Cal Poly Relaxes Curfew Rules for Women's Halls

New curfew rules for Poly coeds have caused much rejoicing in the women's residence halls on campus. During previous years, all girls had to be in their dorms by 10:30 p.m. on week nights, unless signed out on a "special." "Specials" came in very limited quantities unless a girl had an exceptionally high grade point average.

However, during the fall quarter, girls in Trinity hall racked up the highest average grade point level of all the on-campus residences, thus taking an honorary plaque away from Fremont men's residence hall for the first tmie. In further recognition of their achievement, all girls with a C average (2.0) or better will be allowed to sign out until midnight every week night.

However, the new week night hours are in effect for the winter quarter on an experimental basis only, warned Robert Bostrom, residence hall supervisor-counselor, in a letter to head residents and students. Weekend curfew for on-campus women residents will remain 1:30 a.m.
