

WELCOME TO CAL STATE FULLERTON

The Cal State Fullerton campus is located in the heart of Orange County, located within 40 miles of three major airports: Los Angeles International to the north, Ontario to the east, and Orange County/John Wayne to the south. The campus is located immediately adjacent to the Orange (57) Freeway, which is accessible from most major Southern California freeways.

The Titan Softball Complex is located south of Goodwin Field on the first base side of the diamond. Parking is available in lots "G" or "A" for \$5 on weekdays from 7 a.m. to 10:30 p.m. and Friday's until 5 p.m. Parking is free on weekends.

The main softball field is located at the top of the hill, past the baseball stadium with the secondary field beyond the right field fence of the main softball diamond.

FROM LOS ANGELES INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT (36.2 miles):

Take the 105 freeway east toward Norwalk (17 miles) ... merge onto the 605 south (2.4 miles) ... take the 91 east toward Riverside (13 miles)... take the 57 north ... exit Yorba Linda Blvd. (fourth exit on your right) ... turn left onto Yorba Linda Blvd. ... turn left at Associated Road (first light) ... turn right into Lot "G."

Alternate Route: From the 91 freeway, take the State College Blvd. exit ... turn left ... continue north on State College Blvd. until you reach Yorba Linda Blvd. ... turn right on Yorba Linda Blvd. ... turn right at Associated Road (first light) ... turn right into parking lot.

FROM ONTARIO INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT (28.2 miles):

Take the 10 freeway west (12 miles) ... merge onto the 57 freeway south (15 miles) ... exit Yorba Linda Blvd. ... turn right onto Yorba Linda Blvd. ... turn left at Associated Road (first light) ... turn right into Lot "G."

FROM JOHN WAYNE AIRPORT (17.8 miles):

Take the 55 freeway north (3.6 miles) ... merge onto Interstate 5 north towards Los Angeles (4.2 miles) ... take the 57 freeway north towards Pomona (6.7 miles) ... exit Yorba Linda Blvd. ... turn left onto Yorba Linda Blvd. ... turn left at Associated Road (first light) ... turn right into Lot "G."

Alternate Route: From the 57 freeway, exit Nutwood Ave. ... turn left ... turn right on State College Blvd. ... turn right on Yorba Linda Blvd. ... turn right at Associated Road (first light) ... turn right into parking lot "G."

ATHLETIC MEDIA RELATIONS OFFICE

The Cal State Fullerton Media Relations Office is located on the east side of Titan Gym between the racquetball courts and pool in offices 191G & 191E. Members of the staff include Associate Athletics Director Mel Franks (men's soccer, men's basketball, wrestling, fencing, and track & field), Assistant Media Relations Director Jason Spencer (women's soccer, women's basketball, women's gymnastics, softball, and women's tennis), and Assistant Media Relations Director Michael Greenlee (women's volleyball and baseball).

SOFTBALL INFORMATION

Information on Cal State Fullerton's softball program can be accessed via the Internet at www.Fullerton-Titans.com. The website contains news, results, statistics, schedule information, and weekly notes as well as links to audio webcasts and information on all of the university's 17 varsity athletic squads. Box scores and game recaps will be posted as soon as possible following the game.

MEDIA CREDENTIALS • INTERVIEW REQUESTS

Interviews with Cal State Fullerton softball coaches and student-athletes MUST be coordinated through Jason Spencer in the media relations office. Home phone numbers or email addresses of student-athletes will not be released under any circumstances. Players and coaches can be made available before or after practice depending on availability at a time beneficial to both the media member and student-athlete. No interviews will be granted the day of a game.

Credentials will be issued on a game-by-game basis only. Requests must be made either via fax, email, or phone at least 24 hours in advance of a weekday game or by 5 p.m. on Friday for a weekend contest. The media pass list will be kept at the ticket table at the main entrance to the Titan Softball Complex. Press seating is located in the press box located directly behind home plate on the main field.

PHONE LINES • INTERNET ACCESS

The press box on the main field is equipped with five phone lines and five high-speed data lines for use by visiting SID's and members of the media. Please contact Jason Spencer in the Sports Information Office as far in advance as possible to reserve a line for radio or internet broadcasts. During tournaments, additional phone and data lines may be available for use by SID's and media members at the adjacent Goodwin Field baseball press box.

PARKING GUIDELINES

Parking regulations are enforced from 7:30 a.m. to 10:30 p.m. on Monday-Thursday and from 7:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Friday. There is no charge for parking during the weekends. Daily permits are available from vending machines at the entrance to each parking lot for \$5 (bills and quarters accepted). Or, present your media credentials at the Information Booth located to on the northwest corner of Commonwealth and Nutwood Avenues during normal business hours to obtain a daily pass.



TITAN SOFTBALL COMPLEX

Fully remodeled prior to the 2001 season, the dual-diamond Titan Softball Complex stands as one of the top collegiate softball venues in the nation.

After spending the first five seasons at Lions Field located at Brea Blvd. and Lemon St., the Cal State Fullerton softball program moved into its new permanent home on campus in 1985 where it has remained ever since.

With the addition of the baseball stadium and the 10,000-seat multi-purpose Titan Stadium in 1992, the Titan Softball Complex also received a face lift.

Upgraded press facilities and expanded seating for up to 3,000 fans on portable bleachers were in the works as well as the addition of a message board to the already existing electronic scoreboard beyond the left field fence.

With the start of the 1995 season, the stadium underwent yet another facelift with the addition of concrete paving around both backstops for added fan comfort and safety as well as expanded batting cages and bullpens.

At the end of the 2000 season, the face of the complex was drastically changed as the main diamond was literally flipped on end to expand seating for nearby Goodwin Field and create more of a stadium atmosphere for softball competition.

The primary diamond features elevated grandstand seating with permanent box seats directly behind home plate. Chairback bleachers were added down both baselines to increase capacity at the main diamond to 1,000 fans.

A permanent expanded two-tiered press box was added, complete with full Internet accessibility for media members, as well as a beautifully landscaped grassy knoll that runs from the left field foul pole to right centerfield, making the area perfect for fans to enjoy the beautiful Southern California weather during day games.

The main field also features two complete bullpens with room for two pitchers to warm up simultaneously and sunken dugouts for both teams.



The second field at the Titan Softball complex also underwent some changes of its own prior to the 2005 season as the entire surface was levelled to create a safer playing surface for competitors. six-foot high chainlink fences were also erected in the outfield and down both the baselines, replacing the breakaway plastic fences, and create a more permanent feeling.

The secondary diamond matches the dimensions of the main field (190' down the lines, 220' to centerfield) with seating for up to 500 fans on chairback bleachers.

The main softball and baseball stadiums are joined by a structure between the two housing the Doubek VIP room and Wilson baseball clubhouse. Both programs received expanded locker room facilities and offices for the coaching staffs.

The current configuration encompasses two lighted and fenced softball fields that are utilized at their capacity duriing Cal State Fullerton's two premier spring softball tournaments: the Worth Invitational and the annual Judi Garman Classic — widely regarded by many to be the premier regular season tournament and standing second only to the Women's College World Series in Oklahoma City, Okla.

The fields are also used year-round by the City of Fullerton and other area organizations.

Returning to the bench for her seventh season at the helm of the Cal State Fullerton softball program, Head Coach Michelle Gromacki has continued the tradition of success that has built the Titans into one of the most prestigious programs in the

7th Season

Gromacki has devoted the past 11 seasons to the Titans' program after spending five years as an assistant under Hall of Fame Head Coach Judi Garman from 1995-99, helping Cal State Fullerton to a 184-129 (.588) overall record and a berth to the College World Series in 1995.

With Garman's retirement following the 1999 season, Gromacki stepped right in as head coach of her alma mater and the Titans never missed a beat.

Under her guidance, Gromacki's Titans staked their claim to four consecutive Big West Conference championships from 2000-03, bringing the program's total to seven league crowns overall - the most of any other school in the history of the conference.

After a two-year absence, Fullerton reached the NCAA Regionals in each of Gromacki's first four seasons from 2000-03, even earning a bid into the 2002 regional championship game for the first time since 1995 (the last Fullerton squad to reach the Women's College World Series) before falling to eventual national champion California, I-0.

Gromacki's teams have finished in the top 20 in the National Fastpitch Coaches Association's poll in four of her first six seasons, including top-10 finishes in 2002 (No. 9) and 2003 (No. 10). The Titans also finished ninth in the inaugural year of the ESPN.com/USA Softball coaches poll in 2003.

After posting the program's first losing season in 2004, Gromacki brought the Titans back to the national stage in 2005, guiding the Titans to a 30-21 overall record and a 14-7 mark in Big West play to finish third.

Thanks to a very difficult strength of schedule, Fullerton was selected as one of two Big West programs to the 64-team NCAA regional field, seeded third at UCLA's Easton Stadium. The Titans emerged as the only undefeated team through the first two games, including a 2-1 victory in 11 grueling innings over the host Bruins. However, Fullerton's storybook run through the regional tournament ended as UCLA won both games on "Championship Sunday" to advance to the super regional round and eventually finish as the national runner-up.

Gromacki's head coaching career got off to a great start in her rookie year in 2000, leading an inexperienced Titan squad to a 45-15 overall record and the school's first Big West title since 1993 with a 19-5 mark. For her efforts, Gromacki was named Big West Conference Coach of the Year.

With a little more experience under its belt in 2001, Cal State Fullerton won its second consecutive league crown thanks to a 19-2 record and finished the year 48-14 overall after a tough NCAA regional in Tucson, Ariz., where the Titans finished

The 2002 season was a banner year for Titan softball as Gromacki led Fullerton to a 53-13 overall record, posting the most victories in a single season since Gromacki helped the Titans to 59 wins as a player in 1987. That campaign featured a 32-game winning streak (the second-longest in the history of the program and the second-longest in the nation that season) and Gromacki's 100th career coaching victory. She became the fastest coach in school history to 100 wins (134 games), besting Garman (142 games) and former baseball coach Augie Garrido's previous record of 135 games.

Fullerton also clinched its third-straight conference title wih a 22-2 mark, posting the best single-season conference winning percentage in school history. However the "region of death" awaited the Titans in the postseason as Fullerton was awarded one of eight national No. I seeds and was pitted against five other squads in NCAA Regional play at Fresno, Calif. – a regional that featured five ranked teams and four in the top 15.

In 2003, featuring a roster chock-full of talented seniors, Gromacki piloted the Titans to a 41-15 overall record and a 20-1 mark in the Big West to clinch Fullerton's fourth consecutive league title. The Titans broke the school record for best Big West winning percentage and served as host of an NCAA Regional for the first time since

Gromacki has been honored by her peers throughout her coaching career, serving as head coach on three Speedline/NFCA West Region Coaching Staff's of the Year in the last six seasons (2000, 2002-03). She has even taken her talents to the next level for the past three years, serving as an assistant coach for the USA Blue Team in 2001 and the U.S. "Elite" National Team in 2002-04, competing in international tournaments and serving as the "sparring partner" for the U.S. National Team in preparation for the 2004 Summer Olympic Games in Athens, Greece.





In 2003, she helped lead the "Elite" Team to a gold medal at the Canada Cup with an 11-1 record and a roster which featured former Titans Gina Oaks and Jodie Cox. Cox was named MVP of the tournament, posting a 3-0 record without allowing an earned run in 19 innings and striking out 15.

Regarded as one of the best catchers in the nation, Gromacki helped lead the Titans to a combined 170-19-1 overall record and a 65-10-1 mark in the Big West as a player from 1985-87 while helping Fullerton claim the 1986 NCAA National Championship.

In 1995, Gromacki was invited to participate in the firstever Olympic try-out camp and led the Redding Rebels to three ASA Women's Major Fastpitch National Championships. She was named an ASA All-American in 1995 – an honor she has earned eight times throughout her playing career:

Gromacki was also selected as a member of the U.S. National Team that participated in the tournament to open the Olympic Softball Complex in Columbus, Ga., prior to the 1996 Summer Olympic Games in Atlanta. In 1994, Gromacki was a member of several U.S. National Teams which claimed gold medals at the South Pacific Classic Tournament, the World

Championships in Canada, and the Pam Am Qualifier in Guatemala. She was a participant in the Olympic Sports Festival in St. Louis as both a player and assistant coach.

From 1985-92, Gromacki participated in three Olympic Sports Festivals and was a member of two U.S. National Teams that took gold medals in international competition in China (1987) and Japan (1985). She also spent eight months playing on a travelling team in New Zealand from 1988-89.

Aside from playing, Gromacki has also been involved in numerous activities to promote the sport of softball. She was responsible for Junior Olympic try-outs and Pan Am Team practices held at Cal State Fullerton, has conducted numerous coaching clinics and speaking engagements around the world, and conducted a clinic in Italy, spending three days working with the Italian Junior Olympic National Team.

Gromacki is also a contributor to numerous athletic publications, including authoring a monthly column for Southern California Softball Magazine and writing articles for the National Fastpitch Coaches Association newsletter.

A native of Antioch, Calif., Gromacki currently resides in Huntington Beach. Her parents are Rick and Adeline.

Cal State Fullerton Assistant Coach Dee Dee Weiman-Kingsbury returns for her fourth season overall on the Titans' bench and her first as Head Coach Michelle Gromacki's top assistant. Hired to her post prior to the 2003 season, Weiman-Kingsbury will focus her efforts on the continued development of the Cal State Fullerton pitching staff and coordinate the Titans' recruiting efforts.

Under her tutelage, the Titans' pitchers have blossomed in the Big West Conference as Weiman-Kingsbury's impact has been immediately felt. In her first season, the Cal State Fullerton pitching staff led the Big West in six different categories including ERA (1.35), opponent batting average (.156), strikeouts (417), strikeouts looking (156), wins (41), and fewest hits allowed (208). Titan pitching was also second in runs allowed (101) and earned runs allowed (73)

Individually, senior pitchers Jodie Cox and Gina Oaks were named third-team All-Americans and were also first-team All-Big West Conference pitchers in 2003. Cox was named the Big West Conference's Co-Pitcher of the Year, posting her first career 20-win season and finishing with 224 strikeouts to lead the league. In fact, a Titan pitcher led or co-led the league in six different pitching categories that season: ERA (Cox, 1.06), opponent batting average (Cox, 1.25), strikeouts (Cox, 224), strikeouts looking (Oaks, 76), wins (Cox, 21), fewest earned runs allowed (Cox, 29).

Later that summer, the duo would be selected to the U.S. National "Elite" Team where Cox earned MVP honors at the Canada Cup, helping the squad to a championship with a 3-0 record without allowing an earned run in 19 innings.

In 2004, Weiman-Kingsbury helped mold current Titan Brooke Weekley into one of the conference's best freshman hurlers, as Weekley ranked among the league's top 10 in opposing batting average (t10th, .243), innings pitched (1st, 224.0), strikeouts (3rd, 140), strikeouts looking (t5th, 34), wins (t7th, 14), appearances (1st, 42), and starts (1st, 31).

In 2005, Weiman-Kingubury helped guide a still young and inexperienced staff (two sophomores, a junior in her first collegiate season, and a freshman) to success in the Big West as the Titans ranked third in the league in strikeouts, strikeouts looking, and victories, while also ranking in the top half of the league in ERA, opponents batting average, and innings pitched.

Individually, she helped guide Marissa Marzan to All-Big West Conference Second-Team honors after she led the Titans with a 14-5 record and 2.34 ERA, Marzan ranked in the top 10 in the conference in eight different categories including ERA (6th), strikeouts (10th), wins (t6th), and opponent batting average (10th).

Fullerton's other two pitchers, Weekley and Candice Baker, also succeeded in their sophomore campaigns under Weiman-Kingbury's guidance, as the duo ranked 1-2 in the league in fewest hits allowed while Baker, who was a second-team all-conference and first-team All-West Region honoree as a utility player, ranked in the top 10 overall in four other categories.

Prior to the Titans, Weiman-Kingsbury spent three seasons as an assistant coach at Wisconsin of the Big Ten Conference, where she was in charge of coaching the Badgers' pitching staff and also working with the catchers. She helped guide Wisconsin to three straight Big Ten Tournaments and appearances in the NCAA Tournament in 2001 and 2002.

Weiman-Kingsbury coached the Badgers' first-ever first-team All-Big Ten pitcher in Andrea Kirchberg, who owns nearly every pitching record at Wisconsin. In 2002, Weiman-Kingsbury, head coach Karen Gallagher and assistant coach Ali Viola were named the Speedline/NFCA Division I Mideast Region Coaching Staff of the Year, sharing the honor with the Notre Dame coaching staff.

As a player, Weiman-Kingsbury was a member of the 1990 and 1992 UCLA national championship-winning squads while earning All-Pacific-10 Conference honors twice in her career and first-team All- America honors as a senior in 1994. A Honda Broderick Award nominee in 1994, Weiman-Kingsbury finished her Bruin career with a 59-13 overall record, a 0.79 ERA, 746 career strikeouts and 16 no-hitters. Weiman-Kingsburys 359 strikeouts in 1994 stand second on the single-season record lists and had stood as the UCLA record until last season. Weiman-Kingsbury also holds the NCAA career record for strikeout ratio at 10.4 strikeouts per seven innings.

She continued her playing career in the Women's Professional Softball League, playing four seasons (1997-00) after being drafted as the 10th selection of the second round of the 1996 Amateur Draft. Weiman-Kingsbury won the 1999 WPSL championship with the Tampa Bay Firestix and recorded the first strikeout, complete game, victory, save and shutout in team history. She was also the first pitcher to throw a perfect game in WPSL history, shutting down the Carolina Diamonds on Aug. 1, 1998.

Weiman-Kingsbury was a two-time WPSL All-Star selection in 1998 and 1999, and ranks first in league history in games started (83), complete games (70), innings (640.3) and appearances (113). She ranks second in strikeouts (446) and saves (6) while ranking third in wins (46) and shutouts (10).

Upon her hiring, Weiman-Kingsbury was reunited with her catcher on the 1993 ASA Women's Open National Championship in Gromacki, when the duo helped lead the Redding Rebels to the national title.

Weiman-Kingsbury graduated from UCLA with a bachelors degree in sociology in 1994. She and her husband, Mike, married in the summer of 2005, and the couple have a son, Tyler, and an infant daughter, Isabella, and reside in Buena Park.





GINA

1st Season Cal State Fullerton '04

Former Cal State Fullerton All-American and "Jill-of-all-Trades" Gina Oaks returns to her alma mater and takes to the bench for her first season as an assistant coach under Head Coach Michelle Gromacki in 2006.

Oaks spent the 2005 season as an assistant coach at Azusa Pacific University, helping the Cougars to a 32-16 overall record and a 10-14 mark (fifth place) in the NAIA's Golden State Athletic Conference. She then spent the summer on the roster of the Chicago Bandits of National Pro Fastpitch, helping her sqaud to a championship runner-up finish.

In 2004, she was a member of the NPF Champion New York/New Jersey Juggernaut and a member of the NPF East All-Star squad, finishing the year ranked tied for fourth in the league in pitching victories (12) and allowing just 26 earned runs in 131-plus innings (1.39 ERA). She held opponents to a .169 batting average. She was also a team manager for the Titans that season while finishing her degree.

A member of numerous U.S. National Teams, Oaks won a gold medal at the prestigious Canada Cup in 2003 with the USA Elite Team and earned silver medals with the Elite team in 2002 and 2005. She also participated with the Elite Team in the 2005 Intercontinental Cup in Madrid, Spain, and the 2003 Pacific Challenge vs. Australia.

Oaks played four stellar seasons for the Titans from 2000-03, earning All-America honors from the NFCA as a utility player following her junior and senior seasons. She is one of only four players in the history of the Titans' program to become a four-time All-Big West Conference honoree, including earning first-team honors her sophomore through senior seasons. Oaks was the first player in the history of the Big West Conference to be named to the first team at two different positions in 2002 (pitcher and third base) and repeated the feat as a senior (pitcher and utility).

A career .295 hitter, Oaks ranks among the school's career top 10 in 10 different categories, including holding the school's career record for runs scored (150) and ranking second in career hit by pitches (29). She had her best season in terms of average as a freshman, hitting .313 with 26 runs scored, four home runs and 18 RBI, but watched as her numbers in all other categories steadily improved, hitting .301 as a junior to go along with career-high's in runs scored (52), doubles (13), and home runs (10) en route to All-America honors. In her All-America senior season, Oaks hit .284 in a lineup that set seven different offensive team records and led the Big West Conference in nine different major offensive categories.

In the circle, Oaks was equally dominant, ranking among Fullerton's all-time winningest pitchers with a 74-23 all-time record and ninth with a .763 winning percentage. Her best season came as a junior when she went 22-4 with a 0.73 ERA, giving her the fifth-best single-season winning percentage in school history and ranking seventh in the nation in ERA that season. She also won the pitcher's version of the "triple crown" that season, leading the team in ERA, victories, and strikeouts (189). In fact, Oaks led the team in strikeouts in each of her first three collegiate seasons while leading the team in wins as a sophomore and junior.

Oaks ranks among the school's career pitching leaders in 10 different categories including strikeouts (4th - 685), opponent batting average (6th - .184), most strikeouts per seven innings (3rd - 7.69), victories (4th), saves (t4th - 4), complete games (t3rd - 72), and shutouts (8th - 25).

Born on May, 11, 1981, in Duarte, Calif., Oaks prepped at Rancho Cucamonga HS where she was a four-year letter winner in both softball and soccer. She was twice named to the All-CIF squad and was a four-time all-league selection. Her national team experience started early as she was a member of the U.S. Junior National Team that won a silver medal at a tournament in

Oaks graduated from Cal State Fullerton in 2004 with a degree in kinesiology. Recently engaged to her fiance, Bryson, the couple are soon to be residents of Yorba Linda. Her parents are Bob and Irene Oaks of Rancho Cucamonga, and she has an older brother, Bobby.

Anunciation was a three-time All-Big West Conference honoree under Head Coach Brian Kolze, including earning first-team all-conference and second-team NFCA All-West Region honors as a senior after hitting .365 with four home runs and a career-high 40 RBI. She was named Big West Conference Player of the Week for three consecutive weeks in 2005, marking the first time in the history of the conference that a player has accomplished that feat.

She was a second-team all-conference honoree following her junior season and earned honorable mention honors as a freshman. She finished her Tigers' career ranked in the top 10 in average, hits, doubles, and RBI.

A native of Chino Hills, Calif., Anunciation prepped at nearby Diamond Bar HS where she was a four-year letterwinner and a three-time All-Sierra League First-Team honoree.

The daughter of Charles and Lisa Anunciation, Michelle currently resides in Chino Hills, Calif.

Tantlinger was a two-year letterwinner for Fullerton from 2004-05 after transferring from Antelope Valley College. She was one of five Titans to start all 52 games in her junior season, hitting .167 with 13 runs scored and five RBI. Tantlinger led the team and finished fifth in the Big West Conference with 12 sacrifice hits.

As a senior in 2005, Tantlinger platooned with Whitney Kroh in right field, appearing in 33 games and making 25 starts. She hit . III with six runs scored and a pair of stolen bases.

Prior to Cal State Fullerton, Tantlinger spent two seasons at Antelope Valley College in Lancaster, Calif., where she was a two-time All-Foothill Conference honoree, and played three seasons of varsity softball for Quartz Hill HS, earning second-team All-Golden League honors as a senior.

Medina played the better part of three seasons for the Titans from 2003-05 before injury ended her career following her junior year – when she appeared in only 10 games as a pinch runner in 2005, scoring two runs.

She had her best offensive season as a freshman, hitting .250 with 11 runs scored, four walks, and a pair of stolen bases. Medina scored seven more runs as a sophomore and drove in the first three runs of her career in 2004.

A native of Visalia, Calif., Medina prepped at Mt. Whitney HS where she was a three-year letter winner and a three-time All-West Yosemite League honoree for the Pioneers.

Born Dec. 13, 1983, in Tulare, Calif., her parents are Carlos and Anita. Her older sister, Raquel "Rocky" Medina, played softball for the Titans from 1995-98.

2006 SEASON PREVIEW

Talk about bouncing back.

After suffering through the first losing season in the history of the program, the 2005 Cal State Fullerton softball team completed one of the biggest turnarounds in school history, finishing third in the Big West Conference and advancing to the postseason for the 23rd time in the program's 26-year history.

Although the Titans' run into the postseason was abruptly cut short by long-time rival UCLA and freshman phenom Anjelica Selden, this year's Fullerton squad seems well-prepared to duplicate the feat of a season ago.

Cal State Fullerton returns 14 players off of last year's 19-woman roster, including eight position starters and all four pitchers from a squad that finished 30-21 overall and 14-7 in the Big West.

It marked the 24th time the Titans have reached the 30-win plateau in the history of the program and a 12-game improvement from two seasons ago – second only to the school-best 21-game improvement in the win column from the 1980 (30-27) to 1981 (51-14) seasons.

OUTFIELD

With the graduation of versitile centerfielder Lindsey Bashor, the bulk of the offensive weight now falls upon the shoulders of redshirt junior outfielder Ashley Van Boxmeer, who enters her second season in a Titan uniform after transferring from New Mexico.

In her first season with the Titans, Van Boxmeer, who was voted to the All-Big West Honorable Mention team at the conclusion of the regular season, provided the pop in the middle of the lineup, hitting .319 on the year with 10 home runs and 27 runs driven in. Her 34 runs scored were tops on the team as she was one of only three players (Bashor and Katie Gollhardt) to start all 51 games.

Sophomore Whitney Kroh appeared in 36 games and made 24 starts in rightfield, and should be the Titans' opening day starter in February. Kroh only got to bat 24 times as a freshman, but made some of the more memorable plays on the year despite hitting just .154.

Her first career hit (a walk-off double) in the first game of a doubleheader against Loyola Marymount was the game-winner and she helped sweep the doubleheader from the Lions by scoring on a bases-loaded error in the eighth.

In the winners bracket game at the NCAA Regionals, Kroh drew a walk and eventually scored the winning run on Katie Gollhardt's infield single in the bottom of the 11th inning to down the Bruins.

PITCHERS

To say the Titans are well-armed entering the 2006 season would be an understatement as Fullerton returns all four of its pitchers from last season.

Leading the way is redshirt senior Marissa Marzan, who earned second-team All-Big West honors in her first collegiate season after injury and eligibility issues delayed the start of her career.

Marzan, who also played third base when she wasn't in the circle, was 14-5 overall with a 2.34 ERA, leading the team in wins, ERA, starts, complete games, and shutouts. In Big West play, Marzan was almost perfect, going 7-1 in the circle with a 2.24 ERA.

She hit .196 with seven runs and eight RBI.
Junior utility player Candice Baker finished second on the team in wins with nine and amassed a 2.54
ERA when she wasn't starring at shortstop. Baker led the team in strikeouts with 102 in 115 innings.

Baker's versatility led her to All-West Region First-Team and All-Big West Second-Team honors as the utility player as she hit .265 with five doubles, four triples, a pair of home runs and 24 RBI. She will start at shortstop or second base when not in the circle.

Junior righthander Brooke Weekley had a slow start to her sophomore campaign, starting just two games in the Titans' first 20 games of the year. However, she won seven of her last nine decisions – including her final four straight – to finish 7-4 with a 3.00 ERA.

In Big West Conference play, Weekley finished 6-2 overall with a 3.04 ERA and had a team-best 49 strikeouts while holding opponents to a .212 batting average.

INFIELD.

At times, the Titans' infield seemed to be a trial by fire as sophomores Amanda Kamekona, Crystal Vieyra, and Katie Gollhardt were all pressed into duty during their rookie seasons and performed admirably.

Kamekona had the best season offensively of the three, finishing third on the team with a .284 average, two home runs and 11 RBI while spending most of the year in the leadoff spot.

She finished second on the team with nine steals and scored 18 runs on the season – good for a fourth-place tie on the team.

Gollhardt was a rock at first base for the Titans, making only six errors in 361 chances (.983 fielding percentage) in 51 starts. She hit .201 on the season with a home run and 14 RBI to go with 18 runs scored.

Vieyra probably spent most of the off-season with an ice bag somewhere after being hit by a pitch 17 times last season – just three short of the school single-season record and already the third-most in the history of the program.

She struggled at times with her defense (second on the team with 10 errors), but played numerous positions in her rookie season, including second base, third base, and right field. She hit .155 with 16 runs scored.

Junior Tiffany Hoff, who was an All-Big West First-Team selection at designated player last season, can also play first base. She hit just .221 overall on the season, but torched Big West pitching for a .292 average, a home run, five doubles, and seven RBI.

Senior Molly Perez, who transferred from nearby Cypress College, appeared in only nine games at third base and as a pinch-runner, scoring

Redshirt sophomore Jenna Wheeler also returns to the field in 2006 after sitting out last season due to a concussion. Wheeler was an All-Big West Honorable Mention selection as a freshman, hitting .227 with three home runs and 19 RBI (including a .305 average with 14 RBI against Big West competition).

CATCHERS

The Fullerton pitching staff seems to be in good hands once again this season as sophomore Kiki Munoz and senior Ashlee Weatherford will once again call the game from behind the plate.

Munoz was stellar defensively as a freshman, making just one error in 232 chances (.996 fielding percentage) to rank in the top 10 in the Big West defensively (minimum 100 chances). She hit .233 with three home runs and 17 RBI, including a .273 clip against Big West Conference pitching in 20 games.

Weatherford appeared in just 20 games, making 16 starts, hitting .171 with eight RBI, including driving in the game-winning runs against nationally ranked UCLA in the Titans' 4-3 win over the Bruins in February.

She was also solid defensively, making just two errors in 92 chances (.978) behind the plate.

NEWCOMERS

The Titans welcome three newcomers to the roster for the 2006 season, all with stellar credentials and two

with Titan bloodlines.


Freshman infielder Yvette Fernandez is the cousin of former Cal State Fullerton All-America first baseman Monica Lucatero and twice earned All-Golden West League honors at Saddleback HS as a freshman and sophomore. She spent her last two prep seasons at Mater Dei HS in Santa Ana, Calif.

Freshman infielder Courtney Martinez is the cousin of current Titan infielder Jenna Wheeler and was a two-time All-Sierra League selection out of nearby Chino Hills HS.

A second-team All-CIF selection as a senior, Martinez hit .321 in helping lead the Huskies to the CIF title with a 2-1 win over El Dorado HS in the title game.

The third newcomer is freshman catcher Cammi Kaichi, who prepped at Torrance's North HS. She helped lead the Saxons to the third round of the CIF Division V playoffs as a senior and earned second-team All-Pioneer League honors last season.

SCHEDULE

One of the factors in the Titans reaching the NCAA Tournament last season was their strength of schedule. A hallmark of the Fullerton program since its inception, playing a difficult schedule will again be a trait in 2006.

The Titans open with three non-conference tournaments away from home in Phoenix, Las Vegas, and Cathedral City, Calif.

Of Cal State Fullerton's first 15 games, 10 are against teams that reached the 2005 NCAA Tournament as the Titans will meet 18 teams overall (22 games) that advanced to some sort of postseason play – including College World Series participants Arizona, California, and national runners-up UCLA.

The Titans kick off the season on Feb. 10-12 at the Kajikawa Classic in Phoenix, hosted by Arizona State. Postseason participants Fresno State, Oregon State, and Arizona are among Fullerton's slate of contests.

Cal State Fullerton then travels to the glitz and glamour of Las Vegas, hoping "Lady Luck" is riding with them for the Louisville Slugger Desert Classic hosted by UNLV on Feb. 17-19. The Titans will meet four NCAA tournament teams there, kicking off their schedule of games against California, Northwestern, and Brigham Young with Utah State and Notre Dame waiting in the wings.

The month of February finishes in the desert at the Palm Springs Classic where games against Kansas, Illinois-Chicago, Maryland, Oklahoma State, and Texas A&M await the Titans.

After spending the first month of the year on the road, Cal State Fullerton will benefit from a little home cooking as 17 of its next 22 games will be played within the friendly confines of the Titan Softball Complex.

The first chance will be on Mar. 3-5 as Fullerton hosts the Worth Softball Invitational as I I teams from around the country will compete, including NCAA participants Georgia, Northwestern, Stanford, and Oregon State along with College World Series qualifier Tennessee.

Mid-week road contests at UCLA and a doubleheader at San Diego State (coached by former Titan Kathy Van Wyk) follow on March 8 and March 10, respectively, leading up to a single game against Utah on March 14 and the prestigious Judi Garman Classic

on March 15-19 at the Titan Softball Complex.

A star-studded field for the Garman Classic will be one of the best in years as 14 of the 16 teams advanced to postseason play, seven of those advancing to the super regional round, three more qualifying for the College World Series, and includes the 2005 NCAA National Champion, Michigan.

All four teams in Fullerton's pool advanced to the NCAA Tournament as the Titans will take on Notre Dame (for the second time this season), Florida State, and Arizona State before bracket play begins on March 18.

Fullerton doesn't get a break after that as Northwestern (for the third and fourth times this season) stays in Southern California for a doubleheader on March 23 and will be followed by Big 10 Conference rival Ohio State for a March 25 doubleheader. Southern California rival Loyola Marymount then welcomes

the Titans for a non-conference doubleheader in Los Angeles on March 28 as a precursor to Big West Conference play.

Fullerton, which was selected to win the Big West in a preseason vote of the league's coaches (including earning six of seven first-place votes), opens league action at home for the first time since 2003 against UC Santa Barbara to kick off April (no foolin') with a three-game series on the road at Cal State Northridge the next weekend.

A match-up against two-time defending conference champion Long Beach State at home follows on March 14-15 before the Titans travel to Pacific for a three-game road series on April 22-23.

Fullerton takes a break from non-conference play the next week as the Titans host NCAA tournament participant UNLV for a doubleheader on April 27 in the first meeting between the two teams since their meeting in the first round of the postseason last year. A three-game series against future conference rival UC Davis follows on April 29-30 at home to close out the month.

The Titans then finish up the regular season on the road at Cal Poly (May 6-7) and at home against UC Riverside (May 12-13) before the NCAA Tournament comes calling.

The tournament features 16 teams meeting face-to-face in a three-day pool play format consisting of four pools of four teams each. Results from pool play will seed a pair of eight-team


championship brackets with two winners crowned on

Former tournament champions Arizona, Fresno State, Louisiana-Lafayette, Oklahoma, Arizona State, Washington, and 2005 champion Michigan, will compete along with the host Titans for this year's title.

Championship and consolation bracket play begins on Saturday morning (March 18) at 9 a.m. on both fields with the tournament semifinals and finals beginning on Sunday morning (March 19) at 8:30 a.m.





Beginning in 2006, the nation's most prestigious spring tournament will be named after former Cal State Fullerton Head Coach Judi Garman, who built the Titans softball program from the ground up in 1979 and immediately established Fullerton as a national contender.

Garman was inducted into the National Fastpitch Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 1993 celebrating a career that eventually saw her set a then-record with 913 career Division I victories and win just under 71 percent of her games. She retired following the 1999 season with a career mark of 913-376-4.

She led the Titans to eight conference titles and a top 10 national finish in seven of her first eight seasons - including the 1986 NCAA National Championship.

Garman will be honored along with her 1986 championship-winning squad on March 17 at 6:15 p.m. prior to the Titans' pool play game against Arizona State at 7 p.m.

A LOOK BACK

The Cal State Fullerton softball team bounced back in a big way in 2005, recovering from the first losing season in school history to post a 30-21 overall record and finish third in the Big West Conference with a 14-7 mark after being selected by the coaches to finish fifth in the league in the preseason poll.

The Titans made their 23rd appearance in the postseason in the 26-year history of the program, opening the tournament by defeating UNLV, 5-4, and coming from behind to defeat regional host UCLA, 2-1, in a classic I I-inning thriller at Easton Stadium.

The Bruins would exact their revenge however, sweeping Fullerton by the scores of 6-0 and 3-1 on "Championship Sunday" to earn the super regional berth.

TITANS HONORED FOR SUCCESS

Five Cal State Fullerton softball players were honored for their stellar performances during the 2005 season, earning All-Big West and NFCA All-West Region honors at season's end.

Departed senior Lindsey Bashor was named to the All-Big West First Team outfield and was a second-team All-West Region selection after leading the Titans with a .354 average while slugging eight home runs and driving in a team-high 27 runs. In Big West play, she did herself one better, hitting .373 with five home runs and 19 RBI.

Junior-to-be Tiffany Hoff was also named to the All-Big West First Team for the first time in her career as the designated player. Despite hitting just .221 overall on the season, Hoff turned up the heat against Big West Conference pitching, hitting at a .292 clip in 18 games with five doubles, a home run, and seven RBI

Playing in her first collegiate season as a junior, Marissa Marzan was stellar in the circle for the Titans, earning All-Big West Second-Team honors at the position. Marzan was 14-5 in the circle (including 7-1 in Big West games while winning her final six starts)

with a 2.34 ERA.

She led the team in innings pitched (134.1) and finished second in strikeouts (93) while holding opponents to a .249 average. Marzan ranked among Big West Conference leaders in 11 different categories.

Jill-of-all trades Candice Baker was also named to the All-Big West Second Team as the utility player, but was voted by the coaches to the All-West Region First Team at the position.

Baker was fourth on the team in hitting at .265 (.283 in Big West games) to go with 24 runs scored, five doubles, four triples, two home runs, and 24 RBI. Her 18 walks were tied for second on the team while her 10 steals were tops on the squad.

In the circle, Baker was a dual threat, posting a 9-11 overall record with a 2.56 ERA, including a complete-game effort against UCLA in the 11-inning regional victory.

She led the team with 102 strikeouts and held opposing batters to a team-low .203 average - the third-best average in the league.

Transfer Ashley Van Boxmeer returned to form that earned her all-region honors at New Mexico as a freshman, hitting .319 in her first season as a Titan and Honorable Mention All-Big West accolades.

Van Boxmeer slugged 10 home runs on the season to go with a team-high 27 RBI and scored a team-best 34 runs on the season while slugging .603. She led the team in walks with 20 while starting all 51 games in left field.

Cal State Fullerton's Ashley Van Boxmeer was a welcome addition to the middle of the Titans' lineup as she led the team and finished tied for fourth in the Big West with 10 home runs in her first season in a Titans' uniform. The 10 round-trippers were the most for a Fullerton player since Jenny Topping hit 10 as a

The one team hurt most by Van Boxmeer's prolific blasts was former conference rival UNLV, against which Van Boxmeer hit four home runs - including a pair in the opening game of NCAA regional play at UCLA on May 20 to help the Titans to a 5-4 win.

LONG WAIT COMES TO AN END

After two seasons of sitting out and another year on the shelf due to injury, Cal State Fullerton junior Marissa Marzan finally got to take the field to strut

the stuff that made her one of the most highly-prized pitchers out of high school.

After starting the season with just two wins in her first five outings in the circle, Marzan went on a tear to win 12 of her next 15 appearances (including her final nine decisions) and finish among the Titans' postseason award winners.

The Fresno, Calif., native was twice named Big West Conference Pitcher of the Week after earning her first career shutout against Bowling Green State at the Worth Invitational and again after tossing a pair of complete-game victories and earning a save in Fullerton's three-game sweep of UC Davis.

WEEKLEY FINISHES STRONG

Sophomore Brooke Weekley was part of a very deep pitching staff for the Titans in 2005, and finished her season on a strong note, winning her final four starts

of the season en route to a 7-4 overall record and a 3.00 ERA (6-2, 3.04 against Big West Conference opponents).

Her best outing of the season came on May 9, as she carried a nohitter into the seventh inning against Pacific, retiring the first

11 batters she faced and 17 of the first 19 while striking out 10.

FRESHMEN COME TO PLAY

With the largest roster of players in eight years inhabiting the third-base dugout at the Titan Softball Complex, one might think that consistient playing time would be tough to come by.

However, numerous freshmen had a hand in Fullerton's success in 2005, as five newcomers saw significant action - all starting at least half of the Titans' games as rookies.

First baseman Katie Gollhardt was the "ironwoman" of the bunch, starting all 51 games and finishing second on the team in fielding percentage at .983 (six errors in 361 chances).

Infielder Amanda Kamekona played both second base and shortstop for the Titans in her rookie season, and had the best offensive year of any Fullerton first-year player. Kamekona hit .294 (third on the team) while starting 49 of the 50 games she appeared in. Her seven stolen bases were good for third on the

Freshman Kiki Munoz was a rock behind the plate as a freshman, guiding the Titans' young pitching staff with the poise of a veteran. Munoz hit .233 overall on the season (.273 in Big West games) while playing her position to near perfection on defense. She was charged with only one error in 232 chances (.996 fielding percentage) and only two passed balls for the entire season.

Crystal Vieyra was another "iron-woman" for the Titans, appearing in all 51 games and making 48 starts. However, after the year she had, Vieyra might have wanted to be made of iron as she set a Fullerton freshman record with 17 hit by pitches - a total which already ranks third on the career list and second on the single-season list.

WELCOME TO THE BIG WEST CONFERENCE

The Big West Conference enters the 2005-06 season with yet another milestone - the 37th year of Big West existence marks a historic return to its roots as an all-California member conference. For the past 29 years, eight different schools from six different states have joined the Big West family and represented the conference proudly, but separated the Big West from obtaining its original mission of providing a competitive athletic conference for institutions in the great state of California. In 2005-06, what was a dream nearly four decades ago is now a reality - the Big West is the California conference.

The Big West Conference is not only the home of competitive athletics; it is also the home to prestigious California institutions that are at the forefront of academic success. The Big West is now the governing body for seven California member schools that will compete in 17 sports this season. The Big West hosts a dynamic blend of schools from the University of California system and the California State University system, and a private institution that includes: Cal Poly, Cal State Fullerton, Cal State Northridge, Long Beach State, UC Irvine, UC Riverside, UC Santa Barbara, and Pacific.

Long Beach State, UC Santa Barbara, and Pacific are the conference's longest tenured members, and are three of the original charter institutions. Long Beach State is the only school that has held membership every year in the conference since its inaugural season in 1969. Cal State Fullerton and UC Irvine have both been Big West members for over three decades, with Cal Poly entering its ninth year of affiliation. Cal State Northridge and UC Riverside are the Big West's most recent members, as the two schools joined the conference in 2001-02. The Big West is also set to add a ninth conference member with UC Davis coming aboard in the 2007-08 season.

THE BEGINNING

The Big West Conference was formed as the Pacific Coast Athletic Association on July 1, 1969. However, the unofficial history of the conference pre-dates that point of time, extending back to 1967.

Cal State LA, Fresno State, Long Beach State and San Diego State were members of the California Collegiate Athletic Association, long recognized as the nation's premier college circuit.

That conference was classified college division, and therein lay a major source of dissatisfaction. Since 1963, the four institutions had captured 16 national titles. The number swelled to 21 if the mythical football championships were included.

With no more territory to conquer at the college division, a step up to university ranks had to be considered.

At the time, San Jose State, UC Santa Barbara and Pacific were members of the West Coast Athletic Conference but were enduring a strained relationship due to the limit of conference sports sponsored. That, plus the fact that national football figures UOP and SJSU were already competing as independents, led the schools to pursue a more broad-based conference alignment.

Therefore, officials of the seven colleges and universities assembled as a body in May of 1969, tied up loose ends and less than two months later the PCAA was born. Direction in the early days of the conference came from such men as Dr. Stephen Goodspeed, vice-chancellor at UC Santa Barbara, the first president and chairman of the founders

committee. J. Kenneth Fagans provided guidance as the league's first commissioner. Jesse T. Hill, one of the nation's most successful directors of athletics at USC, followed Fagans as the conference's first full-time commissioner.

SJSU was already labeled a university division school in all sports when the PCAA emerged. San Diego State and Pacific were granted university division status in the summer of 1970 and the remaining conference members shed the college division moniker by 1972.

The original PCAA lineup changed in the early years and by 1975, charter members UCSB and CSLA had dropped football and SDSU left the conference in football only. In 1974, Cal State Fullerton moved into the conference. By 1977, UC Irvine joined the Big West and UCSB was back - both as non-football playing institutions — while Utah State became the first non-California member of the circuit, transforming the PCAA into a regional conference.

UNLV (1981) and New Mexico State (1984) soon followed suit, bringing the league's membership to 10 universities.

In the fall of 1983, the PCAA became the first western conference to incorporate women's athletic programs into the conference. Charter women's members UC Irvine, UC Santa Barbara and UNLV competed in five championships.

By the end of 1985, Pacific, Hawai'i, Cal State Fullerton, Long Beach State, San Diego State, Fresno State and San Jose State had joined the women's conference. The PCAA upped its women's sponsorship to eight championships.



The PCAA began its 20th year of existence in 1988 by changing its name to the Big West Conference. With the inclusion of the states of Utah, Nevada, and New Mexico, the term "Big West' more accurately represented the conference. Since the name Big West has been used, conference teams have won nine NCAA team championships, establishing the Big West's winning identity that is recognized nationally. Even though the Big West is again an all-California conference, the name Big West still embodies the identity, history, and tradition of excellence the conference has achieved, making it a well-known entity in collegiate athletics.

SOFTBALL PLAYED HERE

The Big West Conference is entering its 22nd season of sponsoring the sport of softball and is home to the 1986 NCAA National Champion and seven-time league champ Cal State Fullerton. The Big West is made up of seven softball-playing league members: the Titans, Cal Poly, Cal State Northridge, Long Beach State, UC Riverside, UC Santa Barbara, the University of the Pacific. The Big West will welcome 2003 Division II National Champion UC Davis beginning with the 2007-08 academic year.

The conference began sponsoring softball in 1985 as the sixth women's sport. UC Santa Barbara, Hawaii, UNLV, Pacific, and associate member Cal Poly Pomona competed as charter

In 1986, Cal State Fullerton, Long Beach State, and San Diego State were added to the softball-playing roster as the Titans won the league title in their first season and advanced to the Women's College World Series, eventually defeating Texas A&M to bring home the national championship.

Fresno State and San Jose State entered the league in 1987, bringing the conference to a total of 10 teams and, in 1990, a record five schools advanced to NCAA regional competi-

That season, Cal Poly Pomona and San Diego State left the conference in favor of New Mexico State and Utah State.

Two seasons later in 1992, a record six Big West schools advanced to the postseason, including Long Beach State and Fresno State, which advanced to the Women's College World Series. The Bulldogs advanced to the semifinals before losing to eventual national champion Arizona.

The current league alignment was achieved following the 2005 season when Utah State left the league to join the Western Athletic Conference.

Cal State Fullerton is the most-recent member to reach the Women's College World Series, finishing fifth in 1995.

The Big West Conference has placed a team in the NCAA Tournament every season since 1985 and a team in the Women's College World Series in 11 of the previous 21 seasons. In 21 years of competition, 86 players from Big West institutions have been named All-Americans wih 28 more named to the All-Women's College World Series team.

PAM EDDE (1981)

Edde was masterful for the Titans from the circle, posting a 25-8 record and a 0.61 ERA. She also hit .284 that season with 34 runs scored, six doubles, 15 RBI and 32 walks.

SUE LEWIS (1981-82 & 1984)

One of two three-time All-American Titans, Lewis hit .354 with 25 home runs and 138 RBI in her career. Lewis still holds school career records for hits (257), doubles (53), and triples

JANET LLOYD (1981)

Another "Titan"-ic slugger for Fullerton, Lloyd hit .381 with 15 home runs and 41 RBI in her All-American season. Her home run mark stands third on the single-season list.

KATHY VAN WYK (1982)

After transferring from Texas Women's University, Van Wyk posted a 35-1 record with a 0.18 ERA and 270 strikeouts. She was named the National Player of the Year, winning Fullerton's first-ever Honda Broderick Award.

ELISE KING (1983)

King hit .293 with 35 runs and 16 RBI while stealing 12 bases for the Titans in her All-American year.

SUSAN LEFEBVRE (1983 & 1986)

LeFebvre finished her career with a 100-21 record in the circle and a 0.29 ERA to go with 740 strikeouts. In 1986, she became the second Titan to be named Player of the Year and helped Fullerton to the National Championship.

DEBBIE MYGIND (1985)

Posted a 28-4 record with a 0.27 ERA and 183 strikeouts. She is second in career ERA and third in career winning percentage.

JOANN FERRIERI (1985)

Hit .328 with 27 runs and 23 RBI, leading the team in hitting.

TERRI OBERG (1985)

The third Titan All-American in 1985, Oberg hit .298 with 7 home runs and 35 RBI - both team high's. Her eight triples that season set a school record.

CHENITA ROGERS (1986-87)

A career .365 hitter who led the team in hitting in both of her All-American seasons. Hit .386 in 1986 to help the Titans to the national title.

CONNIE CLARK (1987)

The current Texas head coach went 33-5 with a 0.47 ERA and 261 strikeouts en route to Co-Big West Player of the Year and Fullerton's third Broderick Award.

VALERIE DOUGLAS (1988)

Led the team with a .351 average with 19 runs and 28 RBI. Her 72 hits rank tied for ninth on the single-season charts.

MISSY COOMBES (1989)

Hit .359 with 14 doubles and 29 RBI. Went on to earn three All-Big West and two All-West Region honors.

CAREY HESS (1989)

Hit .409 with 10 doubles and 52 runs, which stood as a school record until 2001.

JOY TINER (1990)

Hit .311 with 30 runs and 17 RBI. Was a twotime All-Big West selection.

ANN VAN DORTRECHT (1990)

Was 29-12 with a 0.43 ERA while pitching a school season record of 310.2 innings. Was named Big West Pitcher of the Year in 1990.

TIFFANY BOYD (1991-92)

Combined 63-15 in her two All-America seasons with 543 strikeouts. A three-time Big West Pitcher of the Year.

PAULA "MICH" DEBREE (1991)

Hit .313 with nine doubles, 33 runs and 19 RBI. A two-time All-Big West honoree.

DENISE DEWALT (1992-93)

DeWalt hit .396 for her career, a record which stood until 2003, to go with 70 runs, 29 doubles and 49 RBI.

CHRIS ZBORIL (1995)

Led the team with a .373 average, eight home runs and 25 RBI.

STEPHENIE LITTLE (1999)

Led the team with a .372 average, 57 RBI, and set the single-season record with 23 home

MONICA LUCATERO (2000)

Hit .343 with six home runs and 39 RBI while walking a team-high 20 times. Named top the All-Big West second team.

JENNY TOPPING (2001-03)

The Titans' second three-time All-American (all first-team honors), Topping holds four career records and seven single-season marks.

YASMIN MOSSADEGHI (2002)

Named to the third team after hitting .367 with 13 home runs and 45 RBI. Was also an All-Big West and All-West Region first team selection while being invited to U.S. National Team Camp.

GINA OAKS (2002-03)

Twice earned All-America honors as a utility player (Oaks pitched, played second and third base, and the outfield), hitting .295 for her career and 74-23 with a 1.37 ERA in the circle.

JODIE COX (2003)

An All-American pitcher in 2003, Cox was 21-7 in the circle with a 1.06 ERA and 224 strikeouts. She went undefeated in conference play in her final two seasons (21-0).

JULIE WATSON (2004)

Completing one of the biggest offensive turnarounds in Titan softball history, Watson was named to the second team after hitting .426 and amassing 78 hits - both of which rank among the school's top 10 for a single season.

In the 26-year history of Cal State Fullerton softball, numerous former Titans have gone on to greener pastures and played professionally in the United States in both the Women's Professional Softball League (1997-2000) and National Pro Fastpitch (2003-present).

Former Titans Chris Zboril (Carolina Diamonds), Gabby Guerrero (Virginia Roadsters), and Sue Lewis-Newton (Orlando Wahoos) were among the first to take the field in the WPSL in 1997 as Lewis-Newton co-led the league with seven home runs that year and led the Wahoos to the first league championship, defeating Guerrero and the Roadsters, 3-1, in the title

In 1998, Heidi Robertson (1992-95) and Miki Mangan (1993) joined the Wahoos and helped lead Orlando to its second consecutive

Power-hitting catcher Stephenie Little, who holds the Cal State Fullerton single-season home run record with 23 as a senior in 1999, joined the Durham Dragons at the end of her collegiate career and moved on to play with the Ohio Pride in 2000.

Brenda Iglesias (1998-2001) was a fourth-round draft pick of the newly renamed and defending champion Florida Wahoos in 2000, but she never got the chance to play as the WPSL suspended operations indefinitely in 2001.

After three summers of competing with various all-star teams and with much help from the publicity generated by the 2000 gold-medal winning United States National Team at the Sydney Olympics, the league reformed under the NPF banner in 2003 and began league play with six teams in 2004.

Monica Lucatero (1999-2002) and Yasmin Mossadeghi (1999-2002) were the Titans' first entries into the new league as free agent signees with the Colorado Altitude, but the team suspended operations before the 2004 season began, leaving Jodie Cox (2000-03) and Gina Oaks (2000-03) as Fullerton's representatives.

Cox spent the year as the workhorse in the circle for the California Sunbirds, leading the team with seven wins, 18 complete games, and 187.2 innings pitched. She also ranked second in the league with 152 strikeouts and posted a 2.82 ERA.

Oaks had a somewhat more successful season than her former teammate as she helped lead the New York/New Jersey Juggernaut to the first-ever NPF championship, 10-1, over the New England Riptide. Oaks finished the year ranked tied for fourth in the league in pitching victories with a 12-8 record and allowed just 26 earned runs in 131.2 innings (1.39 ERA). She struck out 116 while holding the opposition to a .169 batting average

The 2005 season was a banner one for the Titans as five former players competed on the diamonds: Jodie Cox, Gina Oaks, Julie Watson, Jenny Topping, and Lindsey Bashor.

Topping, fresh off a gold-medal winning performance at the 2004 Summer Olympics in Athens, Greece, and Bashor, who competed for the Greek National Team in Olympic competition, both played for the Akron Racers, which went on to defeat Oaks and the Chicago Bandits, 5-4, in the championship game.

The duo was a formidable one as Topping, who was also selected to the East All-Star squad, finished third on the squad with a .377 average to go with two home runs, 16 RBI, and tie for the team lead with 27 walks. Bashor hit .299 for the Racers in her first professional season, scoring 23 runs, hitting four home runs and driving in 26.

In limited time with the Bandits, Oaks hit only .187 with 11 RBI and 12 runs scored while going 0-1 with a save in 17.2 innings in the circle

Watson finished her first professional season hitting .272 with 22 runs scored and 11 RBI for the Texas Thunder, which finished third in the league behind Chicago and Akron.

DR. MILTON A. GORDON

University President

Dr. Milton A. Gordon was selected the fourth president of Cal State Fullerton by The California State University Board of Trustees and assumed his duties on Aug. 9, 1990.

His university leadership includes serving as vice president for academic affairs at Sonoma State University for four years, as dean of the College of the Arts and Sciences for Chicago State University for more than eight years and as director of the Afro-American Studies Program at Loyola University of Chicago for six years.

President Gordon also taught at the Illinois Institute of Technology and in the Chicago public schools and served as mathematician at the University of Chicago's Laboratories of Applied Sciences.

He is the vice chairman of the NCAA Presidents Commission and has been appointed to the committee to name a successor to outgoing NCAA President Cedric Dempsey. He also is the California state representative to the American Association of State Colleges and Universities and serves on the governing boards of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, California Coalition for Mathematics, Orange County Chamber of Commerce, Orange County Community Foundation, United Way of Orange County, YMCA of Orange County and Fullerton Chamber of Commerce. In addition, he is on the advisory boards of St. Jude Medical Center and The California State University's Institute for Teaching and Learning.

The President has a Ph.D. in mathematics from the Illinois Institute of Technology, an M.A. in mathematics from the University of Detroit and a B.A. in mathematics and secondary education from Xavier University of Louisiana.





BRIAN QUINN

Athletics Director

Brian Quinn assumed the post of Director of Athletics at Cal State Fullerton on January 14, 2002.

Under Quinn's leadership, the Titans are successfully weathering a state and systemwide fiscal crisis with minimal impact on student-athletes. Academic performances have improved dramatically and Titan Gym has undergone a dramatic makeover. Over the course of the last three years, the Titans have outperformed the rest of the Big West Con-

ference in the NACDA Cup Standings, topped by consecutive appearances by the baseball team at the College World Series, where the Titans placed third for the fourth time in 2003 and then won their fourth national title in 2004.

Quinn, 64, was the athletic director at Loyola Marymount University from 1985 through 1998. He then dedicated his time towards completing the Burns Recreation Center and Aquatics Center at LMU. He also directed the athletic fundraising efforts as executive director of athletic development.

During his years as director of athletics at LMU the Lions won nine West Coast Conference titles and advanced to the NCAA men's basketball tournament three times and once to the NIT. The basketball team advanced to the Final Eight and led the nation in scoring. The baseball team advanced to the College World Series where it defeated the No. 1seed, LSU. Women's volleyball won numerous conference championships as well and the women's crew team won the national championship.

Quinn graduated from Loyola (1963) with a degree in business administration and received his masters degree from Long Beach State. He was a long-time coach and athletic administrator at the high school level in the Irvine Unified School District and taught volleyball classes for Irvine Valley College for six years.

He was the chair of the athletic directors for many years in the West Coast Conference and was the chair of the NCAA men's volleyball committee, as well as serving on the board of directors for USA volleyball. He recently began a four-year term on the NCAA Division I baseball committee.

Quinn was inducted into the Athletic Hall of Fame both at his high school (Serra HS) and university (LMU). He was the captain of the basketball team and MVP and three-year starter on the baseball team. The basketball team was the WCC champion and defeated USC in the NCAA tournament. He also was a member of the Balboa Bay Club national champion volleyball team. He continues to be an avid beach volleyball player.

Quinn and his wife of 42 years, Collette, live in Manhattan Beach. They have four adult children: Andrew, a teacher in Atlanta; Janet, who lives in Rye, NY; Suzanne, a teacher in Inglewood; and Maureen, who recently married. The Quinn's have six grandchildren, Brendan, Ryan, Owen Kiernan, Dylan, Colin Brian, and Mary Frances. Quinn is a member of the Ancient Order of Hibernians.

Senior Associate Athletics Director/SWA

Dr. Allison Rich began her duties as Senior Associate Athletics Director and Senior Woman Administrator at Cal State Fullerton on Jan. 3, 2005.

Dr. Rich most recently was associate director of athletics at the University of the Pacific in Stockton, Calif., where she was in charge of virtually all of the athletic department's internal affairs.

The Fullerton position had been vacant since Dr. June Kearney retired from an interim assignment on July 23, 2004. Dr. Maryalyce Jeremiah resigned the position on Apr. 29, 2003, to return as head women's basketball coach.

Dr. Rich had been at Pacific since April of 1998. She previously was a membership services representative at the NCAA for two years. She obtained her bachelors degree from Princeton in 1991. She earned a law degree from Chicago-Kent College of Law in 1995 and her doctorate in educational administration from Pacific in 2002.

C

al State Fullerton is a major regional university in a vital, flourishing area that includes Orange County, metropolitan Los Angeles and the expanding Inland Empire. The beautiful, 236-acre campus is set in a quiet urban

community in north Orange County, about 25 miles from downtown Los Angeles and about 21 miles from nearby beaches.

The university offers an affordable, high quality education with an exceptional learning environment. Students flourish in close mentoring relationships with outstanding professors and have numerous opportunities for undergraduate research, professional internships, and prestigious competitions. Students experience the dynamic environment of a metropolitan university, but can enjoy a comfortable atmosphere that feels like a small college campus. It's a place where they can easily find networks of friends, interact with faculty on a personal level, and find the support and encouragement they need to be successful.

With full accreditation for its overall program, many of Cal State Fullerton's academic programs have achieved national prominence because of a distinguished faculty and the achievements of alumni. Students can choose from 105 degree programs, including 50 at the graduate level, offered by eight colleges: the Arts, Business and Economics, Communications, Education, Engineering and Computer Science, Health and Human Development, Humanities and Social Sciences, and Natural Sciences and Mathematics. Credential and certificate programs also are offered.

A vibrant university community, which includes more than 33,000 students and nearly 2,000 full- and part-time faculty members, reflects the rich multicultural diversity of Southern California. In fact, Cal State Fullerton is ranked sixth in the nation in terms of bachelor's degrees awarded to minority students, and more than half of the students are people of color.

The main campus consists of 21 permanent buildings, plus a picturesque 26-acre

» U.S. News & World Report lists Cal State Fullerton among its "Top Public Universities," ranking it among the top 10 of the nation's Top Public Universities-Master's institutions in the West.

» According to Black Issues in Higher Education, Cal State Fullerton is sixth in the nation for the overall number of bachelor's degrees awarded to minority students and is the highest ranked among the California State University campuses in this category (June 2005).

In addition to the overall standing, the university was recognized as fifth in the nation and first in California for awarding undergraduate degrees in all categories to Hispanics, and 11th for undergraduate degrees awarded to Asian-Americans. Arboretum and student residence halls. In January 2006, a new Performing Arts Center will open. The \$48 million complex will provide state-of-the-art facilities for audiences and performers alike, as well as instructional facilities for students. Opening of the \$87.5

million Steven G. Mihaylo Hall, new home to the College of Business and Economics, is anticipated in fall 2008. Construction is currently underway on a new parking structure, which is scheduled for completion before the fall 2006 semester.

The university's El Toro Campus offers upper-division and graduate-level courses and provides a convenient location for students who live and work in south Orange County. Other campus satellites include the Grand Central Art Center in Santa Ana, CSUF Garden Grove Center and facilities at the Irvine Spectrum.

An extended education program, which includes open enrollment, expands the university's resources to the surrounding communities. These include academic credit courses, certificate programs for professional development, English classes for non-native speakers of English, a learning-in-retirement program, classes for children and teens, summer camps, international programs and distance education classes.

One of 23 campuses in the California State University System, Cal State Fullerton has shaped a vital role in the growth and prosperity of Southern California. In less than 50 years, the university has awarded degrees to more than 153,000 graduates. Many are leaders in business, government, education and the arts. In addition, the university has an enormous economic impact on the Los Angeles region. As noted in the CSU 2004 study "Working for California: The Impact of the California State University," Cal State Fullerton generates \$851 million in economic activity annually, which sustains more than 12,500 jobs in

the region and generates more than \$45 million per year in state tax revenue.

Titan Athletics... A Proud History

rom modest beginnings and never with abundant resources, the Cal State Fullerton Titans have achieved successes that are the envy of many older and larger institutions across the country. "Titan Pride" has been

the rallying cry for 12 national team championships in seven different sports, hundreds of individual All-Americans, dozens of eventual professional athletes, numerous national coach of the year award winners, Olympic basketball players, a Miss America candidate and the subject matter of a Walt Disney film.

The tenor was set by the first intercollegiate team - men's basketball. In only his second season, Coach Alex Omalev advanced the Titans five rounds into the NAIA playoffs in 1961-62. Sixteen seasons later, the nation watched another "Cinderella" Titan Five advance to within one victory of the "Final Four" as Bobby Dye's 1977-78 team won the Pacific Coast Athletic Association postseason tournament and then beat nationally ranked New Mexico and USF to gain the finals of the NCAA Western Regional.

The basketball tradition began even stronger on the women's side. Recent Naismith and Women's Basketball Hall of Fame inductee Billie Moore coached the Titans to the national championship in 1970 and star forward Nancy Dunkle was one of her players on the women's 1976 silver-medal winning Olympic team. The most recent Titan All-American was center Genia Miller-Rycraw in 1991.

The Titans earned gold in 1984 when point guard Leon Wood directed the men's Olympic team to victory in Los Angeles. The first-round draft pick of the Philadelphia 76ers went on to a 6-year National Basketball Association career

Ceballos and Bruce Bowen (a starting forward on the 2003 and 2005 NBA champion San Antonio Spurs) were some of the stars of the 1980s and 1990s, when the Titans made NIT appearances on both the men's and women's sides. Ceballos gained notoriety for winning the NBA Slam-Dunk contest one year while the women can point with pride to Autumn Hollyfield, the nation's top 3-point field goal shooter in 1993-94, and Koko Lahanas, the nation's scoring leader in 1994-95. Rycraw still holds NCAA records and came back from a career in Japan to earn a spot with the Los Angeles Sparks before returning to Fullerton as an assistant coach.

Gymnastics has brought Fullerton considerable fame. Former men's Coach Dick Wolfe won three college division NCAA titles (1971, 1972 and 1974) and had subsequent teams in the Top Ten at the Division I level while winning 10 PCAA titles in a row. His 1987 squad was ranked No. 1 in the nation. Coach Lynn Rogers began the women's program in 1976 and the Titans have finished sixth or better in the nation 12 times and won the national title in 1979. One-armed Carol Johnston was an All-American and star of the Disney film, "Lefty," while Tami Elliott (1984-86) won 10 All-American awards before becoming Miss Virginia and competing in the Miss America pageant.

Baseball exploded onto the national scene behind former Coach Augie Garrido by breaking the USC monopoly in the NCAA western regionals in Fullerton's first Div. I season in 1975. The Titans have gone on to win four national championships and establish a remarkable winning tradition over four decades. The Titans captured their first NCAA title in 1979 behind Tim

Wallach, who would go on to play 17 major league seasons. They won again in 1984 behind College World Series MVP John Fishel, in 1995 behind national player of the year Mark Kotsay and again in 2004 behind All-American pitcher Jason Windsor, who won two games and saved a third in Omaha to cap a two-year, 8-0 post-season record. Coach George Horton has won national coach of the year honors in two of the past three seasons.

Women also have sparkled on Fullerton diamonds. Hall of Fame Coach Judi Garman founded the softball program in 1980 and won more games (913) than any previous coach The Titans have made eight trips to the College World Series and 22 regional appearances. They brought home an NCAA Championship in 1986 and boast three national players of the year in pitchers Kathy Van Wyk, Susan LeFebvre and Connie Clark.

The now-defunct football program made great strides in Division I-A after its humble Div. II beginnings in 1970. Coach Gene Murphy guided the Titans to two conference championships and four runner-up finishes between 1983 and 1989. Titan products included Super Bowl rookies Bobby Kemp (Cincinnati in 1982) and Mark Collins (New York Giants in 1987). Titans have had remarkable success in the Canadian Football League. Allen Pitts was the CFL's all-time leading receiver and Damon Allen, who was still active this season, is the all-time leading passer, and Mike Pringle is the all-time leading rusher.

With the loss of football, Head Coach Al Mistri's soccer program filled the void in Titan Stadium. A women's squad was launched in 1993 and it coincided with a memorable men's season that saw the Titans climb as high as No. 3 in the national rankings. They were led by All-American forward Eddie Soto and competed at the NCAA Final Four, placing third. There have been three subsequent trips to the playoffs and a No. 2 national ranking in 1996. On the international level, former Titan Brian Dunseth captained the U.S. Olympic team in the 2000 Sydney Olympics.

There have been national titles in men's cross country (1971) and women's fencing (1974) and individual standouts such as golfers Martha Wilkerson and Paul Wise, runner Mark Covert and wrestler Laszlo Molnar, who finished second in the nation in 1994 at 167 pounds. Heather Killeen became the Titans' first Div. I cross country All-American in 1994, won three events at the 1995 Big West Conference track championships and was one of 10 finalists for 1995 NCAA Woman of the Year Award. Brandon Campbell was the Big West track and field male athlete of the year in 2001 after starring in the high jump, long jump and quarter mile. He also was a starter on the basketball team.

Several current and recent Titans have garnered international attention including appearances in the 2004 Olympics in Athens. Catcher Jenny Topping played for the gold medal-winning U.S. Softball team while outfielder Lindsey Bashor was on the Greek team. Competing for Mexico were pole vaulter Giovanni Lanaro and soccer player Marlene Sandoval.

On the diamond, 15 Titan baseball players have donned the Red, White, and Blue with Team USA, including shortstop Blake Davis in 2005.

What about the nickname?

"Why do you have an elephant for your mascot?"

Those are two of the first questions that arise when a Cal State Fullerton athletic team makes its inaugural visit to an area. While the relatively young institution carved out of the Orange County citrus groves may be too new for many traditions, there are some recognized legends.

hat exactly is a Titan?

"It was the students' decision in a vote," explained Dr. Ernest Becker, founding Dean of Students, of the nickname "Titans." "More than a hundred names were suggested, and the Student Council took on the job of narrowing the list down to a few for the purposes of an election. The vote was close, with Titans narrowly prevailing over Aardvarks and Rebels."

It was a unique student body, all upper division students until 1963. There were 453 of them, mostly female, in 1959, the first year of classes at what was then known as Orange County State College.

"Even when it was decided that 'Titans' would be the nickname, there was confusion as to what it represented," said Becker. "I was thinking of a large mythological figure from Greek history, not unlike Tommy Trojan, but with perhaps straighter, more modern lines. In the same vein, the original dormitories were named Othrys Hall. There were others, however, who related the name to the Titan missile then in prominence."

Nothing official was done but then along came the "First Intercollegiate Elephant Race in Human History."

What began as a practical joke attracted elephants from universities around the nation and even Oxford from England. A crowd estimated at more than 10,000 people turned out on "Dumbo Downs" as the hastily graded field became known that spring afternoon in 1962.



To publicize the event, a circus-like elephant called Tuffy the Titan was used and it began appearing on sweaters and notebook covers around the campus. With no other mascot, the elephant was unofficially adopted. Several revisions of the caricature have been made to create a more tenacious Tuffy, or Titus as he also was called in an attempt to make him Greek. The costume that brings the mascot to life also has changed. Tuffy even attracted a female Tiffy in 1992.

The origin of the school colors also bears discussion. The students voted for royal blue and white, but the athletic equipment manager at the time thought orange was appropriate on uniforms for a school known as Orange County State College. The unofficial color was "adopted" and finally was formally acknowledged by the Athletics Council in 1987. A change to a navy blue was initiated in 1992 with a de-emphasis of the orange.

al State Fullerton recognizes the priority of the studentathlete's academic success. Athletic Academic Services works closely with other student support departments, faculty, and coaches to ensure the academic progress and promote general well being of the student athlete.

The services have been created to assist student-athletes with a number of issues ranging from the development of personal responsibility and educational goals to addressing personal and social problems that are unique for our students.

The staff takes a proactive role by coordinating academic plans, study skills workshops, tutoring sessions, study hall, mentoring, and advisement. Student-athletes are also monitored on their academic progress towards graduation, provided personalized, priority advisement and registration, and alerted when their academic progress may be considered at-risk.



In addition to the academic services, Cal State Fullerton participates in the NCAA's CHAMPS/Life Skills program which is aimed at enhancing the quality of the student-athletes experience within the university setting. University 100-Life Skills is a one unit mandatory class for all incoming first-time freshman student athletes. Monthly workshops around the five primary areas — academics, athletics, personal development, career

development and community service — are coordinated specifically for student-athletes. Additional activities by students wishing to serve in a leadership role advocating on behalf of student-athletes or coordinating community-service projects can been met by participating with the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC).

he athletic training program at Cal State Fullerton plays a major role in maintaining the health of Titan student-athletes.

Team physicians, three full-time certified athletic trainers, two certified graduate assistants and more than 20 student assistants comprise a program that is generally regarded as one of the very best in the country.

Titan athletic training personnel specialize in preventive medicine, recognition of injuries and rehabilitation. Student athletic trainers who are admitted into the highly selective ATEP (Athletic Training Educational Program), which is administered through the Department of Kinesiology and Health Promotion, must meet demanding requirements. In addition to taking 100 units of kinesiology and athletic training courses, they must serve five semesters and 1,500 clinical supervised hours.

Before becoming certified, candidates must pass the National Athletic Trainers' Association Board of Certification examination. Since 1997, nearly 80 percent of Cal State Fullerton graduates have passed on their first attempt, compared to the national rate of about 30 percent. Since the inception of the program, dozens of alumni have moved into coveted positions across the country (see below).



ATHLETIC FACILITIES





TITAN GYMNASIUM

Titan Gym continues to undergo major renovations. In the past few years, chairback seats have replaced most of the bleachers, portable basket supports have replaced the fold down backboards, new paint and banners have been applied to the walls and the playing surface has been redone. Recently completed was an expansion that features numerous classrooms, physical testing laboratories, a new upstairs practice facility, as well as additional seating. A new "drop down" scoreboard over center court was installed in the spring of 2003. The facility also features practice and match rooms for the wrestling, gymnastics and fencing programs.

GOODWIN FIELD

Goodwin Field has played host to five NCAA Regionals and four Super Regionals in the past six years. A \$3 million expansion project, spearheaded by a \$1 million gift from Jerry and Merilyn Goodwin, has transformed the field into one of the premier collegiate facilities on the West Coast. The field now features the Wilson Clubhouse — which includes lockerrooms, a reception area and offices for the coaches — and the Doubek VIP Room. In 2005, Goodwin Field also became home of the Fullerton Flyers of the independent Golden Baseball League.



TITAN SOFTBALL COMPLEX

Having received a complete makeover since the 2000 season, the Titan Softball Complex boasts one of the top facilities in the nation. Utilizing the adjacent Wilson Clubhouse and Doubek VIP Room, the two-diamond complex can now adequately serve as a host site for postseason competition (it was the site of an eight-team NCAA Regional in 2003) in addition to the annual Kia Klassic, the top regular-season tournament in the nation.

GOODWIN FIELD

TITAN STADIUM

Titan Stadium is considered among the finest soccer facilities in the nation and regularly hosts professional and international soccer matches in addition to the Titan men's and women's programs. The facility, completed in 1992, was home to the Titan football program for one year before the sport was dropped after the 1992 season. The stadium is also a hot-spot for the entertainment industry and is regularly featured in television commercials and programs. UCLA also utilized the facility in 2003 for its fall football camp. The playing surface was totally renovated in July of 2005.





al State Fullerton student-athletes have year-round access to the services offered by the Strength and Conditioning Program, under the direction of Andy Williams. Aimed at developing speed, power, strength and endurance in Cal State Fullerton's student-athletes, the program plays a key role in the success of Titan teams.

Individual workouts are designed, implemented and regularly adjusted by Williams to help each student-athlete develop the stamina needed to maintain the rigorous year-round workouts associated with Division I sports.

Located inside Titan Stadium is a 6,000 square-foot weight room facility featuring eight platforms, eight squat racks, plyometric devices and nearly 8,000 pounds in free weights. The facility will service more than 300 student-athletes over the course of the year.

ANDY WILLIAMS was named Cal State Fullerton's second full-time strength and conditioning coach on Oct. 11, 2004. Williams came to Fullerton after spending the previous 20 months as the director of human performance at Somerset Sports and Rehabilitation in New Jersey.

Armed with a wide range of experience, Williams spent two years as the head strength & conditioning coach at Tennessee State, working with football and women's basketball, and a year each at Middle Tennessee State (assistant strength and conditioning coach) and Connecticut (grad asst.).

In 1999, Williams was the head strength and conditioning coach for the Frankfurt Galaxy of NFL Europe during their World Bowl Championship season and also served as the assistant special teams coach. He also served a two-year internship with the NFL's Kansas City Chiefs from 1996-98 and was an intern with Major League Baseball's Kansas City Royals during spring training in 1997.

Williams earned his bachelor's degree in exercise science from Missouri Western State College in 1997, where he also played three seasons at outside linebacker, and completed his coursework for a master's degree in education at Middle Tennessee State in 2002.

al State Fullerton is nestled in sun-drenched Orange County, with its mountains, amusement parks, professional sports, cultural showcases and seashores among the top attractions. Students can reach ski slopes in 45 minutes and the beach in

less than a half hour. Los Angeles, with its never-ending cultural and entertainment opportunities, lies just 30 miles northwest of the campus and San Diego is 100 miles to the south. The city of Fullerton itself, which has a fascinating history dating back to the late 19th century, boasts a beautiful historic downtown area that features dozens of restaurants, museums and shops.

The extensive development of the 42 miles of beaches in Orange County and attractions such as Disneyland, Knott's Berry Farm, the Laguna Festival of Arts and Pageant of the Masters, the Arrowhead Pond of Anaheim, Angel Stadium and the Orange County Performing Arts Center continue to make tourism an increasingly important activity. So does the Mediterranean-type climate, with rainfall averaging 14 inches per year, and generally mild days (either freezing or 100-degree temperatures uncommon) with frequent morning fog during the summer.
