NEW BUS SCHEDULE

The new Camarillo city bus schedule has gone to the printer, at last, and should be back and ready for use in the very near future.

The new schedule is going to be printed on slick paper and will have the routes marked with a blue line and a red line. The red route will come down Woodcreek and enter through the Front gate. It will turn right and proceed around L. V. Drive, Mountain View, east on L. V. Drive and exit through the East gate. The blue route will enter the L.V. East gate, and follow the above route in reverse back to the Front gate. Both buses will be clearly marked across the front of the bus. We have asked for a schedule with the blue route marked to be posted across L. V. Dr. near V. 11 where there is presently a pink bench. Those waiting for the red route bus should wait in front of the rec center near the West parking lot where there is currently a pink bench.

The Saturday schedule will remain the same as it has been.

We have not had bus stops marked in L.V. and we hope that we shall be able to keep it that way. If the bus drivers can keep their schedules, we hope to stay as we are. In the past, the drivers have been very accommodating. Let's not spoil that.

NEW AUTO DECALS, May 12-15



NEW SATELLITE REQUIRES NEW L.V. "DISH"

When Leisure Villagers turn on their television sets they have access to several systems which feed the cable system as

1. Regular broadcasting, channels 2 through 13 (except 8 and 12) are supplied through our 300 foot tall exterior antenna.

2. Channel 12 originates at the LV Recreation Center and is a closed-circuit system available within the Village

3. Satellite channels (8, 14, 20 through 24) are obtained from the two sateldishes at the Recreation Center.

4. Premium channels Home Box Office and Cinemax (15 and 16), are also obtained from the larger satellite dish at the Recreation Center. Individual homeowners pay Communications Services to receive these two premium channels.

It should be mentioned that the forthcoming microwave system (which is a year late!) will only be used for regular broadcast channels and will eliminate the need for the existing 300 foot tall tower by the freeway. Other than receiving a slightly better picture, residents will not notice any changes in this service.

Also, remember that the Village is in the "blackout area" surrounding Los Angeles which means that many

EARTH DAY Guest Editorial:

April is Earth month, and Earth Day is usually celebrated on one of the last days of April. However, Sunday, May 3 will be Earth Day at Channel Islands National Park at Ventura Harbor. There will be display booths, seminars, competitions, and entertainment. Earth Day is a little like Thanksgiving and a little bit like the Fourth of July. It is a day to celebrate, to appreciate, and to renew our commitment to being good stewards of our planet, Earth.

Good stewardship implies caring for the future. Today, 14 million children under age five die every year because of dirty drinking water, poor sanitation, malnutrition, and various kinds of environmental pollution. (1)

While most of Earth's people grapple with increasing poverty, hunger, and disease, a privileged few live as if enjoying a global feast, exhausting the seas and the soil. But it is not our generation that will pay the ever-mounting bill, rather our children and grandchildren and many generations to come. (1)

At present, our recycling efforts are steps on the first rung of the ladder of conservation. We must recycle more, and buy recycled products. We can write to members of Congress to support legislation that promotes energy efficiency and renewable energy, and that helps our economy. For example, a ban on the export of raw logs would create 15,000 jobs in the United States. (2)

We must look beyond our own interests of golf. bridge, shopping and entertainment, and diligently seek information to use in influencing our governing officials. The future of our planet begins in our homes, but also depends on global decisions.

In June this year in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, an earth summit meeting will be held in which leaders of 150 countries will gather to establish a single set of international rules for environmental security and sustainable development. So far, President Bush is the only leader of a major industrialized nation who will not make a commitment to attend the Summit. We can write and ask him to go and support specific timetables for reduction of CO2 emissions.

Let me share with you this message of inspiration and enjoyment by John Muir:

"Climb the mountains and get their good tidings. Nature's peace will flow into you as sunshine flows into trees. The winds will blow their own freshness into you, and the storms their energy, while cares will drip off like autumn leaves."

So celebrate! Appreciate! Visit Channel Islands National Park on Sunday, May 3. Take a ride through our beautiful green hills, and see the flower fields at Lompoc, or the wild poppies near Lancaster, drive along our beautiful shoreline.

Happy Earth Day to everyone!





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

SNEAK-INS

Every once in awhile the village security is broken by a so-called "sneak-in," one who is neither a resident or a guest of a resident, but actually a trespasser. Such a person makes this invasion of our private world usually for the purpose of curiosity or being able to enjoy our grounds and recreational equipment or for the sole reason of committing a crime of some sort.

Some months ago a thirty-six foot RV was observed using the RV parking area. That RV didn't belong there. By the time an investigation could be made, the vehicle was gone. This sort of an individual, a persona non grata so to speak, if apprehended by one of our patrolmen, can become a cause for criminal investigation. It doesn't matter if the trespasser was in a motor vehicle, riding a bicycle, walking or using any other means to enter our Village. He must be caught and handed over to the proper authorities.

And this brings up the subject of residents' responsibilities where their quests are concerned. All residents are aware that the grounds of Leisure Village and all of the equipment for games and recreation are for their pleasure and their guests, and for no one else. The Village rule is that the resident must be with his guest when using any of our recreational facilities. This rule identifies the guest as a friend of a resident nearby instead of a stranger not belonging there. It becomes a sticky situation if a visitor should be queried by a patrolman because the host-resident wasn't around to make proper identification.

And so, may this article be an admonition to all residents.

People may choose between gleaning in the fields or handling food in the warehouse. Those who volunteer for gleaning will be called, on average, once a week and their total time picking vegetables and fruit that is left behind is usually less than two hours.

Warehouse volunteers average four hours weekly and here you'll see, first hand, how the food is assembled and distributed to hundreds of churches and relief groups. Some 85,000 less fortunate Ventura County residents were helped last year.

THE CERAMIC **PLUS** CLUB

The Ceramics Plus Club went to the Ceramic Shop at the Camarillo Airport in April. They have a shop that can do things not possible in our shop. The big difference is that we have electrically heated kilns, and they have gas heated kilns. Ours are indoors, theirs are outdoors. Electrically heated kilns are safer than gas, and will do virtually everything a gas-kiln will do, except for "reduction firing". Normal firing, as at 1 p.m. in MPR. different colors because of this. This is smelly and smoky, and of course you can't do this in an electric

In "Raku" firing, electric kilns could be used, but the process is smoky and has to be done out of doors, so we cannot do that here. In Raku, the kiln is heated to glazing temperature, then the pot is put in it. In ten or fifteen minutes the glaze will be melted, when the pot is taken out and put into a nest of combustible materials such as leaves or shavings. These burn, and give the glaze all sorts of unusual colors. While still hot, the glazed pot is taken off of the combustible mix and placed in cold water. This creates cracks and crazes in the glaze. All of these are nearly uncontrollable and unpredictable, so each pot will be different.

Jan Wasserman showed her absolutely great clay bird figures. Each feather is cut in individually. She showed us her beautiful eagle, sitting with its wings outspread, and told us its sad story. while it was on the shelf drying, some unmentionable person picked it up. Ceramic workers know that this is a No-No. Clay objects are very fragile at this stage, but the ignoramus did not know that, and one wing was broken off. The material at this stage has another characteristic - it is nearly impossible to repair it to like-new condition. So you are welcome to visit the Ceramic Shop, but please don't touch anything. Let one hand watch the other behind your back. Thus you might avoid bloodshed. Jan is a live-bird watcher and bird-bander.
