acting director of the Titan Athletic Foundation. He then served under athletic director Lynn Eilefson, who left in January, 1985, for a similar post at San Jose State.

Ed and his wife Connie live in Fullerton with young son Brandon. A second child is due during the baseball season.

MEDIA INFORMATION

This guide is published by the Sports Information Office at Cal State Fullerton for the convenience of the media in coverage of 1987 Titan baseball. Should additional information be required, please contact:

PRESS CREDENTIALS: Requests should be made as far in advance as possible. When time permits, credentials will be mailed. If not, press will call is located in the main ticket booth behind third base.

PHOTO CREDENTIALS: Will be issued on a per game basis only and must be worn in plain sight at all times. Access to the field is permitted with positioning regulated by the game umpires.

PRESS ROW: Is located in the top row of the central grandstands located directly behind home plate. It is an "open air" facility — cooled, heated and ventilated by Mother Nature. Seating at the working counter is limited to approximately seven persons.

TELEPHONES: The press row number is (714) 773-2400. A second line or use of telephones in the sports information office is available after games.

RADIO: Arrangements for broadcasts should be made at least one week in advance. One telephone line (modular jack) is available upon request at a fee of \$20 to visiting stations.

ELECTRICAL POWER: Is limited in press row. Special needs should be requested well in advance.

PARKING: Is FREE on Friday nights (after 6 p.m.) and all day on Saturday and Sunday in Lot A northwest of the field, accessible from either State College or Yorba Linda Boulevard. For other games, a fee of 75 cents (three quarters) for a daily permit is required and is enforced.

The athletic department wishes to acknowledge the support of the CSUF Associated Students, inc.; the instructionally Related Activity (IRA) Committee and the CSUF student body they represent. Their support is critical to the success of the Titans' NCAA Division I program.

A team of balance trying to establish its own identity while regaining respect from the collegiate baseball world.

In a nutshell, that's the position of Cal State Fullerton baseball as the Titans enter the 1987 season. Coach Augie Garrido sees it as a challenge — something to prove.

"This is an underdog team," says Garrido, beginning his 15th season at Fullerton. "It will not be the favorite to win the Pacific Coast Athletic Association title and it will not be ranked in any pre-season polls. It will have to go out and earn the respect of everyone. I see that as this team's responsibility as well as an opportunity to establish its own niche."

The University's 1984 national championship and a string of 11 consecutive trips to the NCAA playoffs is two years removed from this Titan squad. which nevertheless will be trying to post Fullerton's 14th consecutive winning season. The Titans will try to blend 10 veterans from last year's 36-21 club with 15 newcomers — five freshmen. one major college and nine junior college transfers.

"We will have to play an execution kind of game," says Garrido. "This team will not be known for any one thing so everything will be important. It will take a good combination of things.

"I see this team as stronger up the middle than last year's squad. We will have the ability to turn the double play and catch the ball in the outfield alleys. We have some experience in righthanded and lefthanded pitching and I think our catching will be OK. What we must develop is a solid short relief pitcher and establish a No. 2 hitter."

The pitching picture starts nicely with returning All-PCAA lefthander Larry Casian and 1987 pre-season All-American righthander Mike Harkey.

Casian caught fire in mid-season after an injury-plagued 1985 campaign. He finished 6-1 with a team-best earned run average of 2.84. He also had two saves in early season relief duty.

Harkey was the team's top winner with a 9-6 mark and had an ERA of 3.41. He struck out 125, only four off the school record, in 129.1 innings and had 7 of the staff's 16 complete games.

"Two experienced veterans is a good start, but is not enough for a pitching staff," says Garrido. "Casian will have to build off the maturity and experience he displayed last year at this level of play. Harkey's high regard is based on his professional potential and his goal this year is to fulfill that potential over a full season."

Through the fall season. Orange Coast College transfer Longo Garcia and freshman Mark Beck from Mayfair High School have emerged as the likely Nos. 3 and 4 starters. Veterans Gary Buckels and Paul Johnson and newcomers Rick Faulks (El Toro High). Rich Lodding (Western High) and Duane Madje (Santa Ana JC) have yet to break into consideration for those roles.

"Garcia demonstrated good success at the junior college level and Beck had the highest number of innings of any pitcher in the fall so figures heavily." says Garrido. "We will use December and January to establish the three or four starters and where the other five pitchers fit into the staff ladder."

A big hole exists behind the plate with the graduation of John Eccles. a second-team All-American and the team's most productive hitter with 13 home runs and 81 runs batted in to go with a .362 batting average and a school record 29 doubles last year. Letterman Mike Ham (.386) will be challenged by University of Oklahoma transfer Shane Flores and freshman Jason Rolish from Servite High in Anaheim.

"Ham has the experience and defensive ability and showed good offensive skills to be the No. 1 catcher," says Garrido. "Flores is more recognized and respected for his offensive abilities, having played first and third base and been a designated hitter at Oklahoma, but he has worked hard on his defense. Rolish caught the most innings in fall because Ham and Flores were not yet certified academically eligible and Keith Kaub also played there."

The infield of the fall normally included Kaub at first, Fresno City College transfer Mike Ross at second and lettermen Mark Razook at shortstop and Tony Trevino at third base.

"Ken Garcia was expected to be the third baseman, but he wasn't certified eligible and did not play. Trevino did a good job

defensively at third and is a good offensive player (.235). Based on our offensive performance, he or Garcia (.308, 7 HR and 31 RBI) could go back to the outfield."

Razook (.295 and 22 RBI) is the veteran of the group, having been the regular shortstop most of last season as a freshman. Ross has battled Kemer Brett at second and Kaub has gained an edge at first base over Paul Cameron (.239).

In the outfield, Mark Baca had an impressive fall and figures to be the centerfielder as well as lead-off hitter. Jim Osborn had a strong fali and Greg Mannion's playing time will likely depend on the third-base situation.

"Baca is an exciting lead-off hitter who runs well," says Garrido. "Osborn has been hitting in the No. 5 spot and driving in some runs with good power. And Andy Mota (.284) will fill a utility role, both in the outfield and infield, or be a DH."

Fullerton's schedule is typically imposing. In addition to the demanding PCAA race featuring UC Santa Barbara, Fresno State and UNLV, the Titans meet Pac-10 South powers Stanford and Arizona in traditional 3-game series. The Titans also host Texas Christian and Washington for three as well as the neighborhood match-ups with traditionally strong programs at USC, UCLA, San Diego State, Loyola Marymount and Pepperdine.

HISTORY OF TITAN BASEBALL

From the early club days when a playing field literally was scratched out of an orange grove to a national championship captured before the entire country's eyes on live television, Titan baseball has provided Cal State Fullerton fans with a wide range of thrills and excitement over the past two decades

Beryl Kempton and Warren Beck brought the program into the world, Bill Fulton nursed it into adolescence and then Augie Garrido guided it into maturity as Titan baseball has developed into a national power.

Kempton was the University employee who graded the field out of the orange trees. Home plate sat near the old orchard residence, a brick structure now known as "Football House." It's reportedly the second oldest existing residence in the city and now houses the Titans' football coaching staff.

The first-base line ran north and the thirdbase line paralleled what is now called Gymnasium Drive, heading west. A split rail and wire mesh screen served as the outfield barrier.

Beck, a member of the faculty, was the inaugural coach. He fielded a "club" team which played local junior colleges and "pick-up" teams from neighboring universities in its maiden season.

In 1965, the program became a full-fledged intercollegiate sport with Bill Fulton serving as the head coach. He led them into play in the California Collegiate Athletic Association and set the groundwork for the success of the 1970s as he battled Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, UC Riverside, Cal State Northridge and Cal Poly Pomona.

The catalyst to greatness was Garrido, who arrived from rival Cal Poly SLO and began developing the newfield now situated farther to the north. A new backstop, batter's eye and such luxuries as electricity for the pitching machines provided Garrido the most basic of tools.

After a rebuilding year in 1973, the Titans began establishing their great tradition in 1974 by winning the CCAA championship.

The 1975 season saw a move up to Division I status and entry in the Pacific Coast Athletic Association. But the surging Titans didn't miss a beat. They won the PCAA championship by one game over Pacific and then strolled onto Dedeaux Field on the campus of the University of Southern California and won the NCAA Western Regional to deprive the Trojans of a shot at their sixth consecutive NCAA championship.

Fullerton's first trip to Omaha for the College World Series was brief to say the least.

The Titans lost their first two games, to Arizona State and Oklahoma, and were sent packing and flying back to Los Angeles. But the experience would pay benefits down the road.

Fullerton repeated as PCAA champion in 1976, this time by a comfortable four games ahead of San Diego State. But then came realignment of the league as the Southern California Baseball Association was formed by Fullerton, Cal State Los Angeles, San Diego State, Pepperdine, Loyola Marymount, UC Santa Barbara and Long Beach State. Pacific, Fresno State and San Jose State became part of the Northern California Baseball Association.

The new schedule failed to disrupt the Titans' championship rhythm, although they had to share the inaugural SCBA title with Cal State L.A. Fullerton lost a onegame playoff with the Diablos but gained an at-large NCAA bid where they lost in the regional title game to Washington State in Pullman.

There was another SCBA title in 1978 and regional elimination at USC before the Titans struck paydirt in 1979. They parlayed another SCBA crown into a national championship but they did it the hard way.

Fullerton lost the regional opener at Fresno but came back through the losers' bracket, finally beating UCLA twice to earn a return trip to Omaha. Again, the Titans lost the opener, this time to Mississippi State. But a confident Garrido still liked his team's chances and they proved him right. They won five games in a row including a 2-1 verdict over Arkansas for the NCAA championship, the first title for Fullerton in a men's sport in Division I play.

The fruits of victory did not include a home playing site worthy of a regional tournament, so Fullerton began in 1980 a frustrating streak of post-season play. The Titans won the SCBA title again but had to go to Tucson, where the host Arizona Wildcats won the regional on their way to the NCAA title. In 1981, the Titans won the SCBA but lost in the regionals at Tempe to the hosts, the eventual national champion Arizona State Sun Devils.

Fullerton avenged the defeat, however, knocking off the highly regarded Sun Devils in their own backyard after another SCBA crown in 1982. However, the third trip to Omaha proved less than charming. Fullerton set a dubious record, becoming the first CWS team not to score a run as the Titans were shut out by Wichita State and Maine and hustled home.

In 1983, the Titans shared the SCBA crown but lost a one-game playoff to UC Santa Barbara for the NCAA automatic tour-

nament bid. No matter, the Titans' 49-19-1 record earned them an at-large berth. It also earned them another trip to Tempe, where the Sun Devils prevailed.

A slow start in 1984 after a couple of late summer professional signings stripped the pitching staff of its depth left Fullerton's reign in the SCBA teetering. A realignment of the infield seemed to work wonders and the team caught fire. A surge that would see them win 37 of their last 42 games carried all the way to Omaha and a second NCAA championship.

Again, the road to Omaha was via Fresno, where the Titans survived a murderers' row field of USC, San Diego State and the host Bulldogs of Fresno State. An extra-inning title game played in 100 + degree heat finally went the Titans' way and presented a schedule of some of the nation's most famous institutions in the College World Series.

Michigan, Miami, Arizona State, Oklahoma State and, finally, the University of Texas, stood in the way. In a series dominated by the hitters and their aluminum bats, the Titans showed a national ESPN audience that there was quality if not quantity on the pitching mound. Todd Simmons, Jack Reinholtz and record-setting reliever Scott Wright did yeoman's duty and left it for diminuitive lefty Ed Delzer to turn in the performance of his life in winning a 3-1 decision over the Longhorns in the title game.

There were other heroes, however. John Fishel, who would set a CWS record for hits and win the Most Valuable Player Trophy, slid around the Michigan catcher to ignite a five-run eighth inning and give the Titans an opening 8-4 win over the Wolverines.

After a 6-4 loss to Texas sent them to the losers' bracket, the Titans fought back. They routed Miami, 13-5, with bunts and stolen bases rattling the Hurricanes into four costly errors. They eliminated Arizona State as Reinholtz cooled the hot Devil bats and Kirk Bates delivered a crucial bases-loaded single. They outslugged Oklahoma State behind a Fishel home run, a bases-loaded triple by Tom Thomas and a two-run double by Bob Caffrey to earn the winner-take-all rematch with the Longhorns.

The five-foot-seven, 133-pound Delzer got a rare starting call against the defending champions. A couple of infield hits in the first inning produced a run but that was to be all. Delzer pitched a near-perfect game until leg cramps forced him from the mound to open the eighth inning. Enter Wright, the NCAA's most prolific reliever ever. He slammed the door on Texas for his 22nd save.

The offensive hero was John Bryant, who stole a base to set up the tying run and then tripled for the key hit in a two-run fourth inning that proved the difference.

Defending the title proved too much for the 1985 Titans to handle. Competing in the Southern Division of a reconstituted PCAA, the Titans finished in first place in their division but the pitching came up too thin in a playoff series at Fresno State that decided the league championship and the NCAA Tournament's automatic berth. And, with the nation's most difficult schedule taking its toll on an overall 36-32-1 record, the Titans did not get an at-large bid and were left out of the playoffs for the first time in 11 years.

By most school's standards, the 1986 season was a successful one. The Titans

posted a solid 36-21 record and won the Best of the West Tournament in Fresno as part of another challenging schedule. But, for the second year in a row, there was no league title nor NCAA playoff berth as the season turned on one inning. Fullerton blew a 6-2 lead in the ninth inning at home vs. UNLV on Apr. 5 and could never recover from the loss, finishing in third place behind UC Santa Barbara and UNLV.

The 1987 season marks the third year of the Pacific Coast Athletic Association's reformed baseball format.

The league was re-aligned for the 1985 season with teams from the Southern and Northern California Baseball Associations. A north-south format was used in 1985, but in 1986 and again this year all eight teams will vie for the PCAA pennant and automatic NCAA playoff berth in a single division. The 21-game league schedule will consist of seven 3-game weekend series with the sites alternating on an annual basis.

Fullerton joined the PCAA in 1975 when the Titans moved up to Division I status. After two seasons, teams from the south half of the PCAA and the West Coast Athletic Conference were combined into the SCBA and the northern teams formed the NCBA. The desire of the WCAC to field its own baseball league caused the return to the regular PCAA alignment after eight seasons, which saw Fullerton win or share eight SCBA championships.

The end result is one of the most competitive baseball leagues in the nation. In 1983 and 1984, six teams from the current alignment gained the NCAA playoffs with Fresno State representing the NCBA both years and the SCBA being represented twice by Fullerton and once each by UC Santa Barbara (1983) and Nevada Las Vegas (1984). Only league champions Fresno State (1985) and UC Santa Barbara (1986) have gained the 36-team field in the past two years.

TITANS IN THE

Eight products of the Cal State Fullerton baseball program have worked their way into the major leagues with many of the stars of the recent teams waiting in the wings for their opportunity.

The first Titan to play in the major leagues was lefthanded pitcher Dan Boone, who broke in with the Angels and Padres after helping the Titans into the 1975 College World Series. He was soon followed by catcher Dan Whitmer at Toronto and California.

The biggest name came next as Tim Wallach, the 1979 College Player of the Year, broke in with the Montreal Expos on his way to All-Star status as a third baseman for the National League the past few seasons.

More recent arrivals have been righthanded pitcher Jeff Robinson with the San Francisco Giants; outfielder Andre David, who hit a home run in his first at bat for the Minnesota Twins; and outfielder John Christensen with the New York Mets and Boston Red Sox.

The most impressive performance last year came from lefthander Greg Mathews, who burst upon the scene in St. Louis to become a valued member of the Cardinals' starting rotation. He was on the NCAA championship team of 1984 but did not play in the College World Series after getting hit in the face by a line drive in batting practice. Also getting his debut was Bill Moore with Montreal after an all-star season in the American Association for pennant-winning Indianapolis.

Linda Shimamoto, Secretary/Statistician

A communications major with senior class status, Shimamoto travels with the team in

addition to virtually running the day-to-day office operation. In addition to regular baseball duties, she is involved with the fund-raising Diamond Club and coach Augie Garrido's "Angel Country" summer and Christmas baseball camps for youngsters.

A resident of Fountain Valley, Shimamoto served two years as statistician for the Fountain Valley High School baseball team.

New Stadium Part of Sports Complex

A joint venture among the City of Fullerton, the Marriott Hotel Corporation and the State University system will soon produce a long-awaited stadium for Titan baseball.

By 1988, an \$18 million Marriott Hotel will be built on the southeast corner of the campus at Nutwood Avenue and the Orange (57) Freeway. Its operation will provide funds to maintain a \$6.7 million city-built sports complex which will include a football/soccer facility and fan facilities at the existing baseball field. The design, cost and seating capacity of the baseball stadium currently are under review by a committee that includes coach Augie Garrido.
