#### **Auto Registration Sheduled For 83 Decals**

All L.V. residents must reregister 'their vehicles and have the 1983 decal affixed during the first week of Au-

From Monday, August 2nd, through Friday, August 6th, directly in front of the Recreation Center, from 9:00 A.M. to 5:30 P.M., Security personnel will register vehicles. Owners must bring their California Registration Slip. Signs will be posted to facilitate the procedure. On Saturday, August 7th, the Recreational Vehicle Park will be used.

All the following types of vehicles must be registered: automobiles, pickup trucks, commercial vehicles, mopeds, motorcycles, boats, boat trailers, recreational vehicles, trailer coaches, and utility trailers.

Please remember the rules regarding the issuance of de-

1. Only two decals issued per home (third and fourth vehicles must have a six months pass);

2. Renters and lessees are NOT issued a decal. They will be given a six months pass;

3. Owners who do not live in the Village do not receive decals; they are also issued a six months pass;

4. Owners who drive leased or company owned vehicles will receive the new "Resident" pass, with the '83 decal affixed, allowing them to enter the "Resident" gate.

Security strictly enforces these rules, with no variances, changes, or special privileges.

If you are away from the Village during the registration period, call Lt. Bard when you return for an appointment to receive your new decals. Remember: Take your California Registration Slip!



#### Year of Education — Year of Achievement

If you did not attend the annual meeting of the Association on June 23rd, you missed participating in a standing ovation to the two retiring Board members, Gerri Kikendall and Tom O'Brien.

It was a heart-warming occasion, because the assembled residents had an opportunity to express their thanks to these two Directors, who have given so much of their time and effort to make LVA "one of the finest homeowners associations in this land."

President Kikendall reminded us that, at the beginning of her term of office, the Board found itself without a General Manager. It also had to find a new Director of Education and Recreation, as well as a new Executive Secretary. For three months, the Directors managed the Village, each one assuming the responsibility of a department, giving unselfishly of his time and energy. This was a full time job.

It is worth noting the accomplishments of the Board under the Kikendall leadership during the past year:

1) A contract was signed with the City of Camarillo providing weekly six-day bus service, saving the Association many thousands of dollars.

2) Negotiations with Leisure Technology were completed to assume ownership of the maintenance building. The building was remodeled and it is now the LVA administration building, giving employees much better working conditions, at the same time gaining much-needed space in the recreation building.

3) The sidewalks have been resurfaced.

4) "With the help of our Finance Committee and many dedicated volunteers," reported President Kikendall, "we completed an inventory of our property and parts. In the future we will have a much tighter control over parts and materials. A material control clerk has been hired to see that this is accomplished."

5) Further, "The Board reached an agreement with the Bank of A. Levy to pick up and process the monthly assessment payments and have a complete printout available by the 12th of the month. This has resulted in a considerable saving of time and money."

6) There are 3,551 people living in Leisure Village in 1,-998 homes. There are 100 employees, and the LVA budget is close to \$3 million. LVA has been kept financially sound, while the increase in homeowner dues was held to 5-1/2 percent.

Gerri Kikendall expressed her "profound thanks" to "our regular committees, our ad hoc committees, and our always willing volunteers...Without your help and consistent support the Village would not be the beautiful place it is. Our clubs and organized groups have outdone themselves this year, with their generous donations of their time, talent, and money, to improve our facilities and grounds."

ILV believes that the work of the committees is so important to the ongoing success of LVA that we are devoting a substantial amount of space in this issue to summarizing the committees' annual reports.

In addition, we are printing an Honor Roll of committee members, each of whom deserves recognition by all residents.

# **Annual Report of Village Committees**

By Harry Becker

Importance of the work of the voluntary comittees serving Leisure Village residents was stressed by retiring Association President Geraldine Kikendall at the Association's ninth annual meeting on June 23rd.

Highlights of the meeting were carried in the July 4th issue of THE VOICE. To supplement the VOICE'S report, ILV is pleased to present a summary of the work of each committee, as reported to the assembled Association members by the committee chair-

#### Architectural - Ferd Franz:

Of 340 applications for construction work, 310 were approved, and approximately 203 projects were reported completed. Of the applications received, 103 were for solar heating, 65 for skylights, 34 for patio enclosures, 55 for patio covers, and the balance for miscellaneous projects.

#### **Building and Grounds Com**mittee - Bill Rasmussen:

This committee functioned through three subcommittees:

- (1) The Green Area Committee inspected all green areas monthly, reporting any problems to the Manager of LVA.
- (2) The Landscape Permit Committee reviewed 460 requests for landscape changes around residences, disapproving 65 wholly or partially, in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Village.
- (3) The Golf Committee inspected the golf course upkeep, conferring with the Golf Club officers and subsequently presenting recommendations to the parent committee for processing.

#### **Education and Recreation** Committee - Art Wilson:

A detailed survey of current utilization of recreational rooms and other facilities was prepared in graphic form for the use and guidance of the Board of Directors and the Recreation Department.

The Committee recommended the approval of several new clubs, including the Happy Hoofers, Ceramic Club, Stage

Committee, Woodcarving Group, and Weight Control Group.

The Committee also reviewed many areas within its scope, recommending to the Board those with merit; for example, a change in the rules and regulations for the issuance of kitchen keys, a special bulletin board to be created to notify residents of activities in and around Ventura County, a change in admission charge for the dance workshop, and an analysis of the recreation budget for the 1982-83 fiscal year.

The Travel Committee, a subcommittee of the Education and Recreation Committee, was commended for its members' dedication and expertise in conducting many tours, both local one-day trips and more extensive journeys.

#### Finance Comm - Ed Salz er:

A measure of the wide-ranging work of this committee is found in the fact that it functioned through no less than 19 subcommittees! Here are a few of its many accomplish-

The bank now picks up our 2,000 monthly fee checks and supplies us with a monthly report at no additional cost.

A study and recommendation on Insurance resulted in a savings of over \$9,000.00.

Association personal property was inventoried, tagged and recorded for the first time. Our improved records now show the full value of our as-

Reserve requirements were studied and a detailed report submitted to the Board.

Special Events were audited each quarter.

Invoices and Payments were audited twice a month.

The Preliminary Budget was studied, and committee recommendations helped keep the amount of increase of the monthly fee to a minimum.

Most Association funds are now invested in Jumbo Certificates, increasing earnings.

A better defined Chart of Accounts was recommended and is now in use.

Resident Services supplies

were inventoried and an Inventory Control System established.

The Committee is now working with the Bank of A. Levy on the possibility of the bank's doing the Association payroll and all reports connected therewith.


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
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#### **Variety Guild**

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

#### WEEKLY HEALTH TIP

#### TAKE "AS NEEDED"

A common abbreviation used in prescription writing is PRN. These three letters are from the Latin words PRO RE NATA which are loosely translated ''as needed'', ''if needed'', or ''when needed''. The directions on a medication may read ''take two tablets every four hours PRN pain''. PRN directions give the user some discretion in determining whether or not medicine is taken.

Why would a prescriber direct the patient to take medicine in this manner? There could be several reasons ... the most common being that the symptom or problem is expected to disappear with time or from time to time. Examples of such problems include itching, diarrhea, pain, sleeplessness, constipation, fever, and nausea.

For many health problems, medicines must be taken on a routine basis...day after day, month after month. Chronic diseases such as high blood pressure, for example, are not controlled with PRN use of medicines: When a medicine calls for "as needed" use, there is a responsibility to take that medicine ONLY when needed.

surements of everything, reducing feet to inches and dividing by twelve. She was well into the construction of several fine little pieces when in September she suffered a heart attack.

Today Esther feels that her longing to see the project completed can be at least partly credited with helping her in her

Built of plywood, the house is a two-story oblong, with a one-story den attached. The front of the house is enhanced by a window garden on each side of the entry. Shutters on the windows are made of African zebra wood, and the roof is covered with 2,200 hand-cut redwood shingles. A special paint gives the house a stuccolike finish.

Inside, the den is panelled in African sapele wood veneer. Two fireplaces are made of concrete paste and tiny rocks. Planked floors are laid piece by piece, and carpeting is house carpet, shaved with a razor! Note the books on the bookcase and guess their source.

Note the many light fixtures, and know that were you a Lilliputian, you could climb the ladder to the attic and see the transformer that is reducing current along concealed wires to accommodate the tiny 12 v. bulbs.

With few exceptions, all furnishings are "made from scratch" and are of original design. A neighbor's piano was measured, sketched to size and used as a pattern. Oak, walnut, bass and exotic veneers were used throughout, and all this, plus nearly all upholstery was Esther's work.

The rugs in the den are handmade, as are all the curtains, drapery and bedspreads. A cocktail glass makes a fine base for an occasional table, and the doors on the kitchen equipment open on hinges.

Many of the countless minute articles in the house are contributions by family and friends, from pots and pans to the exquisite Chinese figure on the coffee table, to the companionable poodle and kitten on the kitchen floor.

It takes a long time to "walk" through the house and see everything. But it is a delight!


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

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#### **Gem and Mineral Club**

Field Trip Chairman Wayne Wisehart led the Gem and Mineral Club on the July field trip to ancient fossil beds near Santa Paula. Several weeks earlier, Wayne and Dorothy, with Paul and Dolores Lindsey, had investigated this site and another near Simi Valley. The Simi Valley beds were more interesting, as they produced "sand dollars", some nearly four inches in diameter, and which, according to Wayne, were probably Upper Pliocene Age, about 13 million years old. This site involved hiking a good distance from the road as well as a stiff climb up the hill to the beds, so it was considered that this site would be a little too much for our members at this time. The Santa Paula site was more easily accessible and gave up Turritellas (a form of snail). Also reported from this site were sea urchins and crabs. These fossil beds, according to Wayne, are Middle Eocene Age, or approximately 58 million years old.

While the field trips are for members only, the next club meeting will be Wednesday, July 28, and visitors are always welcome.



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



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#### **Current Issues Forum**

Dr. Paul Hanson, professor of history at Cal-Lutheran College, was the featured speaker at the June 25th Current Issues Forum meeting in the Assembly Room. He spoke before a large audience on the situation in the Mid-East today with particular emphasis on Israel's incursion into Lebanon and the possible consequences of this move.

In Dr. Hanson's view there can not be a military resolution of the Palestinian problem in the long run.

If the P.L.O. is no longer able to operate as a military force, it will revert to its former practice of pure terrorism and continue to give Israel no end of trouble. In that event Israel will remain a garrison state indefinitely.

The one solution, Dr. Hanson suggested, is that Israel reach out to the Palestinians on the West Bank and give to them a real measure of autonomy as set forth in the Camp David accords. Israel can safely do this now since her borders have been secured and her military power is supreme in the region. But Dr. Hanson doubted that Israel would do so. He also doubted that Lebanon would be able to form a viable central government

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
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
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#### Reports

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stalled a slotted "V" drain and enlarged the catch basins at the intersection of Oak Canyon and Santa Rosa Roads. This improvement should alleviate problems such as those that occurred on January 29,1981. Also, the City initiated studies on how to improve the entrance to the "F" Canyon Drain north of Santa Rosa and west of Oak Canyon Roads.

Leisure Technology completed the storm drain installations at the northeast end of the Village. The subdivider at the northeast corner of Santa Rosa Road and Upland Road has installed a major part of the drainage pipe required to collect drainage water along Upland Road and discharge it into the Upland Drain along the northeast side of Leisure Village. This system will not operate effectively until curbs and gutters are installed along Upland Road and the street is

The Ventura County Flood Control District accepted responsbility for maintenance of Conejo Creek from the east edge of Village 38 to the Upland Drain and for the Upland Drain from Conejo Creek to Santa Rosa Road.

Pardee was granted an extension of time to pave the "A" Channel (west of Villages 16 and 18) between Adolfo Road and Conejo Creek.

Caltrans continued its studies to determine the design of the new bridges for the Ventura Freeway over Conejo Creek and Calleguas Creek to accommodate a 100-year flood under conditions of ultimate development.

On recommendation of the Committee, Leisure Village Association requested the City of Camarillo to accept into the City storm drain system those drains installed by Leisure Technology pursuant to City requirements and subject to City bonds and inspection. The drains are essentially the same as those which the City would have required had the Village not been a Planned Unit Development. At 14 points, drainage

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
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is picked up along Santa Rosa Road arising on and above Santa Rosa Road, much of it in City storm drains. The request was based on the fact that City revenues, derived in part from the people living in Leisure Village, are used to fund maintenance of the City drainage system, and equity requires that the same service be provided Village homeowners.

### Information Comm New Residents - Edna McCormick:


During the past year the Committee visited 124 homes, including 54 new homes, 28 resales, and 42 leased properties. To assist new residents in adjusting to a new way of life in Leisure Village, Committee members (1) explained how to request solutions to construction problems, (2) explained the use of the Security Department for emergencies, (3) reminded the new residents to familiarize themselves with the C.C.&R's and the Association Rules and Regulations, (4) emphasized the importance of reading the VOICE, (5) explained the relationship existing between Leisure Technology Corporation and Leisure Village Association, (6) described the government of Leisure Village, and (7) encouraged attendance by new residents at Association Board and Committee meetings.

Committee members host the monthly Meet Your Neighbor get-together open to all residents and usually addressed by a Board Member and the General Manager.

### Community Relations Committee - Jack Fosdick:

The committee monitored local and state issues by attending meetings of the City Council, City Planning Commission, and Ventura County Board of Supervisors. These issues included (1) expansion of Camarillo airport, (2) rock quarry discussions, (3) re-structuring of Camarillo State Hospital, (4) emergency medical and paramedic costs and procedures, (5) Caltrans expansion

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of Highway 101, and (6) expansion of Pleasant Valley Hospital and the Ombudsman program.

Information on these matters was given Village residents at the monthly Board meetings attended by many homeowners.

A subcommittee on Medical Emergency Care reported on Ventura County Emergency Care meetings.

The Committee sponsored

Village political forums of candidates for school board, 36th Assembly District, County Clerk-Recorder, and municipal and superior courts, as well as a forum dealing with a Southern California Edison rate in-

The Committee participated on the Camarillo Grove County Park Structural Make-up Committee of the Board of Supervisors.

The Committee also co-sponsored "Open House Day" for the new fire station (52).

#### Security And Safety Committee - Elmer F. Eymann:

During the period August 3rd to 8th, 1981, the Committee, with the cooperation of resident volunteers and the Security and Safety Department, registered over 2,500 vehicles.

On the Committee's recommendation, a new rapid entry file system was acquired to improve efficiency at the Main Gate and to speed up the reregistration of vehicles.

A subcommittee studied the employment practices of the Security and Safety Department and made recommendations that resulted in salary adjustments and other changes in employment practices, thereby improving efficiency.

Another subcommittee made specific recommendations affecting after-dark patrols and perimeter security, including projects complete with cost analysis. The plans and recommendations are on file with the Board.

The Board was also presented with a plan to deter repeat traffic offenders.

Throughout the year the members of the Committee devoted their efforts to develop a community awareness of safety in everyday living. Safety material was presented in the VOICE, INSIDE LEISURE VIL-LAGE, on Channel 12, and in posters.

Through the cooperation of over 200 residents, many skilled in emergency-related professions, a Leisure Village **Emergency Services Organiza**tion is nearly in place, with only two of ten units to be completed. The emergency plan will be presented to the incoming Board for approval.


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**ALL HART**
