A SHORT HISTORY OF GOEZ

In November, 1969, three dedicated Chicano artists, Joe Gonzalez, John Gonzalez, and David Botello began to see a lifelong dream transformed into reality. That was the beginning of the conversion of an old abandoned meat market in East Los Angeles, into one of the most distinctive Fine Art Gallerys in Southern California.


Each visitor to Goez Gallery is immediately captured by the classical atmosphere, warmth, and hand wrought beauty.

Since its opening, Goez has been much more than just a community cultural attraction; not only does it serve as a forum for Chicano artists, but it also serves both the private and business communities with its custom graphic, design, and artistic capabilities.

Goez Gallery has been the subject of a documentary film shown on the Public Broadcasting System, extensive coverage on all the major television stations, radio programs, and news articles in the Los Angeles media.





The main showroom exhibits a panorama of objets d'art, including nail reliefs; metal and wood sculptures; and impressionist, classical, abstract paintings and etchings.
