An Election Report

In Leisure Village there are 2.136 residences. Home owners are the only ones allowed to vote, either by proxy or ballot. This year there were three votes allowed per residence.

A quorum of 50% plus one or 1,069 votes are needed to elect Board Members. The same quorum is required to make a change in the by-laws. To make a change to CC&Rs it requires 75% or 1,602 of the votes of home owners to make a quorum.

In June of 1994 the Village spent over \$2,000. for an election to change the CC&Rs and not enough homeowners voted to make a quorum.

It has always been debatable as to whether cumulative voting makes voting more confusing. If it is eliminated everyone votes the same; if it is not changed everyone has

their choice of how they would like to vote. Please do not be confused by proxy and ballot in regard to votes. At our last election a proxy or a ballot could contain up to three votes.

We do everything possible to have everyone's vote count but we still must abide by Village and State election laws.

At our May Board meeting I tried to ask you to wait until after Candidates Night to cast your proxy. At the start of Candidates Night there were 257 proxies in the box plus 1 house monthly fee. Why should we have Candidates Night if you do not wish to listen to the candidates?

If you have the Board cast your votes for you they divide them as equally as possible between all candidates.

You have one ballot or proxy per household (this See Election.....pg 3

Villager to Celebrate 105th Birthday August 4



Proxy Confusion Loses Votes

This issue of *Inside Leisure Village* features Clary Morgan's report on the recent Village election. He is distressed that 151 proxies (453 votes) had to be declared invalid by the Election Inspectors. Why this many lost votes? Perhaps homeowners did not read or understand the directions provided with the proxy/ballot.

One point of confusion certainly is the current Village practice of using the cumulative voting procedure, or "stacking" of votes. Last year an initiative sought to have this feature repealed, to fall short only by about 18 votes when a quorum on the mail-in election was not reached. This futile election cost LVA over \$2,000.

The Village prides itself on voting in state and national elections, but often struggles to reach a quorum in local Village elections. Voter apathy in Leisure Village? Horrors! Our active voting record has always been a thing of pride to us.

Do YOU understand the cumulative voting procedure? Can YOU explain it to your neighbor? Should we maintain a system many don't understand or use correctly? This time 453 votes were lost. How many more votes will be lost before the system of cumulative voting is voted out?

Committees Form For New Year

Summertime is not vacation time for the new LVA Board of Directors. There is much organizing to be done. One job they have is reforming committees for the coming year. There is an inordinate amount of work done by volunteer committee members here in the Village. New LVA employees marvel at the amount of expertise available to aid the Board of Directors with their many duties.

The Village has over a dozen standing committees, At least 200 volunteer homeowners make the wheels go around, providing counsel and information to the LVA Board. It would cost the Village a mint to hire what our extensive committee system does for free. We are truly unique.

Now is the time for all good men and women to come to the aid of their Village. The deadline for volunteer survey forms to be turned in is Friday, August 4. Committees currently needing more skilled help for a few hours each month are the Insurance, Architecture and Landscape, and Building and Grounds committees.

Those homeowners who have moved into the Village recently especially are urged to consider this service to their new community. They will find that newcomers are welcome to apply and get involved. Training is provided when necessary. Give a few hours a month to Leisure Village by joining the committee system now

At our last election for a quorum needing 1,069 ballots we had a total of 1515 proxies and ballots. Of this total there were 158 ballots which were all valid and a sad count of 151 invalid proxies. Some people who were designated as a proxy did not vote so your vote may not have been counted.



Any return from this investment in interest or dividends would, in reality, be a return on the original investment and would not be taxable, but would give the impression that it is tax-free. At 10% interest, that money would be taxable if it were interest. Treating it as tax-free income may create a problem if it becomes necessary to explain it to the Internal Revenue Service. It's not worth it.
