







I offer you my personal congratulations. The best wishes of the entire campus community go with you.




KSFX and Chester Farrow promoted the show, which had another local band, SVT, as second bill.



The headliners of the evening, the Greg Kihn Band, performed a highly polished set of new and old material.



As students ate free hot dogs, they basked in the sun listening to the music of Push.


The afternoon was topped off by a debate between AS president candidates Robert Dye, Steve Healy and James Malveaux.




Contestants get ready to tackle 1400 burritos at the Greek Eat-a-Thon (Top Left).

ΔΣΦ PROSPERS IN FIRST YEAR




SKI CLUB GETS A TAHOE SKI CABIN

The highlight of the Spring Quarter, as always, was the end of the year Raft Trip June 14, 15 and 16.



PARDI GRAS



CAL STATE CELEBRATES SILVER ANNIVERSARY





BASEBALL

The Cal State Men's Tennis Team toured to schools including Sacramento State and San Francisco State.




In spite of wet and grueling weather the 11- member team came out with a good record.


Nine women composed the 1982 Women's Tennis Team.

By April, the women started winning matches with players like Karen Hughes and Heidi Wiedenmeyer leading in team points.




WOMEN'S SOCCER

The soccer team challenged the University of Santa Clara, Stanford University, Sonoma State, and San Francisco, among others.







MEN'S TRACK
