





A Remarkable Growth Rate The University


California State University, Fullerton is a young institution having opened only 18 years ago. However, it already has grown to 22,500 students and achieved national distinction in many fields.

The university's students come primarily from Southern California with many from other states and other nations. Most students commute each day to and from classes; many come to classes only in the evening.

Drawn from throughout the world, the 800-member faculty is noted for its commitment to effective teaching and scholarly activity. Research is actively pursued,

typically with students involved.


The university enjoys full accreditation for its overall program. In addition, national recognition has been accorded to programs in art, athletic training, business, chemistry, education, engineering, journalism, music, speech and hearing, and theater. All told there are 77 degree programs—36 of them at the graduate level.



Reinforcing classroom instruction is one of the largest internship and cooperative education programs on the West Coast. The program allows students to gain on-th-job experience while continuing their regular studies.

Another amenity is the continuing education program. It provides classes, workshops, conferences and study tours on a year-round basis. Continuing education offerings are open to the community without the formalities of regular admission to the university.

Yet another strong point is the university's cultural events program, including a series which brings nationally known professional artists to the campus for residencies as well as public performances.



A new development is the formation of a professional caliber chamber orchestra to provide the university community and area residents with highquality music.

An extensive recreation program aimed chiefly at students but also open to community members is another highlight, as is the 5,000-person network of community support organizations. The Titan Athletic Foundation is one of these support groups.

A further example of community outreach is the university-operated Tucker Wildlife Sanctuary in the

Santa Ana Mountains.

Meanwhile, construction is under way on campus on a 25-acre arboretum. This preserve represents a joint venture of the City of Fullerton and the university.

To reinforce the university's commitment to high academic standards and community service, President L. Donald Shields has recently embarked on an ambitious campaign called "Partners in Excellence." Its purpose is to raise the necessary non-state funding to achieve the president's chief goal for the university. That goal is to make Cal State Fullerton the foremost bachelor's degree granting institution in the nation within five years.

PRESIDENT

Dr. L. Donald Shields became president of California State University, Fullerton in 1971. At the time he was 34, making him the youngest chief executive of

a major state university in the nation.

Since 1974, Dr. Shields has served as a member of the National Science Board, having been appointed by President Ford and confirmed by the U.S. Senate. He also is the only person from the western United States currently serving on the National Commission for Cooperative Education.

Dr. Shields received his undergraduate education at University of California, Riverside, then went on to

earn his Ph.D. in chemistry from UCLA.

Dr. Shields joined the Cal State Fullerton faculty in 1963 as an assistant professor of chemistry. He became an associate professor in 1966 and a full professor in 1967. He was elected chair of the Faculty Council in 1967 and later that year became the campus' first vice president for administration. From October 1970 to May 1971, he was acting president of the University.

Dr. Shields has authored three books and numerous

articles in professional journals. He has addressed or participated in professional meetings throughout the United States, and in 1976 represented the National Science Board in Vienna, Austria, at the first biennial international symposium at the International Institute for Applied Systems Analysis.

Among Dr. Shields' community activities are having chaired the Disneyland Community Service Awards Committee, being a trustee of the World Affairs Council of



Orange County, and being director of Orange County

Sports Celebrities.

At present, Dr. Shields' foremost goal is to make Cal State Fullerton the outstanding bachelor's/master's degree granting institutional in the nation within the next five years.

Neale R. Stoner

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Neale Stoner, a former athlete at Cal State Fullerton in 1961 and 1962, returned to his alma mater in 1972 to take over the reins as director of athletics.

Stoner, 42, who replaced John Caine in August, served as head basketball coach and assistant athletic director at Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo for three seasons and previously held the same positions at the University of California-San Diego, from 1966 to 1969.

At San Luis Obispo, Stoner's basketball teams compiled an overall record of 48-32 and did not suffer a losing season in three years. In 1970-71 the Mustangs reached the NCAA Western Basketball Regionals. During the 1971-72 season Stoner's team drew an average of better than 2,000 fans per game as the Mustangs shared the CCAA basketball title with UC-Riverside and Cal State-Northridge.

As Cal Poly's assistant athletic director, Stoner was responsible for the on-campus scholarship program, scheduling, budget preparation, the athletic job program and fund raising through the Mustang Boosters' Club.

In 1966 Stoner was named UC-San Diego's first basketball coach and in three seasons compiled an overall record of 40-32; leading the Tritons to the NAIA District III playoffs each year. He also coached

tennis at San Diego from 1966 to 1968.

Stoner earned his bachelor's degree from Cal State Fullerton in 1962 following an athletic career that included two years of varsity basketball and tennis experience at CSUF. The Titan's 1962 squad reached the NAIA quarterfinals. Prior to attending CSUF, he went to Fullerton Junior College and Montebello High School.

Following graduation from Cal State Fullerton, Stoner became the schools's business services officer for four years and coached the freshman basketball team.



He earned his master's degree in physical education and school supervision in 1972, and is currently working on his doctorate at Brigham Young University.

Stoner is married to the former Lynda Del Giorgio of Fullerton. They have five children.

Augie Garrido

Head Coach

Eight seasons of intercollegiate baseball at Cal State Fullerton (1966-72) failed to produce even one winning season. The Titans compiled an overall record of 145-267-2 in those eight futile years — winning just 35-percent of its games.

Enter one Augie Garrido - named CSUF head base-

ball coach in September 1972.

Garrido's first Titan club (1973) finished with an undistinguished 19-33-1 mark. The tide however, had been turned.

In 1974 Cal State Fullerton compiled a 37-17 record, and won its first-ever conference championship in the California Collegiate Athletic Association. Garrido was named CCAA Coach-of-the-Year for his efforts (for the second time, as he was so honored in 1971 as head coach at Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo). The 1974 team participated in the NCAA Far West Division II regionals, losing to eventual national champion UC Irvine.

Cal State Fullerton moved to Division 1 of the NCAA in the summer of 1974, and switched conferences, joing the Pacific Coast Athletic Association.

The Titans responded by winning the PCAA title, the NCAA West Regional (knocking off five-time NCAA champion USC along the way) and representing District 8 at the College World Series in Omaha. Garrido was again named conference Coach-of-the-Year after his squad posted a 36-16-1 record, but that was later topped by his being named NCAA Coach-of-the-Year by the Sporting News.

In 1976 the Titans had their best season ever, winning a school record 48 games (losing only 15), win-



ning the PCAA championship for the second straight season, and reaching the finals of the NCAA West Regional championship.

The 1977 season found CSF in the Southern California Baseball Association, and the Titans responded by winning the SCBA championship with a record of 44-14. Once again CSF went to the NCAA playoffs.

Last season Garrido's Titans won their fifth consecutive league championship (SCBA) with a record of 44-13, and for the fifth consecutive season completed

the year in the NCAA Playoffs.

Garrido, a native of Vallejo, Calif., received his B.A. degree from Fresno State in 1961, following an all-star career with the Bulldog baseball squad. He joined the Cleveland Indians organization in 1961, where he remained until 1966 when he accepted a coaching position at Sierra High School in Tollhose, Calif. Garrido spent a year as head coach at San Francisco State (1969), then moved on to Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo, where he compiled a three-year record of 85-62.

His current overall collegiate coaching record is 338-184-2, for a winning percentage of .647. At Cal State Fullerton, Garrido has compiled a record of 228-108-2 for a winning percentage of .678. However, the past five seasons Garrido's Titans have compiled a record of 209-75-1; a 74-percent winning average.

Garrido formerly coached the Anchorage (Alaska) Glacier Pilots, and is a member of the executive committee of the American Baseball Coaches Association. He and his wife, Necia, live in Fullerton.

Assistant Coaches

BILL KERNEN, 30, is in his second season as assistant to Augie Garrido. Kernen spent two seasons as head coach at San Gorgonio High School (San Bernardino) compiling a record of 16-9, and in 1976 was an assistant at Orange Coast JC.

JODY ROBINSON, 24, is in this third season as a CSF baseball assistant. Robinson was a two-time All-PCAA performer for the Titans, hitting .392 his

senior season. The San Diego native (Morse High School and Mesa JC) handles the outfielders.

Newest addition to the CSF staff is MATT McCANN, Orange County's High School Coach-of-the-Year last season after leading Servite High School (Anaheim) to the CIF Championship. McCann, 25, will handle recruiting and other duties for the Titans.

Cal State Fullerton – Baseball Preview

Augie Carrido's Cal State Fullerton baseball Titans have won or shared five consecutive league titles, and participated in the NCAA playoffs each of those five years.

His 1979 club he characterizes as "one of our better teams."

Last season's team compiled a 44-13 record overall, swept the Southern California Baseball Association title with a 24-4 mark, and came within five outs of defeating eventual national champion USC, before finally losing to the Trojans in extra innings, 3-2.

Thus the '79 team has its work cut out for it if it is to live up to Garrido's expectations.

However, the Titans' head coach feels his team has the talent to more than be up to the task. The major reason

for his positive attitude is the return of first baseman Tim Wallach.

Wallach, a 6-3, 195-pounder from Irvine, Calif., set records last season for homeruns (16), average (.394), runs batted in (80), slugging percentage (.733) and hits (87). After turning down offers from professional baseball' he played this summer in Alaska and broke Dave Kingman's (former USC) record for homeruns with 21. Wallach topped off his summer by being named to the U.S. team for the World Amateur Championships in Italy.

"The return of Wallach and Mickey Palmer, Dan Hanggie's overall improvement, and the maturing of pitchers Tony Hudson and Dave Weatherman alone will make the 1979 squad one of our better teams. And, the addition of Bobby Smith, Glenn Robertson, Ray Lane, John Christensen, Mark Pirruccello and Mike Rubel assure an over-

all improvement," says Garrido.

Palmer, a junior outfielder, hit .346 for the Titans last spring, with eight homeruns and 49 RBI. Dan Hanggie, who started last season as a freshman third baseman, hit only .249, but hit over .400 in summer ball in Alaska. Weatherman and Hudson were both starters last season as freshmen; Weatherman compiling a 9-3 record and Hudson a 4-3 mark.

Smith is a junior college transfer from Orange Coast College, where he hit .507 with 42 stolen bases. He is a lefthanded outfielder. Robertson, also from Orange Coast, hit .393 and will play shortstop. Lane, a righthanded pitcher from Southwestern Junior College in San Diego, compiled an 11-2 mark last spring.

Christensen, Pirruccello and Rubel are incoming freshmen, and were All-C.I.F. selections as prep seniors.

Christensen hit over .500 in league play at Troy High School in Fullerton, and was the MVP of the North-South All-Star game. He was a first team All-C.I.F. pick.

Pirruccello is a lefthanded catcher/first baseman, and hit .380 at Servite High School in Anaheim.

Rubel is also a catcher/first baseman (righthanded), who hit .390 at Banning High School. He was a fourth round draft choice of the Chicago White Sox.

"We feel very strongly that our three JC transfers and three freshmen will make strong contributions to our club this season," said Garrido.

The Titans will be favored to win their third consecutive Southern California Baseball Association Title in '79,

but Garrido sees Pepperdine and Long Beach State as threats.

"Pepperdine will have about as much talent as anyone in the conference, and Long Beach State has a great many returning lettermen. However, I feel they'll have to beat us. We've won the title enough times to feel that's the case. The SCBA is as tough and well balanced as any league in the country, however."

The inclusion of Arizona State and Arizona in the Pac-10 next season will make the NCAA's District 8 un-

questionably the toughest district in the nation.

"The District 8 (Far West) champion is usually one of collegiate baseball's perennial powers," says Garrido, "with the national champion coming out of this district. The addition of Arizona State and Arizona gives us two new teams to deal with, and they will obviously have a major impact on the district. Year in, and year out, USC, ASU and Arizona have programs too strong not to be a factor. However, the turnover of players this season at those schools gives us and the remainder of the teams in the district the best opportunity to win the district championship we've had in sometime, if only from an experience standpoint."

Although Garrido will have one of his best teams, the Titans' 1979 schedule is by far the toughest in the school's history. Besides playing the 28-game SCBA schedule, CSF faces every team in the southern division of the Pac-10 (USC, Arizona, Arizona State, UCLA, Stanford and Cal-Berkeley), Hawaii, San Diego State and New Mexico. Hawaii was ranked number one nationally for part of last season, and San Diego State and New Mexico

will be the co-favorites to win the southern division of the Western Athletic Conference.
