



He stuck with it, and by the age of 19 he was working his way through college by teaching accordion and playing professionally over radio station KSOO. During WWII he joined a U.S.O. unit and entertained the troops in Europe. Myron was "discovered" by Lawrence Welk in 1950 and has been with Mr. Welk's band ever since.

His favorite music is, of course, the polka, although he is fond of all types, and is equally adept in playing all kinds. Myron and his wife Berdye, have five daughters; their oldest daughter, Kristie, is married to Bobby Burgess, dancing star of Welk's popular program.

WHAT IS LEISURE VILLAGE?

(Editors note: The following is a speech that was given by Leisure Village resident Ed Coleman at the Annual Homeowners Meeting. Mr. Coleman, was elected by the residents to serve on the Board of Directors of Leisure Village Association, Inc. He is currently Vice-President of the Association.)

What is this thing called Leisure Village? Is it the security gate? Is it the paved streets? Is it the green belt? Is it our houses? Is it this building? Or maybe Leisure Village is someone calling you on the telephone to say, I'll take care of your garden." Maybe it's someone you haven't even met calling and saying, "I hear you have been in the hospital, can we help?" Maybe it's your neighbor with a newspaper clipping telling you, "This is about your home town. I thought of you." Possibly this is Leisure Village---The other day I was on the practice greens, a family that just finished a game of golf--I thought how nice, here is a family enjoying Leisure Village. Then they disappeared behind a building. I sort of forgot about them. Them I looked up and there they were with a lunch basket at one of the picnic tables. Isn't this what Leisure Village is all about? A family playing together, sharing together, living together, and growing together.

I like to think of Leisure Village as more than concrete and stucco. I like to think of it as people. People more interested in someone else rather than themselves. People more interested in giving rather than receiving: Just plain delightful folks, active, alive, vibrant, and enthusiastic. Beautiful people--that goes for the staff as well as the residents.

The recreation facilities and programs are excellent--but good as they are, I have always thought there ought to be more to retirement than "Fun & Games." When those of us that are not now employed were working we were a part of something. We belonged to and we contributed something. Now, suddenly nothing. These motives are gone. How better can we again become a part of something than by becoming involved in the affairs of our very own community, Leisure Village.

How do we do this? By Communicating--If there is something you don't like, tell your Board of Directors. If you have an idea on how to do something better, say it. Just because something has been done the same way for a hundred years doesn't mean there's not a better way. We were given an information package when we moved in. Among other things in this package were a set of "Rules & Regulations" -there were 155 of them. I counted them. Now if you don't like 154 of them or 3-4-10-of them or you think there should be 214 of them, say it. You know there are provisions for changing the rules. One I can think of has already been changed. The golf course was to have been closed only till noon, well anyway its been half changed.

Now if by chance there is something you do like, say so. Everyone likes a pat on the back and this will help two people, yourself, and the person you are talking with. One of man's most priceless possessions is imagination. We all have it. Because someone used theirs, we now have, autos, T.V.'s, electric lights, and yes, a Leisure Village. Let's use this imagination to make our community a better one. Let's not be satisfied with a Leisure Village that's just as good as Sun City, Leisure World, or another Leisure Village Let's have a better than community. There is more experience and know-how in this room than in the entire city. You are all experts in one field or another. Why not use this talent to produce a better than Leisure Village?

The other day I saw something in the Voice of the Village. The gist of it was, "We don't sell homes, we sell happiness." Happiness isn't something you barter like a bushel of wheat. You wouldn't want it that way either. But I'll bet when you move into your homes and become acquainted, you found Happiness.


