NEW BUS SCHEDULE

The new Camarillo city bus schedule has gone to the printer, at last, and should be back and ready for use in the very near future.

The new schedule is going to be printed on slick paper and will have the routes marked with a blue line and a red line. The red route will come down Woodcreek and enter through the Front gate. It will turn right and proceed around L. V. Drive, Mountain View, east on L. V. Drive and exit through the East gate. The blue route will enter the L.V. East gate, and follow the above route in reverse back to the Front gate. Both buses will be clearly marked across the front of the bus. We have asked for a schedule with the blue route marked to be posted across L. V. Dr. near V. 11 where there is presently a pink bench. Those waiting for the red route bus should wait in front of the rec center near the West parking lot where there is currently a pink bench.

The Saturday schedule will remain the same as it has been.

We have not had bus stops marked in L.V. and we hope that we shall be able to keep it that way. If the bus drivers can keep their schedules, we hope to stay as we are. In the past, the drivers have been very accommodating. Let's not spoil that.

NEW AUTO DECALS, May 12-15

All L.V. residents who own motor vehicles should plan to participate in the 1992 decaling in May. Security officers and members of the Security and Safety Committee will be in front of the Recreation Center the following days and hours:

Tuesday, May 12 -- 9:00 a.m. to 1:00, and 2:00 to 5:00 p.m.


Wednesday, May 13 -- Same as Tuesday

Thursday, May 14 -- 11:00 a.m. to 3:00, and 4:00 to 7:00 p.m.

Friday, May 15 -- 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. only

Be sure to have your current automobile registration certificate available to show the officers.

Recreational Vehicles (RVs) will receive their decals in the RV lot on Friday, May 15, 2:00 to 5:00 p.m. only. The decaling attendant will want to see your 1991 or 1992 registration certificate and proof of a current vehicle insurance policy.

NEW SATELLITE REQUIRES NEW L.V. "DISH"

When Leisure Villagers turn on their television sets they have access to several systems which feed the cable system as follows:

1. Regular broadcasting, channels 2 through 13 (except 8 and 12) are supplied through our 300 foot tall exterior antenna.

2. Channel 12 originates at the LV Recreation Center and is a closed-circuit system available within the Village only.

3. Satellite channels (8, 14, 20 through 24) are obtained from the two satellite dishes at the Recreation Center.

4. Premium channels Home Box Office and Cinemax (15 and 16), are also obtained from the larger satellite dish at the Recreation Center. Individual homeowners pay Communications Services to receive these two premium channels.

It should be mentioned that the forthcoming microwave system (which is a year late!) will only be used for regular broadcast channels and will eliminate the need for the existing 300 foot tall tower by the freeway. Other than receiving a slightly better picture, residents will not notice any changes in this service.

Also, remember that the Village is in the "blackout area" surrounding Los Angeles which means that many locally-occurring sports

Guest Editorial: EARTH DAY

April is Earth month, and Earth Day is usually celebrated on one of the last days of April. However, Sunday, May 3 will be Earth Day at Channel Islands National Park at Ventura Harbor. There will be display booths, seminars, competitions, and entertainment. Earth Day is a little like Thanksgiving and a little bit like the Fourth of July. It is a day to celebrate, to appreciate, and to renew our commitment to being good stewards of our planet, Earth.

Good stewardship implies caring for the future. Today, 14 million children under age five die every year because of dirty drinking water, poor sanitation, malnutrition, and various kinds of environmental pollution. (1)

While most of Earth's people grapple with increasing poverty, hunger, and disease, a privileged few live as if enjoying a global feast, exhausting the seas and the soil. But it is not our generation that will pay the ever-mounting bill, rather our children and grandchildren and many generations to come. (1)

At present, our recycling efforts are steps on the first rung of the ladder of conservation. We must recycle more, and buy recycled products. We can write to members of Congress to support legislation that promotes energy efficiency and renewable energy, and that helps our economy. For example, a ban on the export of raw logs would create 15,000 jobs in the United States. (2)

We must look beyond our own interests of golf, bridge, shopping and entertainment, and diligently seek information to use in influencing our governing officials. The future of our planet begins in our homes, but also depends on global decisions.

In June this year in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, an earth summit meeting will be held in which leaders of 150 countries will gather to establish a single set of international rules for environmental security and sustainable development. So far, President Bush is the only leader of a major industrialized nation who will not make a commitment to attend the Summit. We can write and ask him to go and support specific timetables for reduction of CO2 emissions.

Let me share with you this message of inspiration and enjoyment by John Muir:

"Climb the mountains and get their good tidings. Nature's peace will flow into you as sunshine flows into trees. The winds will blow their own freshness into you, and the storms their energy, while cares will drip off like autumn leaves."

So celebrate! Appreciate! Visit Channel Islands National Park on Sunday, May 3. Take a ride through our beautiful green hills, and see the flower fields at Lompoc, or the wild poppies near Lancaster, drive along our beautiful shoreline.

Happy Earth Day to everyone!



LIVE TRANSMISSION CAPACITY ADDED TO CHANNEL 12 STUDIO

Channel 12 made history on March 5 with a live transmission to LV homes from the Channel 12 studio. Previously, live transmission was possible only from the AR. Now there is a choice.

The first program live from the studio was a phone-in question-and-answer format on the CC&Rs amendment then pending. Jack Whalen served as moderator, with George Parker, John Lauten, and Herb Stern of the ad hoc Emergency Insurance Committee giving the explanations.

Village residents called the Channel 12 phone number and gave their queries to Gertrude Kern, also of the ad hoc committee, or Bob Cullati, LV General Manager, taking phone calls in the Max room. Calls poured in for

two hours.

Technical staff of the Channel 12 committee deserves kudos for the culmination of their efforts to wire the studio, for the live transmission was most successful/effective.

George Huddleston, head of the technical staff, supervised the debut program, Bob Vanderhaven was the cameraman, and Art Kaufman did the lighting, Bill Blauer, chairman of the Channel 12 committee, was on hand to help wherever needed.

This added capacity of studio origination of live programs is handier for the technical staff and will be most advantageous during ESC drills or real emergencies.

Why was the AR wired for live transmission and not the Channel 12 studio, you ask? Telecasting live from the AR was set up when the Channel 12 staff had to operate out of a very small room opening off the AR (*read, closet*). All the elements of transmission were right there.

However, the functions of Channel 12 rapidly outgrew the space available. The new and much more spacious Channel 12 studio was an addition built onto the Recreation Center and opened for business late in 1987. Since that time, the staff has functioned with split facilities, since the studio and the AR are on opposite ends of the Rec Center.

George Huddleston deserves the credit for the necessary brainstorming and much of the actual rigging of the equipment to enable live transmission to be made from the studio. LV is richer for having this added capacity.

DON'T WAIT GET READY FOR THE QUAKE

Emergency Services Organization DPX (Disaster Preparation Exercise) was a success. This year we had over 1727 (80%) "flags" shown. The June '91 DPX had 1646 "flags." Those "flags" are to indicate that everyone is A-OK at your house. So, if the real thing happens and you're all right, put out a white cloth so our Search and Rescue team won't have to waste time.

We tried a different radio communication idea and will refine it in a future drill. We have eleven reflectorized village sign posts with specified nearby villages assigned to the "post." For this DPX we

had a CB-equipped (Radio Citizen Band) RV or car at each post, as well as an amateur "Ham" radio operator. Other CB-ers, with hand-held sets, or driving in a car, roamed their two to four designated villages and reported on CB radio back to their post. That CB-ers, in turn, gave messages to the "Ham" who was present, who transmitted it on a different frequency either to the Communications Center on the East parking lot, or if it required Operations Center attention, to the "Ham" at the LV Association office.

If a real emergency should happen, we believe this double system would be a great service in communicating damage and injuries to the General Manager and the Board, and also to the City of Camarillo.

To Coordinators/Alternates wondering why a car or person was roaming in your Village, we

were checking out the CB radio communication and learning its potentialities or lack thereof. We need help and cooperation from both the CB-ers and the "Hams." We cannot do the job required with only one or the other.

Our other concern is to organize a First Aid Unit. Now that our medical professionals cannot be available to us, we at least need our First Aiders who are protected by the Good Samaritan Law. Our medical professionals cannot be protected by the Good Samaritan Law. We need a Coordinator (Administrator, General, Chief-in-Charge, or Sergeant) for this unit. So someone, please volunteer. Call me (987-1446) or Elmer Eymann (484-8422) and help LV and LV ESO!

Thanks again for each one of you who contributed to the success of this DPX. I said it on Channel 12 and am sincerely expressing it now in ILV.




Every once in awhile the village security is broken by a so-called "sneak-in," one who is neither a resident or a guest of a resident, but actually a trespasser. Such a person makes this invasion of our private world usually for the purpose of curiosity or being able to enjoy our grounds and recreational equipment or for the sole reason of committing a crime of some sort.

Some months ago a thirty-six foot RV was observed using the RV parking area. That RV didn't belong there. By the time an investigation could be made, the vehicle was gone. This sort of an individual, a persona non grata so to speak, if apprehended by one of our patrolmen, can become a cause for criminal investigation. It doesn't matter if the trespasser was in a motor vehicle, riding a bicycle, walking or using any other means to enter our Village. He must be caught and handed over to the proper authorities.

And this brings up the subject of residents' responsibilities where their guests are concerned. All residents are aware that the grounds of Leisure Village and all of the equipment for games and recreation are for their pleasure and their guests, and for no one else. The Village rule is that the resident must be with his guest when using any of our recreational facilities. This rule identifies the guest as a friend of a resident nearby instead of a stranger not belonging there. It becomes a sticky situation if a visitor should be queried by a patrolman because the host-resident wasn't around to make proper identification.

And so, may this article be an admonition to all residents.

Long-time resident Walt Whitaker is urging more residents to become involved in Food Share, and his plea may be seen Monday, May 4 at 5 p.m. on Channel 12.

"At one time we had some 50 volunteers," says Walt, "but today we are down to perhaps 50% of that."

Walt and wife Nancy have been LV residents for 18 years and were the 65th to move into a home.

"Many of the fine old-timers are no longer with us," he comments. "We are looking for folks who can give just a few hours monthly. We promise it will be a rewarding experience."

People may choose between gleaning in the fields or handling food in the warehouse. Those who volunteer for gleaning will be called, on average, once a week and their total time picking vegetables and fruit that is left behind is usually less than two hours.

Warehouse volunteers average four hours weekly and here you'll see, first hand, how the food is assembled and distributed to hundreds of churches and relief groups. Some 85,000 less fortunate Ventura County residents were helped last year.


Chairman Street solicited interest in forming a wood carving group and received a positive re-

We are pure feeling at birth. We naturally feel


hunger, pain, love, and rejection. Thinking starts as we experience living.







The Ceramics Plus Club went to the Ceramic Shop at the Camarillo Airport in April. They have a shop that can do things not possible in our shop. The big difference is that we have electrically heated kilns, and they have gas heated kilns. Ours are indoors, theirs are outdoors. Electrically heated kilns are safer than gas, and will do virtually everything a gas-kiln will do, except for "reduction firing". Normal firing, as we do it, allows plenty of oxygen to enter the kiln, which oxidizes the molten glaze, and this produces what are known as "normal" colors. In reduction firing, the amount of oxygen to the burners is restricted, which lessens the oxygen within the kiln, and the glazes come out

different colors because of this. This is smelly and smoky, and of course you can't do this in an electric furnace.

In "Raku" firing, electric kilns could be used, but the process is smoky and has to be done out of doors, so we cannot do that here. In Raku, the kiln is heated to glazing temperature, then the pot is put in it. In ten or fifteen minutes the glaze will be melted, when the pot is taken out and put into a nest of combustible materials such as leaves or shavings. These burn, and give the glaze all sorts of unusual colors. While still hot, the glazed pot is taken off of the combustible mix and placed in cold water. This creates cracks and crazes in the glaze. All of these are nearly uncontrollable and unpredictable, so each pot will be different.

Jan Wasserman showed her absolutely great clay bird figures. Each feather is cut in individually. She showed us her beautiful eagle, sitting with its wings outspread, and told us its sad story. While it was on the shelf drying, some unmentionable person picked it up. Ceramic workers know that this is a No-No. Clay objects are very fragile at this stage, but the ignoramus did not know that, and one wing was broken off. The material at this stage has another characteristic - it is nearly impossible to repair it to like-new condition. So you are welcome to visit the Ceramic Shop, but please don't touch anything. Let one hand watch the other behind your back. Thus you might avoid bloodshed. Jan is a live-bird watcher and bird-bander.

On May 14, the Club is going to Santa Barbara City College for luncheon in their excellent dining room. Sign-up sheets are in the Shop, for both drivers and riders. The regular May meeting will be on the 28th, at 10:30 in the MPR.


Hearing Impaired

events may not be seen on local television screens. Those events will be scrambled on our system but the signal will be unscrambled after the local sports event is finished.

There are other changes pending which will eventually affect television reception here in the Village. The large satellite dish next to the Recreation Center building presently receives programs for all satellite channels except CSPAN-1 and CSPAN-2.

Communication Services, cable TV supplier advises that during this summer CNN (channel 21), HNN (channel 19), TNT (channel 14), WTBS (channel 22) and ESPN (channel 8) will be moved to a new transmitting satellite.

In order to receive these channels the Village will have to install a new satellite receiving antenna

(dish). It is likely that this new dish will be placed next to the large one next to the Recreation Center building. Thus Discovery (channel 24), CNBC (channel 18), HBO (channel 15) and Cinemax (channel 16) will continue to be received on the existing satellite dish.

The new satellite receiving dish is expected to

be smaller than the one presently in use because the signals transmitted from the new satellite will be much stronger than those from the present one.

Announcements will be made shortly giving schedules for the changeovers and other possible changes in the system. Stay tuned.




