
Leisure Village Bible Study meets every Tuesday at Emeritus, just outside the Village. Emeritus

### Plants go missing from Village's display gardens

For nearly a year, Villagers have been able to visit "display gardens," two beds that contain some of the plants on the revised and Boardapproved full maintenance (FM) plant list. Designed by the LV Residential Landscape Committee, these patches are located in an area to the west of the swimming pool and north of the Clubhouse. One garden features shade-tolerant plants; the second contains flowering, sun-loving, colorful ones.

Landscape Committee Chairman Jerry Sortomme said, "The list was updated in 2013, and we want people to see some of the FM choices in full bloom rather than in a small photo printed on paper."

The beds were installed and maintained by the LV Landscape Department. For months, the display gardens were just fine.

Then about two months ago, Jerry and LV staff noticed a handful of plants had been lifted out of the sun-

loving bed.

"We call them Gucci plants: small, colorful, lower-maintenance, and well behaved for small gardens; several were gone," Jerry said.

A few weeks later, committee members walked to the gardens after their meeting; several more plants were missing.

"They had been thriving and

especially colorful ones," he said. Twice more, colorful plants disappeared — including a painted mirror plant, Texas sage, and indigo spires; a total of eight plants vanished.

Some of the missing plants were easy picking, Jerry explains, newly planted with shallow roots. "But this is not a buffet or u-pick garden," he stresses. "It's everyone's garden."

Jerry Sortomme is an experienced professional, the Professor Emeritus of Horticulture at Santa Barbara City College. He's stymied by the disappearances. He's sure animals are not the culprits. Rabbits and squirrels nibble leaves; they don't remove the plants from the roots.

At full capacity, the gardens display about 30 of the 90 plants on the approved list. The Landscape Committee is planning two informative stations so visitors can identify what they see. Perhaps one or two placards should read, "Please don't take our plants."

(This is the second in a threepart series on Age-Related Macular Degeneration, or AMD.)

People in their 60s and 70s have the highest risk of developing AMD. While experts are not completely sure if AMD is genetic, it does tend to run in families, especially first-degree relatives (a person's mother, father and siblings). It is therefore important for patients who have family histories of AMD to make sure their eve doctors know about it.

The symptoms of dry AMD include slightly blurred vision, the need for more light while reading and the presence of a blurred spot in the center of vision.

The symptoms of wet AMD include visual distortion that causes straight lines to look like waves, blurred vision and trouble seeing details (up close or far away). Advanced forms of wet AMD are more serious and include images similar to hallucinations, and severe central vision loss. One of the most important facts about

AMD is that is does not cause pain as a warning signal, so seniors should never skip routine eve exams.

Sometimes seniors confuse the condition of AMD with other eye conditions such as cataracts and glaucoma, as well as a condition associated with diabetes called diabetic retinopathy. However, these conditions are not associated with AMD, do not increase the risk of developing AMD and do not make AMD worse if it already exists.

The progression of dry AMD varies greatly from person to person. It develops slowly over a number of years, and often people can notice very little change in their vision. AMD can remain stable in between routine eye exams. Those who have dry AMD often develop the ability to work around the vision loss by learning to compensate with their remaining vision, although most people with advanced AMD do become legally blind. Wet AMD progresses faster than dry AMD and is more likely to cause

severe vision loss.

Even if a person's AMD is not advanced, it can be dangerous to drive. As seniors age, they worry about the day they will no longer be able to get around by themselves, as driving represents a symbol of remaining self-sufficient. However, continuing to drive with visual impairment is putting everyone who drives and rides in a vehicle at risk for accidents. Even though it is a difficult decision, their ability or inability to drive needs to be discussed with those who have developed AMD, and it is better to err on the side of caution.

### Pet Club, Security help reunite dog with Montana owner

"She was thirsty and friendly, a Portuguese Water Dog with a rabies tag from Missoula, Montana," recalled Cathy Michaels.

When Cathy called the phone number on the tag, she got a recorded message that was not helpful. Cathy then called LV Security, but no one had reported a missing dog.

Security Officer Christi Moore — a dog lover who actually keeps treats at the Main Gate — reminded Cathy that if no owner could be found within a reasonable time, the stray would have to go to the Animal Shelter. Cathy did not want that to happen and immediately went into action.

She explained, "My next call was

Barbara put a message on Facebook that was shared by other Facebook pet lovers. An eNews alert also was sent to Village subscribers. And the big black furry center of attention went home with Barbara, whose dog Doc welcomed her new pal for a sleepover.

Just after midnight, a call came in to Security; the search was over! Roy and Debra Wilson, visiting LV from Montana, had gone out to dinner, leaving dog River in their RV. Apparently River had jumped through a window in their large motor home, hoping to find them.

"That window is nearly 6 feet off the ground," said Roy Wilson. "It's lucky she wasn't hurt."

And it was lucky that the Pet Club and Security Officer Moore came to her rescue.

The Pet Club got a new member and a donation. The club's "Chain of Kindness" proved an effective and humane option for River and her owners. Paws up for job well done!

### 'Dixie Swim Club' a feel-good play with humor, poignancy

The Players Guild presented its annual extravaganza during Easter week to standing ovations. "The Dixie Swim Club" was characterized as a "hilarious and poignant play" by producer Joyce Belcher. Director Diane Carroll called it a "feel good show." It was all of that — and more.

It certainly was a comedy; the laugh lines were scattered throughout the story, and, in my humble opinion, comedy is the hardest of all acting fields. It is not just the words that are delivered, but how they are delivered, both in tone and in timing. The ladies did a great job there. all the while maintaining heavy Southern drawls.

Spring is officially here, and along with enjoying our beautiful Camarillo weather, it is a good idea to take some time to prepare your home for the warmer season.

The fall and spring are the two most important times to review your home's major HVAC — heating, ventilation, air conditioning system. Right before the warmer days of summer is a good time to ensure that air filters have been replaced or cleaned. Check your air conditioning system before the summer, as it will

most likely be a lot less expensive than three months from now, and the technician will be less busy.

Switching to compact fluorescent (CFL) bulbs may be helpful, as they give off less heat than regular incandescent bulbs, causing less impact on the temperature of the room. They're also more energy efficient.

The "End of Support" announcement by Microsoft means that there will be no more security updates, no more fixes on nonsecurity problems and no more technical support available online for XP users. Until April 8, the company had released monthly updates to fix any recently discovered security

with his wife Joan in Village 35. But for more than three decades, Joel was a discoverer: finding talent for the world of entertainment and doing it so successfully that the echoes of his groups endure today.

"I was a personal manager in the rock 'n' roll business," he says. By accident almost, Joel adds. In his 30s, his acting career was quieting down - "I didn't sing or dance" - and he got worried about supporting his wife and two young sons. His half-brother offered him work as the road manager for the group Steppenwolf, and he took it.

One day, three young men walked into the agency office.

"They sang rock 'n' roll in harmony. No one did that then. I loved them!" Joel recalls.

The trio expanded to seven musicians, the agency booked them as the opening act for Steppenwolf, and Three Dog Night

"A few months later, we were on the road, and I got a telegram saying, 'Tell the boys they are No. 1," Joel says. "It was their record 'One' which went through the

Next came "Joy to the World," and for Joel and the group, that meant performing to sold-out venues.

"It was exhausting: the logistics, the promotion, personal appearances, everything needed on the tour," Joel remembers. "One night we drove straight through from Chicago to Fort Lauderdale."

Eventually, success drew Joel off the road and into the agency office as an associate. It was heady stuff. The agency represented headliners like Steppenwolf and the Standells as well as Three Dog Night.

"We flew in private jets. We didn't have to show passports at customs; we were very recognizable and successful," he adds.

But he was still away from Joan and the boys for long stretches. So when Joel's partners rejected his proposal to represent a pair of Vancouver comedians named Cheech and Chong, Joel decided to go out on his own.

What followed were more successes. He signed Cheech and Chong, and a duo named Steely Dan who went on tour with Elton John. Three Dog Night came over to Joel's company, as did actor-singer David Soul and several other actors. Joel recognized the potential of videotaping musicians' performances and built an international company to market for music concerts in Asia, Europe and India.

"Then everything came to a screeching halt," Joel says. "I was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer, fatal for all but 2 percent of patients."

He smiles.

"I've been part of that 2 percent for a long time."

And he's been busy.

A visit to the Ronald Reagan Library can include a tour of Air Force One and a chance to buy the book "Air Force One: The Final Mission," written by Joel Cohen and his son Michael. It describes how the jet "landed" there.

He's also back in the entertainment business, managing musical groups.

He laughs, "I can't retire. Doing artistic

However, now Joel Cohen is doing all this from his home office in Leisure Village, near his sons and grandchildren.

"I miss the excitement of Los Angeles sometimes," he says, "But our family is nearby."

And that's exciting, too.

### Wood, gourds are instrumental to this talented Village resident

"If music be the food of love, play on." — William Shakespeare

Have you noticed how babies from any culture move to the beat of music? Music transcends all cultures and is a gift to all of us.

Music has been very important to Leisure Village resident Charlie Johnson. Did you happen to see the Woodshop display in the atrium recently? Did you see the banjo made from a gourd and a bamboo flute and the many other amazing pieces of wood art?

Charlie Johnson made the flute and the banjo instruments. After moving here two and half years ago, Charlie found himself at the Woodshop window with a broken guitar. Not knowing if it was fixable, he put his guitar with its broken neck in the hands of the Woodshop elves. To his delight and surprise, they were able to put it back in first-rate condition.

Fascinated by their skills, Charlie started hanging around the Woodshop until they suggested he come in and learn how to use the different machines. The results of his curiosity about the Woodshop, later the Ceramics Room and then the Lapidary group, can be seen in the other instruments that Charlie has made.

The guys in the Woodshop embraced Charlie's passion for building instruments out of materials not ordinarily used for that purpose. Working with Ron Quick and Pete Dellera, he said, "They've never told me no to any suggestion I've made, that it can't be done."

Charlie is quick to credit his residing at Leisure Village and the availability of the Woodshop for his being so prolific in crafting the wood and ceramic instruments he has made since moving here. He spends about six hours a week in the Woodshop, with no end in sight to the instruments he envisions. He has made a ceramic saxophone, a drum out of a gourd and 52 wood sculptures out of recycled materials.

"I think the first rhythmic sound

I heard was that of my mother's heartbeat," he says.

The first drum he can recall seeing was on "I Love Lucy," when Desi Arnaz sat down to play his Cuban drum. He was more interested in hearing Desi play than in seeing Lucy do her comic routine.

His love of music has taken him all over the world. He writes all his own music and plays every instrument he

builds. Inspired by the Woodshop, he wrote "The Broke Neck Blues" and "Going Down to the Woodshop."

As part of The Children's Celebration of the Arts program, Charlie visits schools and teaches children from preschool age to fifth grade. He has taught more than 1,500 children the music of drums from all over the world. He brings about 20 drums with him so the children can participate in a hands-on experience, learning about percussion as he explains the differences in drums from Japan, Africa, South America and other countries. They must delight to see him coming. Can you imagine the sound of 20 children playing the drums? Charles has such a generous nature and thrives

on sharing his love of music. He has a drum circle — a group of people sitting with chairs arranged in a circle, experiencing the spontaneous creation of music on a variety of drums and percussion instruments — at the Atria Assisted Living facility in Camarillo. He teaches the very young to those of senior age.

If you happen to pass the Woodshop, you just might get a glimpse of Charlie working on a new instrument made out of some recycled material. Say hello; he will be happy to talk to you about his love for music and the instruments he

He says he is lucky to live in Leisure Village, and we think Leisure Village is lucky to have him.

### Behind the scenes of Leisure Village's Crafts Faire


Hundreds of people attended the Crafts Faire, held Sunday, April 27, in the AR.



We also reviewed again the local rule defining the out of bounds area beside and behind the first hole.


