# New guidelines for residential landscape

Do you know if your garden is red stake or full maintenance? What happens if you put ceramic statues in the garden in front of your house? Can you have a vegetable garden at home?

A new Village booklet contains answers to these questions and to dozens more that arise from the landscape regulations that apply to the planting areas around Village houses. The new "Residential Landscape Procedural Guidelines" provides practical answers for residents about what they can and cannot plant or cultivate in the beds next to their homes.

"It is really good – much clearer and more precise than what's in the phone book. says Karen Snethen, the Village landscape assistant. "It contains Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) that are just what we get asked in the office every day."



These 2015 guidelines were rewritten by the Residential Landscape Committee

and approved by LV's Board of Directors. "We wanted to get down to basics," says Jerry Sortomme, Chair of the Landscape Committee. The new booklet provides "a more in-depth understanding of landscape options."

That includes sections that define what red stake really means (the homeowner chooses, installs, and maintains the plants at his or her own expense – with a landscape permit). About 30% of Village homes are red stake. Full maintenance means the Association cares for the plants, although the resident can do some weeding or light pruning.

The new Landscape Guidelines are available in booklet form in the Association Office and the Recreation Office. It will be online later this year. Both Snethen and Sortomme call it valuable reading for newcomers and longtime residents. For example, do you know the answer to the ceramic statue question?

# Three teachers — three houses

Karla recalled her experiences at Sunnybrae School, especially when she interacted with her colleague and friend Jean. "We did reverse mainstreaming into my room with a weekly music program. She always graciously included my class into any outings or events her class took part in," she said. Karla also recalled her interaction with Lee Bernstein. "Lee and I would chat before class started. Her room was adjacent to mine. She was a wonderful resource for materials and art projects."

Ventura County Fire Captain (retired) Steve Lasenby told Villagers at the January Board meeting that in a major county-wide emergency, residents must be prepared to protect themselves. He said, "During a major event, if anyone is going to take care of you, it must be you. It is likely that no one will be able to come in from outside."

Professional responders such as firefighters, paramedics, and law enforcement officers cannot be everywhere. Speaking about precaution for any major emergency but specifically about the possible El Nino storms, he stressed that personal preparation before a crisis is crucial. "In Camarillo, there are 6 fire engines for more than 24,000 homes," Capt. Lasenby told residents. "Only one paramedic for every 3750 people."

INSIDE LEISURE VILLAGE

As I approached the unit of Jussara and Nelson Penna in Village 35, I thought I caught the whiff of freshly brewed coffee and the smell of some unknown pastry, and when Jussara Penna opened the door, I realized my nose was still pretty good after all these years. With a pleasant smile, beautifully accented English and a warm heart, she shared a Brazilian coffee with me and her version of Creamy Cornmeal Cake (Bolo de Fubá Cremoso)... a cake she remembers her mother cooking for her. We talked for an hour about Jussara's childhood food memories and what she loved to cook and eat.

She pulled out some old recipes of a few dishes she wanted to show me: Feijoada ( fay-shwada), which is the National dish of Brazil made with beans, simmered meats and spices and served with rice; and a different cake, Bolo de banana rapido de liquidificador which I guessed to be a quick banana cake....wrong! Liquificador is a blender. My Portuguese is not so good. Oh well, it never hurts to try.

Anyway, as I glanced at the rest of the recipes, I noticed that they were all in Portuguese so any chance of me understanding them without Jussara's interpretation was pretty nonexistent; all the better, as I received her explanations with patience and understanding.

Brazilian cuisine has European, African and Amer-Indian influences. Since the country's mix of native and immigrant populations is so huge, the cuisine varies greatly by region. I think most of us think Brazilian cooking is all Churrasco style, i.e. Portuguese/Brazilian BBQ with never ending portions of grilled meats carved tableside, but many Portuguese dishes are much more intricate.

As Jussara and I were chatting, I asked her what you would likely be served as a beverage before dinner if you were dining in some Sao Paulo restaurant. About this time, Jusarra's significant other, Nelson,

wandered in and introduced himself and chimed in with "Caipirinha" (Don't ask me how to pronounce it.) It is Brazil's national cocktail, made with cachaça (don't ask me how to pronounce that either), which is made from sugar cane. "Wanna try some" he asked rather excitedly. Now I'm of the old school, i.e. when you are a guest in someone's home and they offer you a beverage that they seem excited for you to taste, you don't turn them down, even if it is 11 a.m. on a Saturday morning. By 11:15 a.m., it was much easier to pronounce that Portuguese liquor... Ka sha -sa. Try it Ka-sha-sa. See! You can do it. Jussara and I agreed to get together later so she could show me how to make Bolo de Fubá Cremoso.

### Bolo de Fuba Cremoso

INGREDIENTS

4 eggs 4 cups milk

2 tablespoons soft butter

1 package regular size cream cheese, soft

4 tablespoon Parmesan cheese

1 1/2 cups very fine cornmeal

1 teaspoon salt

2 tablespoons flour

3 cups sugar


1 tablespoons baking powder

Preheat the oven to 325 degrees.

Place the all of the ingredients in a blender, and blend until smooth. Pour batter into a 9-inch greased and floured square cake pan, a 9x13 inch cake pan (corn bread will be less thick), or an angel food cake pan or ring pan. Bake for 40-50 minutes (slightly less if using a 9x13 inch pan) or until cake is browned on top and does not jiggle when cake pan is moved. A toothpick inserted into the cake will not necessarily come out dry, because there is a creamy, soufflé-like layer that should form. But if the toothpick comes out with liquid batter on it, then cake is not done. Remove cake from oven and let cool for 5-10 minutes before cutting into slices. Top with powder sugar if desired. Serve

A wall of concrete blocks was installed along the eastern perimeter of Leisure Village last month, a safety measure from Ventura County against possible flooding from El Nino storms this winter. Built by the County's Watershed Protection District, the ribbon of heavy gray rectangles parallels the Conejo Creek to redirect any storm run-off from spilling into the Village. That wall begins at the end of Adolfo Road and will snake along the outside of LV's fence all the way Santa Rosa Road.

"The goal is to keep flood water away from your homes and land," says Roger Boross, Superintendent of the County's Zone 3 Watershed Protection District. His department has laid hundreds of concrete blocks – that are 2' x 2'. x 6' and weigh 3,300 pounds each. The blocks are locked together and will stretch from behind Village 20 to Village 42. This project originated from the County; it was not requested by Leisure Village. Mr. Boross adds that he hopes such flood protection will never be needed.



# Mushy Green-Looking Burnt Eggplant

That my mother used to make

INGREDIENTS

1 eggplant
1/2 small onion, finely minced
1-2 TBSP fresh lemon juice
1/5 cup mild extra virgin olive oil
Sea salt, to taste
Freshly ground black pepper, to taste
Fresh parsley, to serve

DIRECTIONS

Poke the eggplant with a fork several times, place on a flat pan and put in broiler (since our stoves are all electric we can't put it directly on the coils)) until the peel gets slightly burned and the flesh is soft. You'll have to watch it carefully and turn it frequently.

Temperature and time differs according to the size of the eggplant. This is what gives the eggplant dish it's distinctive flavor. Again, it's very important to turn the eggplant on all sides to ensure even cooking and, as previously mentioned, to poke it with a fork before cooking it, to let the steam out.

Once it's done, place it in a bowl and leave it covered for 10 to 15 minutes. 'Steaming' it like this will help to peel it more easily. Once peeled, chop it finely, put it in a bowl and, using a wooden spoon, mix it with the onion, lemon juice, salt and pepper. Add olive oil a bit at a time, mixing continuously till it looks right. Enjoy on crackers or crusty french bread.

# Seminar will focus on balance issues for seniors

The statistic is startling: One out of three people over 65 will fall this year. That fact underscores the relevance of the upcoming program, "Cruising to Balance Island." The unique event will focus on how to assess and deal with balance problems and is offered for Villagers as well as for adult children and caregivers. It will be held in Leisure Village on Thursday, Feb. 25 from 5:30 to 7 p.m. in the AR.

The seminar is sponsored by Camarillo Healthcare District and has grown

from the successful balance classes that have been held in the Village over recent months. "There is a lot of conversation about balance – regaining it and maintaining it, -" said Blair Craddock, a program specialist for CHD. "This event is a perfect match for residents and those who care about them, guiding them with upto-date information, balance evaluations, and sometimes suggestions about medical attention."

Four six-week balance classes have al-

ready been held in the Village. LV Board Member Chuck Kiskaden first proposed them in 2015. "They have been more than I hoped; all filled by people who really enjoyed them and learned from them," he reported. "The value was obvious, and that's why we created this special seminar."

The evening will be combination of demonstrations, lectures, raffles, and food. "We want it to be fun as well as valuable," added Craddock. A physical therapist will be on hand to offer balance assessments,

on a first come, first served basis. And a balance machine that takes a 'snapshot' of a person's balance will provide a simple readout that can be used to suggest a follow-up plan ranging from making an appointment with your doctor or physical therapy or a good walk daily.

The seminar is free to residents; a signup sheet is in the Recreation Office.


# Men's Golf Club


