PRESS CREDENTIALS: Will be issued on a per game basis only. Requests should be made as far in advance as possible. "Visiting" media may make their requests through their respective SIDs. When time permits, credentials will be mailed.

PHOTO CREDENTIALS: Will be issued on a per game basis only and must be worn in plain sight at all times. NCAA rules limit shooting to outside the restraining line enclosing the field and the team areas and these rules will be strictly enforced.

PARKING: Free, ample and close to western grandstand with press box. No credential or pass required.

PRESS BOX: Is limited to working members of the press, radio, television and others whose duties require use of the press area. No one will be admitted without proper credentials (spouses included). Refreshments will be provided. Play-by-play reports by quarters, halftime and final statistics, scoring summary and post-game quotes will be distributed throughout the press box, which is located on the west side of Santa Ana Bowl.

TELECOPIERS: One will be available on a page-by-page, first-come first-served basis.

BROADCAST SPACE: One booth per team. Additional needs will be handled on an individual basis.

TELEPHONES: One pay telephone and one usually busy Fullerton SID phone available in main press box level. Additional private phones must be ordered through Pacific Bell by calling (714) 972-7711.

INTERVIEW ROOMS: None available. Interviews must be conducted outside the locker room areas.

SCOUTS: Professional scouts will be issued tickets in the grandstands. Scouts from opposing schools will be issued press box passes if space permits in accordance with NCAA rules but only if requested at least five days in advance.

CAL STATE FULLERTON CAMPUS



California State University, Fullerton is a broadly based liberal arts institution that also offers many professional studies such as business administration, education, engineering and nursing.

With the theme "Honoring the Past — Creating the Future," the university is celebrating its 25th anniversary in 1984-85. The community is invited to participate in the observance, which includes a wide range of special events and activities. For information, call (714) 773-FACT.

The university's students come primarily from Southern California with many from other states and other nations. Most students commute each day to and from classes: many come to classes only in the evening.

Drawn from throughout the world, the 750-member faculty is noted for its commitment to effective teaching and scholarly activity. Research is actively pursued, typically with students involved.

The university enjoys full accreditation for its overall program. In addition, national recognition has been accorded to programs in art, athletic training, business, chemistry, education, engineering, communications, music, nursing, speech and hearing, and theater. All told there are 85 degree programs — 41 of them at the graduate level.

Reinforcing classroom instruction is one of the largest university level internship and cooperative education programs on the West Coast. The program allows students to gain on-the-job experience while continuing their regular studies.

Another amenity is the extended education program. It provides classes, workshops, conferences and study tours on a year-round basis. Extended education offerings are open to the community without the formalities of regular admission to the university.

Still another strong point is the university's cultural events program. It includes a series that brings nationally known professional artists to the campus for residencies as well as public performances and the Cabaret Repertory Theater Company, which performs regularly in Brea.

An extensive recreation program aimed chiefly at students but also open to community members is another highlight, as is the network of community support organizations. The Titan Athletic Foundation is one of these support groups.

Further examples of community outreach are joint ventures with the City of Fullerton. One resulted in the Fullerton Arboretum, which opened on campus in 1979. Another produced lighting for the baseball field and adjoining soccer fields, while a third yielded two lighted softball fields. The university and city are now moving ahead with plans for an inn/conference center on campus as well as a sports compex.

To reinforce the university's commitment to high academic standards and community services, Cal State has embarked on a comprehensive fund-raising campaign. Its purpose is to raise the necessary non-state funding to make a very good university a great university.

Administration



Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb, President

Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb was appointed the third president of Cal State Fullerton on July 8, 1981. Her selection was the culmination of a nationwide search begun in November, 1980 to replace Dr. L. Donald Shields, who had resigned after a ten-year term to accept the presidency of Southern Methodist University.

Dr. Cobb had served as Dean of Douglass College at Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey, since 1976. There she also held the rank of Professor of Biological Sciences. Prior to her Douglass appointment she was Dean of Connecticut College and professor of Zoology for seven years. Previously, she was Professor of Biology at Sarah Lawrence College in New York.

Born in January, 1924, Dr. Cobb is known for her work in cell physiology, her promotion of the advancement of women in scientific fields and her activities on behalf of minorities. She is the first black woman to head a major public university on the west coast.

Cobb earned her bachelor's degree in 1944 from Talladega College in Alabama and her M.S. and Ph.D. in cell physiology from New York University in 1947 and 1950, respectively. She is the mother of a son, Jonathan, who is a student in the Cornell University Medical School.

Titan Athletic Foundation

The Titan Athletic Foundation is a non-profit organization that exists solely to aid the athletic program at Cal State Fullerton. It is a group of individuals with a genuine interest in athletics, the University and the community.

Athletic Department



Lynn Eilefson, Athletic Director

While demonstrating the highest level of fiscal and academic responsibility, Lynn Eilefson has maintained the championship calibre of the Cal State Fullerton intercollegiate athletic program and established the foundation for continued growth.

Since his April 1, 1982 appointment, Eilefson has seen the Titans win a baseball national championship and their first conference football title and bowl bid; the men's basketball team gained its first National Invitation Tournament berth; and the gymnastics teams and women's softball squads continue their conference domination and consistently earn national Top Ten rankings.

A two-diamond softball complex has been completed and the baseball field is now lighted for night play. These joint venture

projects with the City of Fullerton are the prelude to the long-awaited "Youth Sports Complex" which will feature football/soccer and baseball stadiums. Long dormant plans have been revitalized and with legal roadblocks recently surmounted, a 1986 completion date is targeted.

While many colleges and universities are dropping sports, Fullerton has maintained a well rounded program of 20 men's and women's sports despite overburdened facilities and shrinking

fiscal allocations.

Eilefson came to Fullerton after serving as senior assistant athletic director at UCLA, where he was responsible for alumni and booster liaison, marketing, promotions and sports information. He previously served for eight and a half years at Fresno State University in a variety of postions including associate athletic director, coordinator of the stadium development fund and six years as executive director of the Bulldog Foundation. Prior to that he held posts at Lawrence University and Montana State University.

At Fresno State, Eilefson drew up a capital fund campaign to build its 30,000-seat on-campustadium. He raised cash contributions from \$30,000 to more than \$500,000 during his term and

also launched the "Red Wave" mania that has captured the San Joaquin Valley.

Eilefson is a 1957 graduate of the University of Montana with a degree in Business Marketing Management. He and wife Bev live in Placentia. His children are all graduates of Fresno State University and make their home in Fresno.

Santa Ana Bowl



Fullerton football returns to the Santa Ana Bowl in 1984.

The 12,000 capacity municipal facility served as the home of Titan football during portions of the 1971 through 1975 seasons and Fullerton compiled an 11-9 record there while alternating home dates with Anaheim Stadium.

Located on Flower Street between Sixth and Civic Center Drive in central Santa Ana, the "Bowl" is only nine miles south of the Fullerton campus and boasts tradition as one of the first stadium sites in Orange County.

The site was dedicated on Apr. 27, 1932 and has played host to a wide variety of athletic and entertainment events while undergoing numerous facelifts and remodelings.

The current structure was built in 1963. In 1981 it was re-dedicated as Eddie West Field — Santa Ana Stadium in tribute to the late Eddie West, long-time sports editor of The Register newspaper.

The two-tiered enclosed press box can handle two radio play-by-play crews in separate booths, numerous film crews on the roof and approximately 30 writers and statisticians on the lower level.

Youth Sports Complex

The long-awaited dream of a permanent-on-campus football facility for Cal State Fullerton is "in sight" again after more than a year of delays due to litigation brought by a student group and neighborhood group.

The joint venture involving the State of California, the University, the City of Fullerton and the Hilton Hotel chain is designed to provide the Titans and all of northern Orange County with adequate football, soccer and baseball fan facilities.

State land will be used to house the Hilton Hotel with the land-lease funds being directed to maintain the youth sports complex. The University is required to provide the "front" money with the City of Fullerton funding the majority of the project.

Home Field History

The Titans' return to Santa Ana Bowl for the 1984 season is the latest stop in a vagabond exsitence which has seen the infant football program call six different sites "home" while trying to establish a winning tradition.

The need for a permanent, on-campus facility was never more obvious than in 1983 when the Titans were forced to move the playing site of two of their three home games on an average of 14 hours notice.

The Pacific Coast Athletic Association begins the 1984 academic year with a complemen of eight football-playing institutions after the effective addition to the lineup this season of New Mexico State, which officially joined this progressive 16-year-old organization on July 1, 1983.

The "Pacific Coast" now spreads over four states—California, Nevada, Utah and Nev Mexico—as it continues a tradition of growth as one of only eight Division I footbal conferences in the nation.

Schedules continually are being upgraded to include intersectional Division I powers and the development of the California Bowl in Fresno has brought added national recognition. Each year the PCAA champion meets the Mid-American champion in Bulldog Stadium is one of only two (Rose Bowl) closed-end arrangements in existence.

Head Coach Gene Murphy



For guiding Fullerton State to its long-awaited first winning football season at the Division I-A level in 1983, Gene Murphy was unanimously chosen Pacific Coast Athletic Association Coach of the Year.

And by the time they got around to hoisting the PCAA championship banner against the wall in Titan Gym, the popular Irish-Catholic from New Jersey by way of North Dakota was a nominee for sainthood.

"I'm no 'messiah'," pleaded Murphy as the accolades poured in during a most memorable fourth year at Fullerton. "It's the coaches and the players who

deserve the credit.

"I've said it many times but I sincerely believe it. No one can match our staff of assistant coaches. We work together, they don't work for me. And it takes a special kind of person to play football at Fullerton."

The football world discovered Murphy and the

Titans in 1983 because of the bottom line—a 7-5 record, a first-ever league championship and trip to a post-season bowl game. But it was no overnight success story. The foundation had been laid during the three preceding years but was obscured by a composite 10-24 record.

"Progress isn't always measured in wins and losses," Murphy says. "I knew we could win at Fullerton but we were going to have to do it before anyone on the outside felt that way.

"I said going into last season that we would be as good as Fullerton could be in 1983 and 1984. I knew we had improved each year but you never know until you put the team out on the field. Sure, some good fortune came our way and we got some momentum and some breaks. It was mostly the result of developing a more positive self-image and winning attitude."

How far has Murphy brought the program? Campus security officer Fred Molina pro-

vides a perspective.

"It was the first day of classes in the spring semester of 1980 and everything is kind of chaotic. I spotted this car going the wrong way in one of the parking lots and stopped him. It was Gene Murphy, who identified himself as the new football coach. I told him, 'You've got enough problems. You don't need any more trouble from me.' And I helped get him turned around."

A busy parking lot was the least of the obstacles facing Murphy. No stadium, inadequate office space, a lack of community support, no fall camp or training table and no weight

room were much more pressing concerns.

"We had to go back to square one to build a broad base," Murphy recalls. "This program is still in its infancy. It's only 14 years old now. We're competing with schools that have been

playing football for 50 years or more."

Murphy's program still won't be confused with those Division I universities appearing regularly on national television nor those that use their tradition to write their own bowl game tickets even before the season begins. The lack of fancy facilities and unlimited budgets is balanced out by the camaraderie and personal contact of the entire athletic department staff.

"What we have is 'Titan family'," says Murphy with fatherly pride. "You win with people. We put up with a lot of adversity but we do it together and I think it has made us stronger.

It's something you have to experience to properly appreciate.

"What we did last year was unprecedented. No one had ever done it before at Fullerton. The 1983 team was the first winning team and the first championship team and no one else will be able to say that. Now we face the challenge of doing it again. That's something no

one else in the PCAA has done in a long time."

Utah State shared and then won outright the PCAA championship in its first two years in the PCAA in 1978 and 1979. Those same two years, Murphy was the head coach at his alma matre, the University of North Dakota. He guided the Fighting Sioux to a 15-7 record in two seasons and they climbed as high as No. 3 in the Division II national rankings in 1979 when they finished 10-2.

"I was very comfortable at North Dakota, too comfortable," explains Murphy of his move west in 1980. "I needed a challenge and came to California to see the sun. I've had more fun

coaching at Fullerton than ever before.'

"Smash-mouth" is the way Murphy describes the football at North Dakota, where he was a three-year quarterback, a one-year graduate assistant and an assistant for 14 years before

getting the head job. He came to California to throw the ball and unveiled a razzle-dazzle "squirrel derby" offense, yet it was defense and even some "smash-mouth" offense that earned the Titans the PCAA crown.

"We're still committed to throwing the football at Fullerton. But to throw the ball you've got to have it and it's up to the defense to get it for you. Last year the defense was good again (ranked in Top Twenty most of last two years) and created a lot of scoring opportunities, which the offense took advantage of. Our philosophy was to protect the football."

The result was one of the nation's top turnover ratios (plus 15) as the Titans tied the

school record with 23 pass interceptions while throwing only four.

Born Eugene Vincent Murphy on Aug. 6, 1939 in Jersey City, New Jersey, Murphy was an all-sports star at St. Peter's High School in New Brunswick and earned all-state honors in football and baseball (shortstop). His late father also was a coach and matched wits with the likes of Vince Lombardi at the prep level.

Recruited to the University of Minnesota by assistant Ray Malavasi under head coach Murray Warmath, Murphy soon found himself sitting on the bench behind Gopher star Sandy Stephens. He transferred to North Dakota and as a senior was the All-North Central

Conference quarterback.

After attaining his bachelor's degree (physical education) in 1962, Murphy served one year as graduate assistant and then coached football, baseball and swimming at North St. Paul High School before returning to UND. While he was offensive coordinator, the Sioux won six conference championships and participated in three post-season bowl games (1966, 1972 and 1975). As head coach, he won the conference title in 1979 and was named conference coach of the year. He also spent five summers (1967-71) as an assistant "guest" coach with the Saskatchewan Rough Riders of the Canadian Football League.

Murphy, who received a master's degree in physical education in 1963 and secondary dministration in 1977, served as interim athletic director at Fullerton for much of 1981.

Murphy was married to the former Kathy Fischer on Sept. 25, 1964. They honeymooned at a Minnesota Vikings game. They have two sons—Tim (2/9/66) and Michael (10/14/69) and live in Anaheim.



COACHING INCUBATOR

There has been minimal turnover of assistant coaches during Gene Murphy's five-year tenure at Fullerton and those aides who have left have all elevated themselves with their moves.

Three members of Murphy's original 1980 Titan staff are assistants in the Canadian Football League. Former offensive coordinator Roger Thomas went to the University of Minnesota for one year before turning to the pro ranks. Former defensive line coach Rich Ellerson went to Canada by way of the University of Hawaii and former secondary coach Greg Newhouse went directly to the British Columbia Lions.

Former part-time coach Bruce Ivory is now a full-time member of Dave Currey's new staff at the University of Cincinnati and Ellerson's replacement on the defensive line, Richard Smith, is beginning his first year on the staff at the University of California. Former defensive end coach Bob Davies "retired" from coaching to concentrate on private business and his night-club hypnotist act.



SEASON PREVIEW

Gene Murphy's goal when he became the Titans' football coach in 1980 was merely to post a winning season. It was an accomplishment that had eluded Fullerton since 1973, when it was competing on the Division II level.

Four years transpired before the goal was attained, but when it happened, Murphy and the Titans did it in grandiose style by winning the Pacific Coast Athletic Association championship and a berth in the California Bowl, both firsts in the school's 14-year gridiron history.

"Our goal now is to defend our title," said Murphy, who easily won PCAA Coach of the Year honors. "No one has repeated since I've been in the league and it won't be easy. I doubt if we will

sneak up on anybody this year."

It often has been said that defending a championship is more difficult than winning the initial title, but the task at hand for Fullerton pales in comparison to the obstacles Murphy and his staff overcame in compiling a 7-5 record in 1983. The Titans may be wearing PCAA championship rings and Cal Bowl watches but they still don't have a permanent home stadium, they still must play eight road games, finances are short and this year they must work their fall camp schedule around the team handball competition of the 1984 Summer Olympic Games as well as the Los Angeles Rams.

"We have just learned to live with adversity," said Murphy. "It's our rallying point, it brings us together. We're still the 'Rodney Dangerfield' of college football to the outside world but our own self-esteem has grown immeasurably. We're the 'Titan Family' and the only people we have to

gratify is ourselves. We'll just let last year's record speak for itself."

The nucleus of the squad returns including nine starters on offense and seven on defense. The graduation losses were minimal in quantity but not in quality. Replacements must be found for middle guard Joe Aguilar, the PCAA Defensive Player of the Year; All-PCAA cornerback Lee Miller; and four-year letterman Terry Hubbard, the team's inspirational leader who responded to an All-PCAA snub by making 18 tackles in the Cal Bowl vs. Northern Illinois.

OFFENSE

QUARTERBACKS — In Damon Allen the Titans have an experienced signal caller, who can beat you in many ways. His strong arm and elusive scrambling tactics carried the offense throughout the season. Allen, who is the brother of Heisman Trophy winner Marcus Allen, threw just three interceptions while accounting for nine touchdowns, four passing and five rushing. He is an intelligent player, who Murphy feels is the best athlete that the Titans' have had at quarterback since he took the head coaching job. Kevin Jan, Jim Thornton and Whit Brown will battle for the No. 2 spot. Jan, who may redshirt this year, was Allen's back-up last season and performed well in limited action. Thornton is considered the team's quarterback of the future, as he redshirted last season and was named the Offensive Scout Team Player of the Year. Brown, who transferred from Riverside City College two years ago, impressed coaches during spring practice.

RUNNING BACK — Fullerton is three-deep at the tailback position with incumbent Roy Lewis, returnee Ricky Calhoun and UCLA transfer Burness Scott. Lewis has been the starter for the past two and a half seasons and will likely survive again. He is a versatile player and an outstanding pass receiver. Calhoun had an impressive freshman season, as he finished second to Lewis in rushing. Scott is a legitimate break-away threat who was scheduled to be the Bruins' No. 2 tailback last season. He also could see action at fullback. The competition and depth are less at fullback, but Fullerton does have last season's starter Todd Gerhart back. Gerhart was third on the team in rushing and had a team-leading 4.8 yards per carry average. He will be backed up by Scott and freshman Mike Muras and Bo White.

INTERIOR LINE — The most improved area on the squad last season and everyone is back with the exception of two-year starting center Bill Smith. Letterman Dave Martinez and JC transfer Jim Keller will battle for Smith's spot on the line. Freshman redshirt Phil Benson could be a surprise there, though. Guard is where the Titans are the deepest. Larry Baker and Daryl Titsworth are both back from last year. Baker was a first-team All-PCAA pick in 1983 and Titsworth was the team's Most Valuable Lineman in 1982. Redshirt Larry Waldo, letterman John Geiger and Joe Florentine and freshman redshirt Ed Gillies give Fullerton plenty of talent to call on if necessary, and Baker may move to tackle. Fullerton has three massive, human mountains at tackle in Daren Gilbert (6-6, 285), Hank Goebel (6-8, 258) and reserve John Parke (6-7, 280). Mike Moore, a JC transfer, will also see action, while freshman redshirt Kelly Gogerty will provide depth.

TIGHT END — Things could get very crowded at tight end this season with last year's starter Bob Kent, returnee Marvin Williams and newcomers Jason Franklin and Rod Hicks competing for playing time. Williams was scheduled to be the starter last season, but an injury forced him to the sidelines. Kent, a freshman in 1983, stepped in and performed extremely well over the rest of the season. Kent held a slight edge over Williams at the end of spring practice. Franklin brings good speed and average size with him, while Hicks, a JC transfer, will see plenty of action.

WIDE RECEIVER — The "Bomb Squad" is back for the Titans, as James Pruitt, Wade Lockett, Allen Pitts and Corn Redick all return in 1984. Those four rotated at the wide receiver positions last season and will do so again this year. Redick led the team in passes caught in 1983; Pruitt caught six passes for 133 yards in the Cal Bowl and was named the Player of the Game; Pitts also caught six passes for 60 yards in the Cal Bowl; and Lockett was the team's No. 2 receiver. Senior Terry Smoot will see some action, while coverted running back Van Campfield supplies depth. Versatile Todd White and redshirt freshman Mike Sylvester are in reserve.

DEFENSE

ENDS — 1983 starters Eric Emery and Sean Foy return from injuries, giving Fullerton talent and experience at the defensive end spots. Foy missed most of the season, while Emery played despite nagging injuries. Sophomore Mark Chisom gained experience playing in their absence and will be rotated in the line-up. Greg Williams, a JC transfer, and red-shirt Ted Hinton could press for a regular job along with senior Mike Andrews.

TACKLES — Andre Pinesett and Ron McLean return to their starting spots in 1984. Both are strong and quick. Pinesett led the team in tackles for a loss while McLean improved from game-togame and provided consistency. JC transfers Ruben Lizaragga should emerge as a regular reserve as will Tom Tatum. Sophomores Mark Duncan and Jeff Taylor and red-shirt Greg Hammond could be surprises.

MIDDLE GUARD — The biggest question mark for the Titans in 1984. Replacing PCAA Defensive Player of the Year Joe Aguilar is nearly impossible. Jim Baioa is big enough and talented enough to make it a strong position. Baioa saw limited action last season, but has beefed up 11 pounds (230 to 241) to try and fill Aguilar's shoes. Converted linebacker/punter Brian Fordon will be used in reserve, while freshman Carlos Adley has the talent, needing only the experience. He could be a surprise.

LINEBACKERS — Senior John Nevens returned from a gunshot wound to lead the team in tackles in 1983. Tough and physical with great speed. He will be looked on to fill the leadership void left by the graduation of Terry Hubbard. Prentis Walker, a teammate of Nevens in high school and Scott Weller will battle for the other starting spot along with University of Kansas transfer Bill Malavasi, son of former Los Angeles Rams' head coach Ray Malavasi. Weller, a letterman, held a slight edge over Walker and Malavasi after spring practice. Bob Oeh and JC transfer Bruce Cook will provide depth.

CORNERBACKS — A position where a great talent was lost and another one returns. Junior Mark Collins is back on one side, where he had seven interceptions last season and was a second-team All-PCAA pick. A replacement must be found for first-team All-PCAA selection Lee Miller, who also had seven interceptions in 1983. A trio of JC transfers — Vernon Norwood, Jimmy Walton and Reggie Hill — will compete for the job. Squad members Wayne Allums and Kelly Ross could be a factor and will supply depth. Fall-arriving Tom Orloff might challenge also.

SAFETY — Maybe the strongest part of the defense. Regulars Duane Henson and Mark Pembrook are back for their senior seasons and they have excellent back-ups in University of Utah transfer Mike Romero and JC transfer Tony Campbell. It may be hard to keep promising red-shirt freshmen Tom Phillips and Randy Gonzales out of the lineup. Former cornerback Steve Berlardi, back from an absence of two years due to injuries, is also available as is squad member Trent Baker.

KICKING GAME — Senior Greg Steinke has re-written the Titan book with his place kicking exploits the past three years. He won early season games with dramatic field goals at Boise State and Utah State, but had difficulty in the 40-to-50 yard range the rest of the season and must regain his consistency. Vince Gamache is the incumbent punter but he faces strong challenges from JC transfer Steve Green and freshman Jim Sirois.

A PCAA Championship

"We'll be as good as we can be at Cal State Fullerton in 1983 and 1984," coach Gene Murphy freely told the news media prior to last season on the strength of his freshmen-oriented recruiting program. Little did he know how good that would be.

Thanks to the maturation of a once gangly offensive line, the coming of age of a gifted athlete at quarterback, consistent "big plays" from an always hard-hitting defense and a bit of divine intervention the Titans not only posted a winning season but a championship year in 1983.

The obstacles and adversity? They are many and everyone is aware of them. The media foresaw another losing year and predicted the Titans would finish at the bottom of the Pacific Coast Athletic Association standings, not at the top.

The tide may have turned on one innocent looking running play in Boise, Idaho on Sept. 3. Just when it appeared a victory might be slipping away, Roy Lewis ran for 11 yards on a third and eight play at the Fullerton 30-yard line. Instead of playing cautiously and accepting a tie, the Titans gambled for the win and the positive thinking paid off. Damon Allen passed the team into position for Greg Steinke's last-second field goal and the momentum continued through a 7-1 start.

First-ever wins at Utah State and San Jose State and another late rally at Fresno State would have been good enough only for a PCAA title tie, however, and no California Bowl bid but for the intervention of Long Beach State. The 49ers drove the length of the field with no timeouts in the final minute and a half to score on a fourth-down play at Nevada-Las Vegas and put the PCAA outright champion Titans in the California Bowl.

A season-long pattern of vengeance had its roots in Boise, Idaho where the Titans won for the first time on Greg Steinke's 51-yard field goal with 0:09 to play. A fumble by the Broncos set up Steinke's 26-yard field goal in the third quarter, but the Broncos tied the game with 2:12 to play on a one-yard run by Rodney Webster and Tony Massagli's conversion kick.

Fullerton received the ensuing kickoff and was faced with a third and eight inside its own 30-yard line. Roy Lewis ran for 11 yards and the first down and the complexion of the game, and possibly the season, had changed. Damon Allen passes to backs Jimmy Render (15 yards) and Van Campfield (18 yards) set up Steinke's game winner.

The game ended with the Broncos passing incomplete deep into Fullerton territory.

The Titans' offense, which showed little improvement over 1982 in the win at Boise State, exploded in the first half with 18 points and 264 yards of total offense. Damon Allen directed several long drives including a 99-yard scoring march to match a winning Long Beach drive from the year before.

Kicker Jose Oceguera and running back Lenny Montgomery got the 49'ers back into the game before Allen ran for his third touchdown of the day early in the fourth quarter to tie the school record and establish a season-long PCAA high. Long Beach came back once again in the closing minutes and had a chance to win when a bad snap resulted in a punt of minus 10 yards for the Titans.

The game ended with the 49'ers passing incomplete into the Fullerton end zone.

Not only had Fullerton never before beaten Utah State, but the Titans had never even held a lead over the Aggies. Well, Fullerton finally got a lead, but it lost it and the Titans had to rally from an 11-point deficit in the final eight minutes to achieve the long-sought victory which thrust them into championship posture.

A long pass on the first play of the game set up a quick Itah State score, but Fullerton bounced back after a John Nevens' pass interception. A high snap aborted the extra-point attempt, but it seemed minor when the Aggies stormed to a

24-13 advantage after three quarters.

A school record 54-yard field goal by Greg Steinke made things interesting and a recovered onsides kick had Fullerton threatening. But the Aggies drove Fullerton back and appeared ready to run out the clock. First, Terry Hubbard intercepted an ill-advised pass and Damon Allen drove the Titans to the two-yard line before a slight injury brought on Kevin Jan for his collegiate debut. Two running plays produced a touchdown but Allen's pass attempt on a two-point conversion was no good and it looked like the Titan rally would be two points short. Utah State needed only one first down to run out the clock but on third and inches the Aggies fumbled and Mark Collins recovered at midfield. A 19-yard pass from Allen to Todd Gerhart positioned Steinke for more heroics in a stadium where older brother Steve used to kick for the Aggies.

In their first post-season appearance ever, the Titans saw hopes of another miracle evaporate when quarterback Damon Allen was forced out of bounds on a fourth and one with 42 seconds remaining. That play secured a 20-13 victory for Northern Illinois in California Bowl III before 20,464 fans.

The Huskies took the opening kickoff and marched 77 yards in 12 plays with Vince Scott kicking a 23-yard field goal. The Titans came right back, as Allen hooked up with wide receiver James Pruitt for a 48-yard pass play to set up a 26-yard field goal by Greo Steinke.

In the second quarter, Northern Illinois ground out a 15-play, 59-yard drive, ending in a three-yard touchdown run by Darryl Richardson. The Titans' lightning struck quickly again as Corn Redick raced 43 yards on a reverse to the Huskie 37-yard line. Five plays later, Allen pump faked and then hit a streaking Redick for a 25-yard touchdown pass, tying the game again, 10-10.

The Huskies forged ahead late in the third quarter on a short, 45-yard drive. They then put the Titans 10 in the hole when Scott again connected from 42 yards out early in the fourth quarter.

The Titans refused to fold. Allen moved his team 54 yards and Steinke's 40-yard field goal cut the lead to 20-13 with 7:19 remaining.


