The formula room was under the supervision of Mary Miyamoto, registered nurse, assisted by Amy Outa and Fujiye Ninomiya who prepared the formula milk and the Pablum's cereal which was delivered to the individual apartments by the messengers.

The maternity ward located in this hospital was headed by registered nurse, Tomie Matsuda, and the ward was divided into three divisions, a nursery, delivery room and a recovery room.

DR. HASHIBA HEADS HOSPITAL 3

On May 29, 1942, the third and last hospital to be opened in this Center was opened with Dr. G. Hashiba as the physician in charge.

The main function of this hospital was to hospitalize the tuberculosis patients, and one of the two laboratories in this Center was located at this hospital. Momoyo Koga, head laboratory technician, was formerly employed at the Twining Laboratories, a commercial and research laboratory in Fresno.

GIRL SCOUTS -- LEADERSHIP TRAINING

The Girl Scout movement, begun several weeks prior to the evacuation through the efforts of Dr. Joseph D. Sasaki, received its start in the Center on May 25, when plans were made for the formation of Girl Scout troops.

Lectures on the problems of group leadership were conducted weekly by capable individuals, among them, Mrs. Earl Petersen, executive secretary of the Fresno Girl Scout Council.

Nine troops, including the Brownies, were formed, in addition to the Senior Troop, accommodating girls between the ages of 15 and 18, and the Leadership Training Circle, formed for the purpose of training girls over 18 for future leadership. The latter two groups were active in community affairs in many ways.

The activities of the Girl Scouts were the Flag Day ceremony on June 14 at the Center Bowl, the Fourth of July program, the Get Together Social, the Brownies' Play Day, Brownies' Mothers' Tea, and the Girl Scouts' Play Day.

The Brownies donated potted plants and seeds for the Girls' Center Scouts' Garden, which was taken care of by all the troops.

BOY SCOUTS -- AND THEIR GOOD DEEDS

On May 21, 1942, Dr. Joseph D. Sasaki, sustaining member of the Sequoia Council, called a meeting of all former scouts. Fifteen boys, now holding various positions on the Eleventh District Council, responded. Dr. Sasaki was named chairman of the district, which covers the Center.

During the first few weeks, there was only one troop of 35 boys, but after a membership drive, the group split in two, with Larry Hikiji taking over troop I--35 boys from Section A to D and George Mochizuki handling troop II of 42 boys from Section E to K.

On August 28, Teruo Inouye of troop II was awarded a silver medal for all around scout.

In the first Court of Honor, 17 boys received their tenderfoot

badges and two received second class badges. In the second Court of Honor, 35 boys received Tenderfoot, 11, second class, and 2 first class badges. There were also 115 cub scout awards of Bobcat pins.

"Do a good turn daily" is the scouts' basis for assistance. The boys went on a metal and paper salvage drives, collecting over 1,000 milk bottles and 500 soda pop bottles. At the request of the hospital staff, the Boy Scouts conducted a drive for medicine bottles, netting a generous collection.

With three weiner bakes behind them, the members of the Eleventh District Council and troop leaders topped off their activities with a dinner party.
