Water Conservation

Water, Water, everywhere, Nor any drop to drink."

This is an oft-quoted passage from "The Ancient Mariner." The water crisis in California -- and in Leisure Village -- adds a more prophetic meaning to this famous quotation.

Almost 400 Camarillo residents participated in a public meeting of the Camrosa Water District on March 6. They now know the scarcity of water is going to get worse as the five-year drought shows few signs of ending.

Camrosa and Metropolitan Water District officials laid it right on the line -- the water supply is at an all-time low; allocations to all users will be cut severely; and overuse will bring stiff penalties.

Statistics, figures and percentages become confusing in an explanation of the water shortage. However, you should know that an acre foot of water is a one-foot depth of water covering the area of a football field. There are 326,000 gallons of water in an acre foot.

Last year, MWD had 2.6 million acre feet of water to allocate to its many Southern California customers such as Camrosa. This year, MWD has 1.4 million acre feet of water available, slightly more than half of last year's supply. It doesn't take a mathematician to figure something has to give.

So where does Leisure Village fit into this critical water shortage picture? Just like any other purchaser of water from Camrosa, Leisure Village will be able to buy a reduced alllocation. Intelligent, thrifty usage of water is now a daily responsibility of the entire village community.

Leisure Village is most fortunate to have a hardworking Board of Directors and Terry Craig as the manager of maintenance and resident services. He is widely recognized for his knowledge and achievements in water conservation and water efficient landscaping.

Based on Terry's thorough records, landscape maintenance uses 65%-70% of the Village water and 30%-35% is used in the homes. State-of-the-art irrigation controllers are now being installed throughout the village; installations are to be completed by the end of June. These new controllers will use approximately 15% less water than the old controllers, a significant savings.

The LVA board and Terry will also launch a feasibility study to determine if non-potable water from Conejo Creek or ground water basin can be used for landscape irrigation. Discussions are underway with Camrosa and Metropolitan Water District to get as-

Why would one want to be a member of the Board of Directors of the Leisure Village Association? Every year at this time a few of our neighbors must consider this question; and fortunately for all of us, some arrive at a positive answer and we elect them to provide leadership and stewardship of our valuable property.

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More Flowers With Less Water

By Betty Murray

Homes in Village 11 are the center of a pilot program to change landscape design management for the Village. Most of the original plant material has been removed, a new drip irrigation system has been installed, and new more colorful, more drought resistant low maintenance plants are being planted by our landscape personnel under the direction of Terry Craig.

Landscape architect Dave Davidson studied Village 11, made drawings for the new plan and suggested a list of plants that fill our needs. As work has progressed, Craig says that most homeowners are cooperative. He has made a few changes to satisfy owners' requests, although it is more necessary to meet the needs of the plants (sun or shade) or they will not thrive.

All Villagers are invited to walk through Village 11 to watch the progress and transformation of the flower beds. The Board of Directors approved purchase of larger plants in 5 gallon containers so they will look more impressive right away. Money for replanting Village 9 next year is being provided in the budget, and the same type of plantings will be used if work in Village 11 is satisfactory.

Craig says there are plans to change the irrigation system from sprinklers to drip in all the older villages as money is appropriated. Savings in water will be measurable by the second year, when the new plants are well established.

Terry also noted that the original plants provided by Leisure Tech were largely drought resistant, and he observed that more plants died from too

It's better to face them now and to be as prepared as possible. So, to continue:

45. Loaned equipment may be lost, damaged or stolen. Be sure those items bear your name and address to facilitate return.

46. Your home owner's insurance may cover your temporary housing expense. Keep records of your property and receipts for expenses.

47. LV staff may want to leave immediately to check on their own families and homes. We will have to fend for ourselves.

48. Priorities must be designated and disposal set to save as many lives as possible; perhaps not everyone can be saved.

> 49. Rescuing the living should be the first priority.

50. If phones are worka prediction of doom. Al- ing, the number of rethough most of the items quests for service will be

51. It may be necessary for neighbors to help calm distraught residents or those demanding immediate attention.

52. ESO personnel should have a working knowledge of their assigned areas of responsibility.

53. Some citizens and media will question decisions made because they will not recognize that the safety of our volunteers is paramount.

54. Handicapped and disabled persons are very vulnerable unless personal family and friends can care for them and maintain life-support systems.

55. There will be initial chaos; supplies, materials and equipment needed may not be readily avail-

56. There will be a general lack of necessary information;

Coordinators/Alternates will want to wait for damage/casualty assessment information to establish priorities.

57. Emergency equipment may not be able to reach some locations because of traffic jams. Tow trucks may be at a premium. Parked or abandoned vehicles may block streets.

58. There may not be enough people to deal initially with emergencies; after the initial shock there may be too many volunteers.

59. General information will be offered in response to specific questions because ESO personnel cannot verify the requested information.

60. Individual ESO personnel will be asked to do the work of many; they will have to recruit volunteers on the spot to provide assistance to their efforts.

61. The message flow to, from and within the EOC (Emergency Operations Center) and Command Posts may break down and become inefficient and unmanageable.



sistance in funding a change of all toilets in the Village to the ultra-low flush type.

Resident Services will soon begin a survey to determine the condition of the water pressure regulators in Village homes. This will make it possible to keep the water pressure to each LV home at its most efficient level.

Obviously, LV maintenance and resident services are doing their part to conserve water and retain the unique beauty an quality of the Village. Every homeowner can make an effort to get more benefits from less water. If homeowners discipline themselves to use less water, the entire village benefits. More water will be available for landscape maintenance and the natural splendor of the Village will be preserved.

Water conservation has reached crunch time. We all must get serious about saving water. There just isn't an endless supply. The days of wasteful, extravagant use of water are over. It's time to stop squandering water and become better stewards of this precious resource.

Here are 15 easy ways to save water: In the KITCHEN and LAUNDRY

Use automatic dishwasher only for full loads. Set on short wash cycle if your model has one.

Use automatic washing machine only for full loads.

Keep a bottle of drinking water in refrigerator. This beats the wasteful habit of running tap water to cool it for drinking.

* When hand washing dishes, collect cold water in

bucket as water is getting hot. Use collected water for watering plants.

Check faucets and pipes for leaks.

In the BATHROOM

Check toilet for leaks. Put a few drops of food coloring in toilet tank. If coloring starts to appear in the toilet bowl before flushing, there is a wasteful leak that must be repaired.

Flush toilet less often.

* Put a 1-quart plastic bottle filled with water or hang a plastic bag filled with water in toilet tank, older models.

* Install low-flow shower heads. These are available at LVA office for \$6.13.

Turn off water while brushing teeth or shaving.

Check faucets and pipes for leaks.

Take shorter showers

* Use bucket to catch cold water when waiting for hot shower water.

Outside the home

Use a broom instead of a hose to clean driveway and sidewalks.

* When washing your car, soap car from a bucket of soapy water. Use hose WITH automatic shut-off to rinse off.

* Better yet, take car outside of Village to a car wash.

SPECIAL TIP: Take advantage of the Resident Water Saving Special. Work orders accepted at LVA office through March 29.

Valve Needed To Stop Water Leakage

For villagers who have a reverse osmosis water purifying system for drinking water, an additional water saving strategy may be necessary. Since Jan 1, 1991, a state law requires that an automatic shut-off valve be installed to eliminate most of the leakage from the water purifying system. For systems installed prior to this date, this valve can be added. Call your water system provider to obtain installation of this valve, usually without charge.

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

In between, they will be playing to a new group, the Club Camarillo, which is associated with Pleasant Valley Hospital. The concert there will start at 1:30 p.m.


