# COMMUNITY NEWS By Dennis Doolittle

Research and Advisory Commit- in Village 17. tee (RAC) - Thinking of adding solar to your home? Of buying an EV? Looking for new appliances? Worried about the implications of a long lasting electricity black out? If so, a Town Hall meeting on being wise energy users is in preparation. The date for the meeting has been changed to January 17, 2024, at 10AM to Noon in the Assembly Room (AR). Plans are underway to broadcast the event on LVTV and to make a recording available on the web site.

The Board has requested that a sub-committee of members of the RAC, Water, and Finance committees be formed to address the long term plan for the expected decreases in water availability and significant increases in the cost of water over the coming years.

Paint Project – The original whole house stucco and trim paint project is underway in Villages 6, 8 and 17. Work is now progressing

Villages 7, 9, 19 are in the next phase of the paint project. Work will start once Village 17 is com-

Roofing – Work has begun on the next phase of the roofing project. Individual homeowners will receive notification before work begins on their building

LV Website – Issues of the Village Voice are now available online on the secure log-on portion of the web site. Starting in December, the Village Voice will no longer be printed and mailed to residents. Printed copies will be available at the Administration office, on request.

Printed copies of the monthly calendar are available at the Rec Center office.

Concrete – The Village maintains the concrete in the common areas, driveways, sidewalks, gutters, etc. The Board directed staff to hire a consulting engineer to review the proposed work. Check the next Board meeting for an update.

Completed Projects – The last pool resurfacing and the Village road resurfacing projects were completed this past month.

Garage Doors - The Village receives complaints about garage doors left open. There is no policy on what is acceptable and what is not. A draft policy is being created

to be discussed at the next Board meeting. When approved, it will be out for review and comment by residents in the online Village Voice.

Garbage Bins - The Board decided to go one more month (November) with written warnings on bins left outside (not in your garage or on your patio). Next month enforcement with fines will start.



elements of aging citizens through active participation as volunteers in City and Village activities.



# A WORD ON WINE

# Over the River and Through the Woods

On a recent trip to the Santa Ynez wine country, Jon Niemann, Don & I stopped at the Rancho Sisquoc Winery. Our quest was to pick up five wines for an upcoming Grapes R Us Tasting.

etable farm by the Flood family of San Francisco. In 1970, when avocado and orange trees failed to thrive, some experimental grapes were planted, some of the first in the Santa Maria valley.

It'd been many years since we visited, but nothing had changed. The winery isn't easy to find. At the end of a long and winding road, a small sign marks the gate. We turned onto a one lane road that seemed to lead to private property. Buoyed by another sign that said "Winery - 2 Miles," we drove on, passing fields of vegetables, grazing cattle and olive trees. When we finally arrived at the winery, it felt as if we had stepped back in time. The tasting room is a rustic barn with several cats lounging inside.

Rancho Sisquoc was established as a cattle ranch and veg-

etable farm by the Flood family of San Francisco. In 1970, when avocado and orange trees failed to thrive, some experimental grapes were planted, some of the first in the Santa Maria valley. The first wines were bottled in 1972 – Riesling and Cabernet Sauvignon. Today the winery produces 14,000 cases of wine annually as well as selling grapes to other area vintners.

One of the wines we picked was a Sylvaner, a rarely seen varietal nowadays, but back in the 70's it was ubiquitous. Remember Blue Nun Liebfraumilch? Based on Sylvaner, it is a cool climate grape that is still widely grown in Germany and marketed as Liebfraumilch. Sylvaner was suggested for planting by a friend of the ranch manager who'd grown enamored of the wine while serv-

ing in World War II.

Another interesting selection was a "Meritage" – a recent New World term to denote red blends in the tradition of Bordeaux. In France, it's called a Claret blending Cabernet Sauvignon, Merlot, Cabernet Franc, Petit Verdot & Malbec. An alliance of American vintners held a naming contest, asking for suggested names for their New World "Claret" blend. An amazing 66,000+ entries were submitted. Meritage was selected, combining the "merit" of modern winemaking with the "heritage" of Bordeaux traditions.

The winery's quaintness and peaceful setting are a world apart from the glitzy world that much wine tasting has become. Sipping the wines on the shaded patio with the Santa Maria Bench in the distance was quite peaceful. As we loaded up our purchases and headed back out to the main road, we were grateful that this winery had stood the test of time yet remained unchanged. It's well worth a visit. Just get in your DeLorean and set your time machine to 1975.

# **Do Not Click The Link**

Smishing, Phishing and Fishing, Part 2

NI, I loved to fish. I would fish in the Atlantic Ocean from a boat, cast my line in rivers and streams, plus surf fish from the beach.

The key to successful fishing is using the right bait. I tried stale bread crumbs, slices of slimy squid and messy blood worms. Often, I attached a shiny lure to my line to catch a fish's attention so he'd go for the bait.

Smishing, like fishing, uses the right come-on to distract an unsuspecting mobile phone user. One person defined smishing as "a tactic where bad guys impersonate reputable companies and trick their mark into handing over personal information."

Once the smisher reels in the private information he wants, he uses your precious data for identity theft or other fraudulent activities.

Is there a difference between smishing and phishing? Sure is. Smishing and phishing are two cyberattacks that trick people into handing over their private information. However, they differ in methods of delivery.

Phishing happens through email. The email looks like a genuine article.

This week, someone cast their line into my email inbox. I received a message from FedEx. They were notifying me that a package I was expecting was coming my way. However, I wasn't waiting for a FedEx delivery.

They needed an address confirmation to send me the nonexistent package. Of course, there was a link for me to click. This is phishing.

On the other hand, the method of communication used with smishing is texting. However, the text is merely a shiny lure to catch your attention and convince you to click a link.

What about those texts that look like they came from USPS? At all costs, don't click any links.

As a youngster growing up in We all shop online. Packages from Amazon or Target are normally delivered to our doorsteps. How unusual is it one of your packages is being held up somewhere? Therefore, you may be caught off guard when you receive a text regarding a so-called lost package.

> If I put on my thinking cap, I should recognize someone is trying to mislead me into giving them my personally identifiable information.

> Here's how to refuse their bait. The Postal Service and other companies offer free tools to track packages. To sign up for these free services, you register online or initiate a text message and provide them with a tracking number. Then, YOU are in charge of knowing where your package is.

> USPS only sends you text messages if you sign up to receive alerts about your delivery. If you did NOT sign up for a package's tracking request directly from USPS, and you receive a text from them, guess what? If it contains a link, DO NOT click the link. It is a smishing text.

> Let me conclude with several final warnings about USPS scams.

> First, according to Donna Harris, public information representative from the United States Postal Inspection Service, "If you never signed up for a USPS tracking request for a specific package, and you received one, then DO NOT click any links in the text."

> In addition, the USPS only has your cell number if you signed up for alerts. In this case, you are the one who provided them with your contact information. One Postal Service representative said, "We do not send text messages about lost or unclaimed packages."

> Bottom line: If you receive a notice about a problem with your USPS package's delivery and haven't made a tracking request, delete the text or block the number.

# Ceramics and More-Millie Likes It All

Ceramics is just the latest in Millie Seidman's extensive creative pursuits. In the 20 years she has lived in Leisure Village, she has been actively involved in the community, making costumes for the Players Guild and baking pineapple upside down cakes for the Music Club. Recently she discovered ceramics and can often be found in the ceramics studio exercising her creativity.

"I can spend three or four hours there and it feels like just a little while," Seidman said. "I go whenever I can — I haunt the place. I think this is a perfect time to have discovered this."

Seidman grew up in a town of 200 in northern Minnesota. Her dad was looking for more work when her grandfather went to California and reported there were lots of jobs available. So in January 1953 her family moved to California.

"I can remember seeing palm trees and mountains and then the ocean, and ohhh, it was pretty exciting," she said. But she was a bit overwhelmed about going from a high school class of 17 to 1,500 in her class at Van Nuys High School. "My older brother saved me from crying in the admissions office," she said. Natalie Wood and Robert Redford were in her class.

After high school, she went to nursing school and met her future husband, Donald, a medical student.

"I graduated in 1957 and got married in 1959. I worked until I was seven months pregnant with my first baby and had four more after that,"

she said. They raised their family in Woodland Hills and first heard about Leisure Village when a friend, Jerry Lawrence, construction project manager, showed it to them.

"We came back 30 years later and bought our house," she said. "I'm so grateful we moved here."

She refinished all the woodwork and doors in the house. On each panel of the doors to a linen closet she hand painted 12 different breeds of birds. All are local except for the robin from Minnesota.

After her husband died in 2010 she made a quilt out of his ties, embroidering a poem on the inside.

She learned to sew as a child on a treadle sewing machine and through the years had sewn for her family. So it was a natural progression to start making costumes for the Players Guild.

"I would go to the thrift store or whatever was necessary to make it look authentic," she said.

Another creative activity is baking.

"If there's one thing I'm known for in the Village it's my pineapple upside down cake," she said. For seven years she made as many as 11 cakes and homemade whipped cream to top them for the Music Club's summer concert in the park. She laughed, recalling one concert where the sprinklers came on after the intermission. She put the empty whipped cream bowl over the sprinkler, saving the day. But this was the last year she would be making the cakes, she said, and she passed the baton to someone else, leaving more time for ceramics.

"I never paid any attention to the ceramics room the first 18 years I lived here," she said. "I knew it was there, I didn't know I'd like it so much."

In February 2022, her friend Joan Mc Connell said 'Let's try ceramics.'

"She didn't like it but I loved it, so I thank her," Seidman said.

"I like the freedom of just doing anything you want. It was just a revelation. I could spend hours over there. I do crazy things — I'm a kid playing."

She started with a tour of the studio and introductory class.

"You buy your 25 lbs. of clay for \$16 — it's the bargain of the century," she said. All the glazes and firing are free and dues are

only \$5 a year.

She said Norm Chapman and Ken Brod help people as needed.

She begins many of her pieces by rolling the clay on a patterned surface to create texture and then builds the piece from there. A snowy white base sets the scene for a winter holiday with snowmen and pine trees. Other candle holders evoke Halloween and Thanksgiving with pumpkins, witches' hats and a turkey. A spring garden scene features a flower-covered gate leading to a pathway with little animals and a tiny basket of colored eggs. A large menorah has candle holders spell-

ing, SHALOM. There are baskets with braided handles and a planter in two pieces to encircle a patio table umbrella. When she didn't like the back of a fountain on her patio, she made tiles to cover it.

"I just like creating funny little things, useful things," she said. "It gives me pleasure when someone likes it because that is how I felt when I made it. If it tilts or is uneven, I don't really care." That's part of the charm.

#### **WRITERS CLUB**


