Amateur Radio Club Offers Professional Results and Security



Leisure Village needs the Amateur Radio club. While some people think it's just a small club for a few hobbyists to have fun contacting other hams, there is more to it. The city and county needs volunteers who are able to set up communications in emergency and disaster situations. So our club promotes training and exercises concentrating on the use of our equipment for emergency situations.

We are members of the Auxiliary Communications Service (ACS) of Ventura County. The ACS group prepares for the unexpected in times of need but also helps out with community events such as the Camarillo Airshow and Christmas Parade to provide emergency communications. In an era of cell phones and the Internet, amateur radio still plays an important role in times of disaster or emergency.

Some of our amateur radio operators were a part of a Ventura County Mass Care and Shelter Exercise. Our local ham radio operators provided communications support between the different transportation agencies that normally have no ability to contact each other. Other recent events included an earthquake simulation with the U.S. Geological Survey and another with the Red Cross.

Our current setup allows us to use our higher powered shortwave radios to transmit messages from the LV Ham Shack to anywhere there is a working email system. So if our power, Internet and cell phones were down, we would still be able to summon help from the city, county or state. We would also have the ca-

pability to get messages to the email addresses of our relatives outside the affected area to let them know our status and well-being.

Thanks to the donations of our LV residents and the support of our past president Ted Lansing plus our members, the station was upgraded in 2017 to become state of the art. The LV ham radio station, KJ6LV, is now the premiere, shortwave emergency communications facility of the

Sending Village Warmth Across Ventura County

The beginning of 2021 was chilling - and not just because of the surge in COVID cases. The weather, too, was brutal with frigid temperatures and howling winds across Ventura County. The discomfort, that kept many people at home, had a different effect on members of LV's Women's Club who quickly recognized that homeless people outside our gates and across the county needed help. "When we distributed the thousands of protective masks made by Villagers to shelters and service groups, we heard about the people with no housing, no warm clothing, or protection," says Mamata Kalle. Shearon Millar mentioned that the Women's Club had some used cold weather clothes in its storage area. Could they be donated? Shearon's affirmative answer started an amazing example of Village generosity.

How European Ingenuity Created the COVID Vaccine

One year ago this month the coronavirus morphed into a world-wide full-blown crisis; it laid bare the dangers to life and limb. One month before the first American died of the Covid-19 virus, scientists had already designed the vaccine we take today! How was this possible? The call to tackle such a contagious and deadly virus was organized with brilliant science ingenuity, preparation, and the benefits of globalization.

In a Massachusetts laboratory, run by a team of researchers, scientists, and medical entrepreneurs from around the world, historic life-saving maneuvers to produce a desperately needed and coveted vaccine was taking place. It was indeed a massive enterprise! Moderna scientists at the lab used the genetic sequence of the virus, made public by China, to design an mRNA molecule that teaches the immune system



to recognize it and neutralize it. The Moderna vaccine employs a technology created by Hungarian-born scientist Katalin Karipo. Simultaneously, Pfizer Pharmaceutical House, in conjunction with BioNTech, a European company, headquartered in New York City embarked on the same direly-needed medical miracle. With their German counterparts, the Pfizer vaccine was produced by second-generation Turkish immigrants to Germany, Ugur Sahin and Ozlem Tureci. Their scientific creativity was pushed past the finish line by company CEO Albert Bourla, an immigrant from Greece.

By February, 2020, completion of the two vaccines was accomplished within a few weeks of each other, and shipped to the National Institutes of Health to start clinical trials. This largely unknown time-line shows that while development of the coronavirus vaccines was astonishingly rapid - testing them was painstaking. More than 300,000 Americans died and some 16 million more were infected while a nearly miraculous solution went under testing and approval. Needless to say: For sound reasons of safety and ethics, science and government did not authorize their use until solid testing results were complete; and rush approval was enacted by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

A most remarkable achievement in our lifetimes!


Nine Special Words



RE: My Stash

Dear Rocky:

We haven't met before but I know a lot of your Leisure Village family. Since you have experience in squirreling away food supplies, if you'll excuse the expression, I'm writing you to see if you can help with a couple of concerns; (a) better navigate buying and storing food supplies during the pandemic and since I'm up here in the Rockies (you can tell by the snow falling on my head), give me a few ideas on scavenging in the wild.

Food Storage

Not sure if your tree has internet, but I do and I'm having problems on the Costco website. The pictures are all the same size so when I don't look closely, I end up buying a 3 year supply of saran wrap...the small box looks just like the giant one. And, before I knew it, I found myself with 5 pounds of oatmeal I bought in error. I made some oatmeal cookies, but the oatmeal risotto and oatmeal lasagna didn't turn out so well. What are some ways you use acorns? I see your friends running around all the time with them in their mouths.

Wild Food

The other day I was in the woods and came home with a nice supply of wild mushrooms, dried honeycomb, pawpaw, elderberry flowers and pigweed. I kind of feel like I'm a contestant on that Food Network show where you have to cook something spontaneously from 5 weird ingredients...Sweet & Sour Pawpaw with an Elderberry reduction garnished with pigweed?!

Looking forward to your response. In the meantime, if you find yourself with a lot of leftover oatmeal, try my cookies. I'm not much of a baker but when you got 5 pounds of oatmeal, you gotta try something different...see the next column:

Ingredients

2 cups quick-cooking oats 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder 1/8 teaspoon baking soda 1/2 teaspoon kosher salt 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon 1/2 cup crunchy peanut butter 1 large egg - room temperature 1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract 1/2 cup honey 1/2 cup raisins

In a large bowl, whisk together the oats, baking powder, baking soda, cinnamon, salt. In a medium bowl, combine peanut butter, egg, vanilla, honey. Whisk well. Mix the two bowls together. Add the pigweed and the pawpaw...no wait, that's the other recipe...add the raisins and cool for thirty minutes. It's gonna be a sticky mess.

Line a large rimmed baking sheet with parchment paper. Re-



tor. With a cookie scoop or spoon, drop the dough into 2-inch balls and arrange on the baking sheet, leaving 1 inch of space around each, gently flatten each cookie to be about 3/4-inch thick. Put in a preheated 350 degree oven..

Bake until golden and firm around the edges, about 10 minutes. Remove from oven, cool for 2 minutes, then transfer the cookies to the rack to cool completely.

HISTORIC REFLECTION By Max Copenhagen

THE NATURAL VILLAGE: The Virtual Living Forest of Leisure Village

We live in a forest of 4400 trees, over 150 different species. The most abundant trees are listed in the attached box. Other interesting trees present in small numbers are Chinese Flame, Ginkgo, Camphor, Norfolk Island Pine and New Zealand Christmas Trees. You can read a story about Norfolk Island Pines in "Tales of the South Pacific" by James Michener.

Villager, and Landscape committee chair Don Marquardt, explains that we have so many different and exotic trees because the layout was planned by landscape architects working in New Jersey for the corporation that built the Village.

We had a big wind storm on January 19th. Strong winds of 46 mph were measured at the Camarillo Airport with possibly higher gusts here in the Village. Sadly, we lost at least 42 of our trees.

The last extreme weather event a virtual botanical garden with was in 2011 when a lot of trees were damaged after 5 inches of rain and strong south winds. Landscaping Assistant Angel Tarango, who has worked for the Village for the past ten years, says "That was a bad storm. It had been raining for days, and the soil was saturated when the wind hit. About 50 trees of all sizes fell down."

> Why do trees blow over? Aside from the strength of the wind, it mostly depends on the kind of tree and the soil conditions. Palm trees generally survive storms with their tall limber trunks flexing in the wind. What bends does not so easily break. A lot also depends on the roots. Some trees, like oaks, send a deep tap root down to find groundwater, but some have shallow roots. Trees growing in moist soil, like Redwoods along a stream, do not need to go deep. When the soil is thin and moist, roots tend to fan out near the surface.

Then, when that soil is saturated by sustained rain, it can get slippery and roots do not hold.

Other factors are spacing and the quality of the wind. In a dense forest, each tree is protected by other trees around it, while a lone tree on a golf course or wide expanse is exposed to the full force of the wind. Many trees that would survive a steady high wind will succumb to the force of a sudden gust in those conditions. If it is raining, the extra weight in the canopy increases the risk of a tree toppling over. Even if a tree is not completely uprooted in a strong wind, it may break at a place where it is weak or rotten.

Landscape Superintendent Mike Undem says, "Urban forests like ours face many new challenges, such as non-native pests, reclaimed water and drought. Our goal is to continue to develop a planting program to identify and resolve these challenges."

The Village contracts with West Coast Arborists for professional tree services. In the past, trees were marked with metal tags, but now they can be identified with GPS. This is important for assessing and managing their health, tracking work history and scheduling future needs. Once we had over 5700 trees, but many had to be removed due to disease, rodents and to prevent damaging roofs, foundations, curbs and sidewalks.

It is sad to lose so many trees. We may not notice a wind-thrown tree in the natural forest. Without

injuries or property damage, it is just a natural phenomenon. When we see our lovely trees blown down, it is distressing. Yet, we can try to look at the cup as more than half full. After almost 50 years, we still have many large trees in the Village, and the survivors are the tough ones and likely to be here after the next big storm. "Nevertheless", Marquardt says, "I love the landscape and will continue to make suggestions to improve it. I love Leisure Village. It's paradise."



Argentine Malbec – Smooth on Your Palate, Easy on Your Wallet

We first encountered Argentine Malbec at open air cafes in Buenos Aires many years ago. It was mid-January, their summer, and the cafes would fill with people in the early evening. A variety of tapas were offered, along with local wines, usually Malbecs. We knew of Malbec in Bordeaux blends, but here it was a standalone wine. And what a surprise it was! With a magenta tinged rim, it was deep purple-red, almost opaque, and very fruit forward. Soft tannins made it a pleasing mouthful, pairing wonderfully with tapas.

Malbec is best known as a ripe, dark-fruited red grape from Mendoza, Argentina, but it originated in the Cahors region of southwest France. There it is tannic, high in acid, and, due to Malbec grapes' poor resistance to weather and pests, it never became a top French varietal. Argentine Malbec is a different beast–very fruit forward with soft tannins and very drinkable.

Today, Argentine Malbecs
account for 75% of the world's planting, and the resulting rich red wine pairs beautifully with Argentina's signature cuisine - meat grilled a la parilla. Malbec's journey to Argentina began when a group of winemakers brought back Malbec cuttings from France in 1880. Malbec turned out to be a perfect match for the hot dry climate of the Mendoza Valley at the foot of the Andes Mountains.

For over 100 years, Malbec was popular primarily in Argentina. Then in the 1980s, a 3rd generation winemaker, Nicolas Catena Zapata, became convinced that Argentine Malbecs could also earn a place on the world stage.

He set out to improve the quality of his wines by planting Malbec vineyards at even higher elevations. His own vineyard manager doubted the grapes would ripen at those heights, but they did, and beautifully. The vines had naturally low yields and ripened slowly over the

summer, making wines of great balance, elegance with deliciously soft tannins. Nicolas fine-tuned the clones and eventually created unique Catena Malbec clones that form the basis of today's fine wine renaissance in Argentina. He was the first to export wines and bring them to world competitions. It wasn't long before his Argentine Malbecs won acclaim and Malbec was established as a well-known

An Argentine Malbec tastes as if it has been aged in oak for several years, but usually it has only 6-8 months on oak. Vineyards on flat ground with ample water also translates to lower production cost, enabling great tasting Malbecs to be widely available in the US for \$9-\$15. Treat yourself to an inexpensive luxury. Light up the barbeque and enjoy an Argentine Malbec soon.



Record keeping for taxes can be frustrating and confusing. **Don't rely on LUCK!** Here we bring you a few concepts we hope you find helpful regarding document retention and preservation.

TIME FRAME TO KEEP DOCUMENTS: First and foremost, you should consult your tax professional so that your document retention is tailored to your personal situation because tax professionals are the only ones who can provide tax advice! That said, most people believe it's best to keep your return and supporting documents for 3 years after the due date of your return or the date you file it, whichever date is later. There are some exceptions of specific documents you should keep longer than 3 years, some up to 10. We have a link on our website to an article that lists some of those specifics.

Additionally, it can be a good idea to hold onto copies of the *tax return itself indefinitely*. Why? Well, on our website we have a link to an article about someone who learned first-hand the value of this concept. A man received an IRS request for a copy of his tax return from 5 years prior. Ironically, the IRS had records of his filings prior to that year and after, but was missing that one year. Here's a quote from the article:

"You see, the three-year statute of limitations applies only when you filed an income tax return. If you didn't file a tax return, the statute of limitations never started to run. More importantly, the statute of limitations applies only when you can prove you filed an income tax return. If the IRS doesn't have a copy of your tax return, it's going to assume you didn't file one, and you have to prove you filed it."

The author of the article did file his taxes for the year the IRS was requesting. Luckily, he had a copy that he was able to provide them. The moral of the story is that the burden to prove filing will ultimately fall on the taxpayer. Keep this in mind as you decide how many years of returns you want to store. This brings us to the next concept...

HOW AND WHERE TO STORE DOCUMENTS: Disasters & civil unrest have brought to light the importance of having more than one copy of important documents, and storing the copies in different locations. A good way to store more than one copy of an important document is to have both a hard copy and a scanned, digital copy. Digital copies should be stored so that they can be accessed independent of the physical computer in case the computer is damaged or stolen. (And make sure your scanned, digital copy is stored in a safe, secure manner that protects it from online intrusion.)

<u>DOCUMENT DISPOSAL</u>: NEVER throw important documents in the regular trash! Documents with sensitive, personal information should be disposed of in a way that provides the best protection against data theft and identity theft. Secure shredding is an ideal way to dispose of hard copies
