




### ALMA MATER

Congratulations to the Class of 1963 for stimulating and developing our first Yearbook! Inscribed in these pages are the scenes and stories of the fourth year of the existence of our College, plus a few from previous years. They will furnish all of us a record of our pioneering days in temporary quarters.

Established by the Legislature in 1957, the College first opened its doors in September, 1959. In the years since that date, the Alameda County State College has had a remarkable growth, and developed a firm foundation for the future. In April of 1961, the College was accredited for its liberal arts degrees by the Western College Association and for its credentials program by the California State Department of Education. Thus, our first baccalaureate degrees, awarded in June, 1961, were earned from a fully accredited college, and our active Alumni Association was started the following fall. As Student Body President of Alameda State College for the year 1962-63, I have been given a rare opportunity to serve in a new and growing college. Owing to the size


