

Fresno Bee Editorial Condemns Turkish Denial Of Genocide

FRESNO — The following editorial condemning the Turkish government's denial of Armenian Genocide appeared in the Aug. 15 issue of *The Fresno Bee*, accompanied by a cartoon drawing of the bloody Turks.

* * *

Once again, the Turkish government, in combination with the Reagan administration, has succeeded in heading off an effort to have Congress pass a resolution declaring April 24 as a national day of remembrance for the 1.5 million Armenians who died in a government-conducted massacre in the Ottoman Empire beginning in 1915.

The two unholy allies persuaded enough members of the House of Representatives to defeat a proposed House rule to allow four hours of debate on the resolution, introduced by Rep. Richard Lehman, D-Sanger. For the time being, the resolution is stalled. It was a sorry development.

There is no doubt that the Ottoman Turks conducted a premeditated massacre of Armenian men, women and children. To deny that, as the Turkish government does, is to deny history.

The Turks warn that the adoption of a resolution honoring the victims of the massacre would strain relations between Turkey and the United States, and the

U.S. government doesn't want to antagonize a valued military ally like Turkey.

Michael Arlen, an American writer of Armenian descent, says the Turkish denial of the killings creates "a rage trapped underground" for Armenians. One result is terrorism against Turkish diplomats.

For the Turks, their lack of repentance causes other problems. They appear to be indifferent to what has been called the first genocide of this century. This causes anti-Turkish sentiment throughout the world. And by fighting the proposed resolution, they call more attention to it.

The U.S. Government, instead of playing up to the Turks, should encourage them to defuse the situation with a statement of regret. After all, a resolution honoring victims of the Armenian tragedy would not seem so impossible.
