Time Of Use Plan Can Save On Home **Electric Bills**

By Phil Belsky There is still no cost advantage to replace South-ern California Edison Company with an alternate electrical service provider until the year 2002. At that time certain additional charges on our present So. Cal. Edison Co. electrical bills mandated by the California **Electric Utility Commission** will be eliminated. This will not only reduce our electical costs about 15% in addition to the 10% we now receive, but also make our residential electrical service load attractive to

alternate service providers. In the meantime there is another way to reduce your present electrical energy costs if you are willing to schedule the time of use for the major electrical loads in your home. Most Leisure Village residents are billed by So. Cal. Edison on an electrical energy rate schedule known as Domestic or D schedule at about 12 cents per KWHR (Killowatt Hour). There is an alternate So.

Cal. Edison rate schedule available for residential service known as Time of Use or TOU-D1 or TOU-D2 at a lower cost during certain hours and months of the year but with definite user time restrictions.

Time of Use schedule is suitable for those who can schedule most of their daily electrical power usage from 6 p.m. to 10 a.m. This is known as the Off Peak period when normal demand and cost for So. Cal. Edison electrical power is at its lowest. Your Off Peak electricity will cost about 8 cents

Senior Memory Project **Seeks Volunteers**

The Board of Directors has approved a proposal for a research project by the Andrus Gerontology Center of the University of Southern California to study possible effects of mood on memory in older people. The project will be conducted by Dr. Bob Knight, of the Andrus Center, with the assistance of graduate students at the University, and will be coordinated with Education/ Recreation Committee.

Participants in the project will meet here at Leisure Village in small assigned groups of 5-10 people. They will first fill out a basic questionnaire and a preliminary mood and memory test. Then they will view selected visual material and read selected written material designed to create reactions of pleasure or sadness. Finally they will complete another memory test to determine possible effects of these different emotions. The entire procedure will take approximately 90 minutes.

With the election behind us, a new Board of Directors in charge and a new budget in place, it is time to look ahead to see what is in store for the Village in the coming year.

There are several programs in place, such as the second year of the five year street rehabilitation project, the ongoing dwelling painting program, the continuing replacement of roofs, the tree removal and replacement project and revised pruning and landscaping practices.

The major capital improvement planned for this year includes renovation of the pool and its supporting systems. The Building Code has become stricter over the years and the 25-year old pool needs a lot of work. The pool will be out of service for a couple of months, so the reconstruction will be done this Fall, after the summer season.

All of these activities relate to maintence of the Village, tasks that must be accomplished to keep the Village as attractive as it was when we purchased homes here and, most importantly, make it appealing to future homeowners.

Last year's Board of Directors elected to embark on these programs realizing that they would be costly. It was necessary to "bite the bullet" and initiate the programs because we could not allow the Village to deteriorate further. We urge the new Board, and the ones that will follow, to complete these projects.

The matter of earthquake insurance, and how the residents wish to handle it, is of great importance to many. The insurance policy was renewed this month. Now the new Board is charged with calling a Town Hall meeting in the AR to discuss a possible change to self-insurance. If that direction is of interest to many, the Board must draft measures to alter the Village CC&Rs and have all homeowners vote on them. This process will take months to accomplish. Meanwhile, the retiring Board has paid our earthquake propection for another calendar year, while we debate future plans.


Do you know that the Leisure Village Library has magazines to share? After last month's article on books, I received a phone call reminding me that it also has many magazines.

per KWHR in the Winter period, October to May, and about 9 cents per KWHR in the Summer period, June through September. However, On Peak electricity, 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., costs about 12 1/2 cents per KWHR in the Winter period, and about 43 cents per KWHR in the Summer period. Weekends and Holidays are considered Off Peak all year.

You can see that On Peak electricity during the summer months from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. is very expensive. There is, in addition, a monthly charge for the special meter So. Cal. Edison installs on your home for TOU recording.

The heavy electrical loads in your all electric home which create the major charges on your electrical bill and which you need to shift for use between 6 p.m. and 10 a.m., if possible, are as follows:

Air Conditioner Home Heating System Stove Clothes washer Clothes dryer Hot water heater

If you make extensive use of your air conditioner during the daytime summer months TOU schedule may not be for you. Otherwise, if you presently use up to 500 KWHRS per month or less, TOU-D1 is the appropriate schedule to try. For loads above 500 KWHRS use TOU-D2. Your summer month bills will be higher on the TOU schedule than your present 'D' schedule, but winter months can be considerably less, more than offsetting your summer charges.

Our own home has been on TOU schedule for several years. We estimate savings varying from 10% to 15% per year. The amount you save will vary from year to year depending on how you schedule the use of your electricity.

Know Your Community Resources: **AREA AGENCY ON AGING** By Lillian Hawthorne

Approximately 20 years ago, the federal government passed the Older Americans Act which mandated that each state set up special area agencies to provide services and resources for seniors, defined as people age 60 and over. There are now 33 such agencies throughout the state of California, including the Ventura Area Agency on Aging which serves this county.

Through this legislation, the federal government provides funds to the states which, in turn, disburse them to the various areas to support certain mandated services for seniors. These include the following: senior nutrition and home delivered meals: elder abuse assistance; training for gainful employment; legal services; Medicare counseling; Ombudsman assistance: Alz-

grams may vary in different communities or counties because of the different needs of the senior populations. However, the general and underlying purpose of all these services is to maintain and support for as long as possible, independent living for se-

The Agency on Aging is administered by Executive Director Colleen House; and it is composed of senior volunteers representing all 10 cities in the county. There are two representatives for each city, one delegate and one, who may be either supervisorial appointees or city council representatives. In either case, it is the function of these members to represent the needs and resources of their particular communities.

The Area Agency on Aging meets once per month and, at these meetings, performs the following activities: hears comments from community councils, heimer's day care pro- hears reports from the Cali-

grams. The specific pro- fornia Senior Legislature moving up from observer and other senior organizations, reviews pending legislation related to seniors. reviews reports from designated task forces, hears applications for funding for new proposals for senior services) and listens to comments or requests from the public. The Agency also publishes a senior resource Ventura Area directory, and it monitors and reviews all the programs which it funds.

During the past year, the Area Agency has considered requests for 13 new senior programs, and has approved the following: temporary safe shelters for victims of elder abuse, resources for caretaker respite, "shop at home" assistance for home-bound seniors, and funding to increase multi-purpose resources at senior centers.

Darlene Benz, who is a coordinator at Camarillo Health Care District, serves as Camarillo delegate to the Ventura Area Agency on Aging. She has been active in the Area Agency for six years,

status to alternate to delegate, and currently serves as chairperson. Ms. Benz described the work of the Area Agency as making possible through approving, funding and supporting programs that enhance the lives of seniors in Ventura County.

She stated that the Agency is looking for new members, and encouraged interested seniors to apply because, in her words, "this is a way you can make a difference."
