In our case, an Ombudsman could be defined as one who investigates complaints by residents against the Board or any member of the Board, against the General Manager or any of his staff, or even against another resident, and help to achieve equitable settlement or understanding.

Villagers Must **Amend CC & R'S**

We cannot demand that our elected Board of Directors do the impossible. On July 16, 1983 we amended our CC&R's (Our Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions). The amendment added two words, "flood" and "earthquake" to the various insurance polices our Association had to acquire. In 1985 this insurance of full replacement value of damage by flood and earthquake is not provided by any financially responsible insurance organization in the world.

We are voting to restore the CC&R's to the condition prior to the changes made in 1983. But we are adding a clause "to obtain a policy or policies of flood and/or earthquake insurance upon such terms and in such amounts as is deemed prudent by the Board of Directors."

Other changes are cosmetic. The "Declarant" which refers to Leisure Technology, the developer, as a beneficiary, is deleted; and in this age of feminist equalitarianism "workmen's compensation" is changed to "workers' compensation".

It is difficult to change our CC&R's, as it should be. 75% of all homeowners must approve the amendment if the change is to go into effect. It is the considered opinion of ILV Editors that we must make it possible for our Board of Directors to conduct our business with a sense of personal security and without unnecessary stress.

Be responsive to the needs of our Association. Be responsible and vote YES and turn in your ballot promptly.

These chemicals can be purchased at any number of local retail outlets ... if not from the regular supplier.



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


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Village Celebrates 50 Years of Social Security

GEM AND MINERAL CLUB

By Don Holmes

The Gem and Mineral Club had an entertaining and instructive meeting in August. As announced on the Bulletin boards, on Channel 12, and here last month, Joe Poliak gave a demonstration of enameling on metal. Briefly, these enamels are actually various kinds and colors of glass, which have been either ground into very fine powders or shaped into rods, strings, and other shapes. The enamel is placed on a metal backing, then heated until it melts, which fuses it to the metal. Joe showed us samples of his work, including cloisonne', in which thin strips of metal are soldered to the backing to form cells, which are then filled with the enamel powder. This is then melted to form the design. For his demonstration, however, Joe used copper pennies which he enamelled in various colors and designs. He explained that pennies from 1982 and newer cannot be enamelled because they no longer have much copper in them, and the penny melts before the enamel does. He made enough enamelled pennies so that everyone in the audience of about 40 could have one. Joe had drilled holes in some of the pennies and the ladies, by using two, could make a very nice pair of earrings. The Club offered to reimburse him for the pennies, but Joe declined. saying he would just charge it up to advertising. The audience included half a dozen visitors, who are always welcome to our meetings.

Program Chairman Seymour Fisher is working on the Oct. Program, which will feature Ken Mac Kaig demonstrating his stained glass work. Visitors will be welcome.

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
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



I have banged them on the floor, then used a special wrench, sometimes resorting to hot water on the lid. The "push down and turn" type usually work better if I put them on the floor and stand on them for the "push". Sometimes I use a hammer, break the lid, then rip it right off.
