"What a swell party it was."

I wrote these words before I attended the party. On Jan. 18, I went to a gathering to honor Imogene Gregory on her 100th birthday.

These words did indeed say it all in spades. Over 200 people ate, drank and danced to the music of the Moore Group, which played wonderful music from the 1960s for everyone to enjoy. It was an absolutely delightful evening, especially the highlight of the night when Imogene's family spoke such elo-

quent words about her and then gave the mike to this lovely lady.

Imagine talking for about 15 minutes with no notes and never a waver about her life. Everyone was amazed and so appreciative of her story.

What a life this lady has led! It all started in 1909 when Imogene was born in the small town of Kadoka, S.D. She suffered through the Depression, but managed to receive a bachelor's degree in humanities from Yankton College in her home state.

Her first job was in a Dutch community teach-

ing high school English. She paid \$25 a month for board and room, and her salary was \$80 a month. She was married to Ted Keskey in 1933, but they had to keep the wedding secret because women teachers were not supposed to be married at that time. We've come a long way, baby.

Teaching English, Mixed Chorus, Girls Glee Club and presenting the Senior Class Play at Corsica, S.D., were just some of her duties.

The couple then moved to Sioux Falls, where she


"A wonderful man."

Dorothy, Burt's wife of 70 years, is in a convalescent home in Thousand Oaks. In every way, she was, truly, his "life partner, almost from the day they met in Inglewood, in 1935 — she was 18 and he was 22.



2007 law helps surviving homeowner

From Dec. 9, 2008, through Jan. 9, 2009, the Ventura County Board of Realtors Multiple Listing Service shows six "sold, closed escrow" homes, eight "in escrow/contingent" homes and, as of Jan. 9, there are 42 "active" Leisure Village listings.

The Mortgage Forgiveness Debt Relief Act (MFDR) was enacted in December of 2007. Prior to the passage of this act, a surviving spouse had

to sell their home in the same year as the spouse's death in order to qualify for the \$500,000 capital gains exclusion. Prior to the passage of the MFDR Act, a spouse who waited two years was eligible for an exemption of only \$250,000. Now, a surviving spouse has up to two years to sell the home and keep up to \$500,000 in capital gain, tax free.


This provides the spouse more time for dealing with his/her loss, deciding a personal course of action and planning for

the financial future.

WHAT'S COOKIN'

Sweet and Sour Cabbage Soup takes off the chill

I grew up in Baltimore, and relatives ask me if I miss "the change of seasons." I always say that California does have a change of seasons — we go from good to better!

Make a big batch of homemade soup and stock your freezer with individual portions to defrost and enjoy on a chilly night. One of my favorites is Sweet and Sour Cab-

bage Soup. Serve it with some bread, and you have a whole meal. For the sour taste, I depend on fresh lemons. (If you don't have a tree, ask one of your neighbors who does and promise them some soup!)

There are many versions of this soup, and some prefer brisket as a base. I like chuck. Have it your way!

Ingredients:

2 to 3 pounds chuck meat cut into large chunks
1 quart beef broth
1 quart water
2 onions, diced (I use half a bag of frozen diced onions to save time)
3 cups canned diced tomatoes with juice
1 cup tomato sauce
2 pounds cabbage, thinly sliced
Salt to taste
1 teaspoon freshly ground

black pepper, or to taste
2 to 3 Tablespoons brown sugar (I use Splenda Brown Sugar Blend)
4 to 6 Tablespoons fresh lemon juice
3 to 4 Tablespoons Golden Raisins

Directions:

Combine the cut-up meat, broth and water in a 10-quart soup pot or stock pot. Boil over medium heat. Skim off and dis-

card the gray residue that comes to the top. Now add all the rest of ingredients except the raisins. Bring to a boil, stirring occasionally. Then cover and simmer 3 hours or more, until the meat is "fall-apart" tender. Stir in the raisins and simmer another 20 minutes. Taste and adjust the seasonings.

This recipe makes about 8 to 10 servings.

Women's Club donates \$11,000 a year to local organizations in need

The recent donation by the Leisure Village Women's Club of \$900 to offset the costs of the newly proposed yellow placards for the Emergency Preparedness Committee and \$1,000 for equipment and materials needed by volunteer handymen in the woodshop represents a simple reminder that this charitable group has been raising funds and donating money within Leisure Village for more than 30 years.

Financial records recently provided by Rosemary Woody, treasurer and chair of the Donations Committee for the past several years, shows that since 1980, the club has contributed some \$327,219, or an average of \$11,283 per year, over the past 29 years. Please note that complete records are not readily available for the years 1977 through 1979.

Of the total amount, \$180,481, or 55 percent, was donated for worthwhile causes outside the confines of our Village, including, but not limited to, the Camarillo Library, Boys and Girls Club, Pleasant Valley Hospital and many other similar and worthwhile organizations. Just this past year alone, in 2008, some \$5,600 in

donations was made to the Camarillo Hospice Program, Camarillo Health-care District, Oxnard Food Share Program, Coalition to End Domestic Violence, St. John's Hospital Emergency Room Fund and the Livingston Memorial Visiting Nurses Foundation.

The list of contributions to the Leisure Village Association over the years is much too lengthy for this short article, but it includes donations of some \$146,738, or 45 percent, for diverse projects such as drinking fountains for the golf course, much of the funding for construction of the gazebo, sewing tables, copy machines, computers, a piano, shelves for the library, etc. In addition to the \$1,900 donation for this year as mentioned above, the club also contributed \$250 toward the purchase of the fiber-optic curtain that now adorns our stage.

The next time you see one of the 369 paid members of the Leisure Village Women's Club, all of whom contribute to these worthy causes not only through their annual dues, but through other fund-raising activities as well, perhaps you should tell them thanks for a job well done, an effort that is truly appreciated.

The Association's Board of Directors approved the 2009-2010 budget, which calls for no increase in annual assessments. The approval came at a Working Board Meeting on Jan. 20.

With unanimous approval, the budget totals \$11,120,819.00. Of that amount, \$9,674,178.00 is the day-to-day Operating Budget, while \$1,446,641.00 will be allocated to the Reserve funds, mainly for streets, roofs and non-fixed capital replacement, such as cars, mowers, etc., that have reached the end of their useful value.

In other action, the Board named John Mayer to head up the new ad hoc planning committee that is to begin immediate forma-

Club workshop, while Burt made a similar impact on the Architecture Committee, which he had chaired, and with the Woodshop, where he was a familiar figure almost to the end.

One of his close friends at the Woodshop, and Burt's successor as chair of the Architecture Committee, Ted Lansing, recalls an incident that occurred recently as he was installing the shop's new ventilation system. Burt, who had lost a leg to diabetes and underwent dialysis three times a week, and who had fashioned his own wooden leg, sat watching Ted install ductwork along the ceil-

ing. At one point, when Ted obviously needed help, Burt, the only help around, stood below and used a broom handle to hold the ductwork in place while Ted secured it.

"He knew things I had never heard of," Lansing marveled, adding, "Shortly after he had lost his leg, Burt decided he wanted hardwood flooring in his house. So, he installed it himself."

By all accounts, Burt Swallow was the right man for the Architecture Committee. He came to the Village after a career in building and stationary engineering that followed his retirement as a sheet-metal worker — and, as always, found time with Dorothy to be a volunteer

for a variety of activities, usually involving young people.

Alweiss recalled, "A few weeks after Burt had lost his leg, he was back on his electric cart, delivering the Woodshop report to the Board and back in the woodshop, dodging the woodworkers at their machines and offering his wisdom and guidance."

At Burt's 90th birthday party in the pavilion, Ernie Ohmstedt, chair of the Ed & Rec Committee, said, "Burt helps to keep the Village a fantastic place to live.... always active, never negative, always coming up with ideas and contributions to make it better."

At that same event, the late Milt Mankoff called

Burt, "talented and brave, an all-round man."

Donna Duke, a former Board Member and longtime President of the Women's Club, said of Burt and his wife, "There are not two better people in the Village, which has flourished since they came here."

Much of what Burt Swallow brought to Leisure Village is all around us, often not visible except to those who worked with him, those who knew what a gift he was to all of us.

Finally, perhaps Burt unknowingly provided his own epitaph for us at his 90th birthday party when, thanking those who honored him, he said, "I appreciate all ... of it. And that's the end of it."




795 vie for first-place 2008 Camera Club awards; three win


I have known Imogene as a vibrant 99-year-old, and we all have all been looking forward to her 100th. It was certainly well worth the wait.

Mesta to be the ambassador to Luxembourg. The production became an immediate hit and ran on Broadway for 644 performances before it closed. It was then made into a movie starring Ethel Merman, George Sanders (believe or not, he had a talent for singing), Donald O'Connor and Vera-Ellen.

With all this wonderful talent participating in these two productions, the public's response was electric. The Broadway production won four 1951 Tony awards, including

Best Original Score for Irving Berlin, Best Actress for Ethel Merman and Best Actor in a Musical for Russell Nype. The movie won an Oscar for Best Musical Scoring for Alfred Newman and a Golden Globe for Ethel Merman as Best Actress. (On a side note, Dinah Shore did the original Broadway cast album due to Ethel Merman having an exclusive contract with Decca Records.)

Speaking of music, the show had many popular songs, which included "The Hostess With the Mostes' on the Ball," "Washington Square Dance,"

"It's a Lovely Day Today," "The Best Thing For You (Would be Me)" and "You're Just in Love."

So, you see, "Call Me Madam" has quite a group of famous performers and contributors in either or both productions.




