Since 1996, Jane has led the effort to protect the beauty of the landscape and the exterior areas of homes in Leisure Village. As the premier member of the Buildings and Grounds Committee, she singlehandedly has trained and guided an

army of residents who walk the villages checking for structural defects, untidy gardens, rotting fences, overgrown bushes and trees, and assorted eyesores that are controlled by the rules of our community — rules we can check in the LV phone book. Jane and her troops are volunteers; those rules are their last words.

The team is not a police force nor a landscaping crew. Jane has created a group of friendly neighbors who keep the Village beautiful by monitoring it — watching for decay, neglect or untended wear and tear and respectfully





Board rejects changing Rec Center name to 'Club House'

At its March meeting, the Board rejected changing the name of the Recreation Center to "Club House."

Very likely, the issue may come up in the future. If it does, the Board and Homeowners should consider how lexicographers at a couple of editions of Webster's define the term Club House: 1, a building occupied or used by a club(s); 2, a locker room used by an athletic team; 3, an enclosed section of a grandstand at a racetrack with a restaurant; 4, a communal dwelling for certain unmarried men of primitive tribes.

Granted, while bits and pieces of all our activities occur there, it is hardly a Club House and certainly is not used only for recreational activities.

The currently named Rec Center is, in fact, the physical heart of all the many activities we have undertaken and, as with the spectacular popularity of Wii Bowling, are likely to devise in the years to come, even to the fact that it is where we meet to govern ourselves.

It is, in sum, "a meeting place, often a complex of buildings, where the people of a community may carry on cultural, recreational or social activities."

That is how Webster's New World College Dictionary defines the term "Community Center" — if there's any name change, that name should be good enough for us all.

In the least, it would be the most accurate.



Some egg-cellent tidbits just in time for Passover, Easter

With Passover and Easter coming on the same weekend this year, we have hit the egg jackpot! Not only are eggs perfect for all spring menus, but they are healthy, filling, easy to prepare — and easy to eat.

Here are some egg-cellent tidbits

· White vs. brown? White eggs are from hens with white feathers, and brown eggs are from hens with brown ones. There is really no difference in flavor or nutrition. However, some cooks say that the brown shells are a bit sturdier and therefore crack more

· Organic and/or cage free? The hens that produce these are given special feed that contains no commercial fertilizers, pesticides or herbicides. Furthermore, the hens are able to run around outside in an area covered with natural vegetation. It does sound more humane, but be

prepared to pay up to four times the price for this "spa" treatment.

If you are going to hard or soft cook eggs, here are some things to keep in mind:

• The older the eggs, the easier they are to peel.

This is my sister's recipe for perfect hard-boiled eggs:

· First of all, start with eggs that have no cracks.

• Don't add salt, as it raises the boiling point of the water, making the white rubbery. Place the eggs gently in a pot and cover with cold water by one inch. Bring them to a high boil. Immediately turn off the heat and remove the pot, covering with a lid. Let sit and set your timer for exactly 20 minutes. Then immerse the eggs in cold water with some ice cubes for about 10 minutes or until the eggs cool down.

 Peel them under cold running water starting from the middles, trying to peel away the membranes with the shell. You will have perfect hard-boiled eggs this way.

By the way, when you use eggs for baking, be sure to use large eggs, as using extra-large or jumbo eggs will alter the chemistry, especially in cake recipes. Truly farm-fresh eggs, often available on Saturday mornings at the Camarillo Farmers Market, are prized by professional pastry chefs. The yolks are often larger and vibrant in color. So if you are planning a special Passover or Easter dessert, you may want to get to the Farmers Market early.

More excellent tips for egg-citing

 If eggs are stuck to the carton, wet the carton and they should come out without breaking.

· Storing eggs with their pointed end down will keep them fresh longer and vield fewer broken volks. It also helps keep the yolks in the middle.

· To slice hard boiled eggs, wet the knife first to prevent the yolks from

crumbling.

· Eggs cook better and the whites will yield a larger whipped volume and whip better if they are at room temperature.

Finally, here is a recipe for a terrific, easy breakfast, lunch or snack:

Eggs in a Mug

1 to 2 Tablespoons drained diced tomatoes or salsa

1/8 teaspoon Italian seasoning (or oregano)

4 slices of turkey pepperoni*, diced 1/2 cup liquid egg substitute or 3 egg whites

1 wedge Light Laughing Cow cheese (plain or flavored), diced

1/2 teaspoon low-fat Parmesan cheese, for garnish, optional

Season tomatoes with Italian seasoning, set aside. Spray a large microwave-safe ceramic mug lightly with nonstick spray. Add the egg and diced cheese. Microwave on high for 50 seconds. Stir gently, adding salsa or tomatoes and pepperoni, if desired. Microwave for another 40 seconds (more or less), depending on how firm you like your scrambled eggs. Stir gently. You can now "dump" this on a plate or leave in the mug and add the cheese on top.

Makes one serving.

* You can make this with diced ham, real bacon bits and cooked turkey bacon, too.



Stan also had a full life with his wife, Ruth, for 42 years when she


left him too suddenly with cancer. He helped her raise three wonderful daughters, Laura, Nancy and Debra, and he has six grandchildren.



Realtors Corner: How much will I pay in closing costs?

Typical closing costs for a residential real estate transaction will be approximately 2 percent of the selling price, not including broker commission.

The seller is required to pay the property tax and homeowner association fee through the last day of ownership. Buyers will usually hire a home inspector to provide a report on the condition of the home. Based on that report, the buyer will request corrections and/or credit for the named items needing repair. This does not include cosmetic upgrades. Of course, any loans or liens will be paid before the close of escrow to provide clear title to the new owner.

In our area, it is usually the seller who pays for the title fee that

is referred to as the owner's policy. The owner's policy covers the new owner's interest and "title" to the new property. The buyer typically pays for the "lender policy" that will cover the new lender's interest in the "title" to the property if there is a new loan. Escrow fees are usually split between the seller and buyer.

Additional closing fees include loan, notary, document preparation, deed recording, pest inspection and correction, natural hazard disclosure report, courier or delivery and tax service.

Hearing the music of "Waltz Across Texas" coming from the AR might pique your interest. If you were to peek in the door on a Tuesday or Friday afternoon, you would see a group of dancers moving in a line to waltz rhythm. They are not in cowboy boots, but more likely in tennis shoes. They are not in poufy, crinolined skirts or cowboy shirts and jeans, more likely in sweat pants. There are fewer men than women, but the numbers of both are growing each week.

This is Sharon O'Connor's line dance class at Leisure Village. Line dances are no longer made up of just the stereotypical country music. Dances are created to many styles of music — country as well as modern pop, Irish, Latin to name a few. Some of the dances Sharon has taught include the "Strait Cha-Cha," "Stealing the Best" (an Irish Dance), "Jitterbuggin" and, in time for Valentine's Day, "The Cupid Shuffle."

Line dancing here at Leisure

On the first Friday of each month, Sharon and Sue-Ellen Colp welcome both residents and outside dancers for an evening of line and couple dancing. A deejay takes dance requests and alternates between couple and line dances. Sharon's dance students get

the opportunity to practice what they have learned in class.

The dance is going into its third year and has grown in popularity with about 100 in attendance each month. Many come just to watch the dancing and enjoy the music.

Ballroom dancing

If you were to peek in the AR, but this time on a Saturday night, you would see couples engaged in all styles of ballroom dancing. The dancers dress up a bit more for their Saturday night fun.

Ginny Dunnion remembers ballroom dancing with her husband in 1976 when the cost of admission was 25 cents. Yes, you read it correctly, one slim quarter got you in the door for an evening of dancing to a deejay playing cassette tapes.

Now so many years later, the Ballroom Dance is still going strong

every Saturday night. The beautiful wood dance floor has replaced what once was linoleum, and a live band performs in place of a deejay. And the price has gone up to \$7.

Besides the couples, there are also singles that mingle. Like the monthly line dance, the weekly ballroom dance attracts many outsiders who appreciate the wholesome fun found here at Leisure Village. Therese and Conrad Kaiser, Joyce Baker, Wayne King and a team of 23 volunteers are behind this successful weekly production.

Folk dancing

Once again, we hear music coming from the AR. It is Monday afternoon at 1 p.m. Hearing the music compels you to move. It is folk dancing music, a form of dance that reflects the traditional life of the people from a certain country or region. The steps of folk dances are passed down through generations, rarely being changed.

Our International Folk Dance class at Leisure Village has evolved like so many others over the years. Naomi Wieselman and her late husband were both past presidents of the club. Naomi has been coming to the class for more than 17 years. She said that at one time, there were three folk dancing classes. Some of the cultures represented are Greek, Russian, Romanian, Turkish, Israeli, Japanese and Taiwanese.

Valerie Daley has been teaching International Folk Dancing here for eight years and has performed with her students in several Leisure Village musical productions. Her passion for dancing and her affection for her students are apparent as you see her teach.

As I watched the dancers, the joy they felt was obvious as they lifted their feet, moved to the music, clapped their hands and shouted "Hey!" Like line dancing, these dances don't always require a partner, most being done in a line, others in a circle. The current class is small

in number but no less enthusiastic and would joyfully welcome new members.

At one time square dancing, clogging and tap dancing were also taught at Leisure Village. With increased interest, more classes could be formed again. I've seen the folk

dancers attending the line dance classes; they do cross over. Perhaps the line dancers will join the folk dancers.

A current line dance that Sharon is teaching is "Miller Magic," a medley of Glenn Miller music that the ballroom dancers would enjoy.


