


LV BOARD CANDIDATES SPEAK OUT ON THE ISSUES



Candidate Harold Howarth



MAKE SURE YOUR VOTE COUNTS

By now, all homeowners have received a ballot that enables them to vote in the election for three members of the LV Board of Directors. Those blue ballots – one per household - were mailed by the Association on May 18. There are several routes for voting for these important positions, and each one has specific instructions.

Voting by Absentee Ballot: for those who want to vote ahead of or won't be attending the Annual Meeting on June 22.

1. Vote for up to three candidates per instructions on the blue ballot.
2. Place the blue ballot in the blue envelope and seal it. Do not write anything on that envelope. Do not sign the ballot.
3. Place the sealed blue envelope in the white envelope, seal it, print your name and LV address on the outside of that envelope, upper left corner, and sign your name. The ballot cannot be counted without your signature.
4. Deposit the white envelope in a Ballot Box located either in the Rec Center lobby or in the Association Office, or send via US Postal Service.

Absentee ballots must be deposited in the Ballot Boxes or delivered by mail by 5:00 p.m. on June 21, 2017.

Voting in Person: Blue Absentee Ballots cannot be used.

1. Get a Meeting Ballot in the MPR between 8:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. on June 22.
2. Cast the marked ballot during the Annual Meeting, which begins at 10:00 a.m.

Voting for someone not on the Ballot:

1. Voters can write in a candidate, but cannot vote for more than 3 candidates.
2. Candidates can be nominated on the floor of the Annual Meeting as long as they are present to accept the nomination.

A quorum of 1069 qualified ballots must be received for the election to be official. The official count of all qualified ballots takes place during the Annual Meeting. The results are announced as soon as the count is complete.

DROUGHT UPDATE

Shortly after the “Is the Drought Really Over?” story was published in the May ILV issue, the Camrosa Board of Directors lifted the Stage 2 Drought Declaration. Thus, there is no 15% voluntary reduction or limits on watering. However, customers must still abide by the Camrosa permanent water-use prohibitions, which are always in place. The prohibitions that directly affect Village residents are:

1. No person shall use or permit the use of any water furnished to any property within the District in a manner that causes runoff such that water flows onto adjacent property, non-irrigated areas, private and public walkways, roadways, parking lots, or structures, from any hose, pipe, valve, faucet, sprinkler or irrigation device into any gutter or to otherwise escape from the property, if such running or escaping can reasonably be prevented.
2. No person shall permit leaks of water that he/she has the authority to eliminate. Any detected leak, break, or malfunction shall be corrected within 48 hours after a person discovers or receives notice from the District.
3. All garden and utility hoses shall be equipped with a shutoff nozzle.
4. Vehicles, including but not limited to any automobile, truck, van, bus, motorcycle, boat, or trailer, shall be cleaned only by use of a hand-held bucket or a hand-held hose with a shutoff nozzle.
5. The application of potable water to driveways and sidewalks is prohibited.

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

Seniors and Social Media

Despite the myth that older people can't manage technology because of cognitive deficits, seniors are flocking to social media at a rapid pace. In fact, Facebook, Twitter, Google+ (and Hangouts), Pinterest, and Instagram all note higher adoption rates among adults 65 and older.

Seniors Benefit Socially, Mentally, and Physically

Older adults who have had positive experiences on social media have reported elevated moods. An American Psychological Association study found that seniors who spend time on social media sites were more likely to participate in activities that can lead to greater health, such as cooking healthier recipes and finding easier ways to clean and maintain their homes. The study also indicates that they have lower blood pressure and fewer instances of diabetes and less negative health habits such as smoking, depression, or disease. This is attributed to the ability for self-education on any number of topics.

Social Media Keeps the Family Together

Facebook is particularly useful for linking up with loved ones. It makes for more frequent conversations and helps close the generation gap.

Sharing current photos allows seniors to create a closeness and involvement with grandchildren that may not have existed. Video chats also are a great way to communicate in "real time".

Family Peace of Mind

When a family lives apart, there can be stress and anxiety on both ends. Social media allows seniors

and their families an easy way to check in as often as they wish. This is especially important if the senior is living alone and may experience ill health, a fall, or may not be eating or sleeping well, taking medications, or getting any form of exercise.

Community Engagement and a Sense of Belonging

Social media allows seniors who are unable to leave home to socialize online to combat loneliness.

Shopping Online offers Convenience and Savings

Even if a senior can't venture out of the home, he or she can always shop online and enjoy the ease of home delivery. In addition, there are lots of money-saving coupons and online sales.

Some Precautions Should Be Taken

As a caregiver, you may want to monitor the senior's activities. You may want to make sure that the loved one is not falling for phishing scams and the like. You may also want to make sure they are connecting with trustworthy people – especially if they are conversing in chat rooms and through blogs. Also watch their monetary spending – you don't want your senior overspending on items they don't need.

THE INEVITABLE POTLUCK

I'm always impressed and usually surprised by the special people I've had the good fortune to meet while writing this column. This holds true for a wonderfully warm and welcoming Lorna Byrd whom I met recently. She resides in Village 44 at The Byrd House.

Lorna recalls growing up in Seattle and being in the kitchen with her grandma from Norway preparing Lemon Meringue Pie. Who doesn't like Lemon Meringue Pie... raise your hands?

As a young college student and later in her 20's and 30's, she worked in kitchens at lodges and restaurants. She especially remembers the challenge at the Howard Johnson Motel in Newbury Park. They would get large tour busses full of tourists; but all these experiences just fine-tuned her cooking skills.

Later in life, married to an ex-Navy man, Lorna and Harold traveled all over the U.S. setting up events and cooking for his Naval "team" reunions. It was at one of these "potluck" reunions that she first tasted "Unstuffed Cabbage" - it was a dish brought by a neighbor. She liked it so much, she got the recipe and passed it around to all her friends. She's been taking it to potlucks over

the years ever since. So it wasn't a surprise when she arrived at potluck a few months ago and she saw it already on the buffet table!!!

One of the things Lorna has enjoyed since moving to Leisure Village is, you guessed it, exchanging dishes with her neighbors. Since she still loves to cook, it's an easy way to make new friends. So cook up your neighbor... no don't cook your neighbor, cook up a dish for your neighbor and if you don't have one, "you might try:"

UNSTUFFED CABBAGE INGREDIENTS

- 6 cups uncooked chopped cabbage
- ½ pound ground beef (I suppose you could use ground chicken or turkey if you don't eat red meat)
- 1 cup Minute Rice
- ½ tsp. salt
- ¼ tsp pepper
- 2 cups canned tomato soup (not diluted)
- 1 cup water
- ½ cup of shredded cheddar cheese

In a fry pan, cook beef and onions. Stir in uncooked rice, salt and pepper. Meanwhile put the cabbage in a lightly oiled 8" X 11" baking dish. Pour in beef and onion mixture. Pour soup and water over everything. Sprinkle cheese on top. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes...and make a new friend.

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
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
