Selected Skipper

Of 'Golden Bear'

The board of governors of the California Maritime Academy has appointed Capt. Carl G. Bowman, USCG, chief of staff, Twelfth Coast Guard District in San Francisco, as commanding officer of the training ship, Golden Bear.

Captain Bowman, selected from a field of nine outstanding candidates for the vacancy created by the death of Capt. E. A. Turpin, also will serve as head of the Department of Nautical Science at the Maritime Academy.

The new training ship skipper, who is 52, was graduated from the bachelor of science degree in 1929. He holds an unlimited license as master of sail, steam or motor vehicles.

WAR SERVICE

During World War II, he served as executive officer in the C-4 transports General Howze and General Black. At the end of the war Captain Bowman was in command of the Coast Guard cutter Taney, then an AGC, at Okinawa.

He served in the Taney for three years following the war in San

Francisco before commanding the ice breaker Mackinaw for 15 months.

From 1950 to 1954, the officer was head of the seamanship, navigation and aviation department of the Coast Guard Academy. In this capacity he was in command of the academy training ship, Eagle, during her active commission for three months each summer.
