

PRESS CREDENTIALS: Requests should be made as far in advance as possible. When time permits, credentials will be mailed. If not, press will call is located in the main ticket booth behind third base.

PHOTO CREDENTIALS: Will be issued on a per game basis only and must be worn in plain sight at all times.

PRESS ROW: Is located in the top row of the central section of grand-stands located directly behind home plate. It is an "open air" facility -- cooled, heated and ventilated by Mother Nature. Seating at the working counter is limited to approximately seven persons.

TELEPHONES: The press row number is (714) 773-2400. A second line or use of phones in the sports information office is available after games.

RADIO: Arrangements for broadcasts should be made at least one week in advance. One telephone line is available upon request at a fee of \$15 to visiting broadcasters.

ELECTRICAL POWER: Is limited in press row. Special needs should be requested well in advance.

PARKING: Is FREE on Friday nights (after 6 p.m.) and all day Saturday and Sunday in Lot A, accessible from either State College Boulevard or Yorba Linda Boulevard. For other games, a fee of 75 cents (three quarters) is required upon entry for a daily permit.

Cal State Fullerton Campus

California State University, Fullerton is a broadly based liberal arts institution that also offers many professional studies such as business administration, education, engineering and nursing.

Classes were offered for the first time in 1959 and the first commencement — for five students —

took place in 1960.

The university's 23,500 students come primarily from Southern California with many from other states and other nations. Most students commute each day to and from classes; many come to classes only in the evening.

Drawn from throughout the world, the 750-member faculty is noted for its commitment to effective teach-

ing and scholarly activity. Research is actively pursued, typically with students involved.

The university enjoys full accreditation for its overall program. In addition, national recognition has been accorded to programs in art, athletic training, business, chemistry, communications, education, engineering, music, nursing, public administration, speech and hearing, and theater. All told there are 85 degree programs — 41 of them at the graduate level plus several credential programs and five certificate programs.

Reinforcing classroom instruction is an internship and cooperative education program that allows students

to gain on-the-job experience while continuing their regular studies.

Another amenity is the extended education program. It provides classes, workshops, conferences and study tours without the formalities of regular admission to the university.

Still another strong point is the university's cultural events program. It includes a series that brings nationally-known professional artists to the campus for residencies as well as public performances and the Cabaret Repertory Theater Company, which performs regularly in Brea.

An extensive recreation program aimed chiefly at students but also open to community members is another highlight, as is the network of community support groups. Another is Continuing Learning Experi-

ence, which has spearheaded the fund-raising campaign to build a gerontology center on campus.

Further examples of community outreach are joint ventures with the City of Fullerton. One resulted in the Fullerton Arboretum, which opened on campus in 1979. Another produced lighting for the baseball field and adjoining soccer fields, while a third yielded two lighted softball fields.

To reinforce the university's commitment to high academic standards and community services, Cal State has embarked on a comprehensive fund-raising campaign. Its purpose is to raise the necessary non-state funding to make a very good university a great university.

ADMINISTRATION



Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb, President

Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb was appointed the third president of Cal State Fullerton on July 8, 1981. Her selection was the culmination of a nationwide search begun in November, 1980 to replace Dr. L. Donald Shields, who had resigned after a ten-year term to accept the presidency of Southern Methodist University.

Dr. Cobb had served as Dean of Douglass College at Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey, since 1976. There she also held the rank of Professor of Biological Sciences. Prior to her Douglass appointment, she was Dean of Connecticut College and Professor of Zoology for seven years. Previously, she was Professor of Biology at Sarah Lawrence College in New York.

Born in January, 1924, Dr. Cobb is known for her work in cell physiology, her promotion of the advancement of women in scientific fields and her activities on behalf of minorities. She is the first black woman to head a major public university on the west coast.

Cobb earned her bachelor's degree in 1944 from Talladega College in Alabama and her M.S. and Ph.D. in cell physiology from New York University in 1947 and 1950, respectively. She is the mother of a son, Jonathan, who is a graduate of the Cornell University Medical School.

HEAD COACH AUGIE GARRIDO

Two national championships, four regional titles and 11 conference crowns only begin to tell the success story of Augie Garrido's 13 seasons as baseball coach at Cal State Fullerton.

While serving with equal professionalism his student-athletes, his institution and his sport, Garrido has developed a



nationally prominent program for a University which just celebrated its 25th anniversary. He has sent scores of players into the professional ranks while bringing Cal State Fullerton its first men's Division I national championships and serving as an articulate and respected voice in the promotion of collegiate and amateur baseball.

Garrido, 45, has a 587-254-6 (.698) record at Fullerton and a career mark of 697-330-7 (.679) in 17 seasons. He is No. 10 among active Division I coaches in victories and is in the top 30 in winning percentage. Three times (1975, 1979 & 1984) he has been selected National Coach of the Year.

The 1985 season saw Garrido's Titans miss the NCAA Division I playoffs for the first time ever and a streak of 11 consecutive conference championships was snapped. But the Titans had their 12th winning season in a row (36-32-1) and did it playing easily the most demanding schedule in the country. Fullerton finished in first place in the southern division of the Pacific Coast Athletic Association (21-9) but lost the league championship series at Fresno State.

A native of the San Francisco Bay town of Vallejo, Garrido attended Fresno State University (1961) and was an all-conference performer for coach Pete Beiden. He signed with the Cleveland Indians and played six years in their minor league system before retiring in 1966 to accept a coaching position at Sierra High School in Tollhouse, California.

Garrido moved up to the collegiate level in 1969 as head coach at San Francisco State (25-14) and then spent three seasons at Cal Poly San Luis Obispo (85-62-1), where he had earned a master's degree in 1968.

Situated in the heart of baseball-rich southern California, Fullerton had enjoyed very limited success in the infant years of its intercollegiate baseball program. But that began to change in 1973 upon Garrido's arrival. After one losing season (19-33-1), Garrido produced nothing but winners. And, in 1975, the Titans asserted their new prowess by winning the regional tournament at USC and advancing to the College World Series in Omaha in

their first season of Div. I play.


It took until 1979 for a repeat Fullerton performance in the CWS, but the Titans didn't waste the second opportunity by beating Arkansas, 2-1, for the title. They repeated in 1984, beating Texas, 3-1, in the champion-ship game.

Garrido's baseball interests carry beyond the college schedule. His 1979 team took a goodwill mission to Taiwan, he managed in the Alaska summer leagues, he operates a successful instructional camp for youth and now is involved in a Baseball Academy and Grand Slam training facility in Anaheim.

Garrido is married (Tere) and lives in Placentia.

LARRY CORRIGAN

Larry Corrigan boasts a broad and successful baseball background as he begins his second year as Titans' pitching coach.

Corrigan, 34, spent seven seasons in professional baseball with the Los Angeles Dodgers and Minnesota Twins before returning to his alma mater, lowa State. He served three years as an assistant for the Cyclones before becoming head coach in 1982. He compiled a three-year mark of 82-75.

Corrigan was a pitcher and catcher for four years at Iowa State and won numerous honors. He was the team's leading hitter all four years and was selected Most Valuable Player and team

captain three times (1970, 1971 and 1972). He twice won All-Big Eight honors and set a conference record for pitching victories in a season. He was selected to both The Sporting News and Coaches Association All-American teams. He led the Cyclones to the Big Eight championship in 1970 and 1971.

Corrigan climbed as high as Triple-A in the minor leagues and signed a major league contract with the Dodgers in 1975. His best season saw him compile a 5-2 mark for Toledo of the International League.

The Mendota, Illinois native is married to the former Lorie Hasse.



BO HUGHES

Bo Hughes begins his third year at Fullerton as third base coach while working with the infielders and assisting head coach Augie Garrido with the offense.

Hughes, 30, is a 1978 graduate of LaVerne University where he was a four-year letterman and played on two NAIA College World Series teams. A two-time all-conference selection, he was drafted by the Minnesota Twins in June of 1974 out of Notre Dame High School in Sherman Oaks, where he won All-CIF honors.

Hughes was an assistant under Ben Hines at LaVerne for two years before taking the head job at Hutchinson Community College in Kansas. In three years he compiled a 40-44 record with his 1983 team winning the conference championship. He also coaches summer ball for the Hutchinson Broncs (1979-81) as well as serving as the public relations director and baseball camps director.

Hughes, who has worked with four National Coaches of the Year, is single and lives in Anaheim.



RICK VANDERHOOK

Rick Vanderhook begins his second season as a full-time graduate assistant working with the pitchers and catchers as a bullpen coach for the Titans.

Vanderhook, 24, came to Fullerton in 1983 after completing his playing career at Cerritos College. He was team captain for the Falcons in 1982 when he batted .350.

Vanderhook prepped at Lakewood High School under coach John Herbold,

now the head coach at Cal State Los Angeles. He was team captain as a senior when he batted .320 with two home runs and 19 runs batted in. He struck out only once in 80 plate appearances while playing first base and catching.

Vanderhook is finishing his degree at Cal State Fullerton and hopes to graduate in the coming year. He is single and lives in Lakewood.

1986 SEASON PREVIEW

The 1986 Cal State Fullerton baseball team is loaded with question marks and the man most curious about finding the answers is also excited about the mystery surrounding this edition of the Titans.

"I look at this team and get very excited while at the same time, I really don't know what we have," says coach Augie Garrido as he prepares for his 14th year at Fullerton. "This will have to be a team that grows as the season progresses. It will have to happen because we are not a physical team we don't have the returning stars or one outstanding player to build around. Everyone must join hands and pull together as a team. What is encouraging is that we have seen good work habits, a team attitude and commitment to one another so that it appears this team will give itself a chance to be a good one."

Collegiate Baseball News concurs, ranking Fullerton No. 10 in its annual pre-season poll.

The 1986 Titans don't bear the cross of the tag "defending national champions" that weighed so heavily on the 1985 team. Strings of 11 consecutive conference championships and 10 consecutive trips to the NCAA Division I playoffs were snapped when the Titans lost the Pacific Coast Athletic Association Championship Series at Fresno State. The Titans did win the southern division pennant with a 21-9 record but two losses at Fresno left the season record at 36-32-1, the worst at Fullerton since 1974 and insufficient to attract an at-large playoff bid despite the difficult schedule.

"There is no real trademark we can put on this year's team," says Garrido. "We are not outstanding in any single area. I think our strength defensively will be our pitching and experience behind the plate in John Eccles. Our main concern is our overall inexperience - we will have a totally different middle of the lineup and a new middle infield combination."

Garrido has 12 lettermen back from last year but nine junior college transfers, four major college transfers and three freshmen hold the key to the Titans' fate in 1986.

Expected to comprise the starting pitching rotation are lettermen Mike Belanger and Mike Harkey, Texas-El Paso transfer Jim Halley and freshman Paul Johnson. Arizona State transfer Gil Villanueva, Cerritos College transfer Dave Serrano and letterman Larry Casian are in line to serve as the frontline relief corps with letterman Dean Yamashita and Golden West College transfer Gary Buckels likely to fill the long relief role.

Belanger had the best record on the 1985 staff at 9-5 with a 4.47 earned run average The lefthander started 18 games and was a first-round (secondary phase) draft choice of the New York Yankees in June but chose to return for his senior season.

Sophomore Harkey could emerge as the ace, however. The 6-foot-5 righthander won his last three decisions of 1985 to finish at 3-4 with a team best ERA of 3.69. He then earned All-American honors during the summer when he posted a 10-0 mark for the Humboldt Crabs and was selected the Most Valuable Player of the playoffs in Wichita, Kansas.

Halley was an All-Western Athletic Conference performer for UTEP last year. A late-season arm injury reduced his season's record to 6-7 with a 5.23 ERA but he is healthy again and threw effectively during the Fall season.

The plan is to bring Johnson along slowly as he makes the jump to collegiate ball. The righthander was 33-12 in a four-year career at Redondo Union High School, which was the state championship team in 1985. Johnson was 14-3 with a 1.42 ERA to earn All-CIF honors and was the Bay League's Player of the Year. As a junior, he tossed back-to-back no-hitters.

Lefthander Villanueva was a three-year letterman at ASU. A pre-season All-American last year, he struggled to a 2-4 mark which produced a loss of confidence in himself and on the part of the ASU staff.

Serrano, a righthander, was 12-1 with a 2.40 ERA for Cerritos College's 1985 state JC championship team, which won the title game on Titan Field over College of the Canyons.

Casian, a lefthander, transferred to Fullerton last year from Oral Roberts but was bothered by arm problems and didn't pitch after April 17, finishing with an 0-3 mark. Yamashita, a righthander was 0-1 for the Titans in 1985 in long relief while Buckels was establishing Golden West College records in short relief for games and relief appearances while posting a 4-3 record with five saves.

Behind the plate, the Titans are counting on good health for letterman Eccles, who will be backed up by Mike Ham, the California JC all-state catcher for Mission College in Santa Clara last year. Eccles had shoulder problems early in 1985 and just when he returned to the lineup he suffered an off the field hand injury which kept him out of action down the stretch. Both Eccles and Ham are excellent receivers with extrabase power at the plate.

Despite the loss of three-time all-conference outfielder John Fishel, the Titans' outfield is an experienced group although lingering arm problems may hold back lettermen Jef Garcia and Keith Watkins. Garcia, a second-team All-PCAA performer in 1985 when he hit .404 in PCAA play and .333 overall, may be ready to throw in February. Watkins, a .307 hitter with home run potential, won't be ready that soon, however.

Tony Newkirk, who hit .367 in 30 at bats last year, is the centerfielder while letterman Al Stankiewicz (.277), coming off a good summer, is the rightfielder. College of Sequoias transfer Ken Garcia may get an early opportunity with Watkins and Jef (no relation) Garcia sidelined. Ken hit .396 with 10 home runs and 56 RBI last year.

On the infield, the Titans are looking for improvement at the corners to compensate for the inexperience up the middle where freshman Mark Razook and Cerritos JC transfer Tony Trevino must replace All-PCAA second team shortstop Shane Turner and All-American second baseman Jose Mota. Pat Garman, who hit .427 and .390 the past two seasons at College of Sequoias, will be the third baseman. At first base will be Dann Howitt, a converted outfielder from Michigan State who was the leading hitter at the National Baseball Congress World Series last summer for the champion Liberal, Kansas Bee-Jays. Razook is young but has all the tools. He hit .419 last year to earn All-CIF honors and was the South Hills High Athlete of the Year. Trevino played mostly in the outfield for Cerritos and hit .375.

In reserve, the Titans will have an exceptional glove man in former Orange Coast College captain Larry Cratsenberg and a strong hitter in Andy Nieto, who batted .337 last year and often served as the righthanded designated hitter. Young but promising Andy Mota, Jose's brother, was the "Rustler of the Year" at Golden West after hitting .340. Long-ball threats from both sides of the plate are present in lefty Paul Cameron, who hit .415 at Fresno City College, and letterman Bob Mellano.

Recent NCAA legislation has reduced the Titans' typically overwhelming schedule to merely imposing for 1986. Still on the slate is a trip to Texas to meet the No. 1ranked Longhorns as well as the annual series with Six-Pac rivals Arizona, Stanford, California, UCLA and USC. And then comes the rugged PCAA race.


"I think UC Santa Barbara established during the Fall the strength of its program along with Fresno State and UNLY," says Garrido. "The new format will be interest-

ing."

The divisional alignment of 1985 has been eliminated. Each team will play a three-game weekend series (no doubleheaders) against each of the other seven opponents with sites alternating on an annual basis. The first-place team earns the PCAA's automatic berth into the NCAA Regional playoff format while others must rely on at-large invitations.

"Our goal for 1986 is simply to play good team baseball," concluded Garrido. "We will have to grow as the season goes on to bring our inexperienced players together

as an experienced team."

THE HISTORY OF TITAN BASEBALL

From the early club days when a playing field was literally scratched out of an orange grove to a national championship captured before the entire country's eyes on live television, Titan baseball has provided Cal State Fullerton fans with a wide range of thrills and excitement over the past two decades.

Beryl Kempton and Warren Beck brought the program into the world, Bill Fulton nursed it into adolescence and then Augie Garrido guided it into maturity as Titan baseball developed into a national power.

Kempton was the University employee who graded the field out of the orange trees. Home plate sat near the old orchard residence, a brick structure now known as "Football House." The first-base line ran to the north and the third-base line paralleled Gymnasium Drive, heading west. A split rail and wire mesh screen served as the outfield barrier.

Beck, a member of the faculty, was the original coach. He fielded a "club" team which played local junior colleges and "pick-up" teams from neighboring universities in its maiden year.

In 1965, the program became a full-fledged intercollegiate sport with Bill Fulton serving as the head coach. He led them into play in the California Collegiate Athletic Association and set the groundwork for the success of the 1970s.

The catalyst was Garrido, who arrived from Cal Poly San Luis Obispo and began developing the new field now situated farther to the north.

After a rebuilding year in 1973, the Titans exploded onto the scene with a CCAA title in 1974 and then a Pacific Coast Athletic Association crown in 1975 as the Titans began competition at the top -- the Division I level. All the Titans did for openers was oust defending national champion USC from its own regional to gain a trip to the College World Series in Omaha. Fullerton quickly lost two games and went home but there would be another day in the Midwest.

There was a second PCAA title in 1976 before the formation of the Southern California Baseball Association in 1977. Fullerton won the 1977 title as it would win or share every championship contested in the loop comprised of former members of the PCAA and the West Coast Athletic Conference.

There was another SCBA title in 1978 and then the Titans struck the jackpot in 1979, parlaying an SCBA crown into a national championship. It wasn't easy. The Titans lost their opener of both the regional in Fresno and the College World Series before coming back through the losers' brackets to take the titles. The 2-1 victory over Arkansas in the CWS finale gave Fullerton its first Div. I men's NCAA national title.

Going on the road for regional play as usual, it took the eventual national champs to eliminate the SCBA champion Titans in 1980 (Arizona) and 1981 (Arizona State). But Fullerton avenged the latter defeat by handing ASU its first (and only) home regional tournament loss with a pair of dramatic victories to gain a return trip to Omaha in 1982.

The third time proved totally uncharming. Fullerton didn't even score in two games in Rosenblatt Stadium.

In 1983, the Titans needed their first "at-large" bid to gain the NCAA playoffs after losing a one-game playoff for the SCBA's automatic spot after tying UC Santa Barbara for the league championship. Another trip to Tempe was resolved in favor of the Sun Devils and Fullerton regrouped for 1984.

After a slow start, the Titans gained momentum that carried them all the way back to Omaha and a second national title. Again, the road to Nebraska was via Fresno, where Fullerton won a dramatic extra-inning contest with San Diego State to win the regional tournament.

The lineup of institutions that the Titans would conquer in Omaha read like a "Who's Who" of major college athletic powers -- Michigan, Miami, Arizona State, Oklahoma State and, finally

Texas. A nationwide TV (ESPN) audience would see the versatility of the Titans as they combined a daring slide, "little ball," timely singles, clutch extra-base hits and crafty pitching with solid defense in every game to capture the series.

John Fishel, who would set a CWS record for hits and win the Most Valuable Player Trophy, slid around the Michigan catcher to ignite a five-run eighth inning and give the Titans an opening 8-4 win over the Wolverines.

After a 6-4 loss to Texas sent them to the losers' bracket, the Titans fought back. They routed Miami, 13-5, with bunts and steals rattling the Hurricanes into four errors. They eliminated Arizona State as Jack Reinholtz and Eddie Delzer cooled the hot Devil bats and Kirk Bates delivered a bases-loaded hit. They outslugged Oklahoma State behind a Fishel home run, a bases-loaded Tom Thomas triple and a two-run double by Bob Caffrey to earn a winner-take-all shot at Texas.

Five-foot-seven, 133-pound Delzer got a rare starting call from Garrido against the Longhorns, the defending champions. A couple of infield hits in the first inning produced a run but that was it. Delzer pitched a near-perfect game until leg cramps forced him from the mound to open the eighth inning. Enter the NCAA's most prolific relief pitcher -- Scott Wright -- and he slammed the door on Texas once again for his 22nd save. Meanwhile, John Bryant stole a base to set up the tying run in the third inning and his triple was the key hit in a two-run fourth which proved the difference.

Defending the title proved too much for the 1985 Titans to handle.

The Titans did win the southern division of the realigned PCAA but their pitching came up short in a championship series in Fresno. For the first time since going into Division I in 1975, the Titans did not qualify for the NCAA playoffs.

A new scheduling format will be instigated for the second season of the reformed Pacific Coast Athletic Association in 1986.

The north-south division alignment will be scrapped with all eight teams playing 21 games each to determine the league champion outright. Teams will play a three-game weekend series with each opponent and the site will alternate on an annual basis. There are no scheduled doubleheaders.

Fullerton joined the PCAA when it moved into Division I competition in 1975. After two seasons, teams from the south of the PCAA and the WCAC were combined into the Southern California Baseball Association and the northern teams from those conferences formed the Northern California Baseball Association. The desire of the WCAC to field its own baseball league caused the return to the regular PCAA alignment after eight seasons.

The result is one of the most competitive baseball leagues in the nation. In 1983 and 1984, six teams from the current alignment gained the NCAA playoffs with Fresno State representing the NCBA both years and the SCBA being represented twice by Fullerton and once each by UC Santa Barbara (1983) and Nevada-Las Vegas (1984). Last year only PCAA champion Fresno State gained the playoffs.

TITANS IN THE MAJORS

Six products of the Cal State Fullerton baseball program have worked their way into the major leagues with many of the stars of recent teams waiting in the wings for their opportunity.

The first Titan to play in the major leagues was lefthanded pitcher Dan Boone, who broke in with the Angels and Padres after helping the Titans into the 1975 College World Series. He was soon followed by catcher Dan Whitmer at Toronto and California. The biggest name came next as Tim Wallach, the

1979 College Player of the Year, broke in with the Montreal Expos on his way to All-Star status as a third baseman for the National League last season.

More recent arrivals have been right-handed pitcher Jeff Robinson with the San Francisco Giants; outfielder Andre David, who hit a home run in his first at bat with the Minnesota Twins; and outfielder John Christensen, who spent most of 1985 with the New York Mets before being traded this winter to the Boston Red Sox.

RADIO BROADCASTS

Cal State Fullerton again is the only college program in Southern California to regularly air baseball games on a commercial radio station as John Rebenstorf returns for his fifth year of Titan baseball in 1986 on KWRM (1370 AM).

A 21-game schedule is contracted with possible post-season NCAA playoff games to be added. Rebenstorf, also the voice of Titan football and basketball, called every game of Fullerton's victory in the 1984 College World Series.


