

County, in the State of Washington. The notices were posted throughout that area on March 24, 1942.

90,307 Japanese evacuees entered Assembly Centers in group evacuation under Civilian Exclusion Orders.

Fresno Assembly Center received Japanese only from California. The major portion of the evacuees it housed came into the Center on six Civilian Exclusion Orders.

C.E.O. No. 44 brought in 566 evacuees from Tulare Co.

C.E.O. No. 45 increased the Centers population with 584 evacuees from King Co.

C.E.O. No. 62 added 861 evacuees from Fresno Co.

C.E.O. No. 63 produced an additional 539 evacuees from Madera Co. to swell the occupancy.

C.E.O. No. 64 was the largest single movement into the facility with 1,349 evacuees from Fresno Co.

C.E.O. No. 92 boosted the number of inhabitants substantially with 1,219 evacuees from Amador Co., north of Sacramento.

The balance of the Centers residents included one each from C.E.O. numbers 65 - 66 - 96 and 103. Two each from C.E.O. numbers 107 and 108. Six from C.E.O. number 51 and 49 from C.E.O. number 106. If you add to this 45 individuals that were transferred to the Center from institutions you have the fundamental population of Fresno Assembly Center.

The population fluctuated during the period of occupation because of transfers in and out and the addition of residents by birth and the loss of residents by death.
