Want to see the Summer Olympics and earn your way too? The organizing committee of the 1972 Summer Olympics to be held in Munich, Germany needs 27,000 helpers, male and female, for the period Aug. 15 - Sept. 11, 1972. Many of the jobs require a knowledge of foreign languages, hosts and hostesses for the teams, ushers in the stadia, telephone operators and typists; usherettes and maids of all work. The CSB policy on acceptance of transfer credit has been liberalized. The College is now accepting up to eighteen semester units of non-remedial transfer numbered courses which were previously not accepted for transfer on the grounds that they represented work in applied areas not relevant to degree programs available at this college.

Students whose previous work elsewhere included courses in such subjects as Home Economics will find that this change increases the number of hours they will be able to count toward a degree from CSB.

Any member of the College's faculty or staff interested in attending the four productions of next season at the Ahmanson Theatre of the Music Center in Los Angeles at a 25% discount is asked to leave his or her name with Mrs. Hopkins in Dr. Wilder's office.

The faculty and staff are reminded that drivers of College State-owned vehicles must be employees of California State College, Bakersfield. The definition of an "employee" for the purpose of driving a College State-owned vehicle include only those faculty, staff, and student help of the College who are in a State-funded pay status at the time they are driving the State-owned vehicle and who have on record substantiating documents to that effect in the College Accounting Office. A College employee shall be liable to the State for the actual costs proximately resulting from misuse of a State-owned vehicle by him in consenting or allowing a non-employee to use and drive a State-owned vehicle. The elements of actual costs shall include:

1. The expense of operation of a State-owned vehicle for the distance traveled during such misuses.
2. Any and all property damage to the State-owned vehicle, and other State property, proximately resulting from such misuse.
3. The amount of any judgment or claim not covered by insurance that the State pays by reason of the death, injury, or damage to persons or property arising out of misuse of a State-owned vehicle including interest at the legal rate accruing from the time of payment by the State.

Benton F. Scheide, Director of the Libraries, Mrs. Janice Kirkland, Catalogue Librarian and Viola Jean Dunn, Special Collections Librarian, attended the Spring Meeting of the Southern Section of the College, University and Research Libraries Division of the California Library Association on Saturday, May 15 at San Diego State College. Mr. Hal Holmerude of COM Systems Institute, Datagraphix Corporation presented a program on the "Impact of Micropublishing on Academic Libraries." The meeting closed with an informal tour of San Diego State's new five story Malcolm A. Love Library.

The Spring 1971 issue of Comparative Literature, XXIII, carries a most laudatory review of Dr. Carlos Lozano's book Rubén Darío y el Modernismo en España: 1888-1920. Dr. A. Pagés Larraya, University of California, Irvine, the reviewer, singles out Dr. Lozano's book as most scholarly, and highlights the diversity, vastness and wealth of the material contained in the nearly 1,000 bibliographical entries. The advent of the great Nicaraguan poet Rubén Darío, who dominated Spanish Peninsular and Hispanic American Literature for two decades, and the course of Modernismo, the literary movement he espoused, are traced in Dr. Lozano's critical bibliography.

Professors Homer Chaney and Bob Hunt attended the Spring meeting of the Statewide Academic Senate in Los Angeles May 13-14, and were seated as official members of the Senate.
