## An Open Letter To Members Of The Board Of Directors And Members Of The Finance Committee

You, as well as many others, are aware of the fact that it has been the practice of this as well as past Boards of Directors to invest funds of the Village, not required for near term use, in one of the following:

1. Savings accounts in banks or savings and loan associations where those accounts are guaranteed by either the Federal deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) or the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation (FSLIC);

2. Certificates of deposit issued by banks or savings and loan associations where those certificates are guaranteed by the FDIC or FSLIC; or

3. United States Treasury bills, notes or bonds; and, as a corollary to this practice, that these investments have been listed on one page of the monthly financial reports of the Association that are furnished to each of you and are also placed in the library.

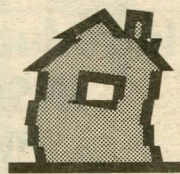
Certainly this practice has provided a degree of confidence in the manner in which the Association's reserve funds were being managed. However, there is nothing in our C, C & R's or By-laws that require a continuance of the practice. Therefore, we recommend that the Board prepare an amendment to the By-laws that will restrict the investment of Association funds to the instruments listed above and that will require a continuation of the present reporting on investments in at least the current amount of detail. The amendment should also require that our outside auditors certify in the portion of their annual audit report that is mailed to all homeowners, that the investments shown in the Association's final report for the year did in fact exist.

Consideration should be given to the necessity of prohibiting the use of a margin account or any other speculative investment technique; the need for providing an exception clause that would permit a Board, following one month's notification in writing to all homeowners, to deviate from the required practice; or any other provision that seems from your vantage point to be required.

We urge you to act expeditiously on this suggestion, for we are confident that many homeowners as well as yourselves are concerned about this subject. Cordially yours.

The California State Office of Emergency Services has divided the month-long observance of Earthquake Preparedness Month into four sections: Apr 4 - 10 will be Government and Emergency Services Preparedness Week, Apr 11 - 17 will be Business and Industry Preparedness Week, Apr 18 - 24 will be School Preparedness Week and Apr 24 - 30 will be Family and Community Preparedness Week. Then there are the old faithfuls who report the Village activities month after month. We depend upon clubs and groups to share their news because we know our readers are interested.



### Smoking ordinance on back burner?

The matter of courtesy is often suggested as a remedy to the smoking issue. True, courtesy is always important, but to imply that it may solve this problem is highly debat-

able. The suggestion confuses the issue, which may be the strategy. How can anyone be courteous while polluting the air in an enclosed area? How can anyone who breathes the pollution be gracious to the smoker?

We have been warned by the most eminent med-

ical authorities that this is a matter of life and death. Until and unless other qualified experts refute the evidence, it is reasonable that we guide ourselves accordingly. Leaders in many governments recognize this fact, accept it and govern accordingly. For them to do otherwise would be to gamble with the health and welfare of those whom they govern.

Any proposal that would permit smokers to congregate with non-smokers would not be acceptable to most people in L.V. The only clear, reasonable solution would be to have a smoke free building with a room designated as a smoking area. In my opinion we should proceed and conclude the matter regardless of what the City

**Escalating Assessments**

Each year, the assessment has been raised moderately in Leisure Village, but this year it has been raised drastically. Spending at the Federal level has been cut due to Gramm-Rudman, and also by the State. Only in L.V. do costs and expenses keep increasing.

I grant you that increases in water, power, insurance, sewerage, trash, and telephone rates

are beyond anyone's control. But anyone who has owned a business employing considerable number of people can tell you that a forty-four percent payroll (including items attributable to the payroll) is a sure formula for bankruptcy. Businesses all around are cutting payroll and increasing the efficiency of remaining workers in order to stay afloat.

Our payroll must be cut, unnecessary expenses eliminated, and we should consider contracting out the landscaping. We know the cost of labor, equipment, maintenance and replacement of equipment, gasoline, landscape supplies, etc. An equal, or preferably a lower bid could be had from an outside source. We should at least try this for a period of one or two years. Manufacturing companies customarily contract out the manufacturing of a part of their product, and have found this to result in considerable savings.

Most of us here are on fixed incomes and many people will be forced out if an effort is not made to lower costs.

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## EYE CARE



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### WHAT IS A CATARACT?

When the natural crystalline lens of the human eye becomes cloudy, it is known as a cataract. Aging causes the lens of the eye to become hard in its center, and the ability to focus on near objects is diminished (usually requiring bifocals at age 45). As the lens ages, it also becomes less clear. Radiation, diabetes and certain medications may promote early development of cataracts.

For more people over age 50, a mild cataract doesn't require immediate removal. Since cataracts usually occur in one eye first, and later in the other, vision is usually not completely obscured.

Cataracts are the number one cause of poor vision among adults. Over two-

thirds of the population over age 60 have vision problems from cataracts, and over a half-million people undergo a cataract removal operation annually in the U.S.

Today a cataract can be surgically removed without discomfort. Using modern methods, poor vision from cataracts can be improved 95 percent of the time.

Among the latest developments in cataract care:

- Modern anesthesia techniques are provided to alleviate discomfort at the time of surgery. The actual operation usually takes less than an hour to perform.

- The use of surgical microscope makes cataract procedures safer and healing time is reduced.

- Lens implants can restore vision permanently and eliminate the need for thick "coke bottle" glasses or contact lenses.

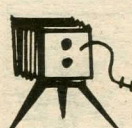


The Ceramic Mold Decorating Club

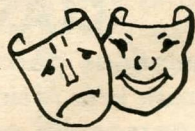
their impressions of their separate visits to the Soviet Union during the past year.
