The Quorum Quandary

Residents of Leisure Village have earned the reputation for being informed, active users of their voting privileges. In State and National elections, villagers usually reach a turnout of 85%, either voting in person or by absentee ballot. This is an admirable record, of which we can be proud.

Then, why was the LVA Annual Meeting of June 27 forced to adjourn for lack of a quorum, unable to transact its business? Where were those voters?

On June 27, less than 50% of L.V. homeowners had voted, fewer than were needed for a quorum. When the Annual Meeting reconvened on July 2, the percentage of votes cast edged just over the 50% mark. Only HALF of the homeowners made the decisions which are binding for ALL of us. At the time of the July 3rd open Board Meeting, the CC&R's measure still lacked 500 votes! We are astonished at these figures.

Leisure Village is a retirement community. Is that a key to the problem? The degree of involvement of homeowners in Village affairs varies widely. Some are active, some pursue special community interests, some reach out to learn new hobbies: computers, bridge, or golf. Some follow an inactive life style, either for health reasons or through choice. We respect their right to choose their own degree of involvement. Retirement should be a time of freedom to "do your own thing" at last.

But that doesn't mean ignoring all responsibilities. One still must put gas into the car in order to drive, pay the bill to maintain phone service, or shop at the market to have food.

It is certainly all right to stay in your home and not to participate in Village activities, but accepting the deed to your home carries the built-in obligation to pay your monthly dues, to live within the framework of our Rules and Regulations, and to vote on issues affecting the Village as stated in the CC&R's.

Voting is not a pressure activity. Information about candidates and issues is mailed directly to every homeowner. Reading the material on Village issues is similar to reading about State election matters.

Candidates' Night for aspiring LVA Board members was held on June 7, with good attendance. Channel 12 ran the video-tape of that meeting twice more.

A three-hour workshop on the revision of the CC&R's was held on May 17. Many residents picked up the thick packet of material prior to the meeting, but only about 25 persons actually attended the workshop.

Voting at the Annual Meeting of the Association has been made very easy. Absentee or proxy ballots were mailed to everyone with instructions given. There were three options listed: 1) Vote for your choice; 2) Sign the proxy and give it to a friend to vote for you; and 3) Sign the proxy and have the Board vote it for you. Proxies could be deposited in the ballot box in the Recreation Center, mailed to the LVA office, or turned in at the Annual Meeting. Talk

about convenience!

There are very few excuses for people who are negligent in casting a ballot: death and mental incapacity would be exceptions. What can we do about it? If Villagers by their inaction are saying, "You decide for me, I'm tired/bored/don't care what happens," at least they could sign their proxies to give that small measure of cooperation.

Granted, our population is getting older, but response to the State General elections indicates that there still exists the capacity to exercise their citizens' prerogative of voting. What stimulus can be used to elicit the same degree of participation in Village elections?


Our organization appreciates her efforts solely on our behalf, and we have the utmost confidence in her work.

It would seem that the appearance of propriety



Information On Village Six-Month Passes

Residents are reminded that current 6-month guest passes are being extended to Aug. 31. A new application for each pass must be submitted by homeowners for the next 6-month period of time which will begin on Sept. 1.

Applications may be picked up at each gate, filled out, and returned to the gate or to the LVA or Security offices near the west gate.

These passes are issued to frequent LV visitors, such as family members or close friends and must be shown for entrance to the Village. Six-month passes will not be issued to domestics, gardeners, real estate personnel, trade-people, etc. These get only a oneday pass.

Homeowners who re-

passes are held fully responsible for the named guest while he/she is in the Village. This responsibility includes complying with all motor vehicle regulations.

A guest may not engage in solicitation, canvassing, commercial activity while in the Village. A guest may not use or be in any recreational facilities unless accompanied by his/her host.

No more than three 6month passes will be issued for each qualified resident, as defined in the Rules & Regulations, Article III, Sec. 3.04.

Passes may be revoked at any time and must be surrendered upon de-
