

## NEW SUPT. & DEAN COME ABOARD

Adm. Joseph P. Rizza was appointed Superintendant and Dr. David H. Grover was appointed Dean by the Board of Governors on May 26, 1972 and have assumed their positions on 2 August 1972. Adm. Rizza graduated from the Pennsylvania Maritime in 1936, shipped with United States Lines for six years, and served for 30 years as a Naval Officer. He came to CMA from the National War College, Fort Belvoir, VA where he was Director of Instruction and Chairman of the Department for Curriculum Development. In 1957 he took his B.S. from the University of Washington and earned his MA in political science from Boston University in 1958.

Dr. Grover graduated from Kings Point in 1945, holds a valid license, and has had experience in merchant ships and in shoreside operations. He earned his MA in speech and communications from the University of Colorado and his PhD from the University of Oregon. Dr. Grover comes to CMA from the Idaho State Board of Education where he was the Associate Director of Higher Education.
