Changes are underway that promise to beautify the main entrance to the Village while also greatly increasing auto safety. The entrance has been long criticized for somewhat unsightly appearance and the very limited view afforded traffic as it exits onto Santa Rosa Road.

Bobbi Comer, co-chair of the Buildings and Grounds Committee and a member of the Landscape Committee has designed the new entrance with the blessing of the Board, the support of the Garden Club, and a consultation with Joanne Rosedahl, the landscape architect who designed the Gazebo Garden. Comer also played a lead role in the selection of the new paint

color scheme and the adoption of the slumpstone wall program.

In planning the new entrance, she had two major goals: First, to provide unobstructed visibility for drivers; second, to have a clean, easy-to-maintain design within an architectural boundary. These guides are evident in the new design.

The current bordering curb around the entrance garden will be retained. A new 12 to 18 inch slumpstone border will surround a small central planting area containing the palm trees, rock groupings and flowering plants. Then, a subtle, but potentially beautiful, border of green lawn grass surrounds the planter and extends sev-

eral feet to the roadside curb completely around the area, easy to maintain and easy on the eye! Note the accompanying rendition.

Additionally, new Leisure Village signs, which will be lighted, will be installed on both walls at the entrance.

To get a feeling for the value of this change, take a look at the palms and planting along the walk from the Recreation Center to the picnic grounds. Note the changes in the pool area, the Gazebo Garden, and the fence around the Farmers' Plots. Combined, these areas provide the Village with an unsurpassed spa and recreation area. The "new" Village entrance welcomes us and guests to a beautiful place!

Mr. Griswold Goes to Sacramento

Dick Griswold, twelve year resident of Leisure Village, has been elected to the California Senior Legislature (CSL) for the 2000-2002 term of office. Dick and his wife, Georgia, moved to Leisure Village in 1988. Griswold said he "watched things for the first few years until 1993", when he was elected to the Board of Directors. After serving one term, he was asked to complete Bill Blauer's term of office in December 1995. He ran again, serving from June 1996 until June 1998. He has served as Treasurer, President, and Member at Large.

One of his accomplishments as President of the Board of Directors was an arrangement with what is now American Medical Response. Now villagers requiring ambulance transport to St. John's or Pleasant Valley Hospitals are no longer charged in excess of what Medicare and supplemental insurance provide. In 1995 alone, the residents of Leisure Village saved about \$75,000.

In the spring of 1998, a representative of Pardee Construction approached the Board asking for suggestions for the use of 3.65 acres of vacant land next to the R-N Market. Griswold suggested the property be used for assisted living

facilities. Pardee liked the idea, sold the parcel to the Marriot Hotel chain, and Brighton Gardens was built. Unfortunately, says Griswold, Pardee didn't concur with his suggestion about their 4.07 acres of property at Woodcreek and Santa Rosa Roads. Griswold's suggestion for that parcel was full care facility to complement Brighton Gardens.

Since completing his last term on the Board, Griswold's activities have included being a member of the Men's Golf Club. Dick enjoys "lots of golf" and bridge.

The Ğriswolds celebrated their fiftieth wedding anniversary in August 1999. They are parents of three adult children, and very proud grandparents of three grandsons and three granddaughters. "Georgia", says Dick, is anxious to become a great grandmother.

Illegal Use of Radar

I recently filed an action in Small Claims Court against the LVA. My reason for doing this was that, in March 1999, I was issued a citation in the Village for speeding. This citation was issued by a security guard, using radar, who not only made several mistakes on the ticket, but also made several statements in his report that were totally un-

true. I was eventually granted a hearing by the, then, current Board that was under the presidency of Mr. C.H. Humphrey. However, despite the evidence I gave them they were quite intransigent and upheld the citation. They appeared to take the attitude, "Don't confuse us with the facts. our minds are made up". This so infuriated me that I eventually filed for restitution in Small Claims Court. However, before I could give any evidence, the judge ruled that the use of radar in the Village was illegal and, if they wished to continue using it, they must first have have all the residents vote on it or, in other words, make a change in the CC&R's. I am writing this letter to make every resident aware of this ruling and wish to pose a few questions to the

Firstly, before they purchased these radar units did they seek counsel as to the legality of their use and if so what advice was given by the lawyer retained, at considerable expense, by the LVA?

Secondly, and here I quote from the judge, were they advised that anyone using these units had to be properly trained by a person qualified for the job? In addition, the judge asked the person representing the LVA, when the unit was last

calibrated before it was used in my citation. As they could not give a satisfactory answer to any of these question the judge ruled in my favor and told them to refund the fine that I had paid under protest.

Thirdly, can anyone who was issued a citation in the past, by the use of radar, seek a refund?

Finally, it appears that my claim for the refund of a fine, that I considered was unjustified, has opened up a "Pandora's Box" which I had not anticipated. Therefore, as this is the beginning of a new administration would it not behoove the Board to sit down with a competent legal counsel and review the CC&RS before another situation, such as this, arises.

FALL CLASSES TO START AT LEISURE VILLAGE

The Education and Recreation Committee is delighted to announce that college level credit courses will be presented in the upcoming fall semester which begins the week of August 21. These classes will be held here in Leisure Village and will be taught by Oxnard and Moorpark College professors.

The initial series of courses will consist of the following: History 121 (US Multicultural/migrations) which will meet in the Village Room on Thursdays at 9:30 a.m. to 12:20 p.m. (3 units), Political Science 105 (current foreign and domestic issues) will meet in the Village Room on Fridays at 9:30 a.m. to 12:20 p.m. (3 units); and Ballroom Dance 1 (M30A) which will meet in the MPR on Monday evenings from 7-9:50 p.m. (1.5 units)

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Registration will take place on August 2 and 9 in the Lanai Room from 2-5 p.m. Ms. Susan Brent, who is the registrar at Oxnard College, will be in attendance. She will answer all enrollment questions and will record all requests for future courses to be presented here. She may be reached at any time at 986-5843. The cost of registration will be \$11 per unit regardless of prior academic credits. Classes will be limited to 20 students per class.

The agreement to present this program was reached as a result of meetings by Mrs. Mitzi Ettinger and Dr. Sig Jaffe with Dr. Anthony Tricoli who is the District Vice Chancellor of Student Learning for the Community Colleges of Ventura County. The group is indebted to Mr. Ernest Ohmstedt, Chairman of the Education and Recreation committee, for expediting the process of establishing this program.

Last May the Ventura Council on Aging, an organization comprised of 35 people from all walks of life, chose Griswold to represent Ventura County in the CSL. A week later, Dick was in Sacramento for an orientation meeting. The California Senior Legislature Session will convene there from October 16-

The CSL was formed after the State Legislature requested the California Commission on Aging to develop a forum through which older Californians could develop their legislative priorities. After consultation with major seniors' groups, the California Senior State Legislature convened its first session in 1981.

The CSL is funded by the California Fund for Senior Citizens. Legislation mandates that CSL collect \$250,000 annually by asking people to make a donation for CSL using on Line 49 on their state income tax form. Griswold states that one of his goals is to educate people to do this. Any amount may be donated. He stressed its importance, since CSL could lose this source of funding if it is not supported by taxpayers. The 1999 amount was only \$218,000. Since CSL is not funded except by this means, much remains to be done to educate California taxpayers.

Besides working on fund-raising, Griswold is studying more than 120 "hot bills" that pertain to various senior concerns. In October, the legislature will narrow down the list to the ten which it feels are most important. These will be the focus of lobbying to California's elected representatives to obtain their sponsorship for eventual passage and enactment into law.

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CAMARILLO PUBLIC LIBRARY

Last month, a group of Leisure Village residents met with Kathryn Page, professional library building consultant, to discuss plans and suggestions improving the Camarillo Public Library.

Earlier this year, the voters of California approved a state bond to make money available for library construction and expansion. This money will not be automatically distributed, but will be awarded through a competitive process among many communities throughout the state. Each one will be required to submit an application and proposal based on special community needs and realistic costs.

Ms. Page has been hired by the City of Camarillo to meet with various groups in the population: businesses, schools, students, parents, etc., to get their input on what a new library should be like. Since seniors are such active library users, their ideas are considered impor-

The present Camarillo Public Library was built approximately 25 years ago when the city's population was about 1/3 its present size. Therefore, expansion and changes are certainly needed.

The Leisure Village

of specific changes they would recommend to meet their particular needs: 1) increased library staff; 2) increased library hours; 3) expansion of collections, especially audio-tapes and up-to-date large print books; 4) more current reference material; 5) more and improved computers; 6) better lighting and more space between shelves and stacks; 7) separate areas for children and adults to reduce noise level; 8) better dispersal of seating arrangements; 9) simpler book withdrawal and renewal procedures; and 10) longer borrowing pe-

Overall, Leisure Villagers appreciated the library and the services it offered, but emphasized two areas of change as priorities: more efficient arrangement and usage of space, and expanded collections of reference and other reading mate-

The library consultant will complete her overall assessment after meeting with all community focus groups, and will then submit her recommendations to the City Council by 7/1/00. This report will then be considered at an open council meeting to which public is invited and encouraged to attend. The final residents listed a number step will be the formal

proposal for application to the State for library funds. Whatever the result may be, Leisure Village residents are pleased that they had the opportunity to participate in the process.
