Senior Legislature Meets

HMOs, elder abuse and geriatric training were among the top concerns of the recently concluded 4-day session of the California Senior Legislature (CSL).

Meeting in the impressive Senate and Assembly Chambers and the equally impressive committee hearing rooms of the State Capitol in Sacramento, the 120-member body debated, voted and prioritized some of the urgent concerns of California seniors.

While lacking real legislative authority, the CSL enjoys wide respect

Leisure Village And The Environment

A short time ago, each storm drain in the Village received a neatly stenciled message "DON'T DUMP, DRAINS TO CREEK," with the silhouette of a crane-like bird. That little statement seems commonplace enough, but leads to wondering how other things in L.V. affect the environment. Many of the procedures we have are just good housekeeping, but they can have consequences which we generally do not even think about. For example:

Trash: In olden times when populations were not so dense, people could toss out the junk they didn't want without much thought. From the midden heaps of Cavemen as well as the Ancient Ones of the Great Southwest, modern anthropologists have learned a great deal about their lifestyles by digging through the leavings. Progress, population, and sanitation now decree that our trash be buried.

E. J. Harrison Company trucks are familiar vehicles in the Village each week picking up trash, and twice a month to pick up recyclables. These trucks hold up to ten tons of material which is compacted to save space and is taken to the Oxnard Landfill. The charge to deposit trash at the Landfill is \$33.50 per ton. Sometime in the middle of 1996, the Oxnard site will be closed, and another location will have to be found. To close a dump, the area is sealed over the top with clay to prevent water seepage. Methane gas is generated naturally from the decaying matter inside the dump, and from it, electricity is already being produced. (Source: Mario, Supervisor at Harrison.)

Green waste, the lawn clippings, tree and shrub trimmings, amount to 1300 cubic yards per year. The green waste goes to a plant where it is composted and resold as mulch or a soil additive. A proposal for saving fuel and man-hours in the Village is being studied by using a growth retardant on a test area in Village 4 to see if the volume of clippings can be reduced.

The pine trees in the Village are a source both of pleasure and annoyance. In the past year, 130 pines have been removed because they were dangerous to dwellings, or diseased. They are being replaced with other varieties of trees which are less messy. Pine needles alone contribute greatly to the bulk of the green waste. (Source: Don Nelson, LVA)

Particularly hazardous to the creek would be waste oil and hydrocarbon products. As oil is changed by the staff in Village machines, it is stored in a large barrel (which is also available to recreational vehicle owners), and, periodically is hauled away. The old, dirty oil is reprocessed and sold for other purposes.

Much has been made of the fuel tank leak at the Association Office. When this was discovered, the tank was taken out, all earth directly around the site was removed (it was hauled to Arizona for disposal), and

fresh dirt was used to fill up the hole. Only about 45 gallons of fuel had leaked into the soil-not from the tank itself, but from the plumbing connections. Although it would seem to have been sufficiently cleaned up, the Ventura County Environmental Health Division, the agency in charge, has not written the incident off. L.V. Directors are still negotiating with the County.

The new fuel tank was installed with the most careful attention to vents, leak monitors, and a computerized system of pumping gasoline from the tank, where each withdrawal of fuel is documented as to its use.

Compromises are constantly being made to maintain the beauty of the Village and at the same time to cut down on use of water, fuel, and to moderate the amount of waste generated by our park-like community. In Camarillo, drinking water costs about \$600 per acre foot. Although we pay for water through our monthly assessments, there is also a small assessment for Camrosa Water District, Metropolitan Water and Calleguas Water on our tax bills. Village homes average about \$15.00 per month per household for water, and pay a flat rate of \$12.25 per month as a sewage charge. The cost to treat an acre foot of sewage is \$250. Camrosa Water District is building a new sewage plant near the Camarillo State Hospital on Lewis Road which should be ready to operate in January 1997. (Info from Richard Hajas, Manager, Camrosa.)

Studies are being made to see if it would be feasible for us to buy non-potable water for the golf course and common areas. The expense involved in revamping the water supply system to save about \$350 per acre foot over using potable water as we do at present, must be ascertained.

Whether or not we are conscious each day of how much our lives affect the larger community, the fact is that almost every time we turn around we use something, or we discard something. We are extravagant with resources, we indulge ourselves in the wealth of our country. A separate industry has grown up to handle the refuse from our cities. It is only natural to encourage the most efficacious handling of our resources as well as our discards.

As residents of a complex cosmopolitan area, we are mandated to clean up after ourselves and to pay for it. C'est la vie.

among the elected legislators and within the State administration. Lt. Gov. Gray Davis, newly elected Assembly Speaker Brian Setencich, and long-time, anyone interested in beand renowned Assemblyman Willie Brown were among the dignitaries who addressed the session's opening ceremonies.

When the legislature convenes its 1996 session in January, the CSL will begin its strong advocacy efforts to have the senior agenda authorized and adopted. Seventy per cent of the 1994 priority proposals were chaptered into law during the 1995 State's legislature session.

Senior legislators are elected by their peers in March of each even numbered year for a two year term. In Ventura County more than 90,000 seniors (13% of the total population) are represented by Sr. Assembly members Bob Unruhe of Ojai and

Eugenie Wheeler of Ventura, and by Sr. Senator Joe Ellenbogen of Leisure Village in Camarillo.

New elections will be held in March 1996 and coming a candidate for one of the three offices should contact the Ventura County Area Agency on Aging which conducts the elections. (Phone: 805-652-7560). It is a valuable. interesting and satisfying community service.

The CSL is a non-partisan, volunteer organization, serving without compensation and representing approximately 4 million people in California over 60. Financed mostly by donations through the California Fund for Senior Citizens, a voluntary check-off item on the California State income tax return, CSL also received contributions from individuals and groups. The LV Beautification Fund continues to grow, but as of now there are only 368 donors compared to a possible 2136 home owners in the Village. 

Profile: Walter Klinger

The kaleidoscopic life of Walter Klinger, V.44, included the cinema in its "golden years", Nazi persecution, war and its immediate aftermath, and more cinematic (later television) association.

Walter's life started in Vienna where he spent his boyhood. At the age of 18, he started a long-time affiliation with the film industry as a distributor with MGM in Berlin from 1929-1933. In 1933, after the rise of Nazism he returned to his hometown where he resumed movie distribution. He remained there until the Nazi take-over in 1938 when persecution for him and his family. During this period, he and Hertha were married (re-60th wedding anniversary)

With great difficulty, they obtained refugee status visas for France. After having left all their possessions in Vienna, Walter and Hertha departed for France with only five hundred dollars concealed in tubes of toothpaste. This was extremely risky, since discovery by the Nazis of currency on their persons would have had very dire

consequences.

Fortunately, they were able to make their way to France. However, their French visas permitted only temporary residence. The only place in the world where they could be accepted on a more permanent basis was Trinidad, British West Indies,

Europeans.

After finally landing in Trinidad, the Klingers found a limited welcome. Only native Creole or British citizens could be employed. However, despite these restrictions, he was once again working in movie film distribution (this in Trinidad where there were relatively few movie theaters).

After the onset of the second world war in 1939, life swiftly changed for the Klingers and the other refugees who had followed them, including immediate family members. Declared "enemy aliens" by the local authorities, they were transported to an internmade it extremely difficult ment camp where they existed under very primitive conditions.

After surviving eight cently they celebrated their months in the internment camp, they were able to obtain entry visas for the United States. Walter again capitalized on his cinema experience and obtained employment in St. Louis in movie advertising. Sometime later in 1941, he accepted another film-associated position in Portland, Oregon. From Portland, the Klingers moved to Hollywood where Walter was employed by Warner Brothers as a publicist in the Foreign Department (he was offered this position because of his fluency in several languages). During this time he acquired a mastery of Spanish which enabled him to participate in Warner Brothers' "Good Neighbor" policy positions (Latin American market). virtually unknown to most He also was very active in

German language public His most memorable exrelations.

After Pearl Harbor, Walter became involved in Warner Brothers' liaison with the U.S. Government's movie interests in Washington which included some of the top personnel at the fledgling Office of Strategic Serv-C.I.A.

Washington, he was assigned to the O.S.S. upon joining the U.S. Army. During his tenure with the O.S.S., he worked with Hans Habe, a legendary figure at that time, who was in charge of "psychological" warfare for the army.

After the German surrender, Walter was assigned to the U.S. Military Government and placed in charge of Arts in Bavaria.

periences during this time occurred during a visit to Vienna when he was able to re-possess his book collection which had been taken from his family under pressure when they left Austria. He managed to ship these to his home in the United States. Anices (O.S.S.), later the other experience occurred when he managed to find Through his contacts in his mother's grave under very difficult circumstances.

> After military separation. Walter resumed film distribution, eventually becoming operations manager in T.V. studios. During this portion of his career, he met many of the notables

of the screen. His memorabilia includes photographs with personal inscriptions by many famous personalities including Humphrey Bogart, Ida Lupino (a good friend), Errol Flynn, John Garfield, Ronald Reagan, Ingrid Bergman and many other Hollywood stars.

The contents of the Klinger's house reflects their many travels.

The art in their home includes a work by Van Dyke, an etching by Rembrandt, and other works by the Old Masters. There are many antique volumes in their library, including an original volume of the Martin Luther Tract printed in the sixteenth century. All of these art works and rare books are eventually destined for the Walter and Hertha Klinger Gallery of the Art Museum at the University of Southern California.

Truly, the life of Walter Klinger could be the subject of an extensive biography, T.V. miniseries or movie. He is indeed a remarkable man.





in-law asked our two grandsons who were about 10 and 13 at the time, to take the balloon structures out to the van. The officers took about a second to analyze what was going on, didn't say one word, but spun around and disappeared around the corner of the building almost as fast as they had come out. The whole incident may have taken 10 or 15 seconds--much less time than it takes to tell.

those officers even bothered to make a report, but that I thought I saw. This if they did, it might have been something like this: "Sunday, 5:00 p.m. Heard (or received reports of) multiple gunshots coming from the east parking lot. responded, approaching turned to go back, the the parking lot from around south side of rec center building. Observed two male juveniles picking up black and white scraps from parking lot. Probable source of noise: explosive release of gas from mulstyle, weapons at hand, tiple inflated rubber
