Grey law: Legal Aid for Seniors

When considering the needs of the elderly in our community, one generally thinks of medical, transportation, income maintenance, housing and food. The area of senior legal rights is rarely mentioned, yet the law plays a significant role in each of the

For example, seniors living on a fixed retirement or government benefit program rely on this income and generally ignore the various regulations that guide their continuance. And senior renters need to know of their rights as tenants, while homeowners are concerned with the improvement or transfer of their property. Transportation and food, basics to us all, are guided by a variety of considerations when seen from an economic standpoint. A legal quagmire that interrupts a senior's income will severely impede his or her ability to obtain these basic necessities.

Grey Law is a nonprofit law firm that was established to pro-

tect senior rights and to provide access to the legal system. Unable to pay the costs of an attorney or find legal assistance, a senior with a legal problem may choose to ignore a frightful or stress-causing legal problem, and this can complicate his life. Indeed a legal problem can be a life or death situation if help is not

Grey Law's purpose is to provide legal advice, counseling, representation and document-preparation to those over 60, with the goal of improving the lives of the elderly.

To operate such a program requires the commitment of dedicated and concerned persons. Indeed, Grey Law would not survive without the financial and volunteer support of the Ventura County community. The volunteer program involves attorneys, paralegals, law students and those who help with fundraising ac-

It is now stretching to reach more county seniors, and with this expansion, will need an infusion of new support. If you are considering doing some volunteer work, think about Grey Law. (Telephone 653-0694)

Nominating Committee Member Responds to Complaint

In answer to the Villager's letter concerning Nominating procedure in L.V., I would like to respond.

1. The CC&R's provision of having a nominating committee choose candidates for the Board of Directors is a valid and universally accepted method. The committee would be most useful, however, in the circumstance of having to choose among MANY volunteers to evaluate the best qualified candidates for the job.

2. When this Nominating Committee began its work in December, I was determined (as were others) to name 5 or 6 candidates to fill the three offices which would be vacated, so Villagers WOULD have a choice.

3. Announcements were made, letters were sent out, club meetings were attended, committees were reviewed, all to find qualified people. Every avenue we could think of was used to alert residents to the

4. More than 50 people were asked to consider being nominated for the Board. Every person whose name was suggested to us within the time limit was contacted.

5. The Committee received only 5 affirmative responses. Three were well qualified and were quickly nominated. The other two were fine, sincere people, but neither had a working knowledge of the business of the Village.

6. The Committee was obligated to consider the criteria for nominees: productive work or career experience, no conflict of interest, good health, knowledge of Village affairs, ability to make sound decisions on behalf of the entire Village.

7. If someone had wished to make a nomination by petition, it could have been started weeks ahead of the Committee report. Or, the parties could have come forward and offered their names for consideration. Much time and energy could have been saved, and we might have had more candi-

Why did we nominate only three? Because that's all there were. It was neither the intent nor the desire to deprive Villagers of a choice. We are grateful to have had three nominees to present. Do you want to change something?

Try to change people's attitudes toward accepting responsibility.

Gruber and Esty Address Forum

In accordance with its stated purpose "to provide L.V. residents with information and viewpoints about issues that affect their lives," the Current Issues Forum recently heard a discussion of impending changes in the operation of Pleasant Valley Hospital and an illustated talk on "The State of the City."

At the Forum's meeting on May 27th, Norman Gruber, executive director of PVH, told of the plan to convert the hospital to a non-profit corporation, so as to develop a structure flexible enough to meet future needs.

He said that the hospital would continue as a "Public Benefit Corporation," yet be in a position to derive income from certain auxiliary pursuits. Such income is needed to compensate for anticipated declines in Medicare and Medical payments.

Gruber said that the new

9 to 11 members, whose 2-year terms would be staggered to hospital board would consist of insure continuity of management.

Vice Mayor F. B. (Bill) Esty addressed the Fourth Anniversary Luncheon of the Forum on June 3rd at the Mercury Savings and Loan facility on Arneill Road.

Esty prefaced his remarks with the reassuring words: "The city is in strong financial shape."

He spelled out the various capital improvement projects that are being considered, such as a new city corporation yard, road improvements, including the Las Posas-Upland Road connection, and certain changes on Santa Rosa Road. None of these projects will require additional taxes, he asserted.

On July 1st Bill Esty will assume the chairmanship of the Ventura Country Association of Governments.

Lay wet suits on the benches?


Leave your shoes on the floor for someone to trip over?



PROFILE: David and Isabel Dominguez

If a Collectors clique ever convened in L.V., David and Isabel Dominguez could be considered candidates for inclusion.

David collects clocks, and Isabel favors dolls. Combined, their home can qualify as a museum of time and toys.

Dave's hobby began in 1941 when he got tired of watching Belle buy antiques, and he acquired his clock*1. When he found he could not fix it, he enrolled in a night school class in Antique Clock Repair. He was "hooked," and began to buy more. At one time, he owned over 400. He put them in operating condition and in a feat of timing, he set 52 clocks so they would chime continuously at the hour. It took about 5 minutes to hear them all signal noon.

The collection contains some clocks of rare value. He is most proud of his two Grand Sonnerie chiming clocks with their antique pendulums. He has a Japy Freres made in Paris between 1840-1850 which was

last owned by Clark Gable. A Seth Thomas calendar clock with two dials is another rarity.

As with many objets d'art, the collection increased in value many times. Selling only a portion bought the Valencia the Dominguez' now occupy. Dave has catalogued his treasures and though the house has dozens in the open, there are more than 100 still in storage.

Belle Dominguez just loves antiques: crystal, cut glass, furniture, buttons, handicrafts, lots more. Just ten years ago, her daughter sent her a greeting card with the picture of an antique doll on it. That did it! She had to have that doll, and since than, she has bought dolls, all kinds and sizes. She also took classes in restoring dolls, and has learned to dress them, re-wig them, and classify them; she has over 500 catalogued in her collection. Antique cupboards display many of them. Her oldest doll is a bisque beauty dating from · 1865, and although the silk is in tatters, she still wears the orig-

inal French gown. Her most valuable doll is a French Jumeau fashion doll made before 1900. Many of her dolls date from "our" childhoods, some bear personality names: Shirley Temple, Judy Garland, Sonja Henie, Ella Cinders, Dionne quintuplets. There are Madame Alexander and Bye-Lo babies.

David and Isabel both grew up in Los Angeles. They met when Belle was 7 years old at the Methodist Church located near Sunset and Figueroa where Isabel's father Rev. Christopher Valencia served as minister. They were boy and girl friends on and off throughout school years until a momentous "blind date" arranged by Belle's sister helped them decide to get married in 1939. They have two daughters.

Dave Dominguez' father was a telegrapher for the railroad. Dave remembers his mother and father sending
