Motivated by the recent Mexico City Earthquake and assured the full cooperation of the City of Camarillo and the Southern California Earthquake Preparedness Project the LVESO is now in a position to develop an effective disaster service unit. Some of the immediate goals of the organization will require the cooperation of many Leisure Village residents.

A disaster and earthquake preparedness manual for each home in the village is in production covering actions to be taken before, during and after an earthquake. The manual will be short concise and tailored to Leisure Village Residents' needs. The existing emergency plan is being revised to a comprehensive operating manual for use by managers, coordinators and volunteers during a disaster.

An assembly room program is being planned to alert and inform residents on earthquake preparedness. Lectures, films, demonstrations and exhibits on earthquake hazards and home safety will be presented. Unit coordinators are organizing their units to maximize the units' effectiveness during an earthquake or other disaster. Appropriate train-See Emergency Pg. 5

Channel 12 Emerges As Key Instant **Communicator For Leisure Village** In Ventura County Fire Alert

When brush fires darkened the skies around Camarillo recently, Leisure Village Emergency Units had a good trial run and work-out. Association security forces were in immediate contact with the Fire Department and Police officials and liaison was established. At no time was our Village considered in imminent danger but the situation was constantly monitored.

Certain lessons were learned from the experience. Our security phones were deluged with calls from anxious residents. Naturally our older, single, bedridden and handicapped Villagers wanted upto-date information. Association Manager, Skip Roberts initiated the instruction to Elva Ward, Channel 12 volunteer coordinator, to broadcast the latest information. The liaison of Security Chief Max Moses with the Fire and Police Departments; with Skip Roberts and Channel 12 operators Elva Ward and Russ Sievert, gave Villagers immediate reliable news. Security could clear phone lines with one phrase, "Turn on Channel 12." Lesson in future emergencies — "Turn on Channel 12".

An interview with Villager Elmer Eymann, who spear-headed our Emergency Plan development was also reassuring. Elmer said he "felt good about the responsible reactions of Management, its coordination and cooperation with security, fire and police personnel." He pointed out that in worse emergencies with which the Plan dealt, we might be confronted with impassable roads, no electricity and therefore, no Channel 12.

On the whole, we conclude that Leisure Villagers are being well served. We salute the persons involved and say, "Well done."

As a member of the Traffic Control Sub-Committee of the Security and Safety Committee '84/'85, I observed the traffic in the Village. I found and reported that over 70%, or better than 2 out of 3 cars, do exceed the 25mph. limit; that cars do not observe the 3-way stop signs — in some instances, just slide across the intersection or fail to come to a stop altogether; thus endangering those pedestrians whose eyesight or hearing is not good.

As I walk a lot I find that this situation has been deteriorating of late. Security and safety patrols and officers are not enforcing driver compliance with speed limits and stop signs. The village speed limit might just as well be 40 or 50mph., for that is what a great many vehicles are doing.

I have proposed that one patrol car should be equipped with a radar gun, and operate on a test basis for one month, and that the result should be publicized. Also, when a vehicle is pulled to the side, we would expect driver courtesy, and not foul language, etc.

My question is: What is the Board going to do about this problem, BE-FORE the first serious accident in our village?





CURRENT ISSUES FORUM

By Herbert Swartz
Attorney Robert M. Triplett discussed "Why is Estate Planning Necessary?" at the Current Issues Forum luncheon meeting at County Savings Bank on Sept. 27. He strongly recommended that everyone have a will and stated that 70% of the population fails to do any estate planning.

Death or incapacity may occur and could result in needless delay in passing assets on to heirs and having state laws determine how assets will be distributed instead of being determined by the wishes of the decedent, he stated.

Triplett said that there are three choices: 1) do nothing; 2) draw up a will; or 3) a living trust. He discussed the advantages and disadvantages of each choice. them reviewed. He said that now you can pass \$400,000 in assets to close heirs without any estate tax and that the amount is going up to \$500,000 next year.

Triplett also discussed the use of the "Durable Power of Attorney" as a way of preplanning for the possibility of incapacity or senility. After his presentation, he answered many questions from the audience.


