It was only after months had elapsed and many complaints and appeals had been made that the boxes were restored.

We believe that Leisure Village differs in many vital ways from other condominium and planned-unit developments. Not the least of the differences are the many lively, stimulating and supportive activities. From drama to bazaars, from dancing to travel, from blood pressure clinics to vaudeville, from chess, bridge, art, educational forums to yoga and college level classes, covery. we have it all.

No obstacles should be placed in the way of these life-enhancing programs. Those who decree a rule which results in a sterile atmosphere in our Center should reconsider. Let's hope we can all celebreate the "Return of the Easels".

We are in place your donation in an area where surplus Y.N.C.G. mail box (near does exist and the needy are around us.

Some time ago ILV published a request for funds and donations and Food Share was appreciative of the response. But now again there is a need for funds.

For those who may not be familiar with the program, it works like this. Participation requires the sponsorship of a nonprofit authorized agency and the furnishing of an agent who is responsible for the paper-work, and the pick-up and delivery of the food to those who qualify. Some two years ago Y.N.C.G. became the sponsoring agent for the village and pays the monthly fee required. Val Barbeau, the present agent, succeeded Leonie Ziler.

There are hundreds of volunteers in the county. many of them villagers, who glean fields and orchards and distribute the food. Anyone whose annual income is not over \$7,470 (\$10,080 for a couple) is eligible to receive this food. (Records are strictly confidential-not even Y.N.C.G. has access to this information.)

Although labor is donated and storage space almost free (a warehouse in Saticoy is furnished by Ventura County for \$1.00 a year), there are other expenses for utilities, truck operation, etc. Can you help in this phase of the program? Any amount


Villagers Comment On Different Aspects Flood And Flood Insurance

EDITOR'S COMMENTS

The editors of ILV knowing that most villagers are deeply concerned about the flooding and the issue of flood insurance have asked some residents whom we considered to be knowledgeable to write about some of the facets of the problem as they see them. We do not in any way wish to imply that these are the only people who do understand the problem-many of

you most certainly know others with whom you will wish to discuss this issue. We submit these articles for your information, however, hoping that they will be of further help to you.

Since this problem is sure to be of primary interest when the revision of CC and R's is presented to us in the form of petition to sign, probably in September, you may want to save these discussions for review at that time.

The Board of Directors of Leisure Village Association has made a decision to forego the purchase of flood insurance at this time. The decision was made only after several weeks of serious study and deliberation.

The CC and R's of the Association call for the purchase of "full insurable replacement value" for our property insurances. For fire and earthquake our association policies cover us to \$146 million, which was determined to be the full insurable replacement value. The premium for these coverages is paid from our annual assessments. In the case of flood insurance, the premium was to have been a special assessment spread over three months.

The annual premium would amount to about \$100 per household, a total cost to the Village of about tant. \$200,000. Interestingly, the coverage would apply to "structures" and not to individual living units. One policy limited the coverage to \$35,000 per structure. A 4-unit structure, then, would have only unit. Villagers to consider include the very limited possibility of a flood of major proportions. Each building pad in the Village is supposedly built higher than the hundred-year flood level. With the lengthening of the bridge under Highway 101, more water will be able to flow beneath the highway and less danger will exist from blockage from debris. Within the Village itself, many homes are considerably higher than others.

Constraints established by the CC and R's prevent the Board from negotiating in terms of master insurance policies. An ad hoc committee of knowledgeable, concerned Villagers has been established to assist with our insurance problems. In the long run, we hope to have advice from this committee and also from an objective professional risk management consul-

But our first need is to amend the CC and R's to remove an impossible and unnecessary requirement. Every effort will be made to inform residents and to obtain the approval of 75% of homeowners to \$8,750 coverage for each make the change. FLOOD INSURANCE **DILEMMAS**

The inability of the Association at the present time to obtain flood insurance for the full replacement value of the improvements, including dwelling units, in the Village, has led to the writing of this article to review the hazards which exist, the role of insurance in overcoming adverse economic effects of such hazards, and the present state of the insurance industry which has caused the withholding of flood insur-


This year, CAL-TRANS commenced construction of two new freeway bridges over Conejo Creek. The creek channel will be widened 71' and the bridge length will be extended by a like distance. The bridge height will be raised several feet and the piers supporting the bridge are expected to

be so constructed as to cause less pile-up of debris. Upon completion in 1986 the types of flooding experienced in Leisure Village in 1978, 1980 and 1983, due to the old freeway bridge's obstructing flood flows should be eliminated except in a flood with an intensity greater than a 100-year

Downstream of the freeway, the existing Conejo Creek channel is very inadequate, and the Ventura County Flood Control District does not have sufficient funds to improve the channel. However, when owners of the land adjacent to the Conejo Creek develop their land, they will will be required to improve the channel just as Leisure Tech was required to improve the channel adjacent to Leisure Village. Seth and Edla soon became naturalized citizens. When the children reached high school age, the Obergs put down roots in the Los Angeles area, where Edla became involved in PTA and Scouts. They both were active in Swedish groups in Los Angeles and Hollywood.

Seth established his own business, Oberg Construction Corp., in 1937, serving as president for many years, until his retirement at age 72. The corporation operated from 1967 to 1984 by their two sons, then sold and the family name was removed.

One of Seth's favorite projects was the construction of the Sepulveda underpass at LAX, which he personally supervised in 1960. Other Oberg Construction Corp. pro-

iects were bridges, dams. highways, storm drains, college libraries, and hangers; also test facilities at military bases in Southern California.

The Oberg children live furniture. nearby. Son Nils lives in Isabella and son Carl in Simi Valley; each has his own business in different areas of the construction field. Two daughters, Aina and Mary Louise, live in Camarillo; daughter Iris lives in Arizona. The family suffered a tragic loss when one of the six children, a 7-year-old son, was struck and killed by a drunken woman driver.

Seth and Edla now live quietly in Village 20. Two greenhouse windows and the patio are full of carefully tended plants. The Oberg home has a view of the LV golf course and the Camarillo grade. The house abounds in family portraits and snapshots hung on hall walls, with the latest photographs on an entry table.

Edla just received her

driver's license for another two year period. She enjoys cooking Swedish dishes and doing occasional hand crafts. Seth formerly did woodworking as a hobby, making patio

The Obergs return to Sweden for visits frequently. Their latest trip was in 1982, when they rented a car there and visited many relatives and familiar spots. On a previous trip, they toured Europe for a month, seeing France, Italy, Switzerland and Holland.

They look forward to making another trip to Sweden next summer. Edla's siblings came here from Sweden for a recent visit. She also has a sister, Hulda, who lives in Van Nuvs.

Seth and Edla were the subjects of a Swedish American project of the Oral History Program at Cal State University, Fullerton. Each was interviewed about their lives, and the transcript was published in 1978.

Under the foregoing circumstances, the CC&Rs need to be revised immediately to give the Board more discretion over whether to procure flood insurance, and what coverage should be obtained. It is hoped that conditions in the insurance industry will improve and the Board then will be able to obtain flood insurance with greater coverage at a reasonable cost. While the risk of loss from flood appears less likely than fire, if a major flood should hit the Village, the modest investment in insurance would prove to be very effective in preserving property values in the Village by enabling immediate repair and reconstruction possible.
